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## Generalized rotation metric in curved spacetime

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#### Abstract

Haug and Spavieri have recently introduced a new exact solution to Einstein's field equation that takes into account both the electric field energy of the charge and the gravitational field energy of the mass. Here, we introduce a generalized version of this metric where we take into account rotation.

**Key Words**: Mass-charge, general relativity, strong gravitational fields, black holes, rotation, charge, angular momentum.

Our recent introduced metric [1] that takes into account both electric field energy and the gravitational field energy is given by (in spherical polar coordinates, geometric units):

$$ds^2 = -\Delta dt^2 + \Delta^{-1} dr^2 + r^2 d\Omega^2, \tag{1}$$

where

$$\Delta = A(r) = 1 - \frac{2M}{r} + \frac{M^2}{r^2} + \frac{Q^2}{r^2} = 1 - \frac{2M}{r} \left(1 - \frac{M}{2r}\right) + \frac{Q^2}{r^2}$$

When generalized to also take into account rotation, we obtain the following metric in Boyer–Lindquist [2] coordinates:

$$ds^{2} = \frac{\Delta}{\Sigma} (cdt - a\sin^{2}\theta d\phi)^{2} - \frac{\Sigma}{\Delta} dr^{2} - \Sigma d\theta^{2} - \frac{\sin^{2}\theta}{\Sigma} (adt - (r^{2} + a^{2})d\phi)^{2}$$

where  $\Delta = 1 - \frac{2M}{r} + \frac{M^2}{r^2} + \frac{Q^2}{r^2} + \frac{a^2}{r^2}$ ,  $\Sigma = 1 + \frac{a^2 \cos^2 \theta}{r^2}$ , and *a* is the Kerr parameter  $a = \frac{J}{M}$  (angular momentum per unit mass). Our new metric can simply be seen as a further generalization of the Kerr-Newman [3, 4] metric, with the only difference being that  $\Delta = 1 - \frac{2M}{r} + \frac{Q^2}{r^2} + \frac{a^2}{r^2}$  (see [5]), while our metric in addition has the  $\frac{M^2}{r^2}$  term. If a = 0 one get our mass-charge metric without rotation.

### Horizons

The horizons of the new generalized rotation metric are given by:

$$r_h = M \pm \sqrt{M^2 - M^2 - Q^2 - a^2} = M \pm \sqrt{-Q^2 - a^2}$$

compared to horizons of  $r_h = M \pm \sqrt{M^2 - Q^2 - a^2}$ , in the Kerr-Newman metric, see [6].

### Match to the Planck scale for micro black holes

Ultimately, if general relativity is compatible with future quantum gravity, it is expected that the Planck scale will play a central role. This idea was first suggested by Eddington [7], and today it is the prevailing viewpoint among researchers working on quantum gravity theory (see for example [8?, 9]), despite opposition from some researchers [10]. We have recently demonstrated that the Schwarzschild metric can only partially satisfy a few properties of the Planck scale for any micro black hole mass candidate.

See Table 1. The generalized rotational metric can satisfy many more properties of the Planck scale (when Q = a = 0) than the Schwarzschild metric. One could attempt using alternative mass candidates other than the Planck mass in the Schwarzschild metric. However, we [11] have recently demonstrated that no mass candidate can match more than a few properties of the Planck scale in the Schwarzschild metric.

## 1 Conclusion

We have extended the Haug-Spavieri metric to include angular momentum (rotation) as well. Our mass-charge metric also seems to fit better the Planck properties for micro black holes than the Schwarzschild metric.

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
