
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## Context

Iron reinforcements of Notre-Dame de Paris cathedral are a source of data for the interpretation of gothic architecture. Radiocarbon dating of these metallic armatures can provide information on the chronology of the building and reveal potential recycling during restoration phases. In addition, this method coupled with archaeometallurgical analyses can highlight which roles iron played in the monument's construction.

Radiocarbon dating was performed on six cramps (tribunes and upper walls) and on two ancient tie-rods of the clerestory windows.






Sampling in the most carburized areas (cementite phase Fe<sub>3</sub>C)

Sample sealed in quartz tube along with an excess of CuO and silver wire CuO/Fe ratio = 5 > 850°C for 5 h Graphitization


Radiocarbon measurement using AMS (ARTEMIS, LMC14, Saclay)

Calibration: IntCal20 Northern Hemisphere radiocarbon age calibration curve – OxCal software

## Conclusion

- The results concerning the cramps show that these samples are contemporaneous with the construction phases of the cathedral in the middle of the 12<sup>th</sup> or beginning of the 13<sup>th</sup> century. The two cramps of the tribunes are older than those coming from the upper walls. It proves that the builders implemented these iron armatures of the tribunes in the earliest phases of construction, most probably in the early 1160s. So far, these series of cramps are the earliest known example of iron armatures used in the initial design of a Gothic monument. However, the rows of cramps of the upper walls were dated from the early 13th century at the latest. It coincides with the dating of the 13th century framework, indicating that the erection of the wall and the installation of the cramps occurred shortly before the completion of the framework.
- The radiocarbon study of clerestory windows tie-rods samples show that one of them is contemporary with the reconstruction phase of 1225 mentioned by E. Viollet-le-Duc. The second sample seems to be from a later early modern or modern restoration phase.

## Outlook

Radiocarbon analyses of the samples presented in this poster give a first vision of the use of these metallic armatures in the construction of Notre-Dame de Paris cathedral. Other samples will be analyzed in the upcoming months, including cramps from the choir upper walls, for a better understanding of this Gothic monument.
