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
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NOVEL TOOLS FOR AUTOMATED ACTIVITY MONITORING OF FOREST BIRD COMMUNITIES

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RATIONALE

- Activity data are essential for accurate conservation schemes as they shed light on species space use and timing of activity
- For many small vertebrates in dense habitats, the fine-scale monitoring of activity patterns is limited
- We developed a novel, automated method based on fixed VHF antennas allowing to classify movement states in small flying vertebrates





Fixed VHF antennae

METHODS

Fig. 1. Marburg Open Forest, Germany

Location of fixed VHF stations in red



Train Machine Learning model to detect active / passive bouts from VHF signals

Model validation:
Birds, bats and humans




Fig. 2. Probability of activity predicted over 24 h for 13 forest bird species.

Hierarchical Generalized Additive Models of active / passive states classified over 1-min intervals



Comparison of circadian activity patterns among 13 common European forest bird species

KEY FINDINGS




Fig. 3. Onset of activity compared among species.

Onset: time when $P(\text{activity})$ at minimum




Fig. 4. Correlation of activity bouts among species.

$r > 0$: synchronized
 $r < 0$ avoidance

- Forest songbirds are mostly synchronized in activity onset and duration of activity bouts
- Automated tools now allow the monitoring of an entire community of small flying vertebrates
