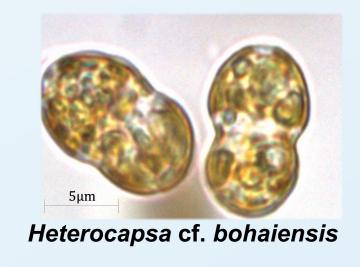

Introduction

- ☐ New Caledonian coastal waters are naturally rich in metallic trace elements. (Biscéré et al. 2017; Merrot et al. 2022)
- ☐ An excess of metallic inputs induce an **oxidative stress.** (Pinto et al. 2016; Danouche et al 2022)



- ☐ Heterocapsa cf. bohaiensis, a dinoflagellate isolated in New Caledonia, is associated with shrimp and crab mortalities. (Xiao et al. 2018)
- ☐ Might be a good candidate to study the production of metabolites of interests (e.g. carotenoids, biotoxins, fatty acids...)
- ☐ Does the species **adapted** to this particularly **metal-rich** environment and does it impacted the photosystem and metabolome by developing adaptive strategies?

Aim: Study the impact of nickel & iron on the photosystem and metabolome

Materials & Methods

- **Culture in photobioreactors:**
- Continuous culture of *H*. cf bohaiensis
- Addition of **nickel** and/or **iron** after steady state
- **Experimental conditions (in triplicate):**
- **Metals:** Ni 10⁻³ M ; Fe 10⁻³ M ; Ni+Fe 0.5 10⁻³ M (of each)
- **Times:** Control t₀ ; t_{24h} ; t_{72h} ; t_f (13 days)
- **Analyses:**
- Chlorophyll a fluorescence using PAM (Pulse Amplitude Modulated) fluorometry
- **Bioaccumulation** capacity by ICP–MS/OES
- **Pigment** analyses through HPLC-UV (450 nm)
- Fatty acids GC-MS (Transesterification)
- Non targeted metabolites NMR

Maximum Quantum yield

efficiency Maximum photosynthetic by **25**% and **15** % in Fe decreased and Ni+Fe condition, respectively

Rapid Light Curves (RLC)

