NEO AND ITS OBJECTIVE

Neo is a hierarchical data model for the representation of intracellular and extracellular electrophysiology data with support for multi-electrodes (for example tetrodes) and EEG data.

The Neo project distributes an implementation of this model with a set of input/output (IO) modules for various file formats, as an open-source, multi-platform Python package under a BSD license. It is available at http://pypi.python.org/pypi/neo.

The objective of Neo is to facilitate the cooperation between independent software projects working on simulation, modeling, representation and analysis of electrophysiological signals in electroencephalography or intracellular and extracellular electrophysiology.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PROJECT

The need for a common data model appeared in the NeuralEnsemble community (neuralensemble.org). The specification process started by considering the available data models in existing NeuralEnsemble tools for processing of experimental data (OpenElectrophy, NeuroTools) and for simulation (PyNN). Other projects with related goals were also considered, in particular the Neuroshare project (neuroshare.sourceforge.net). In this process, the limits of the data models in these different projects as well as the current and future uncovered needs were identified.

After discussions between Neural Ensemble members, a first implementation in Python of Neo (version 0.1) was produced during summer 2010 as part of the rewriting from scratch of OpenElectrophy. To respond to the needs of new projects interested in using Neo, some discussions took place in February 2011 for the specification of Neo 0.2. The main improvements introduced in Neo 0.2 are the possibility to handle physical quantities and the possibility to represent data items individually or grouped in arrays for improved processing efficiency and better handling of multichannel data.

For this, Neo provides a common representation of the core data in order to improve the reusability of the developed tools and share data between different projects. It also provides a common layer for datafile and database reading and writing through its IO modules.

The core objects and IO modules provided in the Neo 0.2 implementation are described below.

Architecture



- **Block**: Main container gathering all the data for a given setup, which can be viewed as a list of Segments.
- Segment: Container for heterogeneous data objects sharing a common time base, generally acquired during the same time period.
- AnalogSignal: A regular sampling of a continuous signal.
- AnalogSignalArray: A regular sampling of a multichannel continuous signal.
- **IrregularlySampledSignal**: An irregular sampling of a continuous signal.
- **RecordingChannel**: A physical location identifying the recorded data (for example the position of the electrode).



- **RecordingChannelGroup**: A set of physical locations identifying the recorded data (for example the positions of the electrodes).
- **SpikeTrain**: A set of action potential times (with optional waveforms) emitted by the same cell in a given time period.
- **Spike**: One action potential characterized by its time and waveform.
- Unit: A Unit gathers all the SpikeTrain objects within a common Block, across several Segments, that have been emitted by the same cell.
- **Event**: Point-like time event (triggers, stimulus,...)
- **EventArray**: A set of Events
- **Epoch**: Similar to Event but with a duration (period, state of a subject,...)
- **EpochArray**: A set of Epochs

INPUT/OUTPUT MODULES

Neo provides of a set of IO modules to convert data from/to many file formats used for multichannel recordings of electrophysiological data. The IO module API also enables access to databases for the storage of Neo objects.

Compared to other projects, Neo has the specificity to provide these converters as free and open-source pure Python code, which ensures transparent multiplatform use and upgradability.

The file formats currently supported in Neo 0.2 are: ASCII, Axon, EEGLAB, Elan, HFD5, Micromed, NeuroExplorer, Plexon, PyNN, raw, Spike2, TDT, WinEDR, WinWCP, Neuroshare (win32 only).

Some new IO modules are currently in development or planned (AlphaOmega, Brainvision, EDF, Elphy), and others will be added in the future.

PERSPECTIVES

Neo 0.2 is currently in development and will be released towards the end of this summer.

Neo is a young project which is still open to evolution and welcomes new contributions. You can join the Neo initiative by:
