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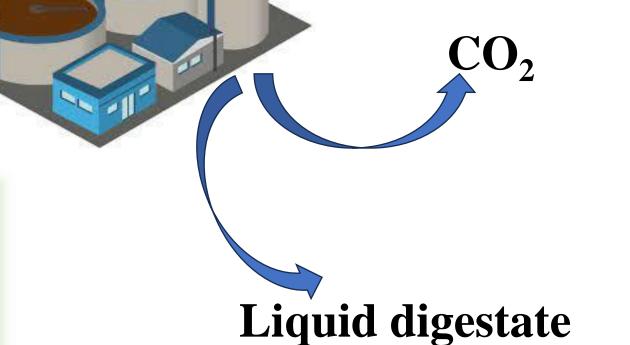

A waste-to-energy LCA was performed for an open raceway system fed by two effluents from the environmental biorefinery process: digestate (for N and P source) from methanization and CO₂ from biogas upgrade process.

Nutrients recovery in microalgae open raceways cultivation

Main objective

This study determines the effects of operational parameters, SRT and HRT, on microalgae biomass pond area, seasonal removal efficiency of nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorous) and environmental impacts. In addition, this case study provides a circular economy perspective on microalgae cultivation for liquid digestate by recycling of nutrients (nitrogen, phosphorous and CO₂) and water, reducing the discharge to the natural environment, while producing compounds from microalgae to source green chemistry.

MATERIALS AND METHODS

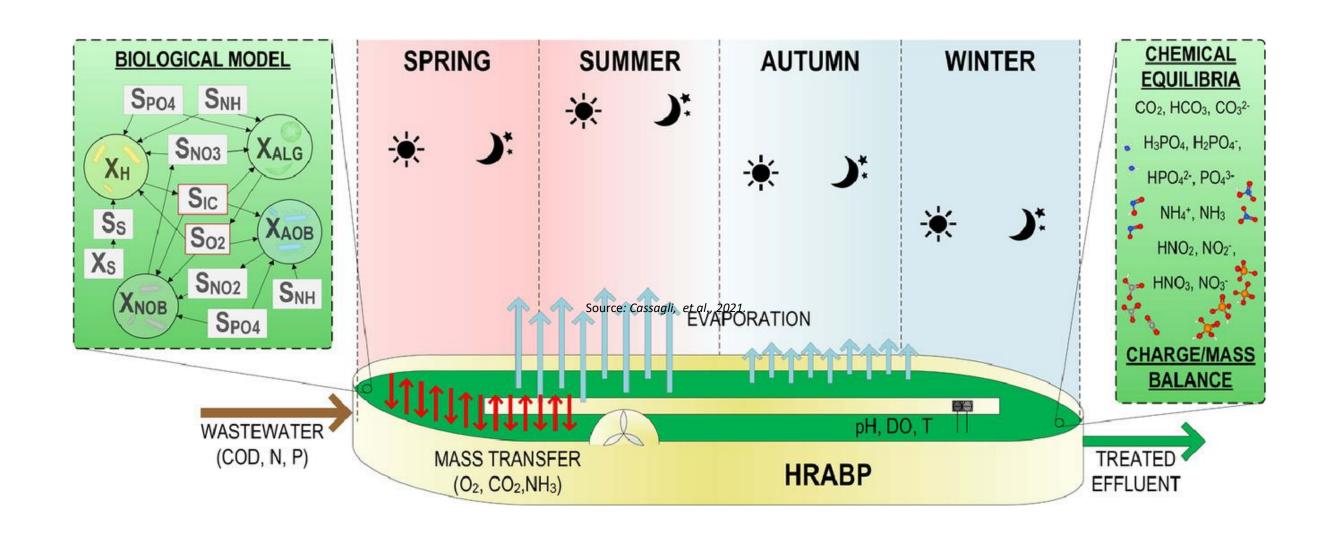


Fig.1. Microalgae growth model ALBA was used for determining productivities and mass balances of COD, C, O, H, N and P. This model describes algae-bacteria ecosystem evolution in an outdoor raceway for wastewater treatment, while local climate drives light and temperature (Casagli et al., 2021).

