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### 200 Gbit/s terahertz tunneling demultiplexer in 300 GHz band

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*Abstract*—We showcase here the experimental demonstration of demultiplexing terahertz channels with up to 200 Gbit/s aggregated data-rate, using 4 carrier frequencies. The demonstration is carried out in the 300 GHz band. Best error vector magnitude obtained values are in the range 6-9%, with 50 Gbit/s per channel, enabled by a recently-reported novel substrateless integrated passive demultiplexer, which was developed specifically to serve the particular requirements of terahertz waves.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

Terahertz (THz) technology is receiving rapidly increasing attention for an envisioned application in the communications field. Specifically, the frequency range around 300 GHz is very attractive from a good compromise of technology performance and atmospheric window between 250 and 320 GHz. Significant advances have been achieved for transmitters, receivers and related lab demonstrations. Among the multiple challenges of THz communications [1], passive functions as filtering, multiplexer/demultiplexer, duplexing, antennas are also mandatory to consider. Here we showcase the use of a recently developed THz multiplexer [2] in the 300 GHz band, thoroughly characterize its frequency differentiation and dispersion properties, and demonstrate that it is able to support a 4-channels signal with 200 Gbit/s aggregated data-rate.

#### II. TRANSMISSION AND DISPERSION ANALYSIS




Fig. 1. Photograph of the 4 channel tunneling demultiplexer.

The THz demux deployed here is described in detail in [2]. This device is implemented in a broadband substrateless all-silicon platform that offers freedom to define arbitrary guide curvatures [3], which the demux exploits for tailored wave-tunneling from a curved guide into an adjacent slab in order to achieve a frequency-scanning focused beam. The demux is shown in the Fig. 1.




Fig. 2. Transmission characteristics of the THz demultiplexer. VNA measurement is done in the 220-325 GHz/325-500 GHz bands (CH1), and 325-500 GHz band for CH2-4.

The demux is incorporated in two THz testbeds. The first one is used to measure the transmission characteristics and the dispersion characteristics using a set of 2 frequency extenders coupled to vector network analyzer (VNA). In this case, injection is done at the common port, and signal is extracted from each individual channel port. The measured transmission characteristics are shown in Fig. 2.




Fig. 3. Transmission characteristics of the 350 GHz channel and measured group delay, found to be flat and close to 0.51 ns.

The 4 channels were well identified, and centered at 330, 350, 370 and 390 GHz. One important feature is also a flat group delay (GD) performance of the device, which is of critical importance to avoid signal degradation due to dispersion. An example (channel 2) is shown in Fig. 3, and the flat GD in-band is clearly visible.

#### III. THZ COMMUNICATION DEMONSTRATION




Fig.4 16-QAM transmission in all channels (up: references, down, after demultiplexing).

The THz demultiplexer was then tested in a data communication setup. A 16-QAM with 12.5 GBaud was successfully transmitted in all the channels, resulting in a 4x50 = 200 Gbit/s aggregated data-rate. The constellations for the reference and transmitted 16-QAM signals are shown in Fig. 4, and a clearly defined pattern of symbols can be observed, and corresponding EVM for all channels, in the range 5.6~8.5%.




Fig.5 EVM performances curves for all channels.

The Fig. 5 shows the EVM evolution with the relative received power, corresponding to the lowest EVM obtained for the channel 1 (329 GHz).

#### IV. CONCLUSION

We have thoroughly characterized the transmission and dispersion of a recently reported passive four-channel terahertz demux [2]. The device is shown to support an aggregate data rate of 200 Gbit/s using a 16-QAM modulation format. This clearly illustrates the potential for practical applications of terahertz waves. The channel characteristics will be shown in greater detail at the conference.
