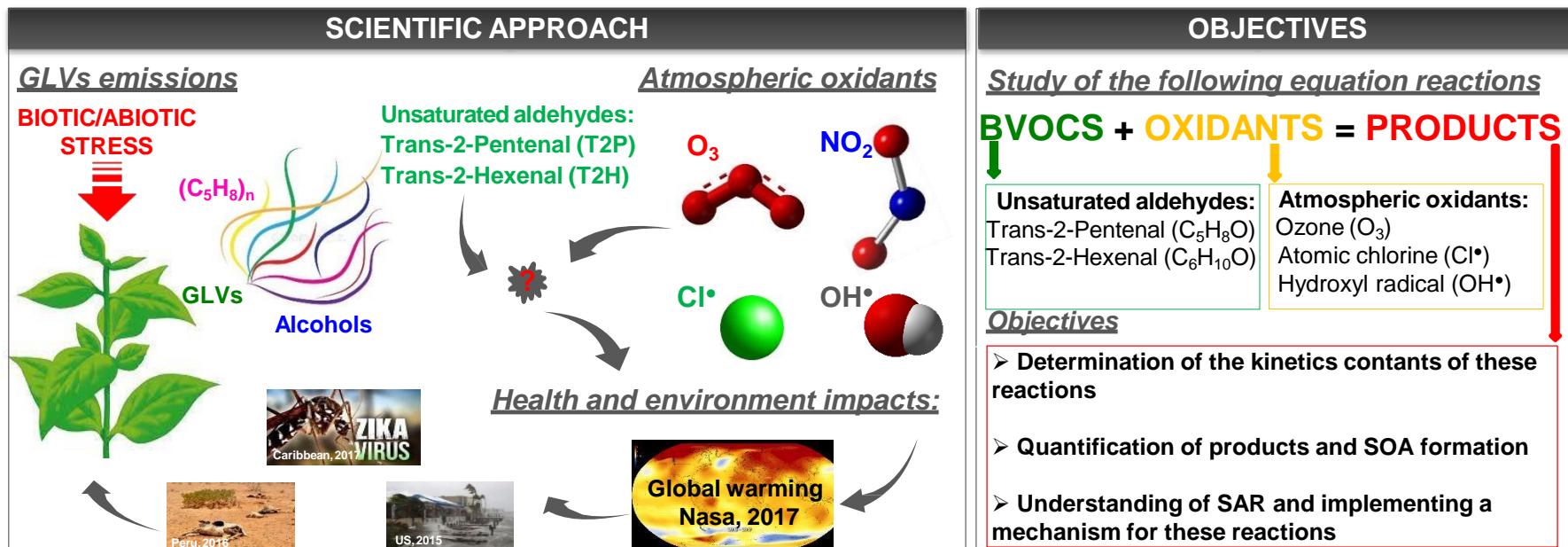

EXPERIMENTAL SETUPS

Atmospheric Simulation Chambers & Laminar Flow Reactor (LFR)

Teflon 0.3 m³, Douai (CSA)



Stainless steel 9 m³, Dunkerque (CHARME)



Quartz 1 m³, Wuppertal (QUAREC)



Pyrex 7 L, Douai (LFR)



Reactants analysis

- Analysis of T2P and T2H by FTIR spectroscopy (CSA / QUAREC), PTR-ToF-MS IONICON 1000 (CHARME), PTR-ToF-MS Kore (CSA), GC-FID/MS (LFR)
- Analysis of ozone by UV absorption spectroscopy (Environmental SA 49C)

SOA and products analysis

- SOA size distribution analysis by SMPS-TSI (DMA, model 3080 ; UCPC, model 3788) in CSA and (DMA, model 3071A ; UCPC, model 3025A) in QUAREC
- Product analysis by FTIR spectroscopy and by Carbotrap-202 cartridges further analyzed by GC-FID/MS

RESULTS

Kinetic constants of the reactions BVOC + O₃

CSA :

$$\ln \left(\frac{[O_3]}{[O_3]_0} \right) = -k' \times t_{mes} \text{ with } k' = k \times [BVOC]_0 + k_{wall loss}$$

LFR :

$$T_{cal} = \frac{V}{Q} \text{ with } T_{mes} = \frac{T_{cal}}{0.97 + 0.18 \times \exp \left[\frac{Re}{H} - 0.38 \right]} \quad (4)$$

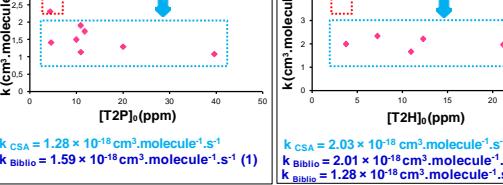
$$\ln \left(\frac{[O_3]}{[O_3]_0} \right) = -k' \times t_{mes} \text{ with } k' = k \times [BVOC]_0 + k_{wall loss}$$