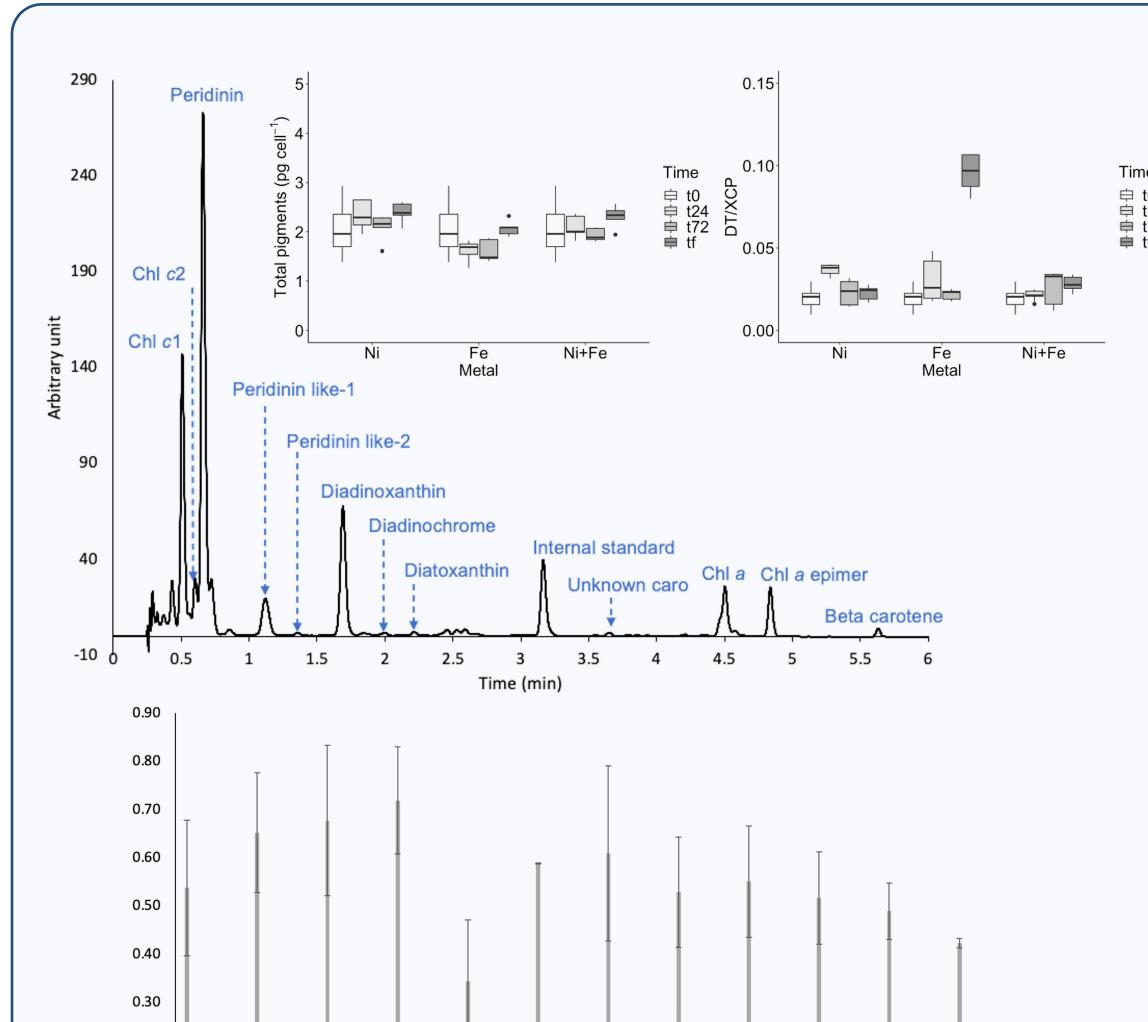
Negative impact on photosynthetic activity due to high iron concentration

