The need for more knowledge on minor crops' pests

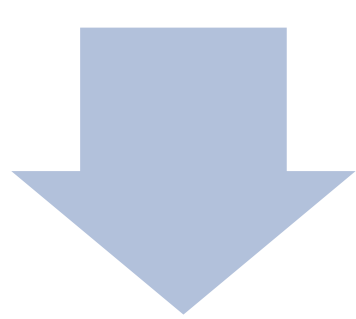
- To control pests without pesticide, innovative cropping systems should be designed, at different spatial scales
- To this aim, crop diversification is a major lever (Meynard et al., 2018)
- Yet, we face a lack of scientific and technical knowledge on minor crops, and on their pests, and practices to control them

Our OBJECTIVE

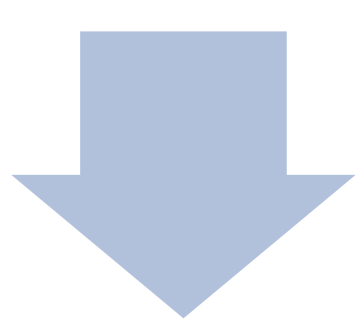
Was to develop a **knowledge-based tool** to gather knowledge on pests, and practices able to control them, in the view to support the design of pesticide-free systems

DEVELOPPING the TOOL showing links between functions acting on pests and practices

We first observed designers of low-pesticide systems, in design workshops, to identify the knowledge they used



Gathering all this information, we then developed generic knowledge-based tool to support exploration (generative knowledge structures, Brun et al., 2016)



We then built the tool on the example of legume pests with various contributors (students, researchers, ...)



- Extract of the knowledge-based tool on lentil bruchid (*Bruchus signaticornis*)

- Rules to build the tool:

- The tool describes the successive **pest life cycle stages**
- For each stage, **functions** that can impair the pest life cycle were defined. Sub functions were given when different strategies were possible to reach the function
- For each function, a range of possible **farming practices** was proposed
- We specify whether this knowledge is (i) stabilized (frequent) or hypothetical, and whether it arises (ii) from literature or from innovative farmers

Perspectives

- The tool is thought to be evolutive, being enriched by feedbacks from users in design situations (Cerf et al., 2012)
- Such knowledge-based tool should be included in the national GECO platform, to enhance a wide contribution and use (Guichard et al., 2017)
- Knowledge derived from on-farm innovation tracking could enrich such tool (Salembier et al., 2021)

>> Knowledge capitalization is a difficult and time-consuming activity, needing crafting, BUT is determinant to document and share scattered actionable knowledge, thus enhancing open innovation for agroecological transition
