Moving layers and damage coupling with elasto-plasticity

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- Objective : what is coupling between plasticity and damage.
- Simple model : perfect plasticity or linear kinematic hardening, and isotropic hardening
- Influence of the choice of rupture criterion.

Rupture criterion



 $\Phi(\varepsilon,\alpha) = \frac{1}{2}C(\varepsilon-\alpha)^2 + \frac{1}{2}H\alpha^2$

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Quasi-brittle material



At critical point, a jump of energy occurs

$$\Phi_{1}(\varepsilon,\alpha) = \frac{1}{2}(\varepsilon - \alpha) : \mathbb{C}_{1} : (\varepsilon - \alpha_{1}) + \frac{1}{2}\alpha_{1} : \mathbb{H}_{1} : \alpha_{1}$$

$$\Phi_{2}(\varepsilon,\alpha_{2}) = \frac{1}{2}(\varepsilon - \alpha_{2}) : \mathbb{C}_{2} : (\varepsilon - \alpha_{2}) + \frac{1}{2}\alpha_{2} : \mathbb{H}_{2} : \alpha_{2}$$
It suffices point the plantic violating function $f(\varepsilon - \mathbb{H}_{1} : \alpha)$

At critical point the plastic yielding function $f(\sigma - \mathbb{H} : \alpha) \leq 0$ Material 2 has initial strain α_2 , which must be compatible with

Discussion

- Material 1 changes to material 2 homogeneously on the bar
- Another answer is possible : let a damage phase appears at x = 0,

$$\Phi_1(\varepsilon,\alpha_1) = \frac{1}{2}C_1(\varepsilon-\alpha_1)^2 + \frac{1}{2}H_1\alpha_1^2$$

Dissipation is now

$$D_m = A_1 \dot{\alpha}_1 (1 - \gamma) + \mathcal{G} \dot{\gamma}$$
$$\mathcal{G} = \llbracket \Phi \rrbracket_{\Gamma} - \Sigma \llbracket \varepsilon \rrbracket_{\Gamma} = \frac{1}{2} \Sigma \llbracket \varepsilon - \alpha \rrbracket_{\Gamma} - \Sigma \llbracket \alpha \rrbracket_{\Gamma} + \frac{1}{2} \llbracket H \alpha^2 \rrbracket_{\Gamma}$$

Uniaxial investigation

Consider a bar under uni-axial tension

$$\begin{aligned} x < x_o: \quad \Phi &= \frac{1}{2}C_o\varepsilon_o^2\\ x_o < x < \gamma(t): \quad \Phi &= \frac{1}{2}C_o(\varepsilon_2 - \alpha_2)^2 + \frac{1}{2}H_2\alpha_2^2\\ \gamma(t) < x < 1: \quad \Phi &= \frac{1}{2}(\varepsilon_1 - \alpha_1(t))^2C_1 + \frac{1}{2}H_1\alpha_1^2\\ \Sigma &= C_o\varepsilon_o = C_o(\varepsilon_2 - \alpha_2) = C_1(\varepsilon_1 - \alpha_1) \end{aligned}$$

Global strain

$$E = x_o \varepsilon_o + (\gamma - x_o) \varepsilon_2 + (1 - \gamma) \varepsilon_1$$

Global irreversible strain

$$E_{ir} = (\gamma - x_o)lpha_2 + (1 - \gamma)lpha_1$$

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Rigidity

$$E = rac{1}{K} \Sigma, \quad rac{1}{K} = rac{\gamma}{C_o} + rac{1-\gamma}{C_1}$$

Rigidity changes with the motion of γ .

$$E_{ir} = (x_o - \gamma)\alpha_2 + (1 - \gamma)\alpha_1, \quad \dot{E}_{ir} = \dot{\gamma}(\alpha_2 - \alpha_1) + (1 - \gamma)\dot{lpha}_1$$

