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## Ammonium fluoride as suitable additive for HILIC-based LC-HRMS metabolomics

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### Introduction

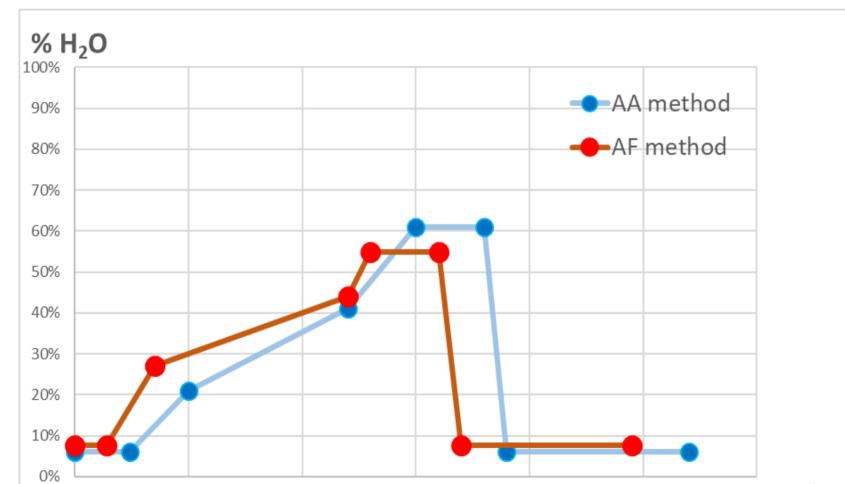
• Ammonium fluoride salt is becoming a popular additive in LC-MS, due to its well-known ability to increase compounds' ionization. Nevertheless, an objective evaluation of its applicability in

Hydrophilic Interaction Liquid Chromatography (HILIC) is missing.

• In this study, we developed a HILIC chromatographic method using **ammonium fluoride** as additive and we compared it to a standard **ammonium acetate** method already in use in our laboratory.

## 0. Chromatographic method development

Due to the different ionic strengths, specific chromatographic methods have been developed for each additive as reported in figure 1. The AF and AA methods are long 24,5 and 27,5 minutes long respectively.



### Materials and Methods

COLUMN: SeQuant ZIC-HILIC 200Å, 2.1\*100 mm (Merck-Millipore, Fontenay sous-Bois, France)

Eluents A-B: Acetonitrile-Water

Instrument: 1200 infinity HPLC (AgilentTechnologies, CA, USA), Exactive Orbitrap MS (ThermoFisher Scientific, Bremen, Germany) ADDITIVE SALTS:

