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Road runoff: one of the most polluted types of urban stormwater



- Pollutant sources
  - Road surfaces
  - Tires
  - Break pads
  - Exhaust fumes
  - Vehicle components
  - Fuel, oil, lubricants
  - Road pain and signs...

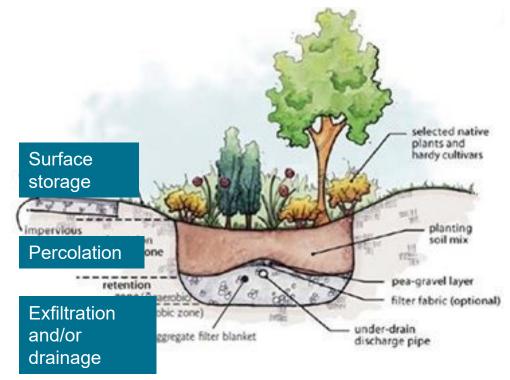

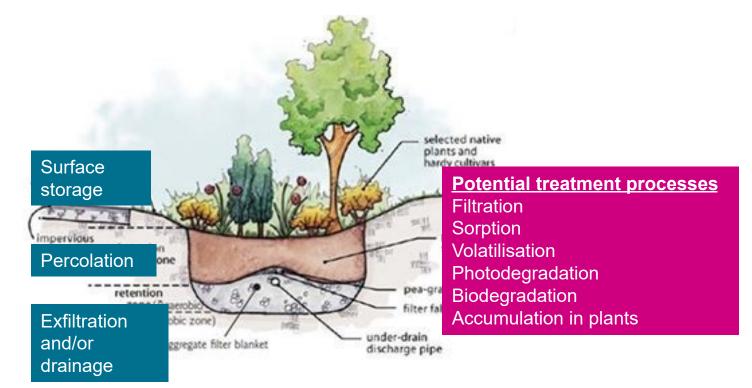
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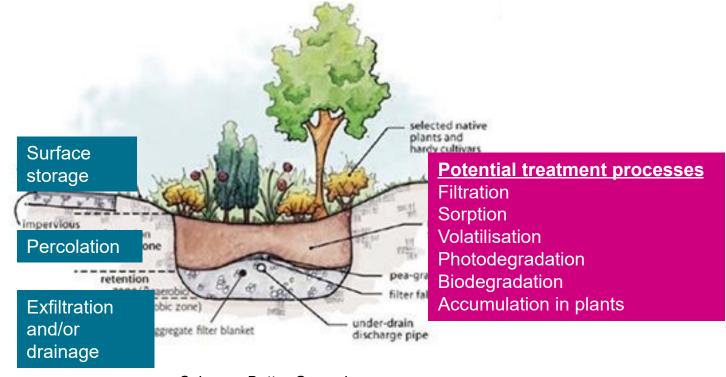
### Stormwater treatment using biofiltration Technology



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✓ Biofiltration can effectively treat organic micropollutants (Flanagan et al., 2018; Beryani et al., 2023)

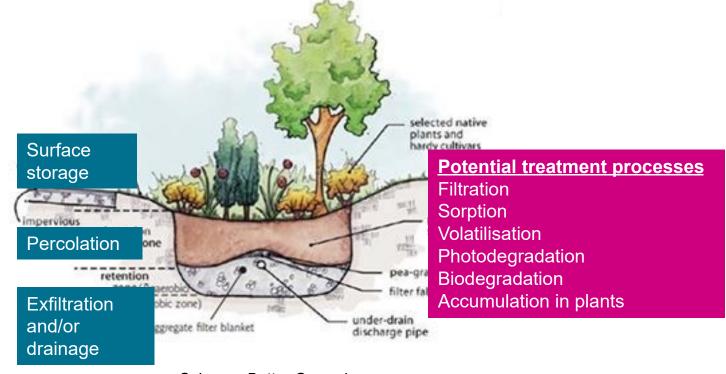
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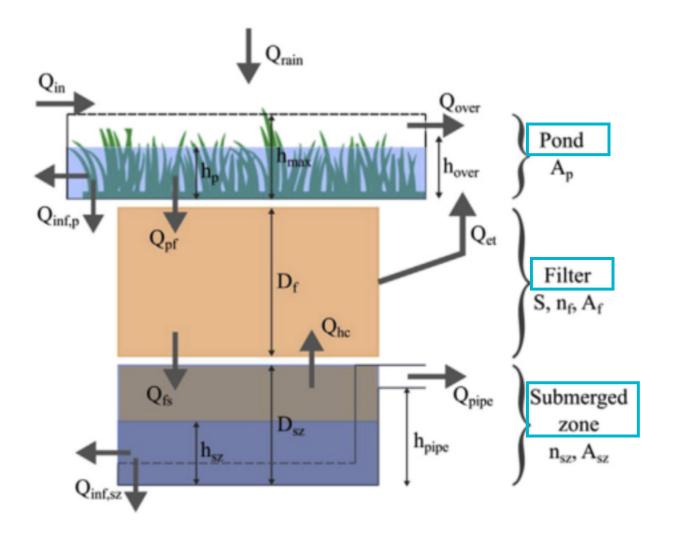


