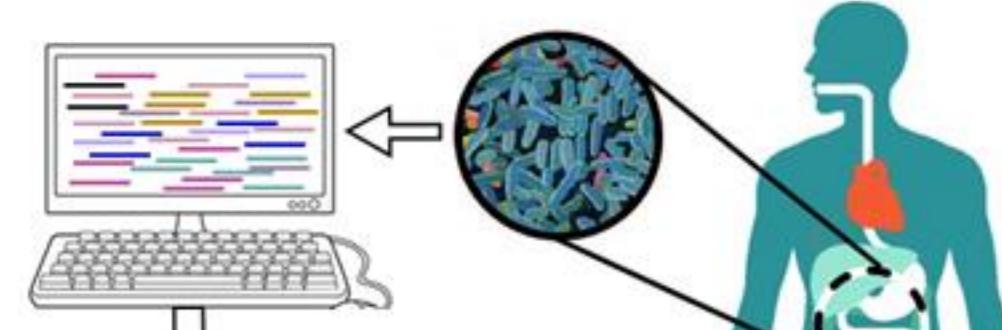




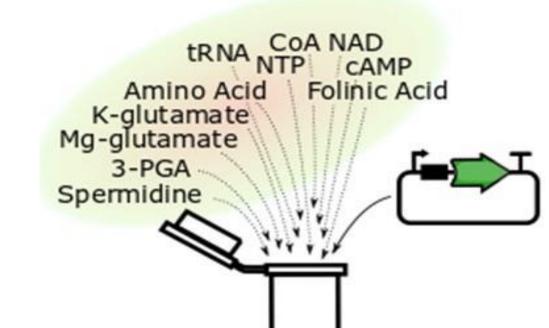

Background: Human gut microbiome



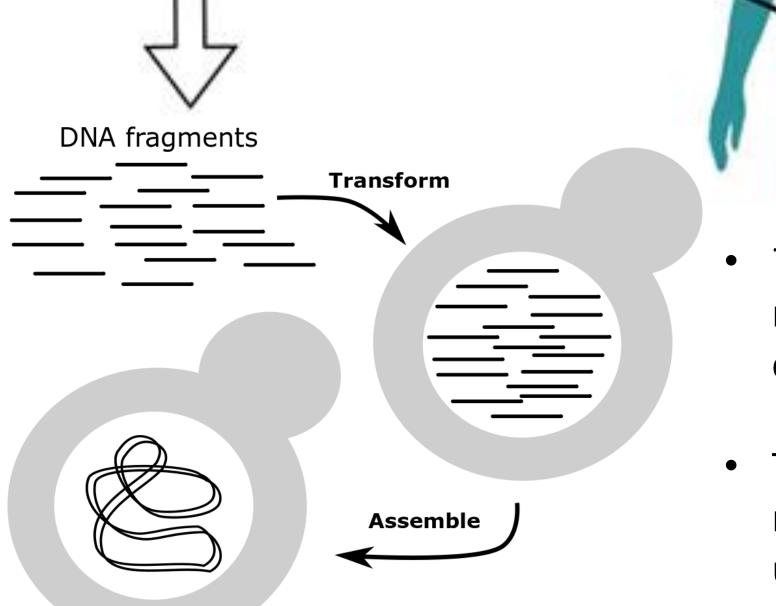
Background: cell-free systems



Cell-free systems are based on cell lysates to express genes of interest by adding DNA.