Two terms = rupture + plasticity

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Plasticity is governed by normality law

$$f(\Sigma - H_1\alpha_1) = ||\Sigma - H_1\alpha_1|| - \sigma_o \le 0, \quad \dot{\alpha_1} \ge 0, \quad f\dot{\alpha}_1 = 0$$

The solution is given as

$$\alpha_1 = \frac{C_1}{C_1 + H_1} (E - \frac{\sigma_o}{C_1}), \quad \Sigma = \sigma_o + H_1 \alpha_1$$

When $\alpha_1 = \alpha_c$, rupture occurs

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$$\begin{aligned} \mathcal{G} &= \frac{1}{2} \Sigma \llbracket \varepsilon - \alpha \rrbracket_{\mathsf{r}} - \Sigma \llbracket \varepsilon \rrbracket_{\mathsf{r}} + \frac{1}{2} \llbracket H \alpha^2 \rrbracket_{\mathsf{r}} \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \Sigma^2 (\frac{1}{K_2} - \frac{1}{K_1}) - \Sigma \llbracket \alpha \rrbracket_{\mathsf{r}} + \frac{1}{2} \llbracket H \alpha^2 \rrbracket_{\mathsf{r}} \end{aligned}$$

For α continuous and H₂ ≤ H₁, then G ≥ 0
 If G = G_c then Σ, α are determined, The transformation occurs, and the state is determined by E.

$$E = x\varepsilon_1 + (1-x)\varepsilon_o, \quad \dot{E} = \dot{x}(\varepsilon_1 - \varepsilon_o) = \dot{x}\Sigma(\frac{1}{C_1} - \frac{1}{C_o})$$

• For $\llbracket \alpha \rrbracket_r < 0, \alpha_2 - \alpha_1 > 0, H_2 = H_1$, $\mathcal{G} > 0$ A criterion $\mathcal{G} = \mathcal{G}_c$ gives $\Sigma = \Sigma_c$ $\Sigma - H\alpha_1 < \Sigma - H\alpha_o = \sigma_o$ Plasticity remains unchanged. Consider a sphere under radial loading



During monotone process : three phases occur

- : Elasticity
- : Plasticity
- : Propagation of interface

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Case of a composite sphere

$$c = \frac{R_i^3}{R_e^3}$$

Elastic domain R_p, R_e

$$\frac{u}{r} = a + b\frac{R_p^3}{r^3}; \quad E = a + bp, \quad p = \frac{R_p^3}{R_e^3}$$
$$\sigma_{rr} = 3K_oa - 4\mu b\frac{Rp^3}{r^3}, \quad \sigma_{\theta\theta} = 3K_oa + 2\mu_o b\frac{R_p^3}{r^3}$$

Plastic domain $R_i, R_p \ \varepsilon_p = \alpha(r)(2 \ \boldsymbol{e}_r \otimes \boldsymbol{e}_r \ - \ \boldsymbol{e}_\theta \otimes \boldsymbol{e}_\theta \ - \ \boldsymbol{e}_\phi \otimes \boldsymbol{e}_\phi)$

$$\sigma_{\theta\theta} - \sigma_{rr} = \sigma_o, \quad b = \frac{\sigma_o}{6\mu_o}, \quad \operatorname{Tr}(\sigma) = 3K_o \operatorname{Tr}(\varepsilon)$$
$$\frac{\mathrm{d}\sigma_{rr}}{\mathrm{d}r} - 2\frac{\sigma_o}{r} = 0, \sigma_{rr} = \sigma_I + 2\sigma_o \ln(\frac{r}{R_i^3})$$
$$\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}r} \left(\frac{L_o}{r^2} \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}r} (r^2 u)\right) = \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}r} \left(L_o \operatorname{Tr} \varepsilon\right) = 12\mu_o \frac{1}{r^2} \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}r} (r^3 \alpha(r))$$