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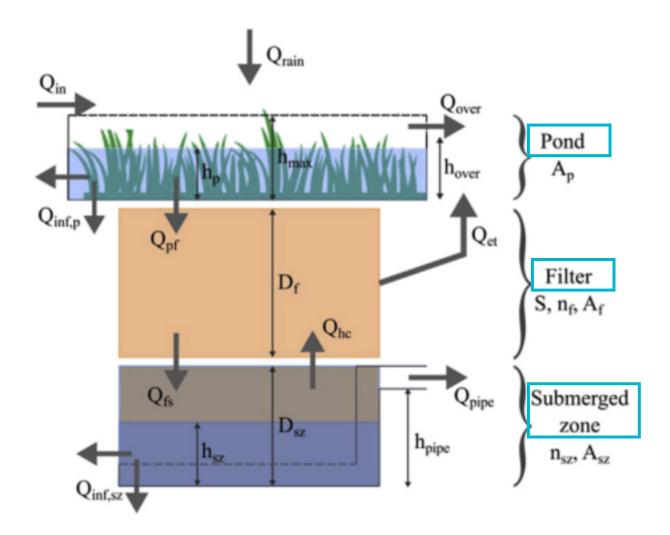

Process-based **pollutant transport** module:

- Advection
- Dispersion
- Volatilisation
- Sorption
- Biodegradation





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Compare 1-year pollutant loads (with uncertainty propagation) established from field data and model

- 2 Trace metals
  - Copper
  - Zinc
- 2 PAHs
  - Pyrene (Pyr)
  - Phenanthrene (Phen)
- 1 Phthalate
  - DEHP
- 2 Alkylphenols
  - Nonylphenol (NP)
  - Octylphenol (OP)

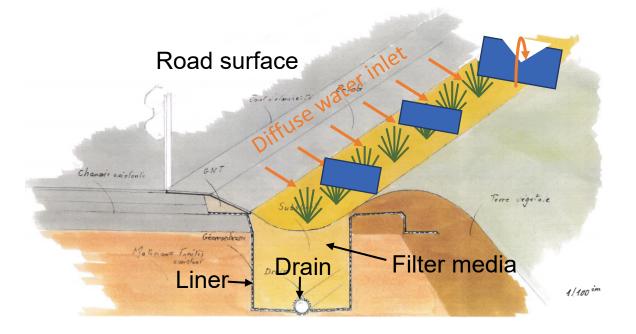
Diversity of physicochemical properties (K<sub>D</sub>, K<sub>OW</sub>, degradability...)

### Methods Compans field data set





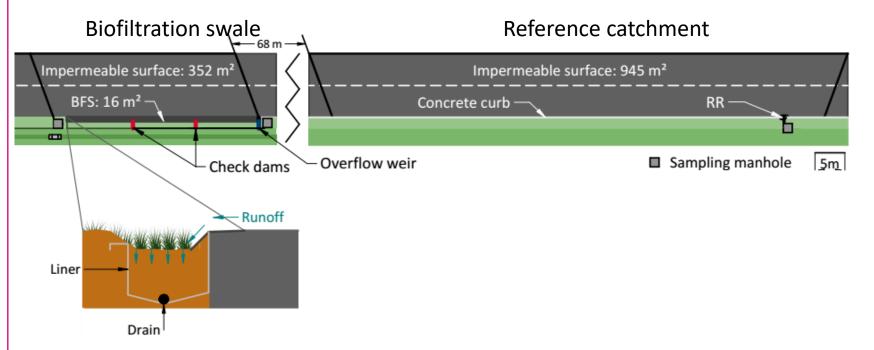
- Constructed March 2016
- Drained, lined, located directly at the road
- 50 cm filter media (sandy loam, alkaline pH, low organic matter content)
- 30 m x 0.7 m
- Check dams & overflow weir (installed in June 2016)

