Introduction

A (re-)insurer observes many (positive) random variables that represent losses from several portfolios of risks.

A major topic is the evaluation and modeling of the dependency between those risks. Indeed, the properties of this dependency has a huge impact on the behavior of the total loss, and therefore on the capital management of the company.


Risks can be heavy-tailed, skewed, and are usually dependant with each other, including in the extremes.

The infinite divisibility may be a wanted property.

Why infinite divisibility?

Definition (ID r.v. X)

- \bigcirc X is *n*-divisible if and only if there exists $X_1, ... X_n$ i.i.d. such that $X = X_1 + ... + X_n$
- \bigcirc X is ID iff this can be done for all n.
- \bullet X_i is called a *piece* of X.
 - Dependencies are largely unobservables in reinsurance;
 - Experts are providing information as divisibility parameters: "20% of this is driven by the same risk factors as 10% of that.." this means comonotonic pieces accross marginals.



SC (Solvency Capital): regulatory capital calculated using a risk measure that the re-insurer must have to absorb potential losses. For example, in the Solvency II directive of the European Union, it is the VaR(99.5%) of the P&L distribution.

Risk factors modelisation

In the internal modeling point of view, the distributions of several losses X_1, \ldots, X_d are supposed to be known, but the dependence structure between them must still be evaluated and taken into account to assess the variability and behavior of the total loss:

$$\sum_{i=1}^d X_i.$$

It might be achieved by a risk factors decomposition: $X_i = \sum_{j=1}^{n} X_{i,j}$,

where $X_{i,j}, X_{\ell,j}$ are either independent or comonotonic.

Divisibility allows to interpret the $X_{i,j}$ as pieces of X_i .

⇒ multivariate generalized Gamma convolutions give an answer to that question.



Recall Gamma distributions

Well known class of infinite divisible distributions.

 $X \sim \mathcal{G}(k, \theta)$ if its density function is:

$$\frac{x^{k-1}e^{k/\theta}}{\Gamma(k)\theta^k}.$$



Multivariate Gamma convolutions classes $\mathcal{G}_{d,n}$ and \mathcal{G}_{d}

 $\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{t} \in \mathbb{R}^d$, **Recall:** Cumulant generating function:

$$\mathcal{K}(\mathbf{t}) = \mathsf{In}\left(\mathbb{E}\left(e^{\langle \mathbf{t}, \mathbf{X} \rangle}\right)\right).$$

Multivariate Thorin Classes 1_n

$$\mathbf{X} \sim \mathcal{G}_{d,n}(\alpha, \mathbf{s}) \Leftrightarrow \mathcal{K}(\mathbf{t}) = -\sum_{i=1}^{n} \alpha_{i} \ln (1 - \langle \mathbf{s_{i}}, \mathbf{t} \rangle)$$

$$\mathbf{X} \sim \mathcal{G}_d(\nu) \Leftrightarrow K(\mathbf{t}) = -\int \ln\left(1 - \langle \mathbf{s}, \mathbf{t} \rangle\right) \nu(\partial \mathbf{s}).$$

All gammas, log-Normals, Paretos, α -stables, and sums and/or products of these are in \mathcal{G}_1 .

No estimation procedures were available before our work.

Motivation: interpretability of $\mathcal{G}_{d,n}$ models

 $\mathbf{X} \in \mathcal{G}_{d,n}$ has an additive risk-factor structure: there exists gamma random variables $G_1, ... G_n$ such that:

Goal: Estimate ν from observations of the random vector **X**. **Pb:** It is a deconvolution problem, which is numerically hard (can also be interpreted as a solution-less moment problem for the Thorin measure, see MFK 2).

