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## MORPGHOLOGICAL AND BEHAVIOURAL ANALYSIS OF BMAA IN ZEBRAFISH LARVAE

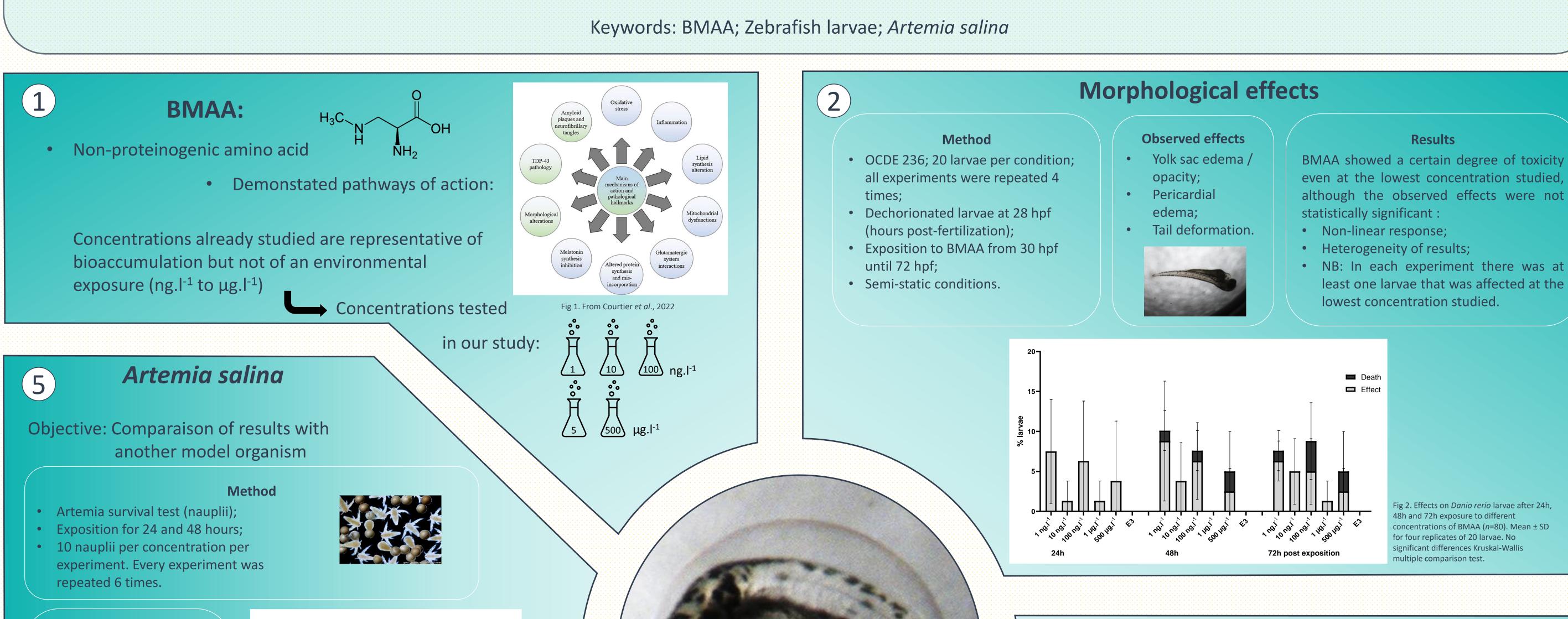


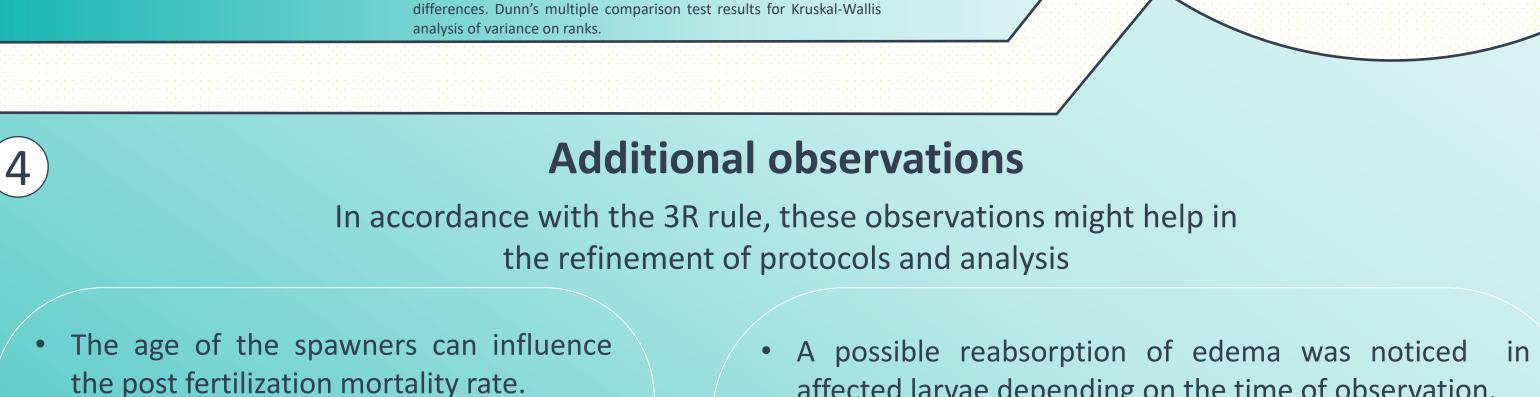
Results

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BMAA (β-N-methylamino-L-alanine) is a toxin produced mainly by cyanobacteria and the subject of several hypotheses suggesting a link with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS). It has historically been found in cycad roots, consumed in various ways by the Chamorros on the island of Guam, where an incidence of ALS much higher than the global average was detected. Other clusters have also been identified by the scientific community (Spencer et al., 2019) and several studies have highlighted multiple mechanisms of toxicity of this molecule (Courtier et al., 2022).

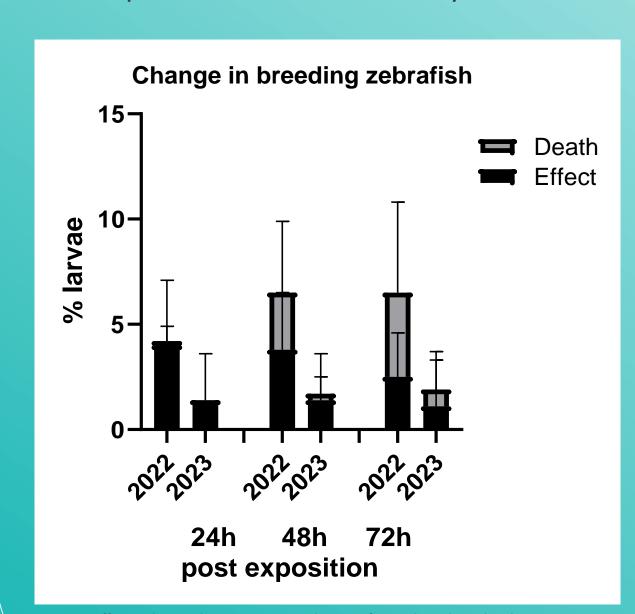
In France, in the Occitanie region, BMAA has been detected in the Thau lagoon in bivalves (Réveillon et al., 2015) while its isomers have been found in water and/or air samples (Courtier thesis, 2022). Other global studies show the possible presence of this toxin in the environment at nanogram concentrations (Abbes et al., 2022). As highlighted by the 2017 ANSES report, most of the toxicological studies have been developed at relatively high concentrations and investigations on the effects of environmental concentrations remain to be completed.

