Impact of growth rate on protein production

Can we predict protein abundance at any growth rate from mRNA concentration?

Cell physiology is growth-rate dependent

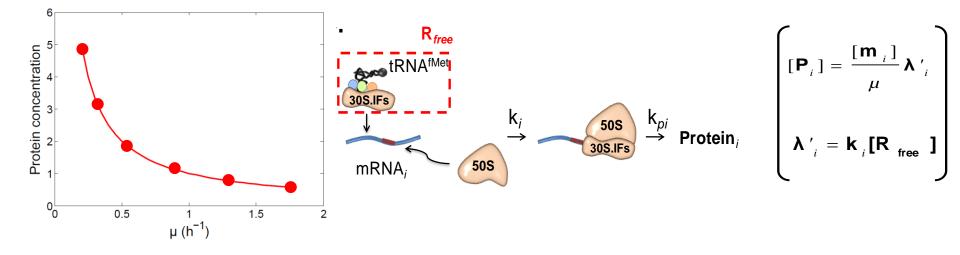

Protein concentration decreases with increasing growth rate

<u>Previous knowledge</u>: The concentration of a constitutively expressed protein decreases with increasing growth rate



<u>Previous theory</u>: the concentration decreases due to the only resulting dilution (Constant mRNA concentration and Constant translation efficiency)

<u>With this model</u>: mRNA concentration (measure with tiling arrays) and protein concentration (proteomic) partially correlate

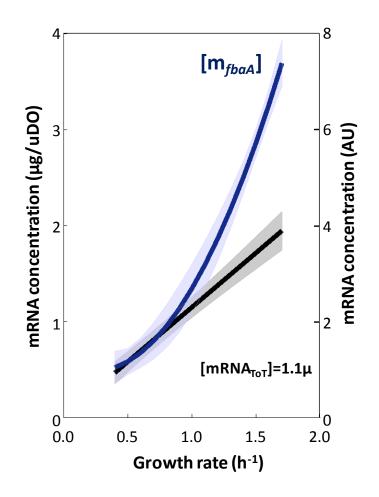
mRNA concentration increases with increasing growth rate

fbaA, a constituvely expressed genes in B. subtilis

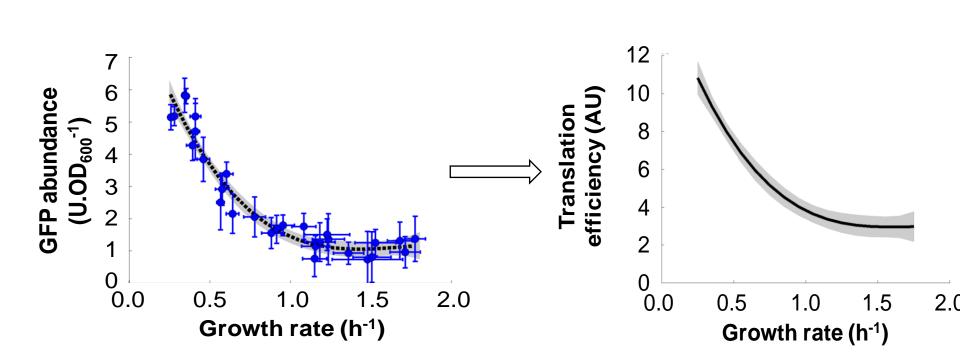
 $\underline{\textbf{mRNA}}_{\underline{\textbf{Tot}}}$ abundance increases as much as the rate of growth

 $\frac{mRNA_{\textit{fbaA}}}{mRNA_{\textit{fbaA}}}$ Abundance of the constitutive mRNA_{\textit{fbaA}} increases faster than mRNA_{Tot}

<u>New knowledge</u>: The concentration of a constitutively expressed mRNA increase with increasing growth rate



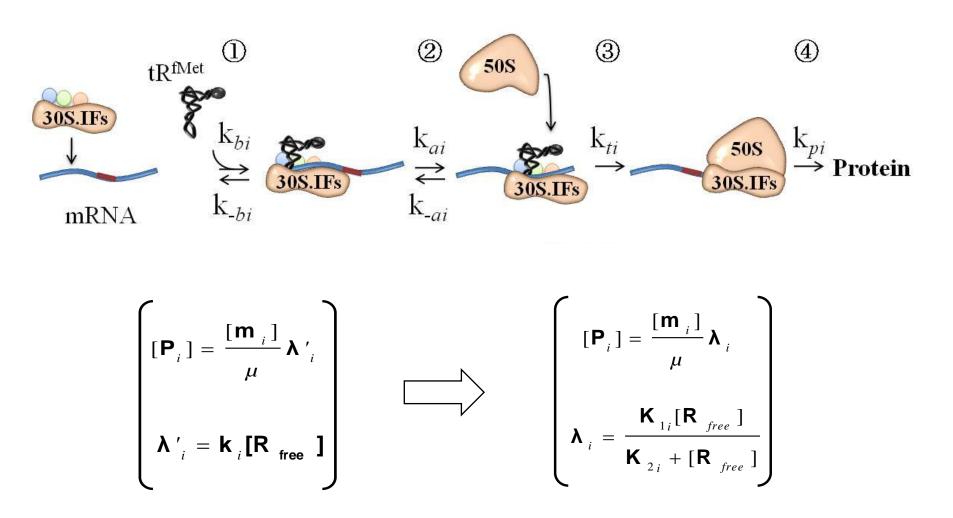
Translation efficiency decreases with increasing growth rate