#### **Sampling & Measurement**



#### Flow proportional event mean water sampling

- BFS: drained water from the biofiltration swale (15 events)
- RR: untreated road runoff from nearby reference catchment (14 events)
  - Continuous flow and rainfall measurement

(Flanagan et al., 2018)

#### **Annual pollutant loads**

$$M = \sum C_{ev} V_{ev}$$

#### Numerous uncertainties!

#### **Monte-Carlo uncertainty propagation**

Uncertain terms varied within a distribution of possible values

- Analytical uncertainty
- C<sub>ev</sub> for unsampled events?
- V<sub>ev</sub> when measurements unavailable or invaldated?
- Analytical or flow measurement uncertainties?

**X 10 000** to characterize overall uncertainties in each term

### Modelling approach



**Calibration** of **hydrologic module** using rainfall, potential evapotranspiration and drain outflow data



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**Calibration** of **hydrologic module** using rainfall, potential evapotranspiration and drain outflow data

**Uncertainty analysis** of **pollutant module**: drain outlet pollutant concentrations and loads

Initial loss model on catchment

Calibration of D (depression storage)
Adjustment of catchment surface

**Semi-2D representation** of biofiltration swale to account for slope and check-dams (swale represented as three 1-D sections)

Calibration of Ks (hydraulic conductivity)

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#### **Monte-Carlo** method

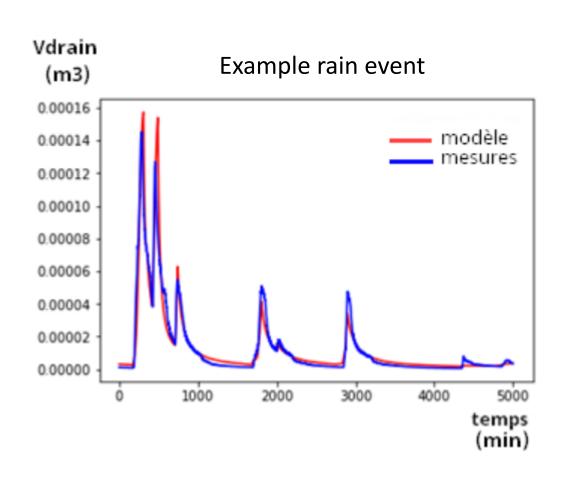
**Variation** of pollutant transport parameters in **possible ranges** 

Uncertainty analysis of pollutant module: drain

- H<sub>c</sub> (Henry's constant)
- f<sub>e</sub> (fraction of sorption sites in instantaneous equilibrium)
- K<sub>oc</sub> (organic carbon partition coefficient)
- $\alpha_{\kappa}$  (rate of kinetic sorption)
- T<sub>1/2</sub> (biodegradation half-life)
- $\alpha_1$  (dispersivity)

### Results hydrologic module





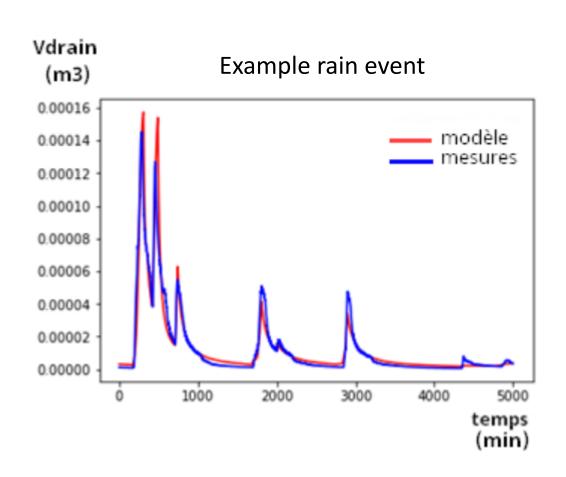
Final configuration of the biofiltration swale:

