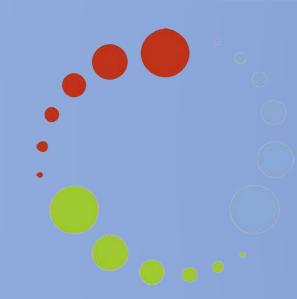

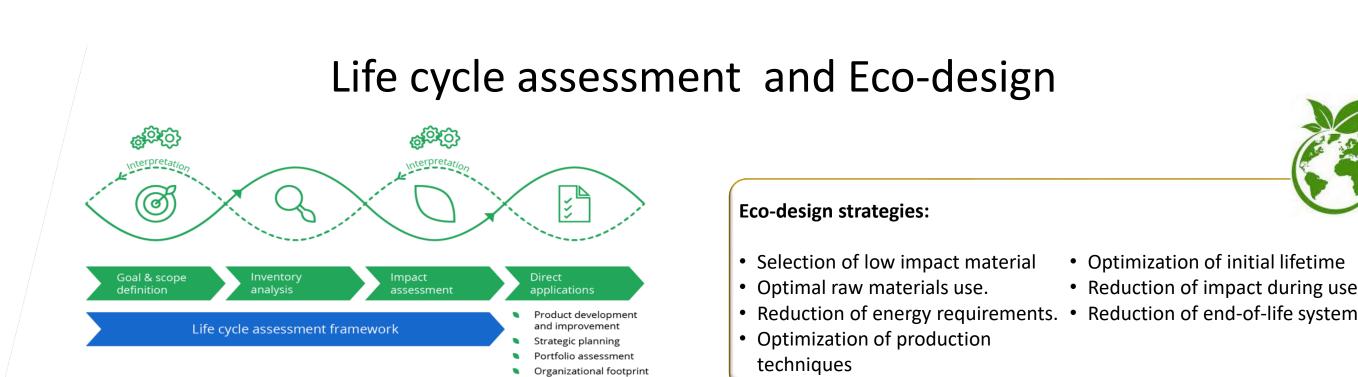

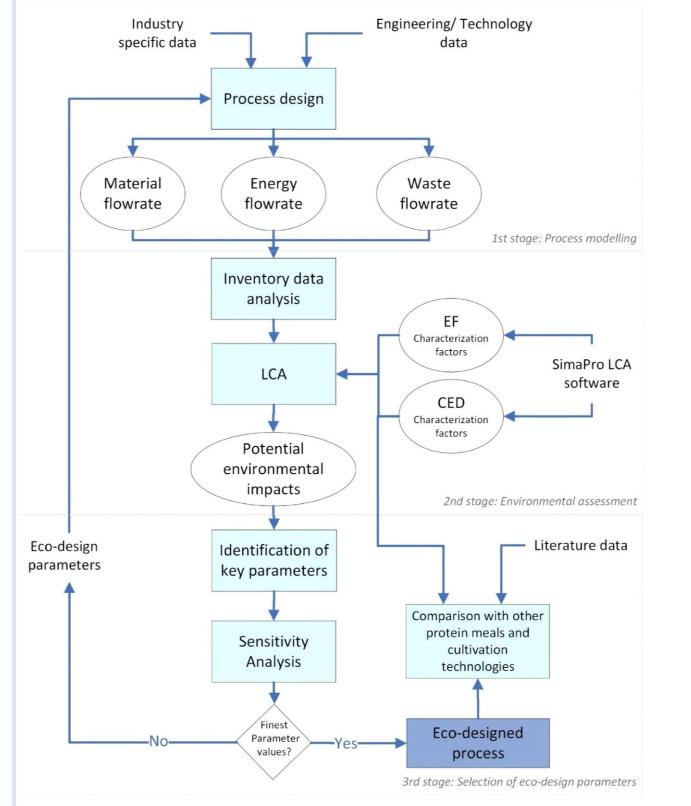
## Main objective

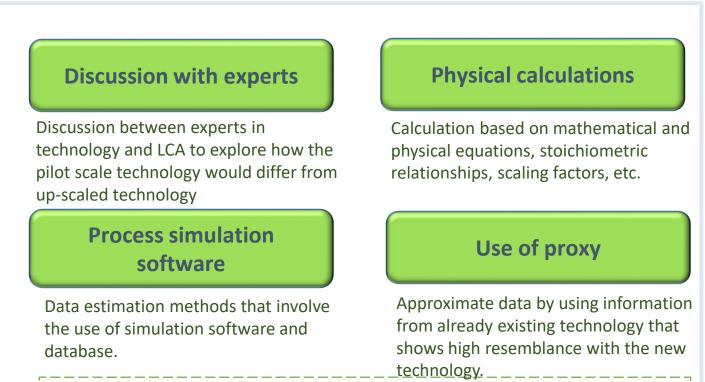
To carry out an LCA study with an eco-design approach to minimize the environmental life cycle impacts of a rotating cylinder biofilm technology for the cultivation of *Tetraselmis suecica*.

## **Specific objectives**

- Implement a contribution analysis of process stages (or substances) to the environmental impacts.
- Identify the sensitive parameters that specify the design of the rotative cylinder biofilm system and their influence on the subsequent environmental burdens.
- Compare the environmental impacts of the protein meal produced in the rotating biofilm system with other protein sources, such as soymeal and fishmeal.
- Compare Inalve technology to other microalgae cultivation technologies, such as open raceways and rotative carpet biofilm.

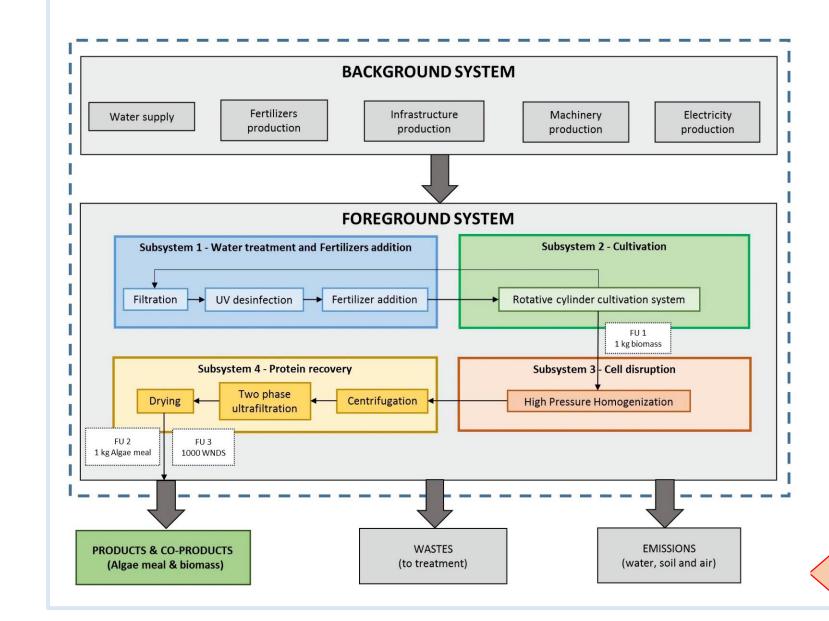

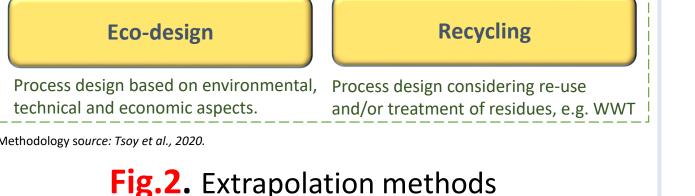

Fig.1. Research methodology

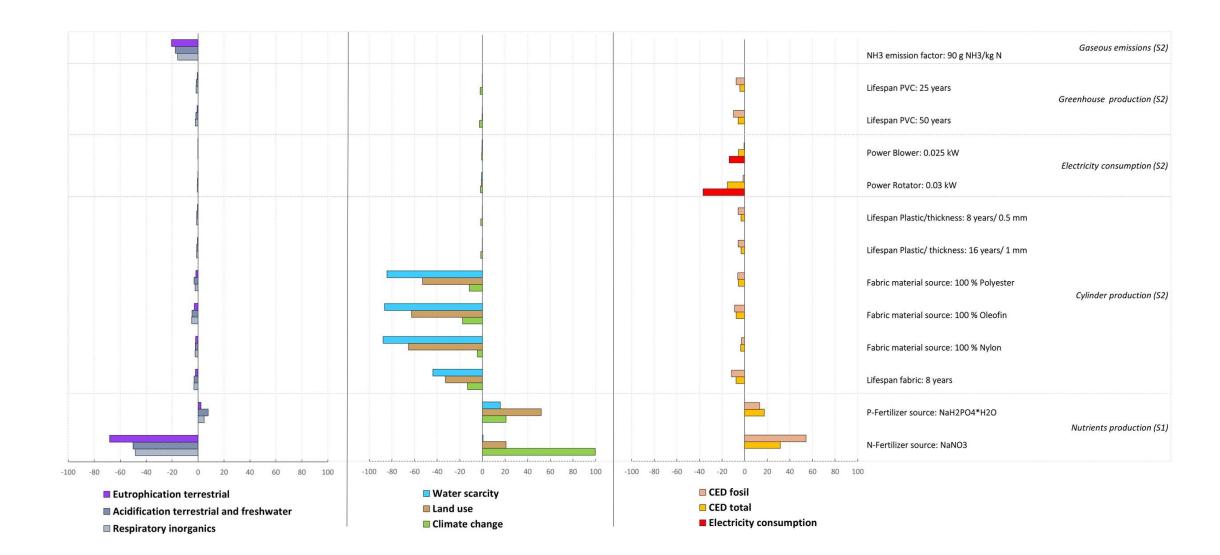




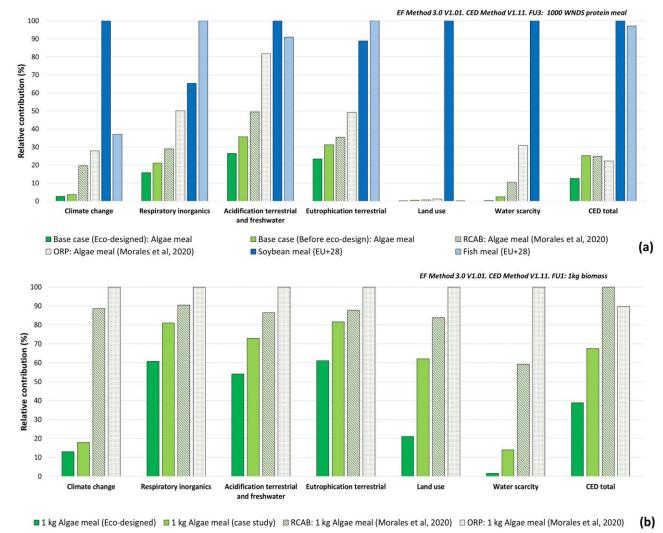
The research methodology (Fig. 1) includes:

- 1st stage process modeling; where, in addition to the conventional extrapolation methods, new objectives (eco-design and recycling) were included (see Fig. 2).
- 2nd stage environmental assessment: at the system boundaries, water treatment and recycling were included (Fig. 3).
- 3rd stage selection of eco-design parameters: the processes and parameters with the higher contribution by impact category were identified (see Fig. 4); an iterative sensitivity analysis to the parameters identified for the eco-design was performed (see Fig. 5); finally, the eco-designed technology and its product were compared with existing technologies (see Fig. 6).