T2P + O₃

T2H + O₃

$$y = 1.39 \times 10^{-18} x$$

Hypothesis:
Transformation of trans to cis for both compounds; the cis isomer would be more stable at high temperature and more responsive with O₃

Kinetic constants of the reactions BVOC + Cl[•]

$$\ln \left(\frac{[BVOC]}{[BVOC]_0} \right) = \ln \left(\frac{[Ref]}{[Ref]_0} \right) \times k' \text{ with } k' = \frac{k_{BVOC/Cl}}{k_{Ref/Cl}}$$

Two references are used isoprene (C_5H_8) hexanal ($C_6H_{12}O$):

$$k_{isoprene/Cl} = (4.45 \pm 0.7) \times 10^{-10} \text{ cm}^3 \cdot \text{molecule}^{-1} \cdot \text{s}^{-1} \quad (5, 6)$$

$$k_{hexanal/Cl} = (2.72 \pm 0.2) \times 10^{-10} \text{ cm}^3 \cdot \text{molecule}^{-1} \cdot \text{s}^{-1} \quad (7, 8)$$

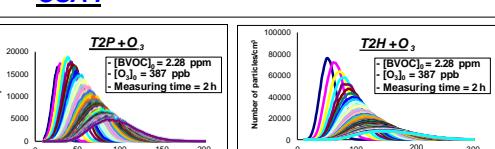

Comparison of the SOA formation from the ozonolysis of T2P and T2H

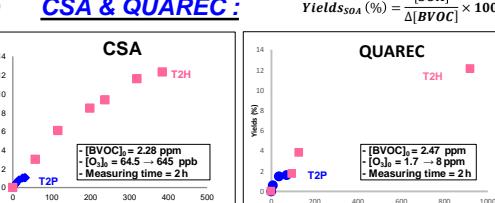
CSA :



The ozonolysis of trans-2-hexenal forms a number of particles 4 times bigger than the trans-2-pentenal.

At the end of the experiment, the diameters of the particles formed from the T2H are 2 times larger than those formed from the T2P.

CSA & QUAREC :



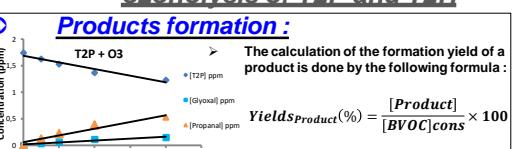
The maximum SOA yield for trans-2-hexenal is much higher (~ 12%) than for trans-2-pentenal (~ 1%).

The formation of particles for these two compounds seems very high compared to the length of their carbon chains (max 6 C atoms).

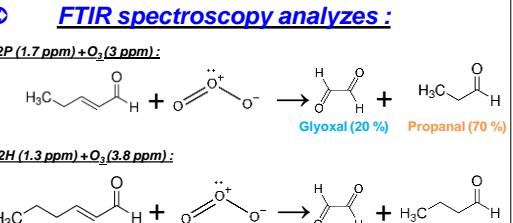
The experiments done at QUAREC have confirmed that of the CSA, that shows that the geometry and the material of two reactors did not affect the formation of the particles.

New experiments are underway in the CHARME reactor in Dunkerque to verify these previous results.

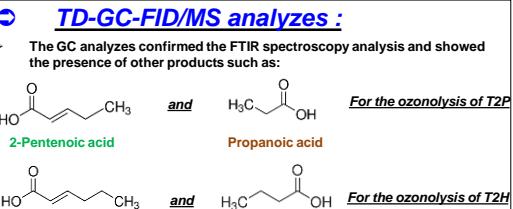
Evaluation of the products of the ozonolysis of T2P and T2H

CONCLUSIONS

- The values of the kinetic constants of the BVOC/O₃ reactions are in good agreement with the literature whereas those for the BVOC/Cl[•] reactions are high by a factor of 2 (a single value found in the literature).
- The SOA formation is more important for T2H than for T2P and in both cases it depends on the initial concentrations of the reactants but especially on that of O₃. The particle size of the particles and their yields are influenced by the structure of the BVOC.
- The products mainly formed by the ozonolysis of T2P are glyoxal, propanal but other products appear in GC-FID/MS analyzes such as: propanoic and 2 pentanoic acid. Similarly, the products of the degradation of T2H with ozone was mostly glyoxal and butanal. Additional analyzes by gc showed the presence of butanoic and 2 hexenoic acid.

FUTURE WORK

- Quantification of products by the TD-GC-FID / MS system.
- Other T2P/Cl[•] experiments in CSA are planned to ensure the results found for the kinetic constants.
- A series of experiments will be carried out at University Castilla La Mancha (Spain) in order to determine the products of the reaction of the selected BVOC with atomic chorine (Cl[•]).