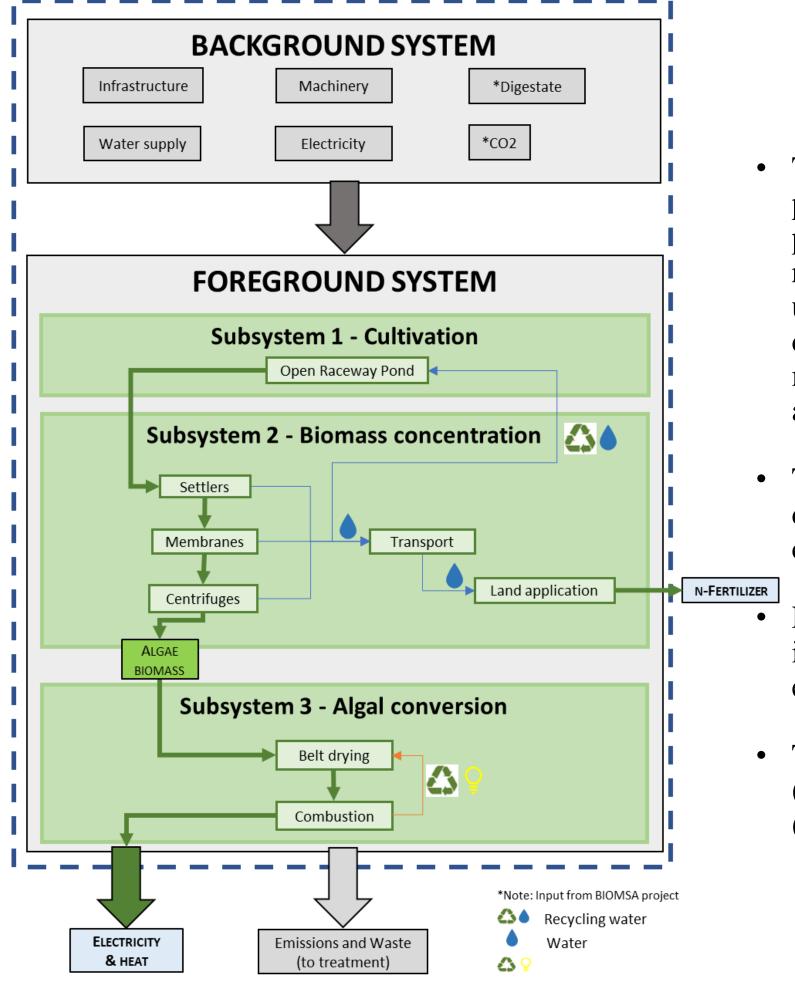
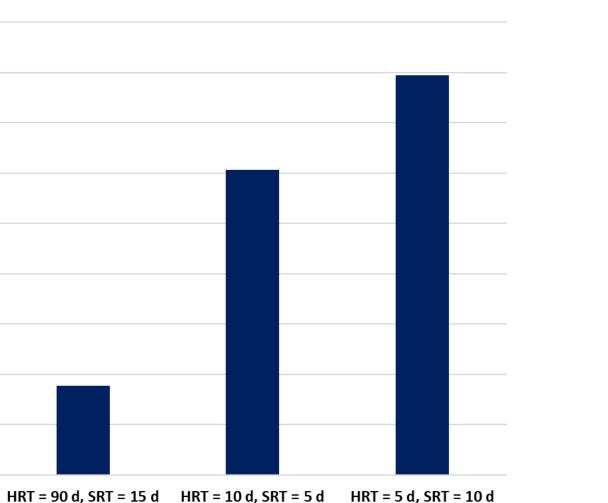


Fig.2. System boundaries.

• The boundaries include the biomass production, infrastructure, machinery production, emissions, and transport related to the chemical and materials used in the process units. The dismantling and final disposal of machinery and infrastructure material are also included.

- The functional unit (FU) is 1 m³ of liquid digestate entering the microalgae cultivation system.
- ReCiPe (H) v1.005 was used as life cycle impact method using midpoint and endpoint approach.
- Three case studies at different HRT (Hydraulic Residence Time) and SRT (Solid Residence Time):
- HRT: 90 d, SRT: 15 d
- HRT: 10 d, SRT: 5 d • HRT: 5 d, SRT: 10 d

and size of raceway ponds for the three scenarios.

