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Cold Plasmas for Analytical Applications Projet PLASPAMS, CSOSG 2013

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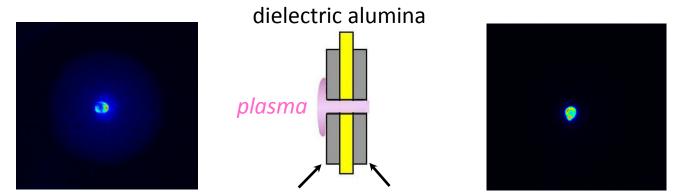


Introduction

Through the PLASPAMS project we will develop an instrument dedicated to the real time detection and identification of species present in air at trace concentration or deposited on surfaces. We will combine plasma techniques and mass spectrometry in order to build a compact detector suitable for field operation.

Analytic applications in the field of security are particularly demanding:

Micro Hollow Cathode Discharge for the generation of H₃O⁺ ions



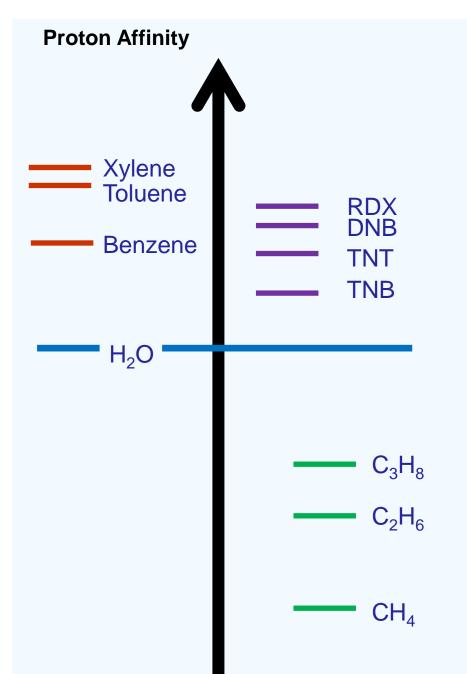
-dangerous or prohibited molecules must be identified with precision among the many species potentially present ;

-concentrations can go from the ppb range (1 molecule per billion) to %;

-the more volatile molecules can be detected directly in air but species of low volatility will stay on surfaces and we need to desorb them efficiently in order to detect them. This will be the case for many explosives or narcotics ;

-the detector must be broadband, very sensitive and must have a fast response time.

Selective ionization of trace compounds

The most used ion molecule reaction for trace detection in air is the proton transfer from H_3O^+ ions (protonated water)

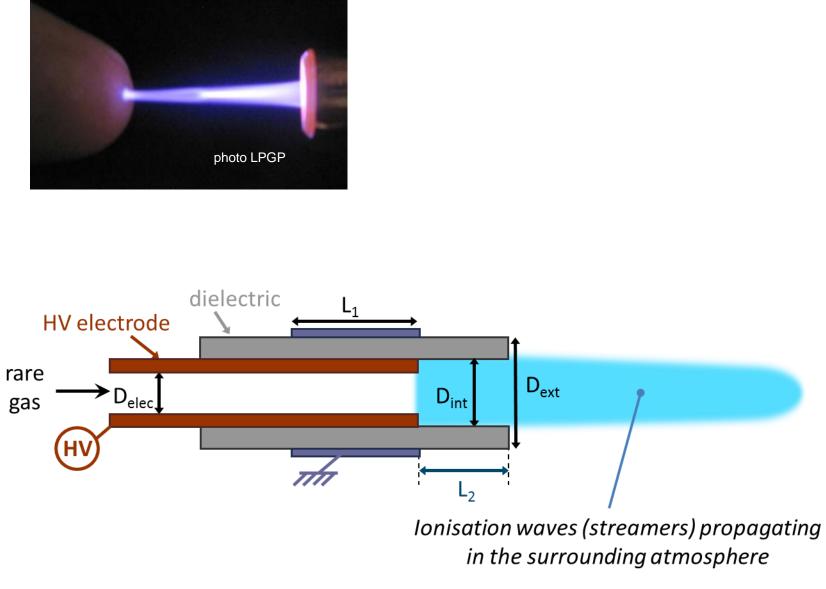
 $H_3O^+ + M \rightarrow H_2O + MH^+$

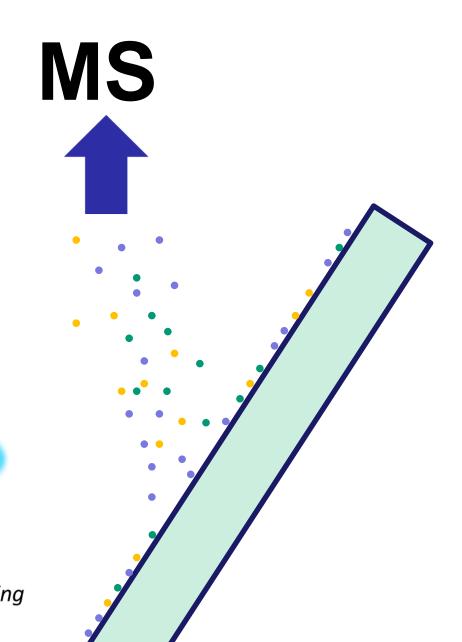
The reaction will be fast and efficient for molecules having a proton affinity higher than water (such as aromatic compounds, alcohols, aldehydes, nitrated explosives, narcotics,...) but will not occur with compounds having a proton affinity lower than water (which is the case for the main constituent of air N₂, O₂, Ar and also for alkanes, CFCs,...) cathode side cathode anode anode side electrodes in Molybdenum

Typical diameter of the discharge hole: 1 mm.

Objective: to determine discharge parameters for the generation of H_3O^+ ions by a MHCD working in Ar/ H_2O mixtures.

