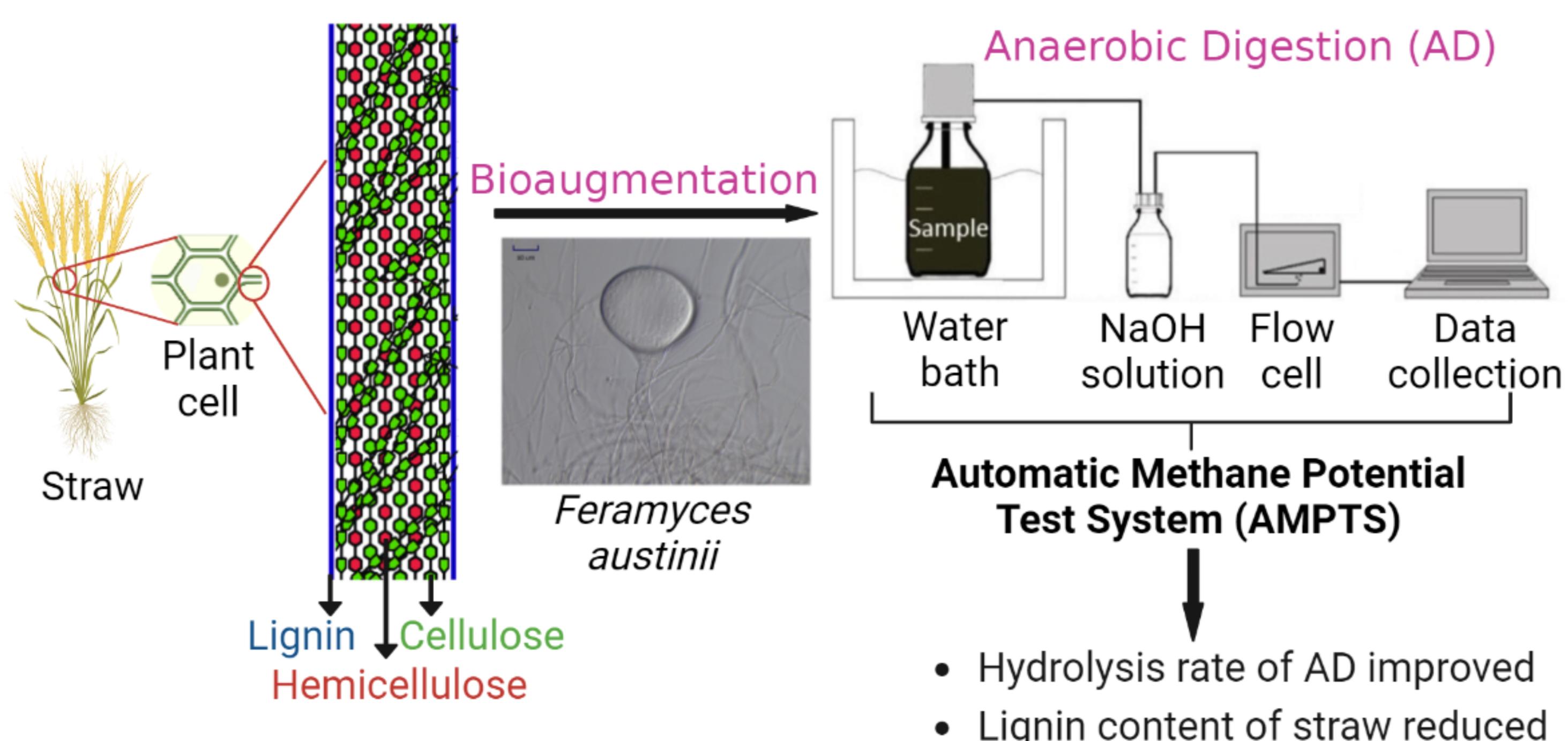

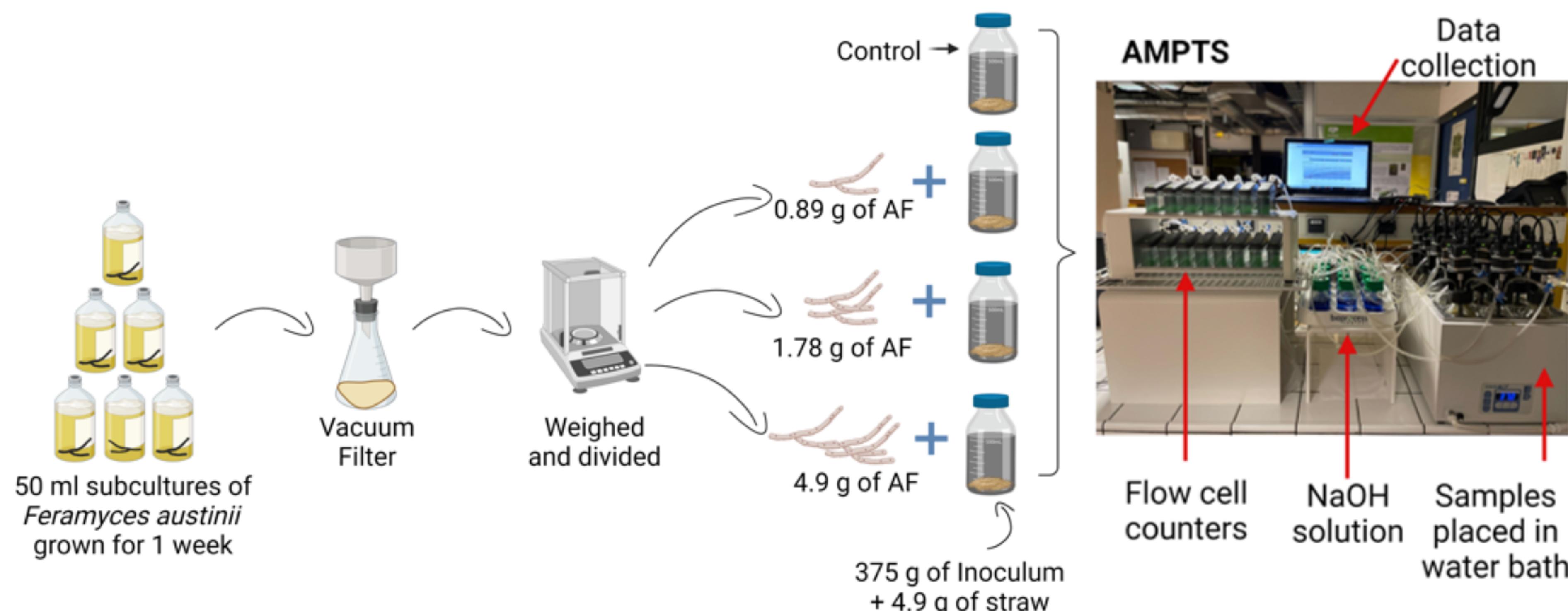

INTRODUCTION

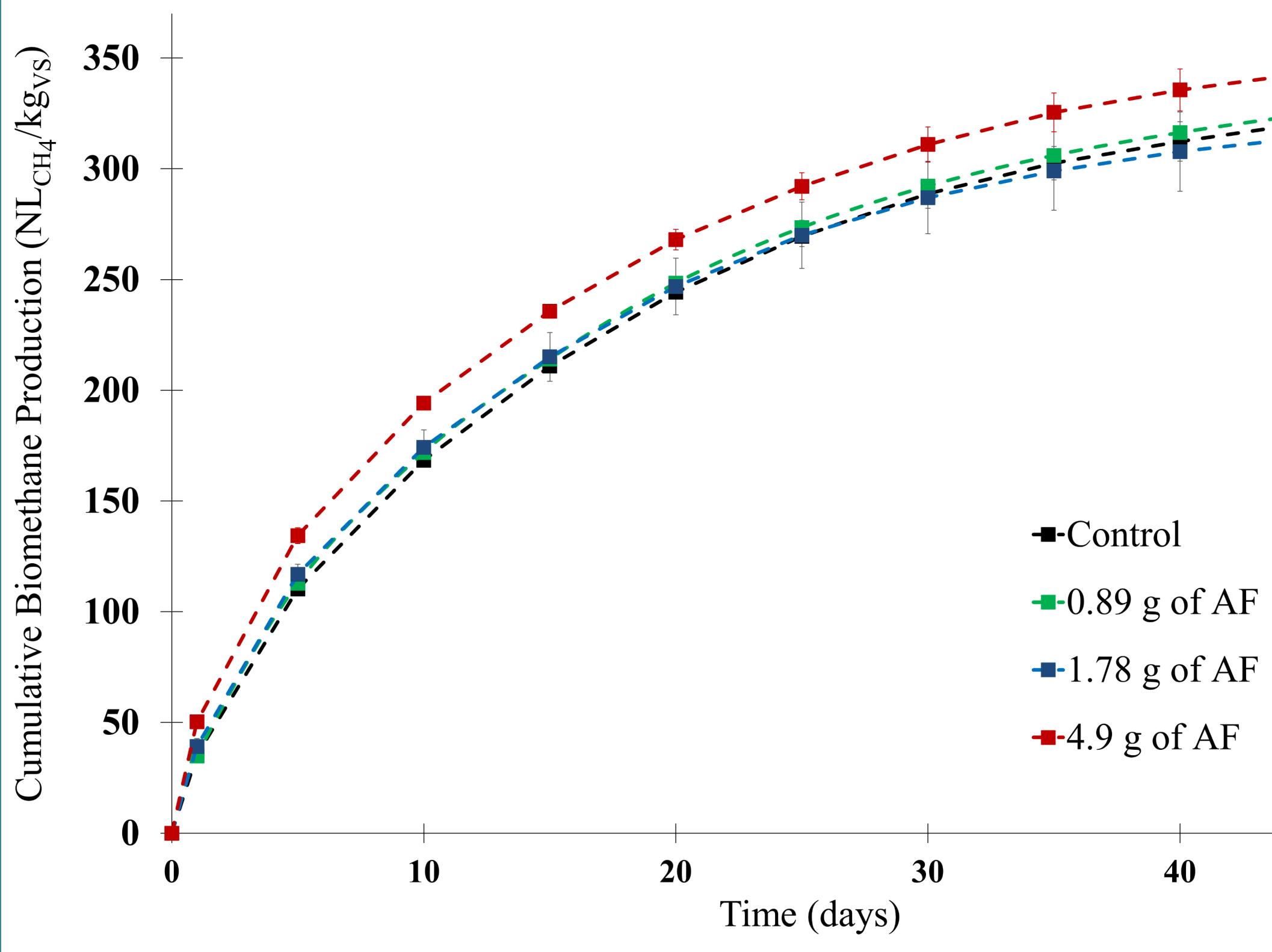
- Lignocelluloses are the largest reservoir of renewable energy on the earth¹
