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# Morpho-phonological adaptation and the development of secret languages: The case of Chamtok in Mutengene, South-West Cameroon 

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## Chamtok

A secret language (argot, language game, cant, ludling) created by modifying Cameroon Pidgin English (CPE) and used by some Mutengene girls to exclude non-group members from their conversations.
(1)


## Mutengene, South-West Cameroon

- Road junction town (to Buea, Limbe, Tiko)
- Several petty businesses
- High crime wave
- Town and inhabitants nicknamed Cham, e.g., Chamboys, Chamgirls

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Widely documented globally, e.g. Pig Latin, Verlan, Gibberish, etc.
- Pig Latin, English and several other languages (Cowan 1989)

Rule: (1) the initial onset of a word is moved to the end of the word and the diphthong "ay" Leı/ is added after the consonant.
(2) $\quad$ pig $=$ "ig ay"
latin = "atin ay"
banana = "anana ay"

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Pig Latin, English and several other languages

Rule: (2) When a word begins with a consonant cluster both sounds are moved to the end of the word and the diphthong "ay"/eı/is added.
(3) friends = "iends ay"
smile = "ile may"
blood = "ood lay"

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Pig Latin, English and several other languages

Rule: (3) When a word begins with a vowel simply add "way, "hay", or "yay" at the end.
(4) eat = "eatway"
omelet = "omeletway"
are = "areway"

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Korakistika, Greek (Manning 2012)

Rule: Insert " k " and the vowel of the original syllable after each syllable:
(5) Kalimera = "Kaka liki meke raka"

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Yäwof q'uanq'ua ('bird language'), Amharic (Cohen 1939)

Rule: Duplicate each syllable, replacing the initial consonant with "z" in the duplicate:
(6) säbbärä = "säzäbbäzäräzä"

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Păsărească (birds' language), Romanian

Rule: After each syllable, add ' $p$ ' and repeat last vowel:
(7) maşină = "mapaşipinăpă"

## Formation of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- Jeringonza or Jeringozo in Argentina, Spanish

Rule: Each vowel is reduplicated with a separating ' $p$ ':
(8) No sabe nada = "Nopo sapabepe napadapa"

## Functions of Secret languages/argots/ language games

- System of manipulating spoken words to render them incomprehensible to an untrained listener.
- Used primarily by groups attempting to conceal their conversations from others, e.g. children and teenagers to avoid understanding by adults.
- Some language games such as Pig Latin are so widely known that privacy is virtually impossible, because many people have some understanding of how it works and the words can sound very similar to their English counterpart.


## Cameroon Pidgin English

- Kamtok (literally ‘Cam(eroon) talk’)
- Origin unclear but significant spread between 1850 and 1884 when coastal Cameroon was virtually under the control of the British (Todd 1982, Menang 2008)
- Influenced by English phonology and vocabulary.
- Lingua Franca in English-speaking regions of Cameroon and beyond


## Cameroon Pidgin English Phonology

- 6 vowels: i, e, u, o, د, a
- 4 diphthongs: ai, au, эі, ia (possibly a fifth, ei)
(9) bai 'buy' vs. ba 'bar' kau 'cow' vs. ka 'car'
nois 'noise' vs. nos 'nurse' bia 'beer' vs. bi 'bee'
- 21 consonants: $\mathrm{p}, \mathrm{b}, \mathrm{t}, \mathrm{d}, \mathrm{k}, \mathrm{g}, \mathrm{m}, \mathrm{n}, \mathrm{n}, \mathrm{f}, \mathrm{v}, \mathrm{s}, \mathrm{z}, \mathrm{f}, \mathrm{h}, \mathrm{t} \mathrm{f}, \mathrm{d} 3, \mathrm{l}, \mathrm{w}, \mathrm{r}, \mathrm{j}$.
- Tone? bábà 'barber' vs. bàbá 'father

- Recorded on Android Phone in .M4a format
- Annotation in ELAN
- Some analysis in PRAAT (Boersma \& Weenink 2001)

## Chamtok: Creation processes

Rule 1. Reduplication of CV portions of syllables, preventing monosyllabic words
(11) a. maban/maman/ Chamtok man CPE 'man'
b. fubud /fufud/ Chamtok fud CPE
'food'
c. dribink/dridink/ Chamtok drink CPE
'drink'

## Chamtok: Creation processes

Rule 1. Reduplication of CV portions of syllables: Disyllabic words or longer
(12) a. fabadaba /fafadada/ fada
'father'
b. kabakubulebet /kakakukulelet/ Chamtok kakulet 'calculate'
c. tubumoborobo /tutumomororo/ tumoro 'tomorrow'

## Chamtok: Creation processes

Rule 2. Replacement of reduplicated consonant by the voiced bilabial plosive /b/, resulting in the omnipresence of /b/ in all words,
a. fabadaba /fafadada/ fada 'father'
b. kabakubulebet /kakakukulelet/ kakulet 'calculate'
c. tubumoborobo /tutumomororo/ tumoro 'tomorrow'

Rule 3. Codas shift rightwards

'Finish this section!'
b. mebe wubu dibiskobos fobo wubus
tobopibik Chamtok me wu diskos fo wuf topik CPE let 3PL discuss for which topic English 'On which topic should we discuss?'

Rule 4. Words generally ending in a HL falling melody

## Chamtok: Functions

$\checkmark$ Restricted to girls
$\checkmark$ Exclude non-group members (parents, friends, men) from conversations
$\checkmark$ Making secret plans
$\checkmark$ Extortion situations

## Future of Chamtok

$\checkmark$ Critically endangered like many other secret languages across Cameroon
(17) wibi fobs sebekaba debe tobsk sebe mebe wubu tobsk naba ibinglibi wi fo Seka de tok se me wu tok na English Chamtok CPE we for Saker they talk say make we talk only English English When we were in Saker, they said we should speak only English.'

Of 104 secret languages listed in Wikepedia, only 4 are hosted by African languages
$\checkmark$ Need to document and preserve

$\checkmark$ Based on Cameroon Pidgin English
$\checkmark$ Used to exclude non-group members (parents, friends, men) from conversations, making secret plans, and for extortion