In the core, elastic properties K_2, μ_2

$$u(r) = A_2 r, \quad \sigma_{rr} = 3K_2 A_2 = \sigma_1$$

$$\alpha = \gamma_o \left(1 - \frac{R_p^3}{r^3}\right), \quad \gamma_o \frac{3K_o + 4\mu_o}{18\mu_o K_o}$$
$$\Sigma = 3K_o \left(E - \frac{\sigma_o}{6\mu_o} - \frac{2}{3}\sigma_o p\right)$$
$$E = \frac{\sigma_o}{6\mu_o} p + \frac{2\sigma_o}{9K_o} \log \frac{p}{c} + \frac{1}{3K_o} \left(\sigma_I + \frac{2\sigma_o}{3}\right)$$
$$\sigma_I \left(\frac{1}{K_2} - \frac{1}{K_1}\right) = \frac{p}{c} \frac{3K_o + 4\mu_o}{6K_o\mu_o}$$

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Dissipation

Energy

$$2W = \frac{1}{\Omega} \int_{\Omega} \sigma_{rr} (\varepsilon_{rr} - 2\alpha(r) + 2\sigma_{\theta\theta} (\varepsilon_{\theta\theta} - \alpha(r)) \, \mathrm{d}\Omega$$
$$3\Sigma(p, c) E(p, c) + \frac{\sigma_o \gamma_o}{6\mu_o K_o} (p - c - p \log \frac{p}{c})$$

Dissipation

$$D_m = \mathcal{G}\dot{c} + 2\dot{p}\ln\frac{p}{c} = \mathcal{G}\dot{c} + \int_{\Omega_o} \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\alpha} \,\mathrm{d}\Omega$$

with

$$\mathcal{G} = \sigma_o^2 \frac{3K_o + 4\mu_o}{18\mu_o K_o} + \frac{K_o - K_2}{6K_o K_2} \sigma_I^2(\frac{p}{c})$$

If we consider an hollow sphere $\sigma_I = 0$

$$||\gamma(r)|| \leq \varepsilon_m, \rightarrow rac{R_p^3}{R_i^3} = f_c$$

gives the missing link. If not criterion $\mathcal{G} \leq \mathcal{G}_c$ gives an identical results

Solution with transfer of internal state

An additional domain appears R_i , Γ , where the elastic properties are K_2 , μ_2 , with uniform internal strain γ_2 For such internal strain, the radial displacement satisfies

 $\Lambda_2 d \ldots \int_{\Gamma} 12\mu_2$

$$\frac{\Lambda_2}{r^2}\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}r}(r^2u) = \int_{R_i}^{t} \gamma_2 \frac{12\mu_2}{t} \mathrm{dt} + A$$

then

$$r^{2}u(r) = \frac{4\mu_{2}}{\Lambda_{2}}\gamma_{2}\left(r^{3}\ln(\frac{r}{R_{i}}) - \frac{1}{3}(r^{3} - R_{i}^{3})\right) + Ar^{3} + B$$

In the plastic domain the solution satisfies $\gamma_p = \gamma_o (1 - \frac{R_p^3}{r^3})$

$$\sigma_{rr} = \frac{2}{3}\sigma_o \ln \frac{r}{\Gamma} + \sigma_{rr}(\Gamma)_p$$

and displacement depends on two constants in plastic domains, and elastic domain. We have 6 constants to be determined, 2 boundaries conditions and 4 interface conditions.

The plastic strain satisfy $\varepsilon_p = \gamma_o (1 - \frac{p}{c})$ Along the moving interface σ_{Γ} satisfies

$$\sigma_{\Gamma} = \sigma_o \frac{3K_o + 4\mu_o}{6\mu_o} \frac{K_2}{K_o - K_2} \frac{c}{p} = K_2 Q \frac{c}{p}$$

and the state Γ/R_p satisfies

$$E - \frac{\sigma_o}{6\mu_o}(1-p) = \frac{\sigma_{\Gamma}}{3K_o} + \frac{2\sigma_o}{3}\log(\frac{p}{c}) + \sigma_o\frac{3K_o + 4\mu_o}{6\mu_o}$$