- Anaerobic fungi (AF) can mechanically and enzymatically attack lignocelluloses²
- AF have been shown to increase hydrolysis rates and biogas production³
- The present work is a first study using *Feramyces austini*, a recently isolated AF⁴, for AD enhancement

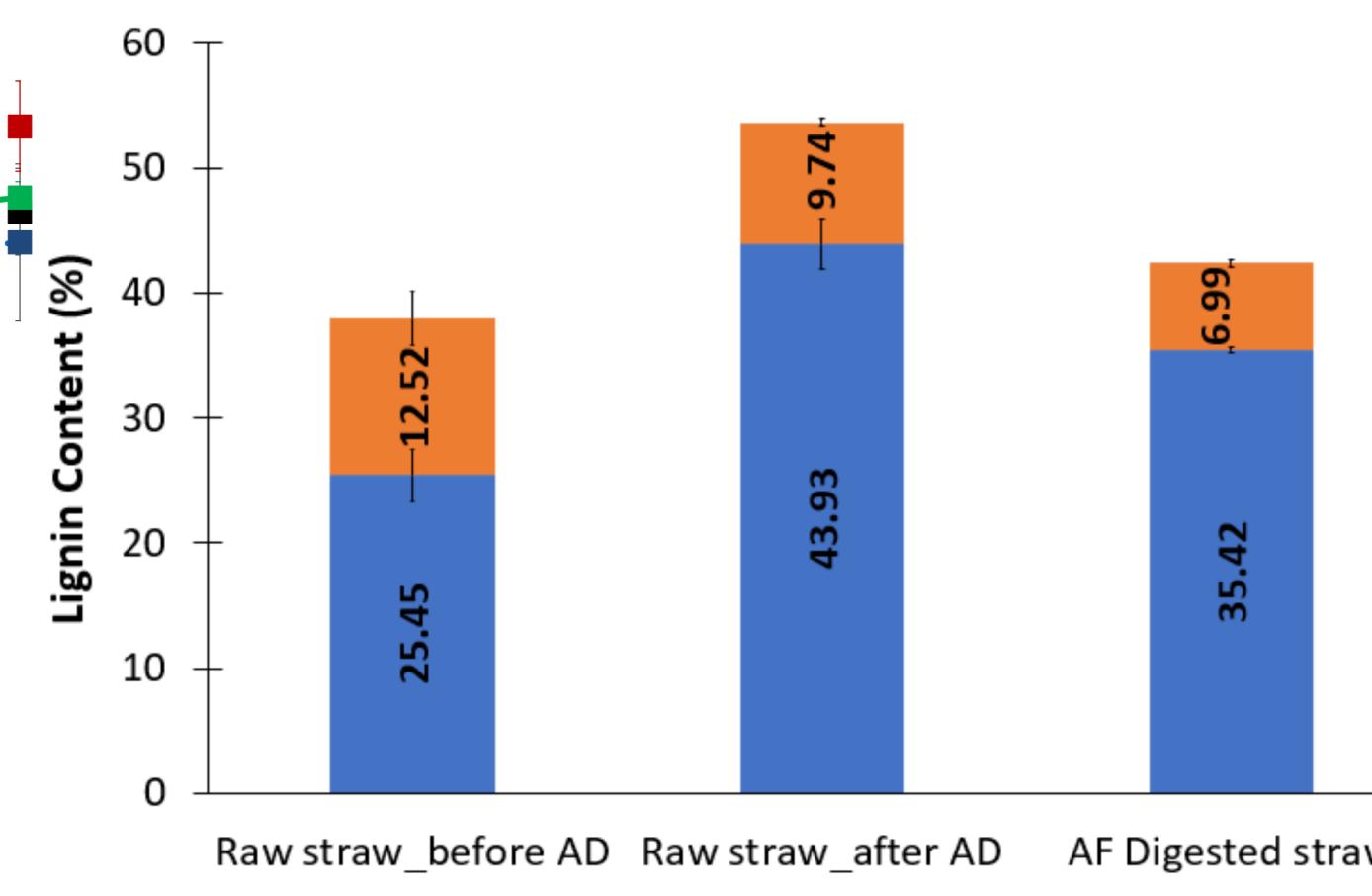

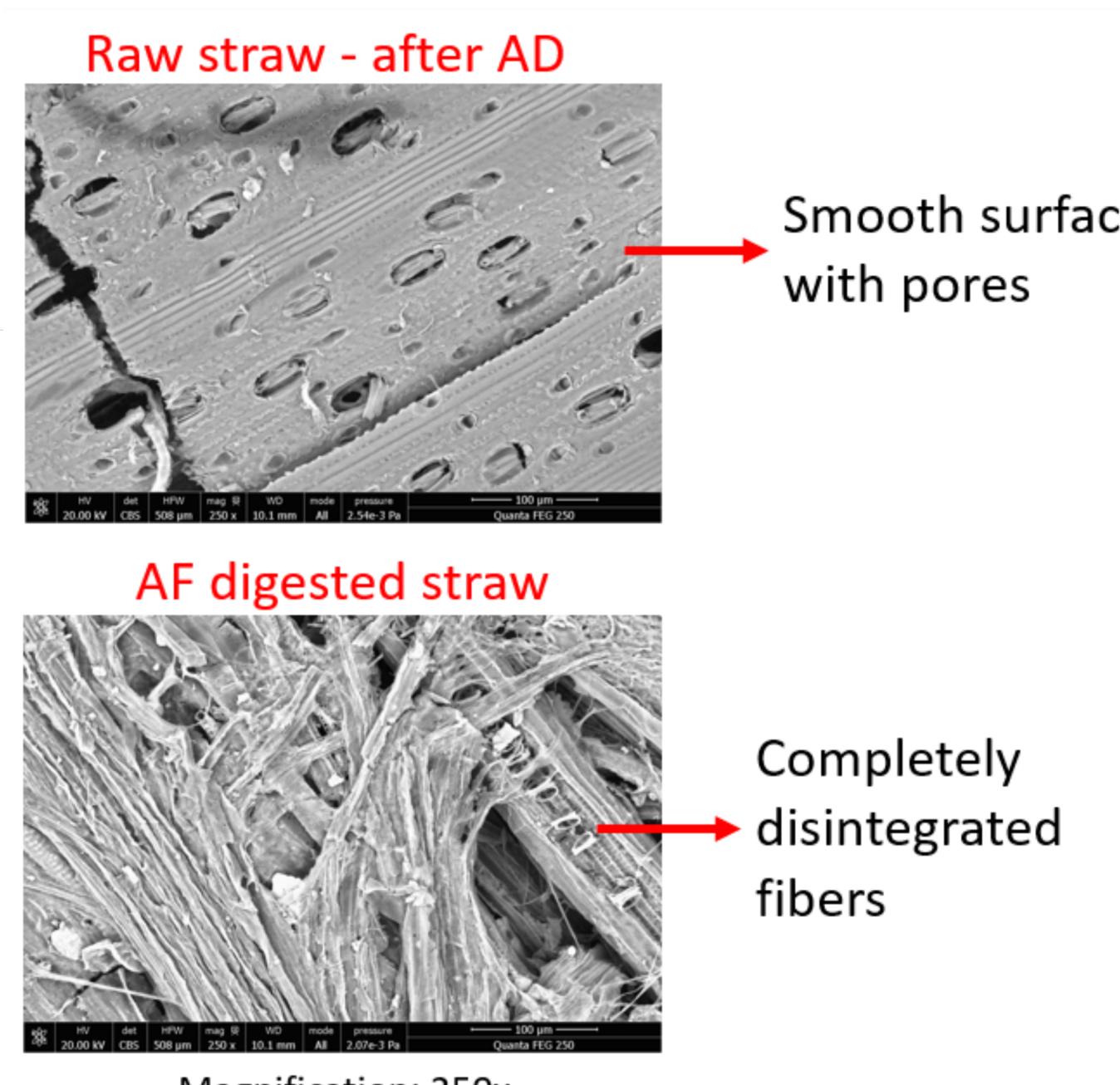
Biomethane Potential (BMP) Test

CONCLUSION

- 4.9 g of *Feramyces austini* improved BMP by 7.2% and hydrolysis kinetics by 22%
- Kinetics were improved with increasing fresh mass of *Feramyces austini*
- A very low ratio of AF/Inoculum (4.9 g of AF/ 375 g of inoculum) is sufficient for bioaugmentation of AD
- Significant modification to the straw surface was observed through SEM
- Feramyces austini* was able to modify lignin content, possibly through mechanical or enzymatic pathway
- Large-scale production of AF is challenging and should be further studied

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