The processes with contribution over 10% by impact category were  $NH_4NO_3$  production,  $P_2O_5$ production, cotton production, polyester production, rotator motor and blower electricity, and NH<sub>3</sub> emissions (Fig. 4).

The parameters identified for the eco-design were NH<sub>3</sub> emission factor, lifespan PVC, blower and rotator power, lifespan and thickness plastic, fabric material source, lifespan fabric, P-fertilizer source, and N-fertilizer source (Fig. 5).

The algae meal produced by the eco-designed system obtained reductions > 70.8%, in all the categories evaluated, compared to conventional protein meals (Fig. 6).

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## CONCLUSIONS

- This study proposes an eco-design approach dedicated to technologies at early design stages, for which extrapolation at industrial scale is necessary.
- The most impacting eco-design parameters are: NH<sub>3</sub> emission factor, Power blower, power rotator, Plastic used in the cylinder: Thickness and lifespan, Fabric material source and lifespan.
- Sensitivity analysis of these parameters shows environmental impact reduction between: 25% and 27.6% for CC, RI, A, 65.7% for LU, 88.3% for WS and 50.3% CED method.
- Algae meal from eco-designed rotating biofilm has an environmental impact reduced by at least 70.8% in comparison to conventional aquafeeds (fishmeal and soymeal).
- The methodology used in this work can be adapted and implemented to analyze other emerging technologies at early design stages, through the analysis, identification and selection of key parameters according to their environmental loads.

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