Desorbing molecules deposited on surfaces with plasma jets



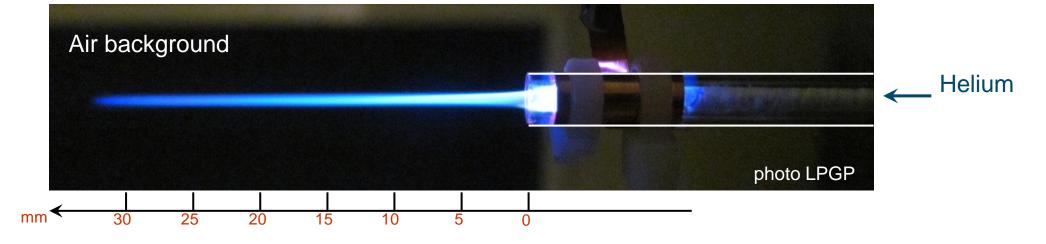


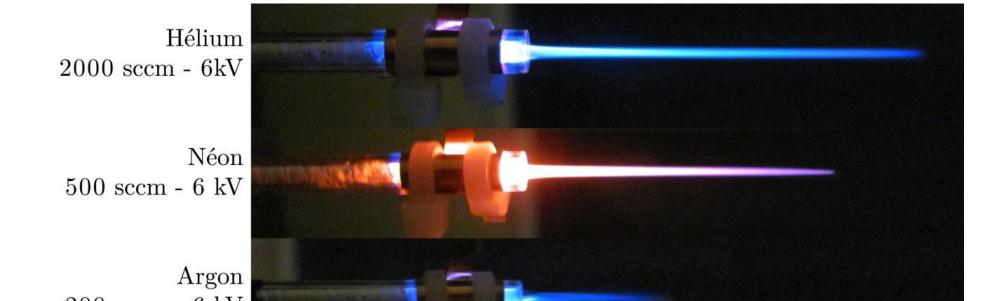
Typical dimensions of the discharge structure: $D_{elec} = 1.6 \text{ mm}, D_{int} = 2 \text{ mm}, D_{ext} = 7 \text{ mm}, L_1 = 10 \text{ mm}, L_2 = 5 \text{ mm}$

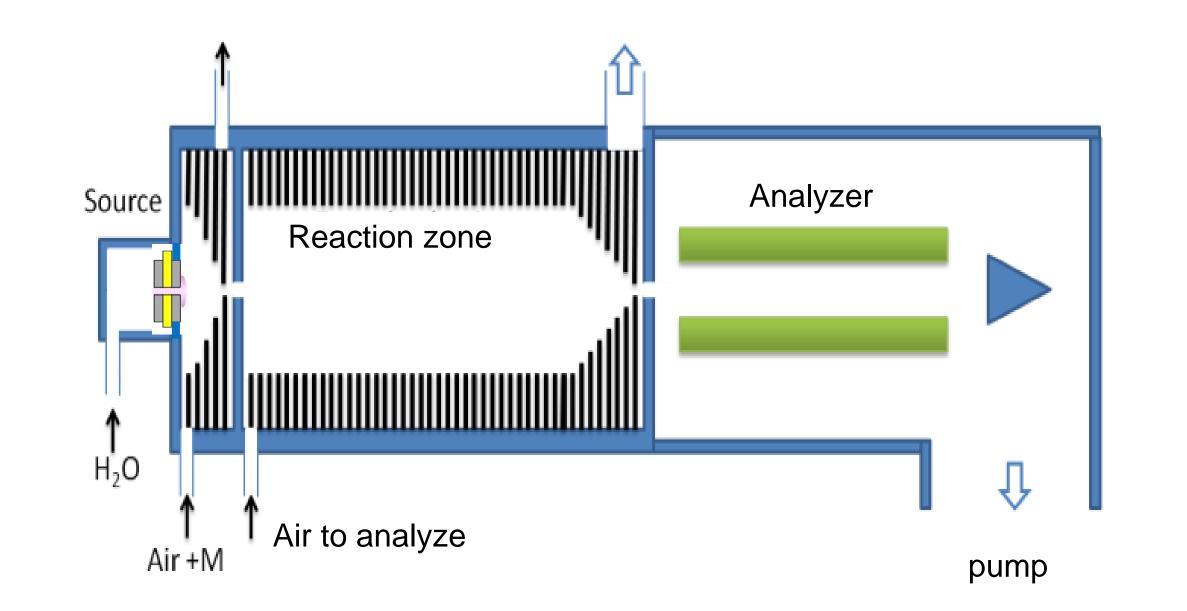
Plasma jets are used to desorb the low volatility species deposited on surfaces without heating the surface.

Plasma micro-jet of helium in surrounding air







The precursor ions formed in the source will react with the sample air in a reaction zone where radiofrequency electric fields will help in guiding and transmitting the ions to the mass analyzer.

The intermediate zone can be used to break apart the cluster ions eventually formed in the source or to switch to another ionic precursor.

In a first time the analyzer will be a quadrupole. Then an ion trap will be developed in which collision induced fragmentation will help for precise identification.

Use of Ar allows to reduce the rare gas consumption. Objectives: optimisation of the discharge parameters for improving the spread of the plasma jet, optimization of the Ar metastable states density and study of the jet interaction with surfaces.

Conclusion

The PLASPAMS project combines plasma techniques and mass spectrometry. The project team associates cold plasma specialists, physico-chemist experienced in real time trace analysis and the AlyXan company (commercializing high-resolution mass spectrometers).

The compact instrument developed will allow real-time analysis of traces present in air and of low volatility species deposited on surfaces. They will be transferred in the gas phase using cold plasma jets (without heating the surface) and detected with the very high sensitivity of mass spectrometry associated to chemical ionization.
