Goals

- Study microbial biodegradation of infiltration structure soils
- Testing different parameters that could influence microbial biodegradation efficiency :
 - Age of the structure
 - Vegetation
 - Soil composition
 - Heterogeneity within the same structure: upstream/downstream

Kinetic design





Controls:

- biotic controls without micropollutants
- abiotic controls without microorganisms

Physico-chemical analysis

⇒ Observation of changes in the environment and MP biodegradation

Analysis

- Determination of targeted micropollutants: BPA, 4-NP and OP (biodegradation efficiency)
- pH (impact on the environment)

Biological analysis

- ⇒ Study of the abundance, activity and microbial diversity that can be impacted by the presence of MP
- MPN (microbial biomass: most probable number)
- CO₂ (microbial biomass)
- Biolog (microbial activity)
- Sequencing Illumina bacterial diversity : RNA 16S V3-V4

Results - BPA biodegradation









- ⇒ Very high biodegradation efficiency of the 2 Dourdan soils ⇒ 100% biodegradation of BPA
- \Rightarrow High biodegradation efficiency from Vitry
 - \Rightarrow 100% biodegradation of BPA
 - \Rightarrow Except Vitry downstream tree

 \Rightarrow Biodegradation efficiency of Noue: almost 60% of BPA

- \Rightarrow Different biodegradation rates
 - \Rightarrow Vitry upstream plant 100%: 7 days
 - \Rightarrow Vitry downstream plant 100%: 17

 \Rightarrow Other Compan soils not efficient for biodegradation

Complete biodegradation

 \Rightarrow Dourdan, Vitry and Swale: soils best suited to biodegradation

Results - Relationship between BPA biodegradation efficiency and soil genetic diversity



\Rightarrow Compans:

- \Rightarrow associated with Alphaproteobacteria and Firmicutes
- \Rightarrow BFS1_V_Down
 - \Rightarrow far from the elipse
 - \Rightarrow associated with the Gemmatimonadetes,
 - Actinobacteria, Acidobacteria and other phyla..
- \Rightarrow Dourdan, Vitry and BFS_C soils:
 - \Rightarrow associated with Betaproteobacteria, Bacteroidetes, Gammaproteobacteria and Deltaproteobacteria.
- \Rightarrow Negative correlation between Firmincutes and Alphaproteobacteria with the rest of the phyla present.
- ⇒ Correlation of biodegradation efficiency with genetic diversity
 ⇒ about 60% of the information in my data is represented on this plane



Bilan

Our study shows:

⇒Significant differences in micropollutant biodegradation efficiencies: positive effect of hydrological load, duration of functioning and vegetation cover.

- \Rightarrow biodegradation efficiency ranging from 0 to 100%.
- \Rightarrow time to 100% biodegradation with the same site can vary from 7 to 17 days

 \Rightarrow The Dourdan and Vitry sites: the most active in terms of biodegradation:

- \Rightarrow dominance of beta-proteobacteria or a greater diversity than the Compans soils.
- \Rightarrow Firmicutes and Alphaproteobacteria are positively correlated with soils not biodegrading at all.
- ⇒A more detailed genetic diversity analysis is underway to try and identify the families that are characteristic of these pollutants.
- ⇒The kinetics were continued with the 2 most interesting soils, IB_D_Up and BFS_C, this time using columns of soil taken directly from the sites in order to be under more real-life conditions.



The results are among the first to associate diversity, microbial functionality and biodegradation potential of MOPs in structural soils. They will be useful for understanding and managing stormwater treatment facilities.
