# GENERATION OF COLOR CENTERS IN 6H-SiC

## Ion implantation

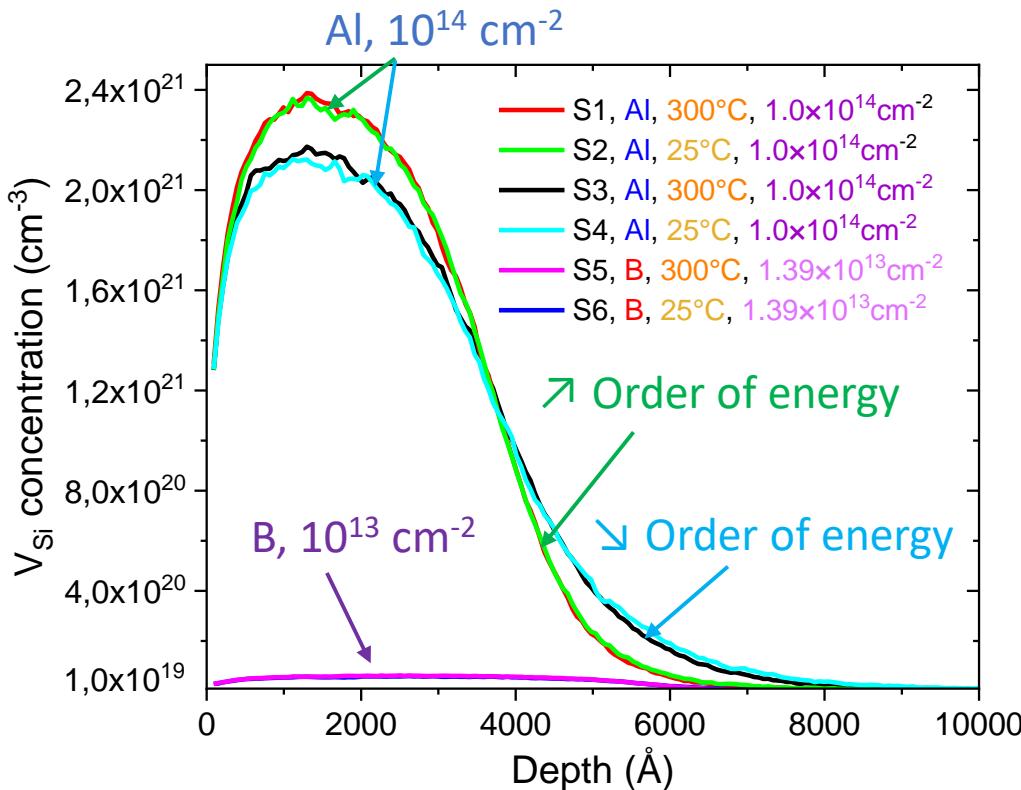

- Simulations close to the experimental results
- Generation of color centers in **localized and large areas**
- **Ion implantation of Al and B in 6H-SiC**
- Energy of implantation fixes the point defects depth
- Order of implantations can change the defects distribution
- Limited damage in the SiC lattice with well-controlled parameters : dose and temperature

