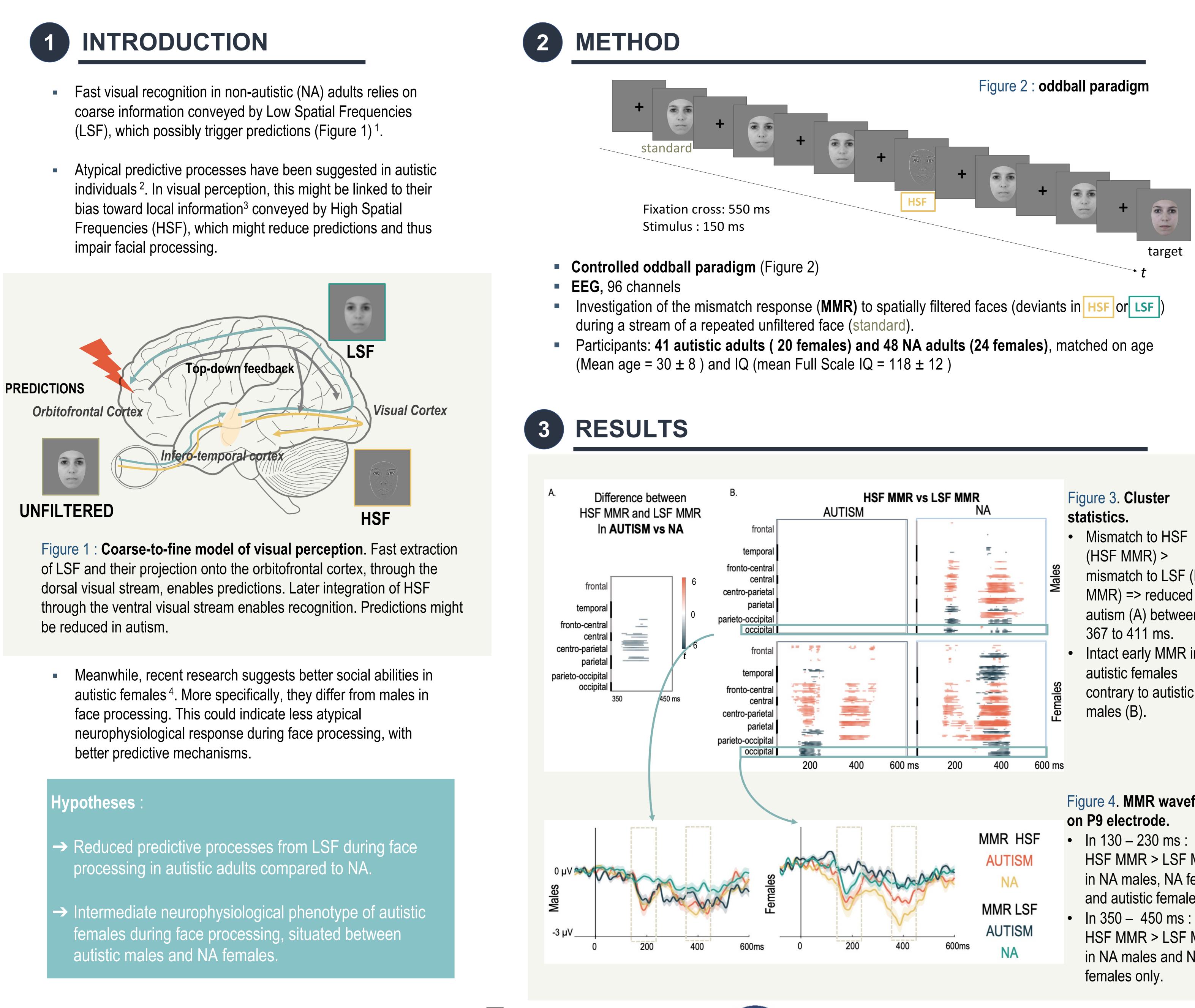

 Confirmation of the predictive role of LSF during face processing in NA individuals

 Atypical predictive mechanisms from LSF during face processing in autistic individuals.

 Intermediate neurophysiological phenotype of autistic females during face prediction, who present both characteristics of autistic males and of NA females.

 \rightarrow Better face processing in autistic females might be related to less atypical neurophysiological response to

→ Longitudinal studies are required to determine if differences are inherited or due to compensation

 \rightarrow A better understanding of autism heterogeneity is needed to better specify sex differences.
