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## Progress in process development of La<sub>0.7</sub>Sr<sub>0.3</sub>MnO<sub>3</sub> thin films for uncooled THz bolometers

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Abstract— We present preliminary results of uncooled THz bolometers based on La<sub>0.7</sub>Sr<sub>0.3</sub>MnO<sub>3</sub> thin films on SrTiO<sub>3</sub> buffered high resistivity silicon substrates. Fabrication improvements enable to obtain low contact resistance and the impedance measurements show that it is possible to minimize the impedance mismatch with an antenna.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

Antenna-coupled thermal sensors offer a unique choice for infrared detection applications. The antenna captures the incident radiation and can be designed to meet spectral, directional and polarization requirements [1]. The sensing element, in our case a bolometer, is located at the feed-point of the antenna. Previously, we have developed uncooled suspended La<sub>0.7</sub>Sr<sub>0.3</sub>MnO<sub>3</sub> (LSMO) bolometer in the near infrared range since this material shows a strong variation of electrical resistivity as a function of temperature close to 300 K and a very low noise level [2-4] compared to other resistive materials such as semiconductors and other oxide-based materials. In this paper, we will present our progress in process development of uncooled antenna-coupled bolometers based on LSMO thin films on SrTiO<sub>3</sub> (STO) buffered high resistivity silicon substrates to reach THz domain.

#### II. SAMPLES

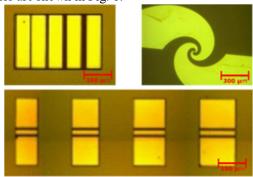
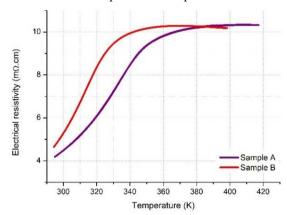


Fig. 1. Image of some test structures a) TLM Transmission Line Method b) CPW CoPlanar Waveguide designs and c) an antenna-coupled bolometer designs.

The 55nm-thick LSMO layers were deposited by Pulsed Laser Deposition (PLD) on STO buffered high-resistivity Si substrates (5x10 mm²) to minimize electromagnetic losses. About 150nm-thick gold layers were deposited by ion beam deposition with KI etching or lift-off techniques to form contact pads. An Ion Beam Etching (IBE) was used to pattern LSMO layers. Examples of the test structures and the antenna-coupled bolometers are shown in Fig. 1.

#### III. RESULTS

#### A. DC characterization

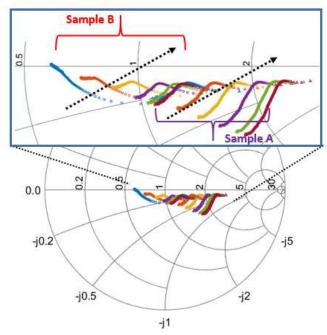
**Fig. 2.** Electrical resistivity versus temperature characteristics of the unpatterned 55 nm thick LSMO/STO/Si samples.

In order to determine the contact resistance value that can be problematic for impedance matching in antenna-coupled bolometer, DC electrical measurements using transmission line method (TLM) and four probes designs have been performed on different geometries and samples. Here we present the results on 2 typical LSMO/STO/Si samples: gold contact pads were defined by standard UV photolithography and chemical etching (sample A) or by lift-off process (sample B). Fig. 2 presents the electrical resistivity versus temperature characteristics of these unpatterned samples.

Using 4-probes and TLM designs, electrical resistivity and specific contact resistance at 300 K for the 2 samples are around few m $\Omega$ ·cm and few  $10^{-4}$  Ohm·cm². After an annealing at 320 °C during 30 min, specific contact resistance has reached  $10^{-5}$  Ohm.cm² for the sample B. It means that for a 50  $\Omega$  LSMO load ( $10\times100~\mu\text{m}^2$ ), the DC contact resistance is about 5 Ohm. Moreover, previous measurements have shown that contact resistance tends to decrease with temperature [5].

#### B. RF characterization

RF measurements were made on different CoPlanar Waveguide (CPW) lines designed to have a characteristic impedance of 50  $\Omega$  without LSMO in the slots at different temperatures (300 K to 350 K) between 250 MHz and 50 GHz. Figure 3 shows impedance measurements (S11, 1-port) of

 $120~\mu m\text{-long}\ 12~\mu m\text{-large}\ CPW$  structures (with LSMO load) measured with a vector network analyzer (VNA) with coplanar probes.

As expected the real part of the impedance shifts progressively to higher values as the temperature increase (the temperature coefficient of the electrical resistivity of LSMO is positive indeed). The sample B exhibits better performances probably due to the lower electrical contact resistance. For this geometry, the lowest reflection coefficient is obtained at 320 K. The impedance variation with the RF power and with the temperature have been also investigated in order to choose the optimal geometry and get a characteristic impedance close to 50  $\Omega$  at targeted frequency with a high sensitivity [6]. It seems thus possible to fabricate matched loads for mm-wave and THz bolometers. Further results will be shown at the conference.

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