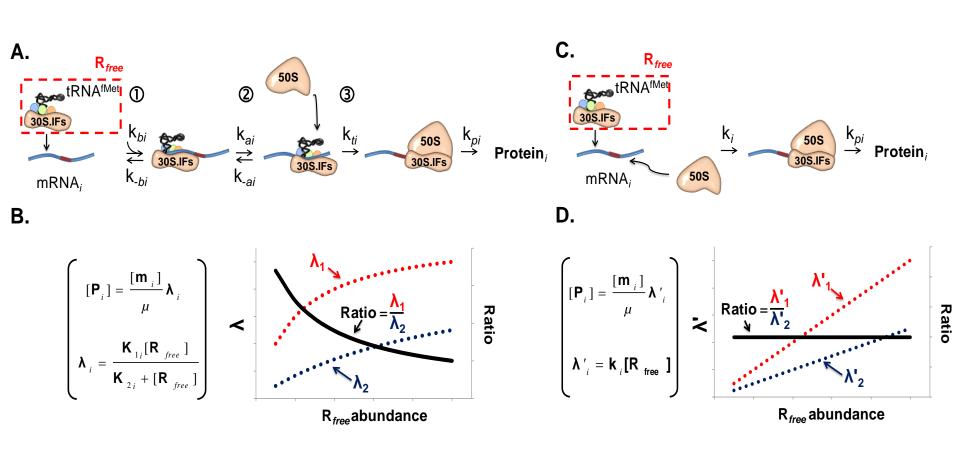
New knowledge: Translation efficiency drops with increasing growth rate

<u>With this model</u>: mRNA concentration (measure with tiling arrays) and protein concentration (proteomic) exhibit low correlation

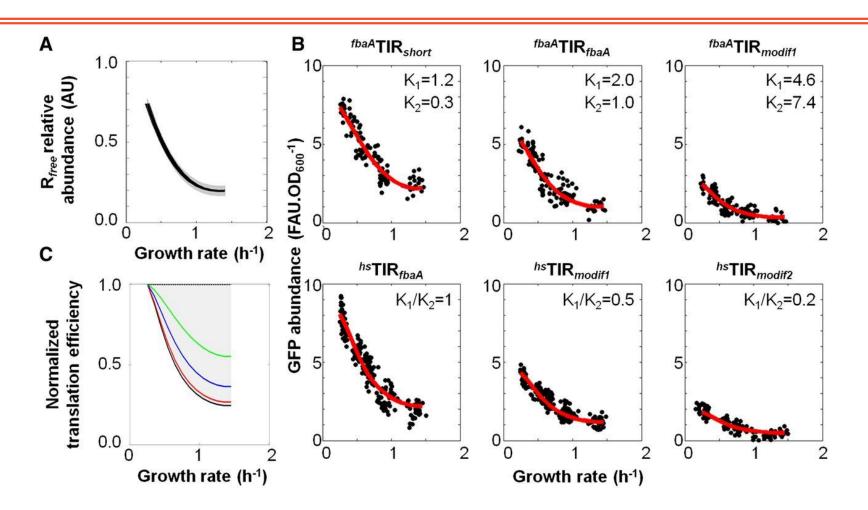

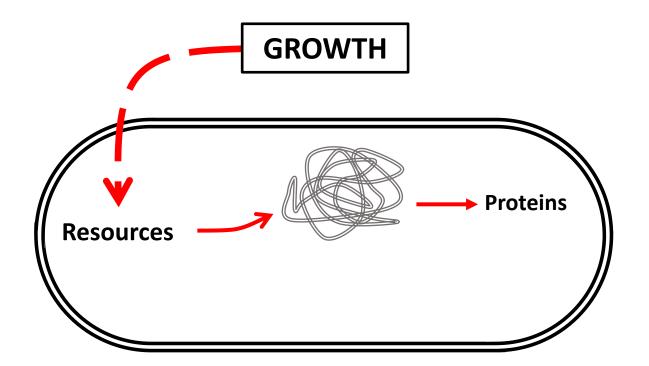
<u>New model</u>: Constitutively expressed protein behave differently as a function of the growth rate

