
Wood heating mode in the Pays de Bitche : between identity and resource

A territory characterized by its forest

This map was designed to point out two physical aspects of the Pays de Bitche (PdB):

- Its forest occupies a large amount of the territory
- The forest occupies mostly the eastern part of the territory also called « covered land », in contrast of the « uncovered land » at the west

Furthermore, this map is an extract from an on-going study, that deals with the repartition of the heating modes in the PdB. Its forest plays a major role in the using of wood heating mode.

Wood: a tangle of symbols and beliefs

« Wood is reassuring, it's like a « livret bleu », we have wood for 10 years, we can sleep peacefully » according to an interlocutor

- · Wood is considered as safe by its stock
- Belief in wood: it is a ritualized object, through the repeatability of its stocking
- Cheap : it knows a renewed interest with today's increasing energy prices
- A political object: it responds to a strong desire for autonomy by producing their own wood, in private or public forests (Photo 2)
- Cultural heritage: wood has a high identity value (Photo 1 « Swedish oak » in Reyersviller, which was used to hang people in the XVIIth century)





Wood: a social object

- Intergenerational attachment : it enlightens the reproduction of parents/grandparents's practices
- Wood creates social ties: it requires organization and a concrete social encounter, that involves the user with one or more groups (family, friends, neighbors)