Nash-sutcliffe = 0.7

Modelled outflow volume = measured volume

### Results hydrologic module





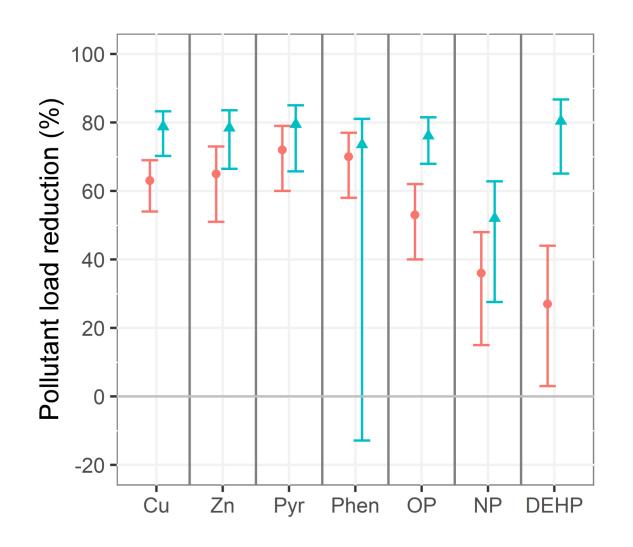
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Significant effort required to adjust model to the site (Adjustment of configuration and parameters)





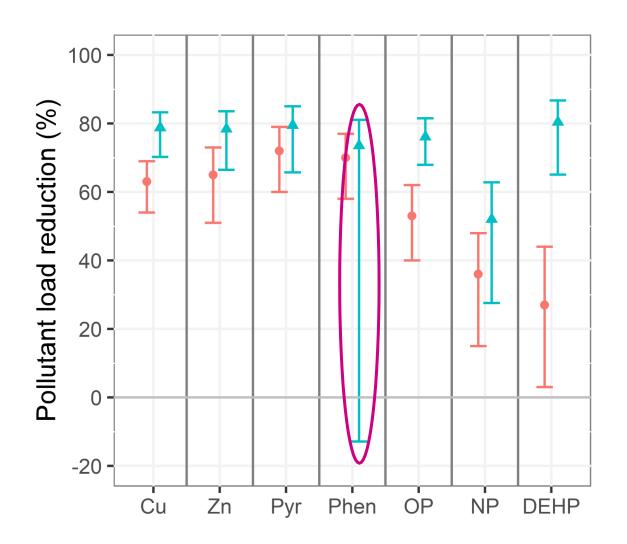
Legend

$$Load\ reduction = \left(1 - \frac{M_{drain} + M_{over}}{M_{in}}\right)100$$





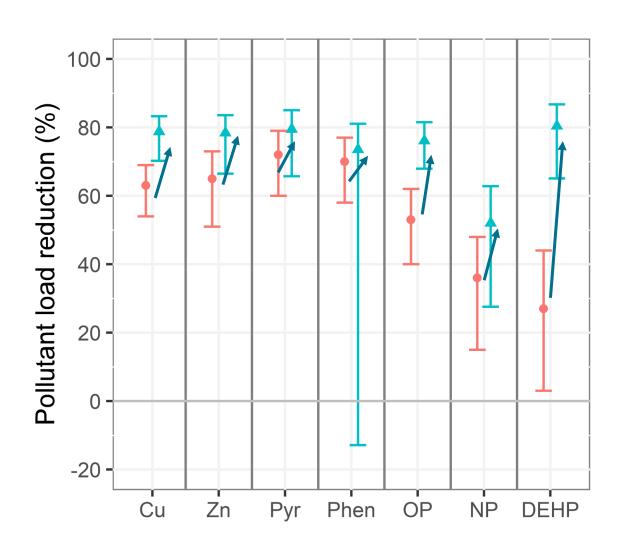
Large uncertainties in modeled load reduction Especially for phenanthrene, which had log(Koc) in huge range: 2.42-6.02