and finally

$$\mathcal{G} = Q \frac{\sigma_o}{3\mu_o K_o} \Big(4\mu_o (K_o - K_2) + K_2 (3K_o + 4\mu_o) (\frac{p}{c})^2 \Big)$$

with

$$2K_2(A_2 + \frac{12\mu_2\gamma_2}{3K_2 + 4\mu_2}) = \sigma_{\Gamma}$$

$$c = (\frac{\Gamma}{R_e})^3, p = (\frac{\Gamma}{R_p})^3$$

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Criterion $||\varepsilon_p|| = \varepsilon_c$ and $\mathcal{G} \leq G_c$ give same results. The coupling between damage and plasticity is observed on the irreversible strain

$$E - rac{1}{K}\Sigma = E_{ir}$$

K depends on c

Then G contains two contributions : one associated to K(c) and another one to the variations of internal residual state

Sharp or diffuse interface

 Sharp interface Γ : elasto-plastic quasi-brittle material Material 1 Φ₁(ε, α_o) changes in material 2 Φ₂(ε, α₁)

$$\llbracket \mathrm{d} \rrbracket_{\Gamma} = -1$$

Dissipation

$$D_m = \int_{\Omega} A_i . \dot{\alpha}_i \, \mathrm{d}\Omega + \int_{\Gamma} \mathcal{G}\phi \, \mathrm{d}S$$
$$\mathcal{G} = \llbracket \Phi \rrbracket_{\Gamma} - \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \llbracket \boldsymbol{\varepsilon} \rrbracket_{\Gamma}$$

• Diffuse interface : moving layers with internal continuous evolution of variables and continuity conditions at boundary of the layer. For example : in the layer, steady state analysis for any mechanical quantity

$$\dot{f} + \phi \nabla f. \boldsymbol{n} = \boldsymbol{0}, \xi = \boldsymbol{x} - \phi \boldsymbol{n} t$$

Dissipation

$$D_m = \int_{\Omega} A.\dot{\alpha} \, \mathrm{d}\Omega - \int_{\Gamma} \int_{e} (Y \nabla \mathrm{d} + A.\nabla \alpha) . \mathbf{n} j \, \mathrm{d}z \phi \, \mathrm{d}S$$

Consider now, the case of diffuse interface, introducing a damage variable $\mathrm{d},$ and

$$\Phi(\varepsilon, \alpha, d) = \frac{1}{2}(\varepsilon - \alpha) : \mathbb{C}(d) : (\varepsilon - \alpha) + \frac{1}{2}\alpha : \mathbb{H}.\alpha$$

 $\mathbb{C}(\mathrm{d})$ is a continuous decreasing function of d Consider the motion of the surfaced = 0+, to avoid a dissipation on this surface

$$\mathcal{G} = \llbracket \Phi \rrbracket_{\Gamma} - \boldsymbol{n}.\boldsymbol{\sigma}.\llbracket \boldsymbol{\varepsilon} \rrbracket_{\Gamma} = 0$$

then $[\![\alpha]\!]_r = 0$ and $[\![\varepsilon]\!]_r = 0$ Hypothesis : α remains constant in damaged materials as proposed for sharp interface.

Conclusion

• With this hypothesis, the solution required on change in the layer, replacing L_2 uniform by L(r) in the equation of Tr ε

$$\frac{1}{r^2}\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}r}r^2u = \frac{12\mu\gamma_2}{L(t)}\log(\frac{t}{R_i})$$

This changes the value of σ_{Γ} .

- The main coupling is seen on the global irreversible strain. Part due to plasticity and contribution of internal state of residual stresses.
- More complex behaviour must be study : especially to define how the internal state (as hardening) changes during the motion of the layer
- Internal structure of such layer must be studied, with respect to condition of uniqueness and entropy production. ε_p must be increase as d does.