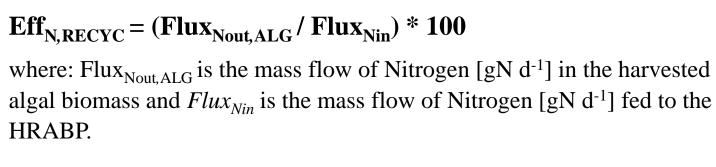

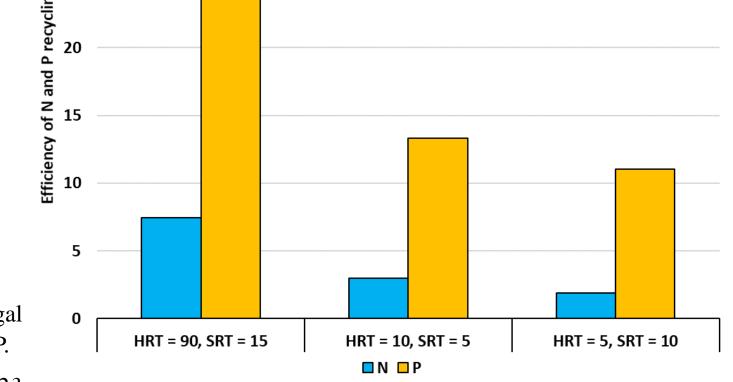

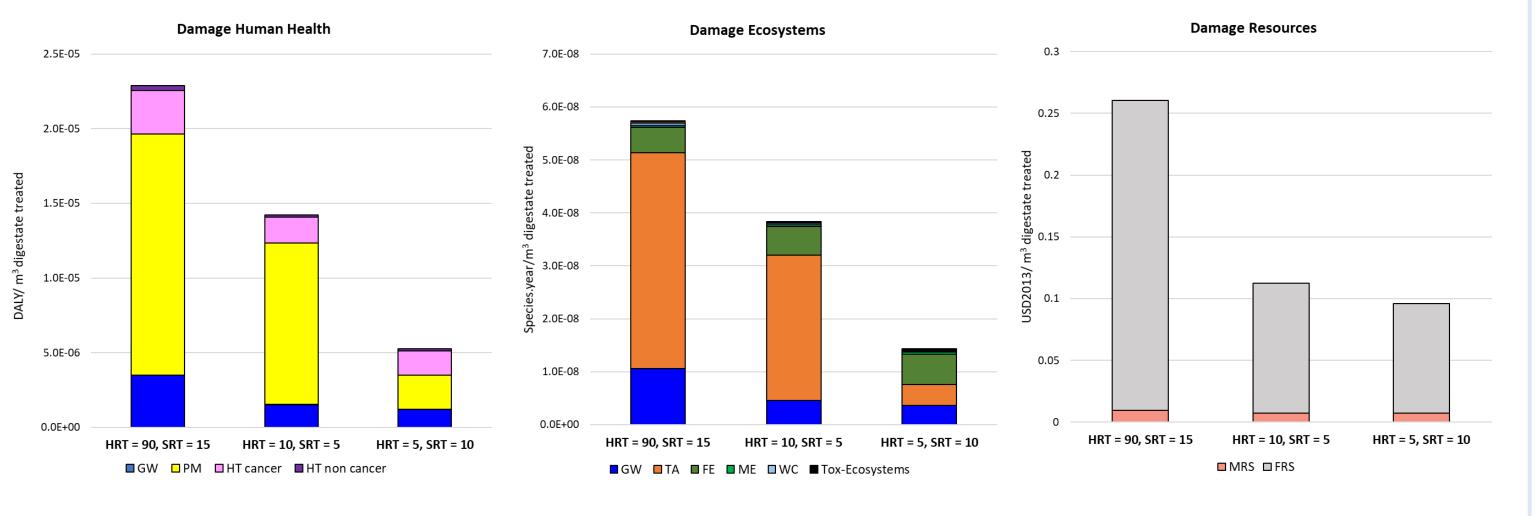


Fig.6. Endpoint environmental impact results. NOTE: GW: global warming; PM: particulate matter formation; HT cancer: Human toxicity, cancer effects; HT no cancer: Human toxicity, non cancer effects; TA: terrestrial acidification; FE: freshwater eutrophication; ME: marine eutrophication; Tox-Ecosystems: terrestrial, freshwater and marine ecotoxicities; MRS: metal resource depletion; FRS: fossil resource depletion.

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CONCLUSIONS

The best scenario from a point of view of environmental impacts is scenario (HRT= 5 d, SRT= 10), with the lowest impacts in damage to human health, ecosystems and resources. In addition, this scenario leads to a high productivity with a reduced production area (lower than 10,000 m² ponds) for treating the digestate. More scenarios should be analyzed to find the best trade-off between productivity, N and P removals and reduced environmental impacts.