Experimental validation

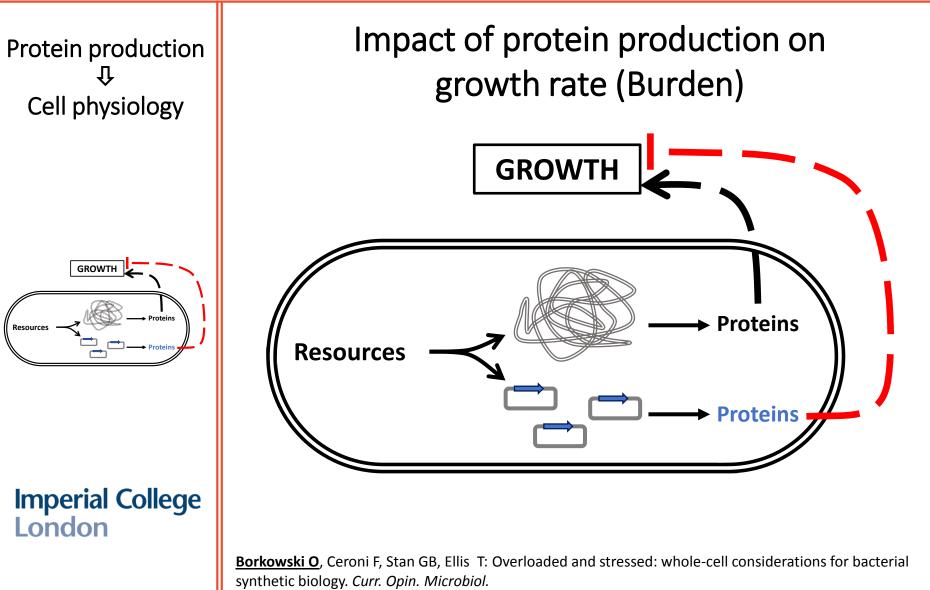


Data validate the model: Nonlinear translation efficiencies entail differential drops in protein abundances with increasing growth rate

Overload of CIpX by production of heterologous protein



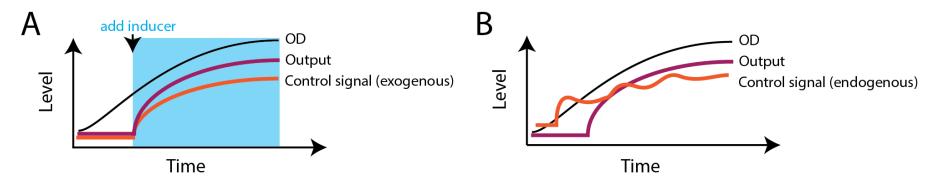

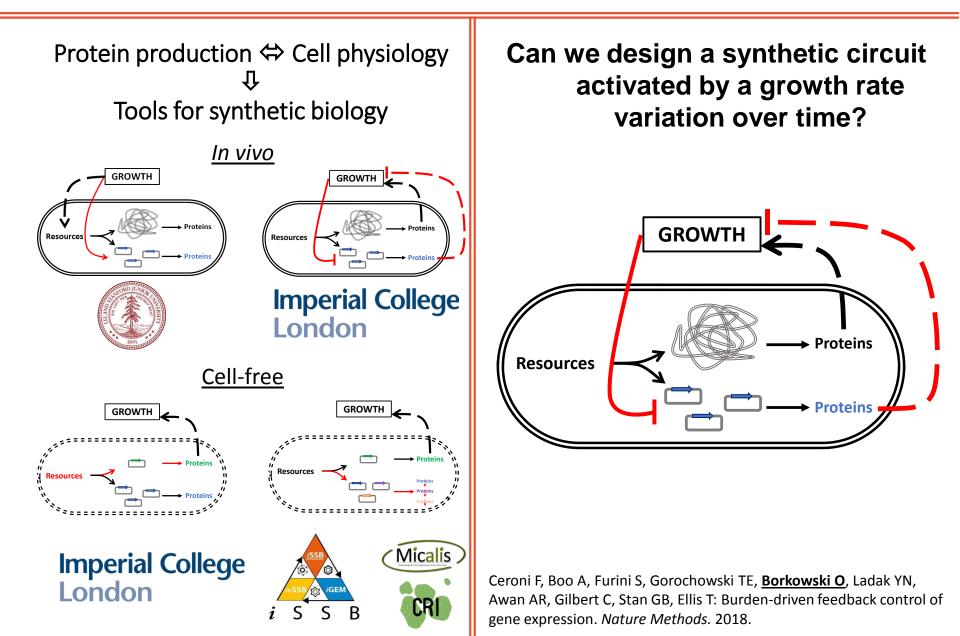
