Conductimetric microsensors integrating phthalocyanine nanolayers : high-performance sensing devices for the measurement of NO₂ at ppb level in air

Scientific context and objectives

Metallophthalocyanines constitute an extended class of molecular organic semiconductors that the extrinsic electronic conductivity can be strongly modulated by the adsorption of oxidizing species. Taking into consideration the great number of π -electron delocalized on each macrocycle, adsorbed oxidizing pollutants like NO₂ and O₃ induce high p-type conductivity variations whereas adsorbed reducing pollutants like CO, NH₃ or H₂S not lead to significant conductimetric response in the same range of concentrations.

Results reported here highlight the high sensitivity of phthalocyanine-based conductimetric microsensors to NO₂ associated to a limit of detection and resolution closed to few ppb, at low working temperature. The effect of sensing layer thickness on metrological performances as well as influence of humidity on response is investigated in this range of concentrations. A special attention is focused on selectivity, especially towards ozone O_3 which remains the major interfering pollutant leading to substantial cross-sensitivity and long-term degradation of sensing layer according to an ozonolysis process. Sensing performances of conductimetric microsensors integrating nanolayer of phthalocyanines as sensing membrane are illustrated and discussed.

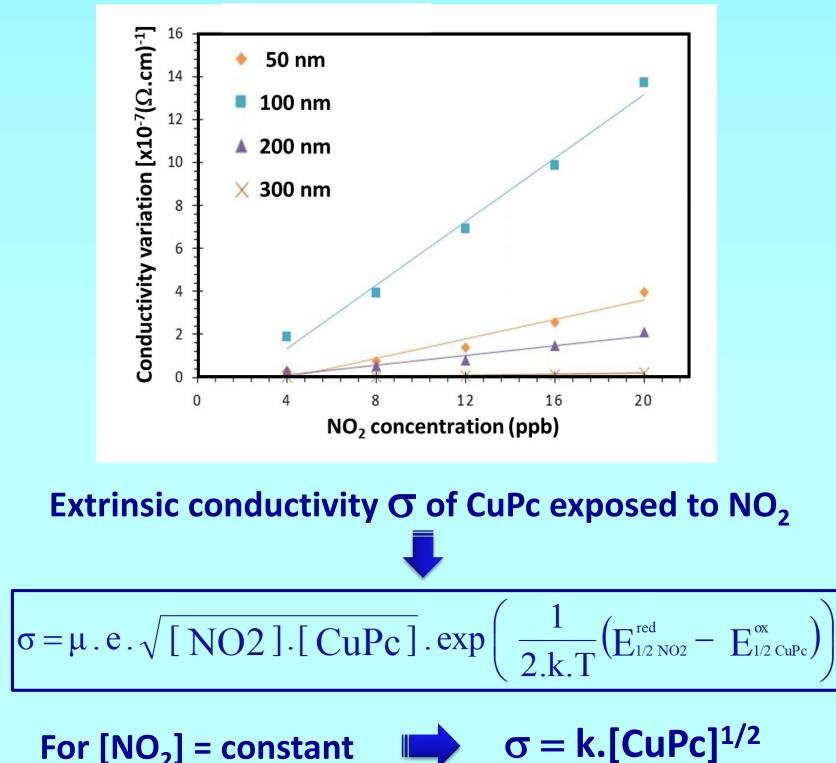

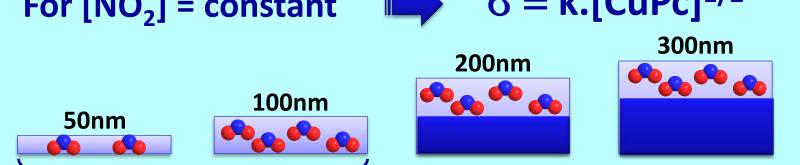


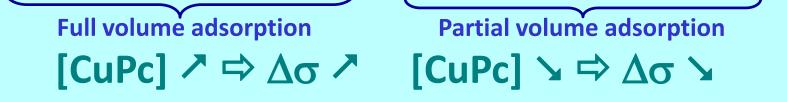




Effect of layer thickness on response

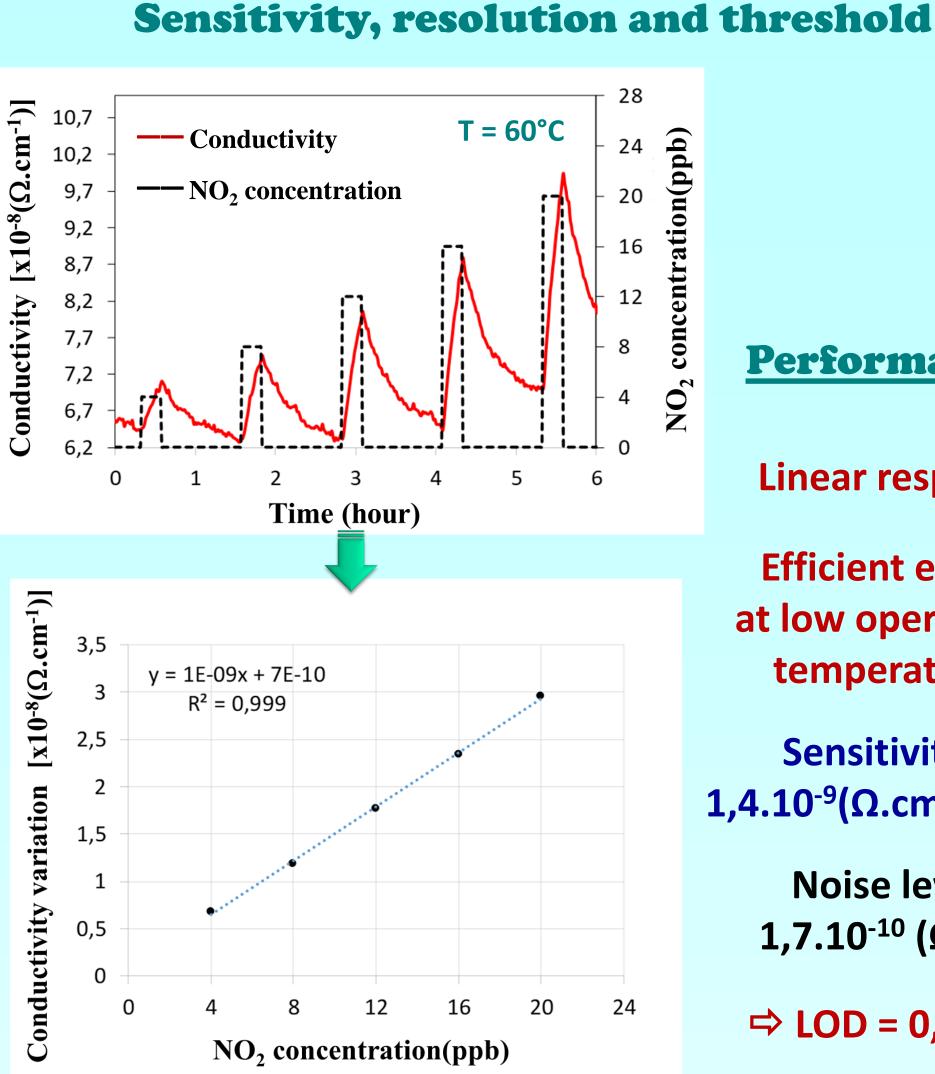


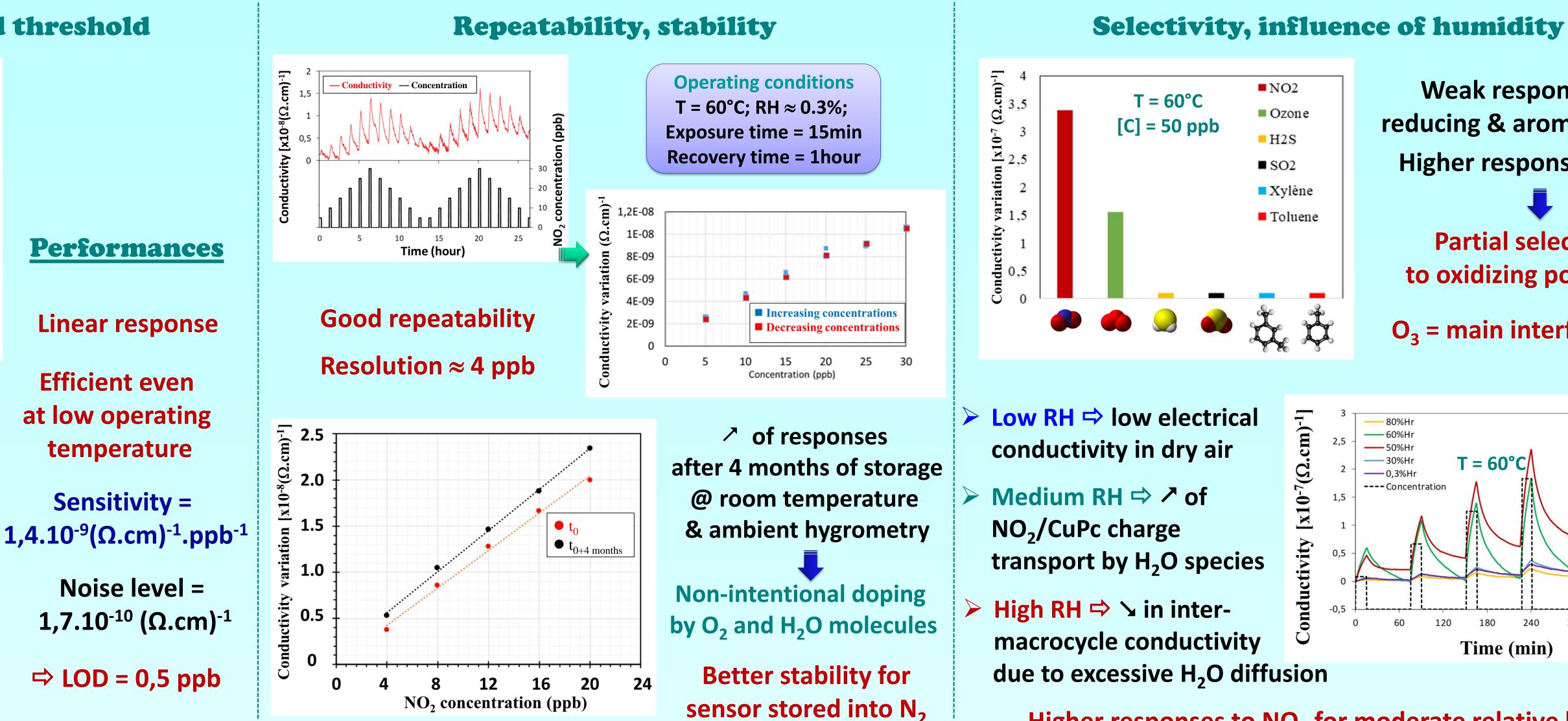




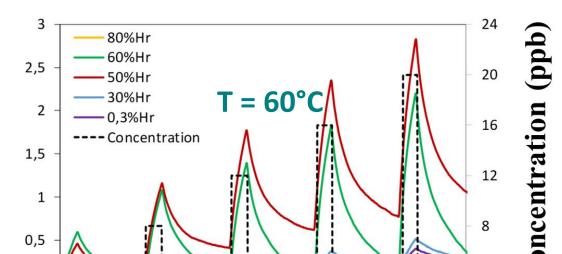
 $\Delta \sigma$ maximum for layer thickness e = 100nm

Main results and conclusions

Sensing strategy

Phthalocyanines as sensing materials

- > Cheap, thermally and chemically robust class of material
- > Well-controlled layering by thermal evaporation even @ nanoscale
- > Extrinsic electrical conductivity highly modulated by oxidizing gases

Microsensor devices

- > Best sensitivity for sensing layer thickness close to 100 nm
- > Suitable for ppb measurement even at low operating temperature
- > Low-power consumption

Performance level

Metrological performances

- \succ Linear response in the [4 30 ppb] NO₂ concentration range
- Good repeatability leading to resolution better than 4 ppb
- > Limit of detection close to 500 ppt
- > Storage in neutral atmosphere required for stability

Influence of interfering species

- Negligible cross-sensitivity towards non-oxidizing gases
- \succ Cross-sensitivity \approx 40% towards O₃
- \succ Higher NO₂ responses in moderate relative humidity (40-65%)