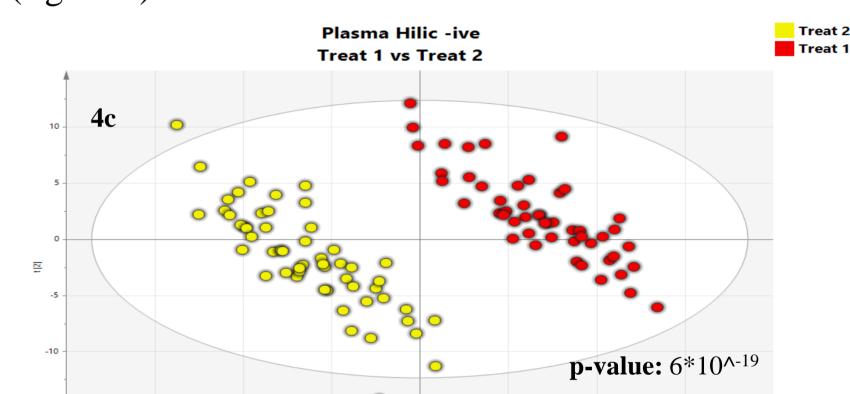
Ammonium Fluoride (AF) 2 mM

Ammonium Acetate (AA) 10 mM



## 3. Applying AF in real metabolomics experiments

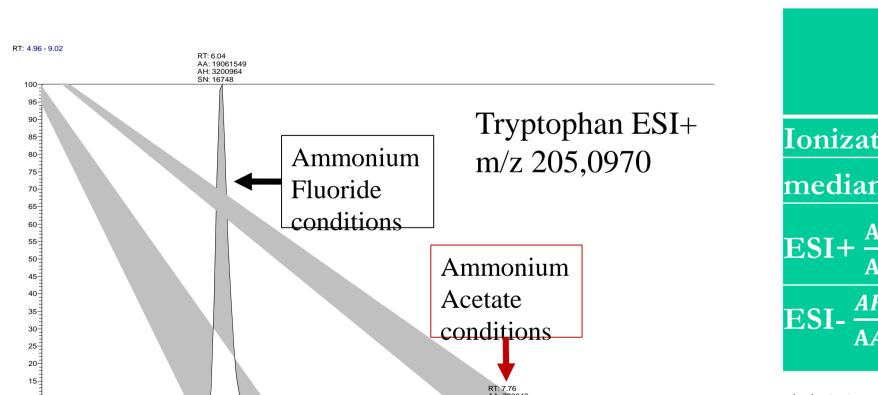
The developed AF chromatographic method has been used to perform two real metabolomics experiments with urine and plasma samples (Narduzzi et al. submitted). The method showed to be robust across 5 days of injection and the results very satisfying in terms of discriminative power (figure 4).

# 1. Standards ionization comparison

34 analytical standards representing various chemical classes have been injected in both methods to compare the ionization performances. The AF method resulted most performing in both positive and negative ionization modes (figure 2 and table 1).

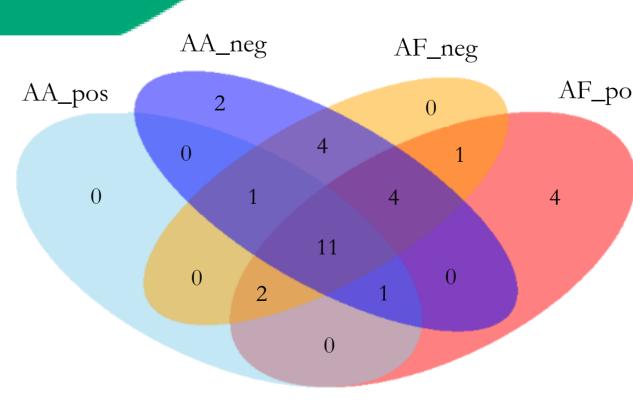
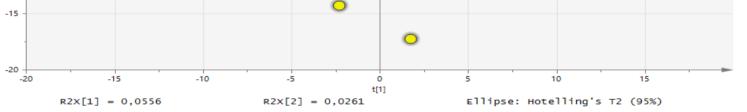


Figure 3: the number of compounds detected. AF Median 29 17 10

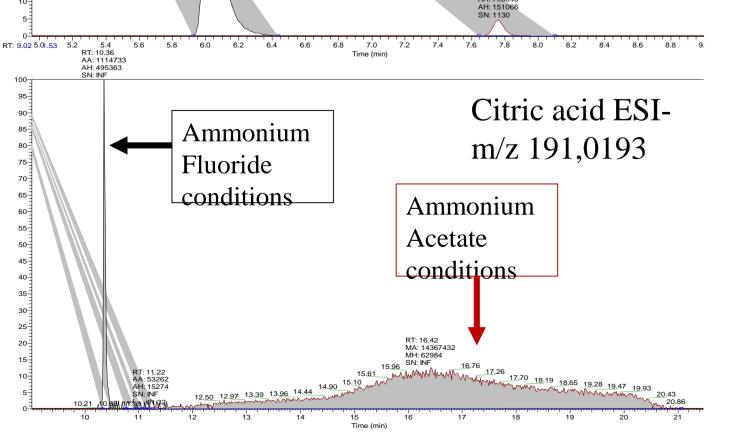


**Figure 4:** a PLS-DA analysis of the plasma samples injected using the AF chromatographic method.

# 2. Pooled samples injections comparison

Pooled samples of human urine have been injected using both chromatographic methods to compare the number of compounds detected, the MS signal intensity and the intraday repeatability of the method (figure 3 and table 2)

**Table 2:** Comparison of the method performances in terms of number of non-detected peaks (ND), median peak area, median relative standard deviation (RSD), and mean retention time shift (RT shift).

Ammonium fluoride showed higher ionization efficiency, stability and repeatability than ammonium acetate in HILIC-MS experiments. These characteristics make ammonium fluoride as a candidate additive in metabolomics experiments. Performing two real metabolomics experiments, we achieved good stability and a good discriminant power, without having troubles during the sequence injections. Future work should focus on the determination of the best ammonium fluoride concentration specific for each kind of chromatographic column and instrument.