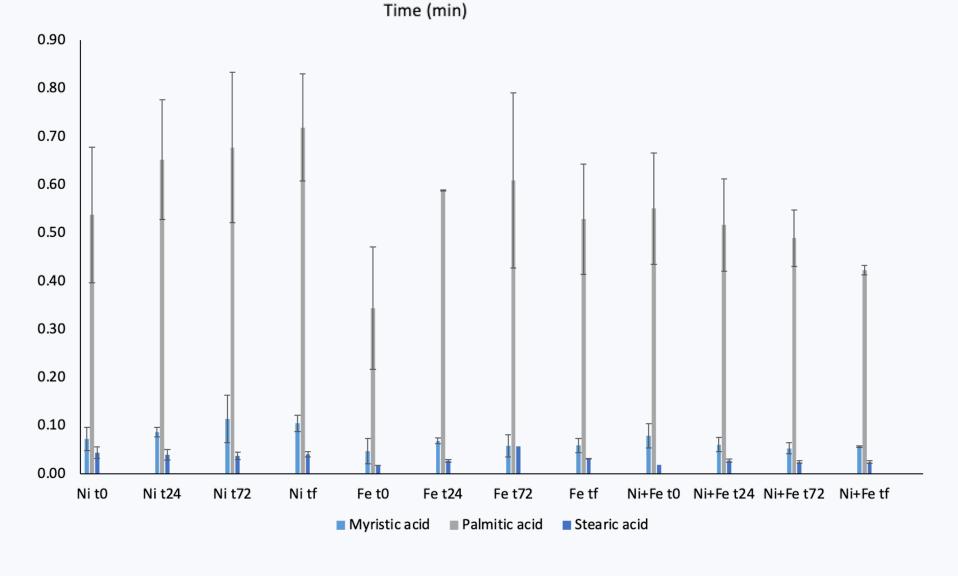
OJIP tests

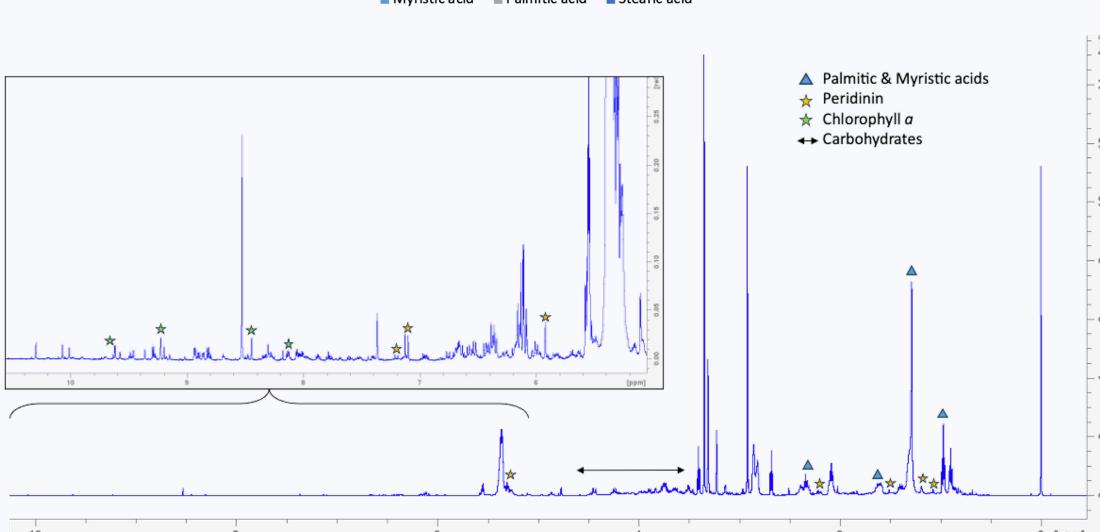
- efficiency Decrease of quantum parameters after 13 days with iron
- Absorption, trapping and dissipation were higher with addition of iron (concentration dependant) after 13 days

Bioaccumulation capacity

> Higher accumulation of the specific metal when added at concentration culture







Pigment analyses

- Identification of typical dinoflagellate pigments
- > Increase of diatoxanthin concentration by 3 after 13 days of exposure to iron at 10⁻³ M

Fatty acids

- Increase over time in **nickel** condition
- > Increase from t₀ to t₇₂ and decrease at t_f, with iron
- Decrease over with both time metals

NMR ¹H

- Detection of major metabolites
- Higher fatty acids content than pigments
- Detection of carbohydrates
- Some metabolites have to be identified

Discussion

Photosynthetic efficiency

□Ni □Fe

- > H. cf. bohaiensis is tolerant to nickel at high concentrations
- In Iron conditions:
- > Fv/Fm H. cf. bohaiensis is impacted after a long term exposure
- > RLC Iron reduced the ability to use light
- > OJIP Iron stimulates capture and absorption of light energy & slows down the electron transport rate between photosystem II & I
- > Increase of specific fluxes (absorption, trapping and dissipation)

Pigment analyses

- > Increase of diatoxanthin in iron condition
- Responsible of dissipation increase
- Photosystem **protection** against iron induced ROS (Huang et al. 2017)

Fatty acids

> Majority of 3 fatty acids more or less affected by the presence of metals

NMR ¹H

- Majority of fatty acids
- > Detection of other metabolites than in targeted methods

Bioaccumulation

- Greater bioaccumulation of iron than nickel
- > Transfer in the food chain (Hédouin et al. 2010)

Conclusion

Aim: Study the impact of nickel & iron on the photosystem and metabolome

- ✓ Toxic effect of iron dependant of the concentration on the photosystem
 - ✓ Iron stress adaptative strategies to protect against ROS
 - ✓ Risk of metal bioaccumulation in the food chain
 - ✓ Identification of specific metabolites by targeted metabolomics
 - ✓ NMR results show metabolites previously metabolites and new ones
- ☐ Untargeted metabolomic data have to be statically analysed to evaluate the metabolome response to metals (NMR & UPLC-HRMS)