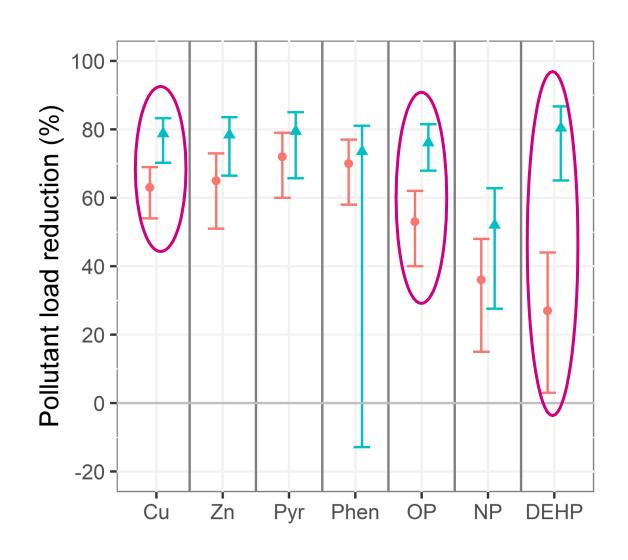

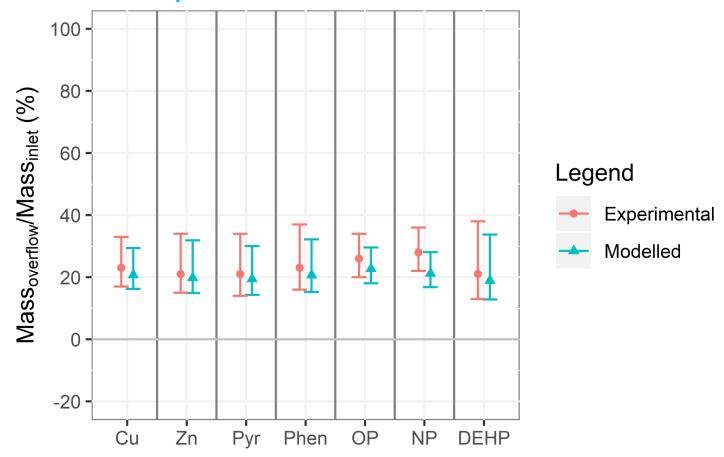

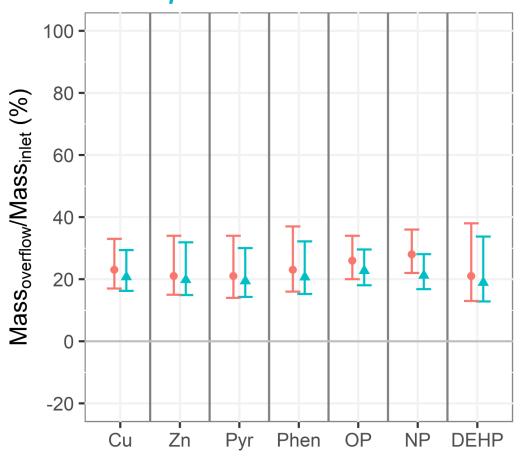
#### Proportion overflowed



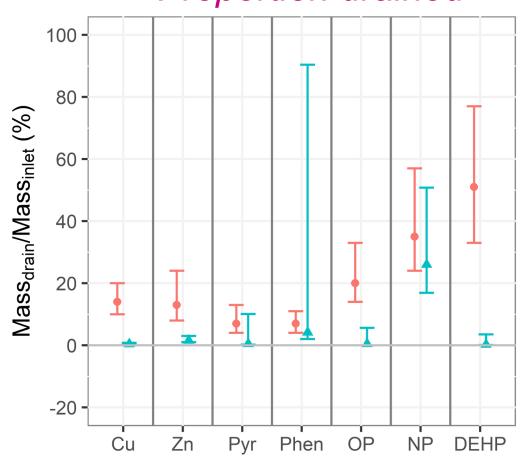

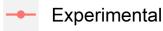




#### Proportion drained

Significant differences for Cu, Zn, OP and DEHP



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- Solid-liquid partitioning in the liquid phase
- Particle transport and physical filtration
  - In particular, colloidal transport (consider particle size as well as solid-liquid)

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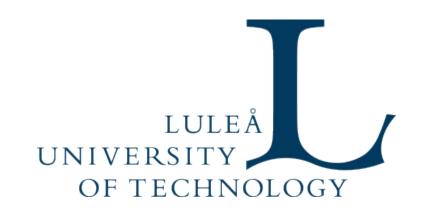
But can we really desire or expect models to represent this?

### Conclusions



- MPiRE's hydrologic module provided a good fit for outflow
  - Flow not evenly distributed: necessitates semi 2D configuration
- MPiRE's pollutant transport module tends to over-predicts pollutant removal
  - Speciation limiting treatability?
  - Unexpected processes (e.g. pollutant emissions from construction materials) cannot be represented by a model
- Applying process-based models to field data can allow us to develop a better understanding of processes occurring in biofilters
