CONCLUSIONS

[T2P]₀ (molecule.cm⁻³)

- The values of the kinetic constants of the BVOC/O₃ reactions are in good agreement with the literature whereas those for the 0 BVOC/CI[•] reactions are high by a factor of 2 (a single value found in the literature).
- 0 The SOA formation is more important for T2H than for T2P and in both cases it depends on the initial concentrations of the reactants but especially on that of O₃. The particle size of the particles and their yields are influenced by the structure of the BVOC.
- The products mainly formed by the ozonolysis of T2P are glyoxal, propanal but other products appear in GC-FID/MS analyzes 0 such as: propanoic and 2 pentanoic acid. Similarly, the products of the degradation of T2H with ozone was mostly glyoxal and butanal. Additional analyzes by gc showed the presence of butanoic and 2 hexenoic acid.

FUTURE WORK

- € Quantification of products by the TD-GC-FID / MS system.
- 0 Other T2P/CI* experiments in CSA are planned to ensure the results found for the kinetic constants.
- A series of experiments will be carried out at University Castilla La Mancha (Spain) in order to determine the products of the reaction 0 of the selected BVOC with atomic chorine (CI[•]).
