- 3D movement: 2 cycles of swimming for each visible limb
- 1 full cycle of swimming ~1,5s
- ROM : larger than on land for all joints excepts for fetlocks, due mostly to

larger maximal flexion (smaller minimum angle), with a precision of 1°