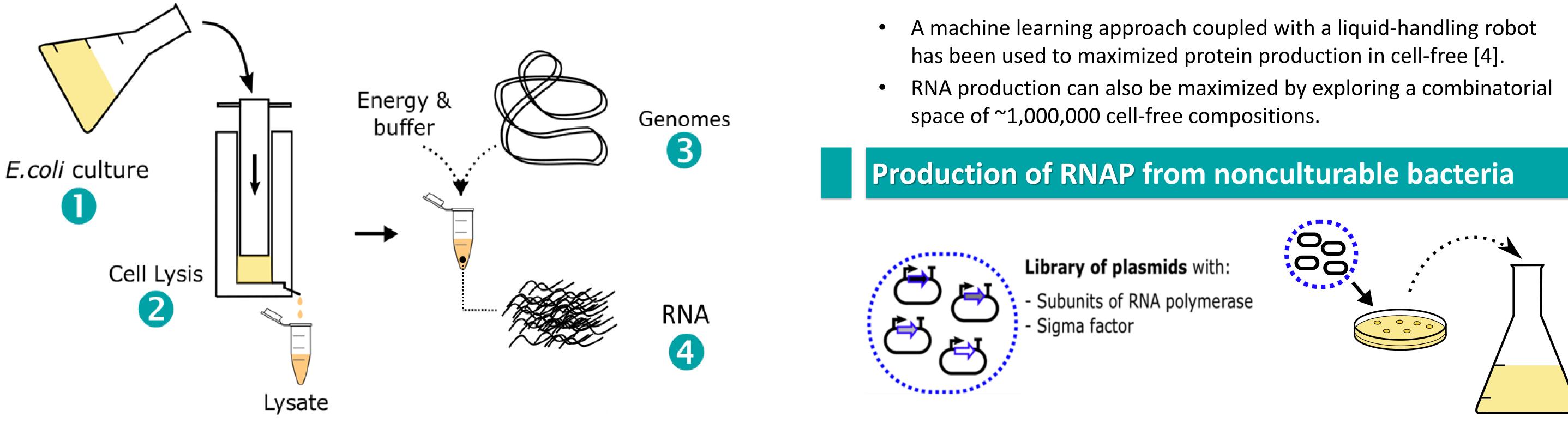

The lysate is supplemented with \bullet



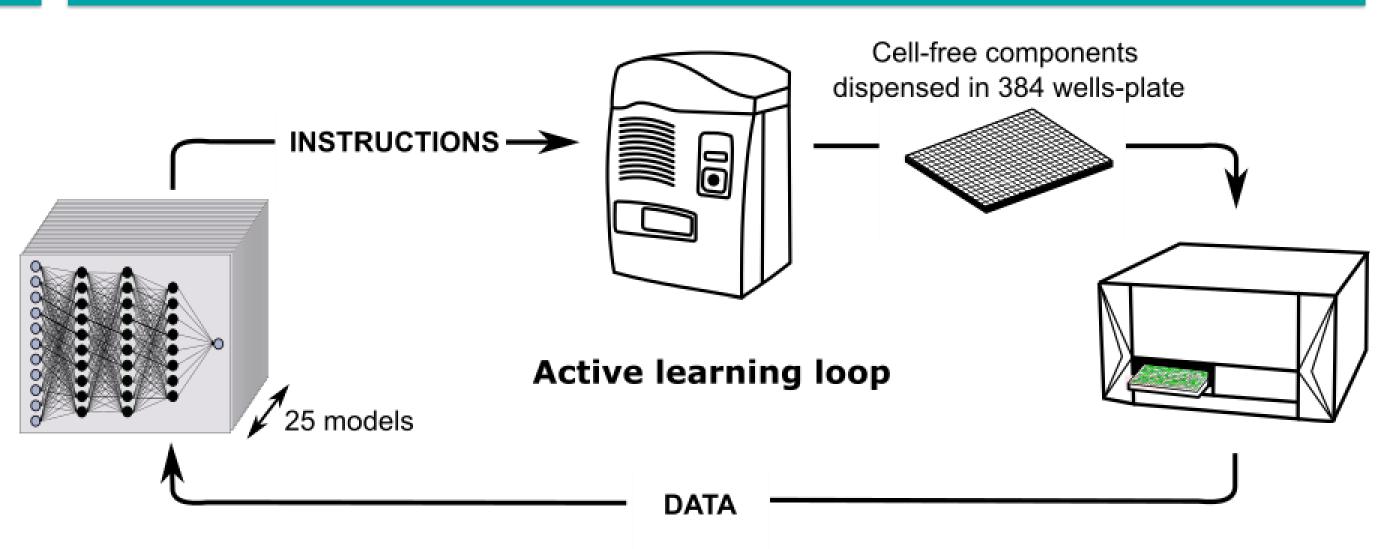
- 70% of the human gut microbiome species are currently nonculturable [1].

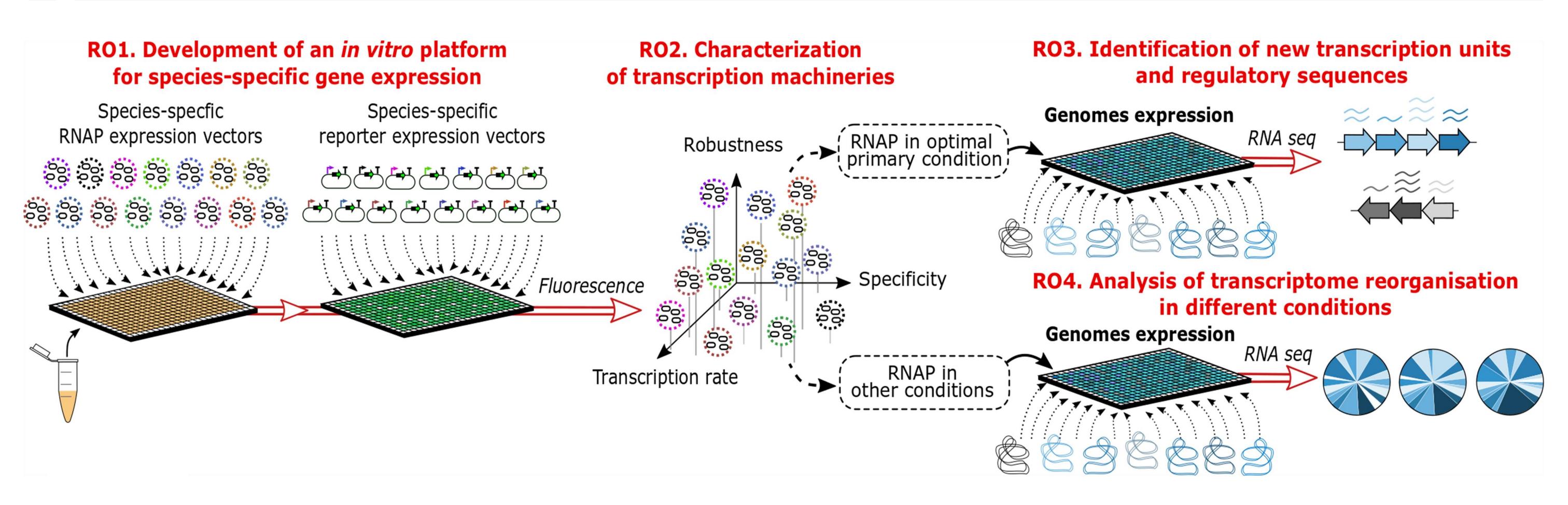