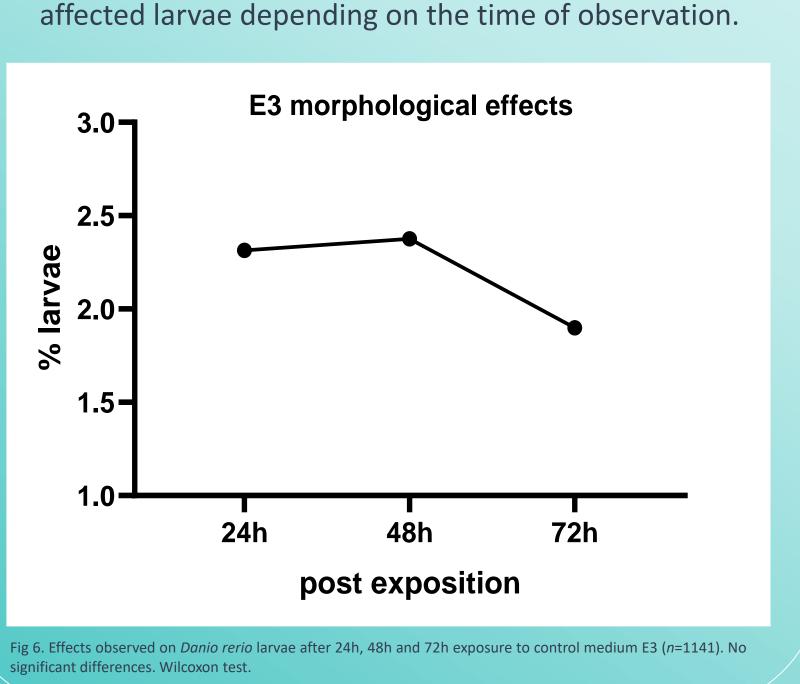

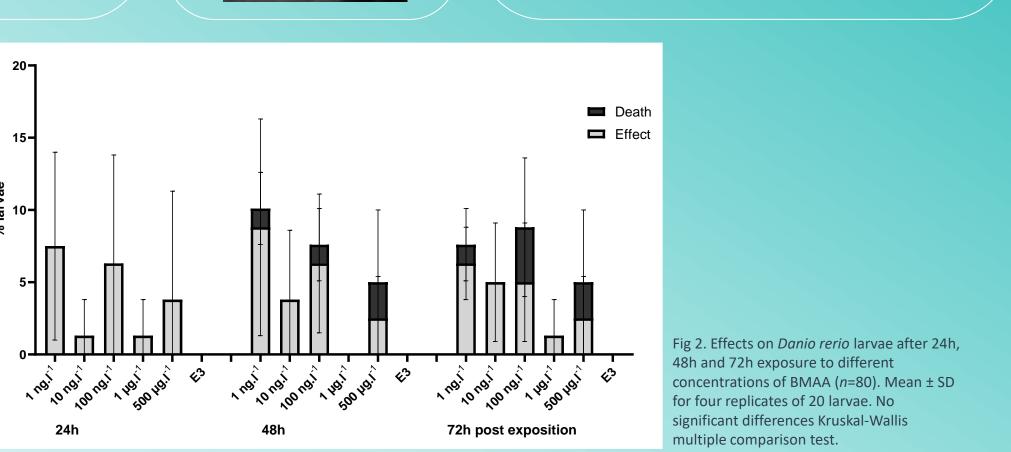

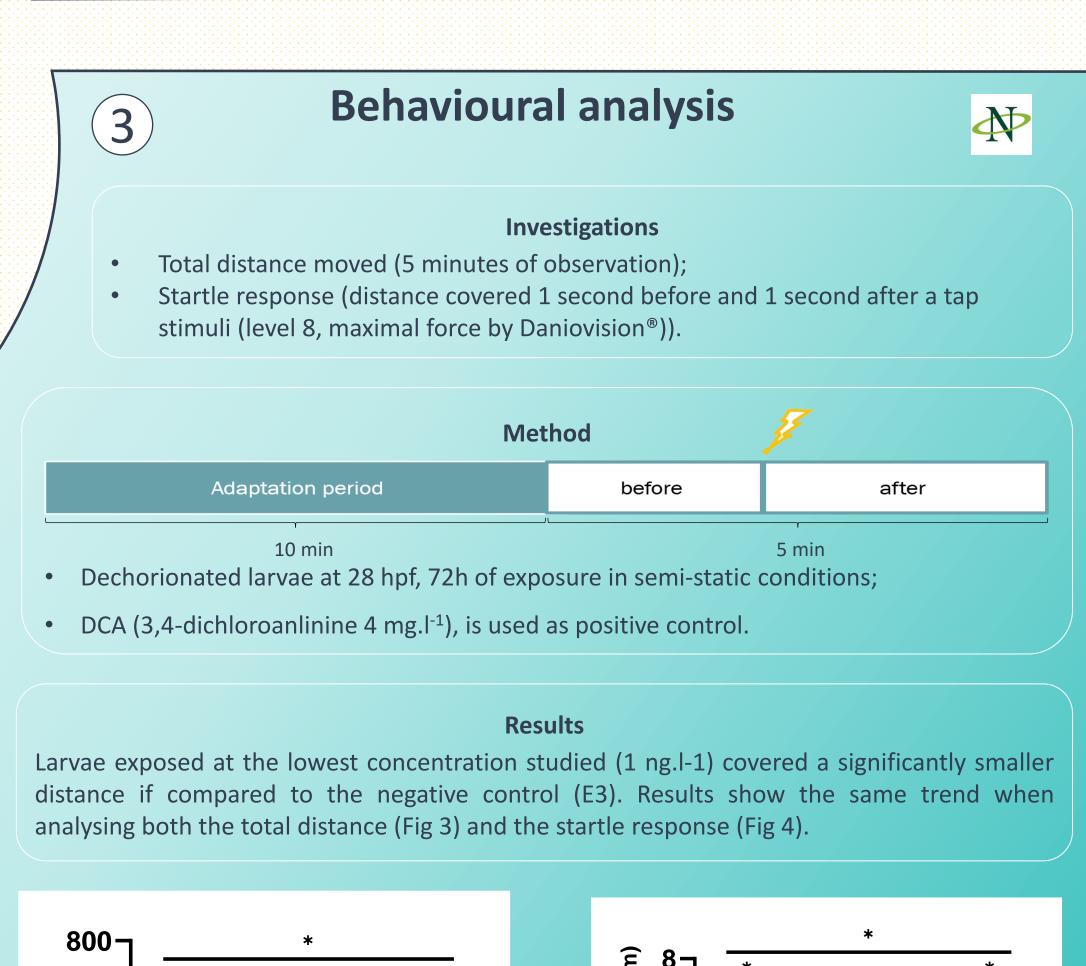
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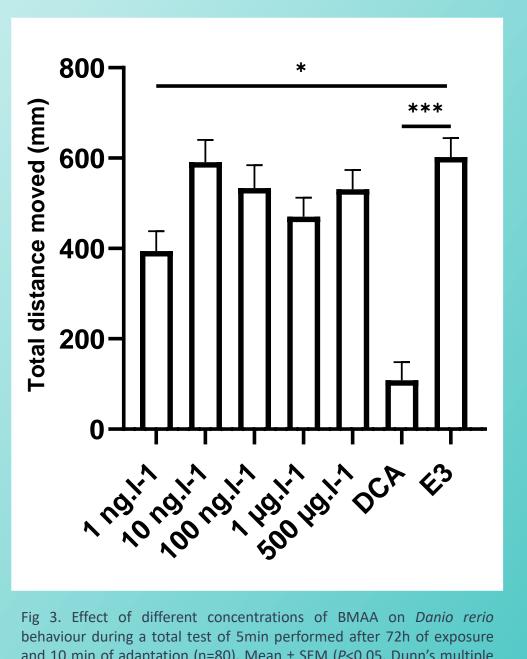
Fig 5. Effects observed on Danio rerio larvae after 24h, 48h and 72h exposure to control medium E3 (2022 n=723; 2023 n=482). Mean  $\pm$  SD for 21 replicates. No significant differences. Mann-Whitney test.



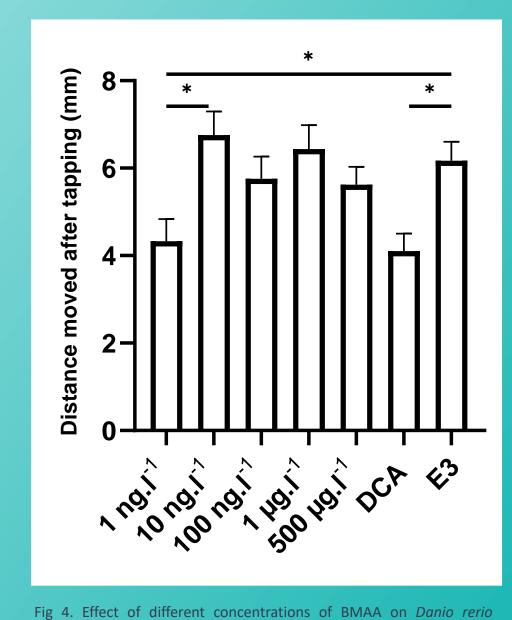
## • NB: In each experiment there was at least one larvae that was affected at the lowest concentration studied.

## **Conclusions**

- $\rightarrow$  Environmental concentrations of BMAA showed some toxicity even at the lowest concentration tested (1ng l<sup>-1</sup>) and, notably, a possible non-linear response;
- → The morphological analysis showed results that are not statistically significant. Further investigations are needed (e.g. Real Time-qPCR studies);
- → The behavioural analysis showed that an effect of BMAA was present at the lowest concentration, with or without tapping stimuli. The results are statistically significant;
- → The survival test on *Artemia* nauplii seems to confirm a <u>non-linear response</u> to BMAA;
- → The morphological analysis on zebrafish larvae evidenced the importance of the observation time. A possible remission of the effects (mainly edema) has been noticed.