The orthonormal Laguerre basis of $L_2(\mathbb{R}^d)$

Consider the following orthonormal basis of $L_2(\mathbb{R}^d_+)$ called Laguerre basis ³: let $\mathbf{p} \in \mathbb{N}^d$,

$$\phi_{\mathbf{p}}(\mathbf{x}) = \prod_{i=1}^{d} \phi_{p_i}(x_i)$$
, with $\phi_{p}(x) = \sqrt{2} \sum_{k=0}^{p} {p \choose k} \frac{(-2x)^k}{k!} e^{-x}$.

Any square integrable distribution density f can be expended as:

$$f(\mathbf{x}) = \sum_{\mathbf{p} \in \mathbb{N}^d} a_{\mathbf{p}} \phi_{\mathbf{p}}(\mathbf{x})$$
 where $a_{\mathbf{p}} = \int \phi_{\mathbf{p}}(\mathbf{x}) f(\mathbf{x}) \partial \mathbf{x}$

Simulations

Estimation

Consider a random sample X_1, \ldots, X_N of $X \in \mathcal{G}_d(\alpha, \mathbf{s})$. Let

$$\widehat{\mathbf{a}_{\mathbf{p}}} = \frac{1}{N} \sum_{i=1}^{N} \phi_{\mathbf{p}}(\mathbf{X}_i).$$

Consider the integrated square error loss:

$$L(\alpha, \mathbf{s}) = \sum_{\mathbf{k} \leq \mathbf{m}} (\widehat{a_{\mathbf{k}}} - a_{\mathbf{k}}(\alpha, \mathbf{s}))^2$$
 and

$$(\widehat{\alpha}, \widehat{\mathbf{s}}) = \operatorname{argmin}_{(\alpha, \mathbf{s})} L(\alpha, \mathbf{s}).$$

Remark that the theoretical Laguerre coefficients may be computed using the formula:

$$a_{\mathbf{k}} = \langle \phi_{\mathbf{k}}, f \rangle = \mathbb{E}\left(\phi_{\mathbf{k}}(\mathbf{X})\right) = \sqrt{2}^d \sum_{\mathbf{k} \leq \mathbf{p}} \binom{\mathbf{p}}{\mathbf{k}} \frac{(-2)^{|\mathbf{k}|}}{\mathbf{k}!} \mathbb{E}\left(\mathbf{X}^{\mathbf{k}} e^{-|\mathbf{X}|}\right).$$

Consistency

We have the following consistency result ⁴ under the thechnical well-behaved asumption (which holds for univariate Gamma convolutions, independent multivariate Gamma convolution and invertible linear transformations of them e.g.).

Theorem

If **X** is drawn from an ϵ -well-behaved density $f_{\alpha,s} \in \mathcal{G}_d(\alpha,s)$ then,

$$\|f_{(\widehat{\alpha},\widehat{\mathbf{s}})} - f_{\alpha,\mathbf{s}}\|_2^2 \xrightarrow[\substack{N \to \infty \\ \mathbf{m} \to \infty}]{a.s} 0.$$

Dimensionality issues

Introduction / motivation

The loss $L(\alpha, \mathbf{s})$ is too costly to work with when d gets large. Indeed, the number of coefficients to compute is given by

$$D(m,d) = \sum_{i=1}^{m} \binom{i+d-1}{d-1}.$$

which is exponentially increasing in d and therefore unusable in high dimension (ok until d = 4 or 5.

Improvement of the method by Oskar Laverny ⁵ by using an approximation of an integrated loss function and random projections (tested for d = 1000).




Figure: MLN case: n = 10




Figure: Clayton case: n = 20

Conclusions

- The univariate Thorin class is wide: LN, Pareto, α -stable, (some) Weibull, ...
- The Multivariate analogue provides an asymmetrical dependence structure which include tail dependency, and can take a lot of different shapes.
- Deconvolution is a hard inverse problem, and estimation of these distributions is complicated.
- The final additive risk-factor model gives easy interpretation of parameters and easy aggregation schemes. Should be shortly used by SCOR in some parts of their internal model.
- Improvement to go to high dimension in Oskar' work ⁶ and the open-source Julia package ⁷ provides the implementation.