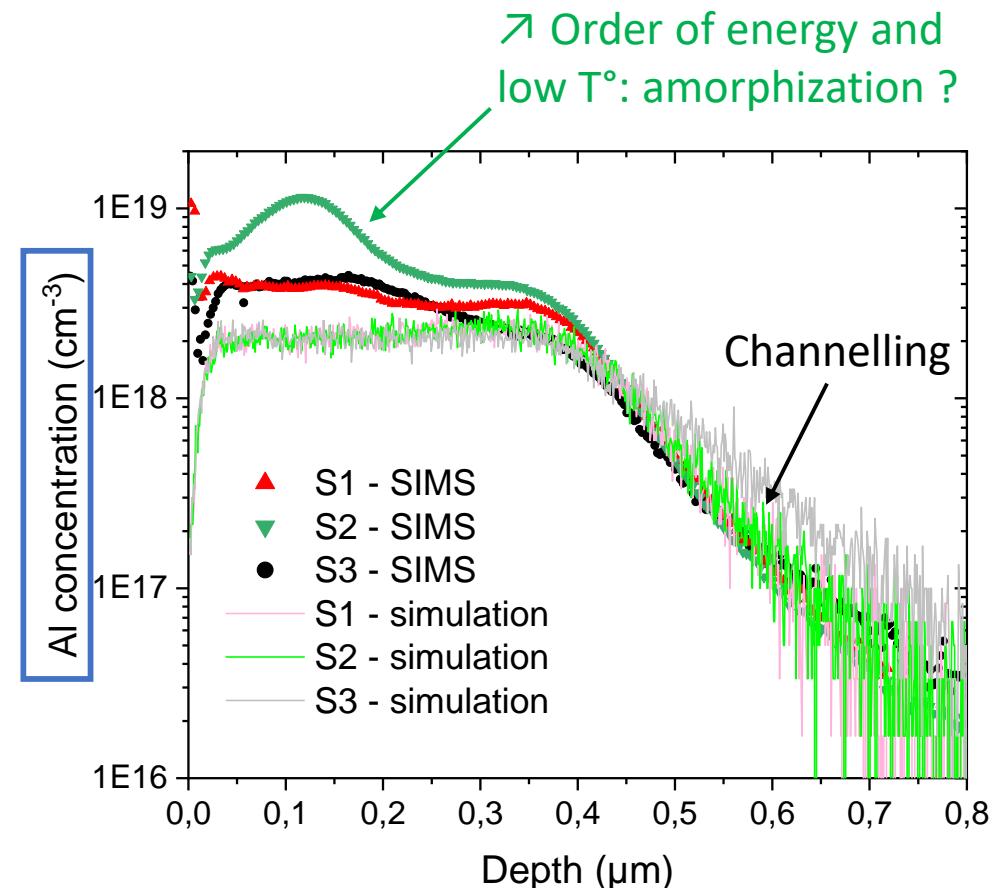

- The order of implantations and the dose impact the distribution of  $V_{Si}$

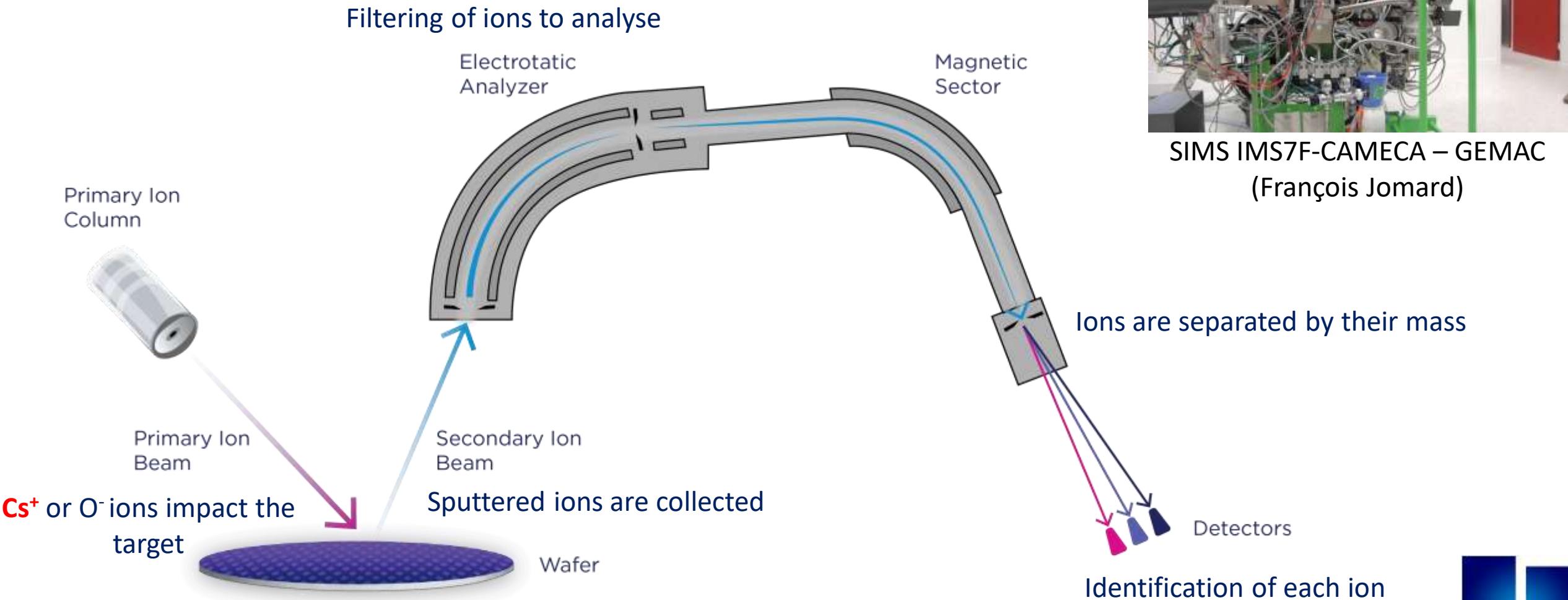

# CRYSTALLINITY OF THE SAMPLES

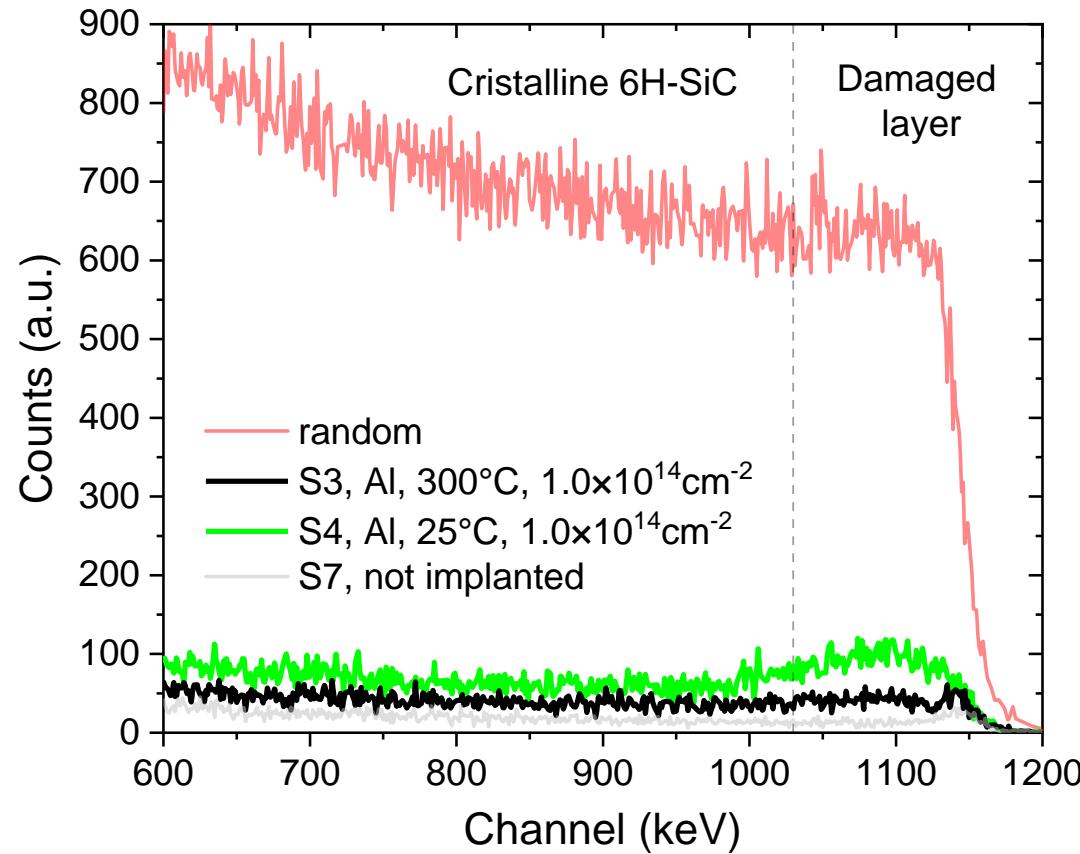
## Raman measurements



↗ sample damage at the surface with implantations of high doses at low temperatures  
 Contrary to simulations, temperature affects the lattice damage but not the order of implantations

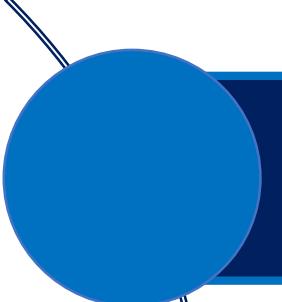
# CRYSTALLINITY OF THE SAMPLES

## RBS/C measurements

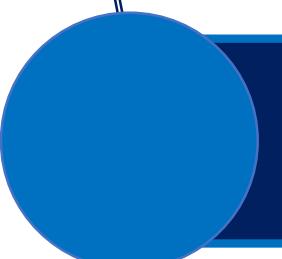


- Slight samples' surface damage
- Far from the amorphization threshold
- Less sensible to damage compared to Raman
- Point defects can still be observed

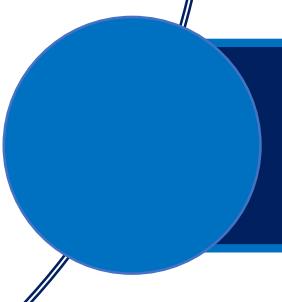

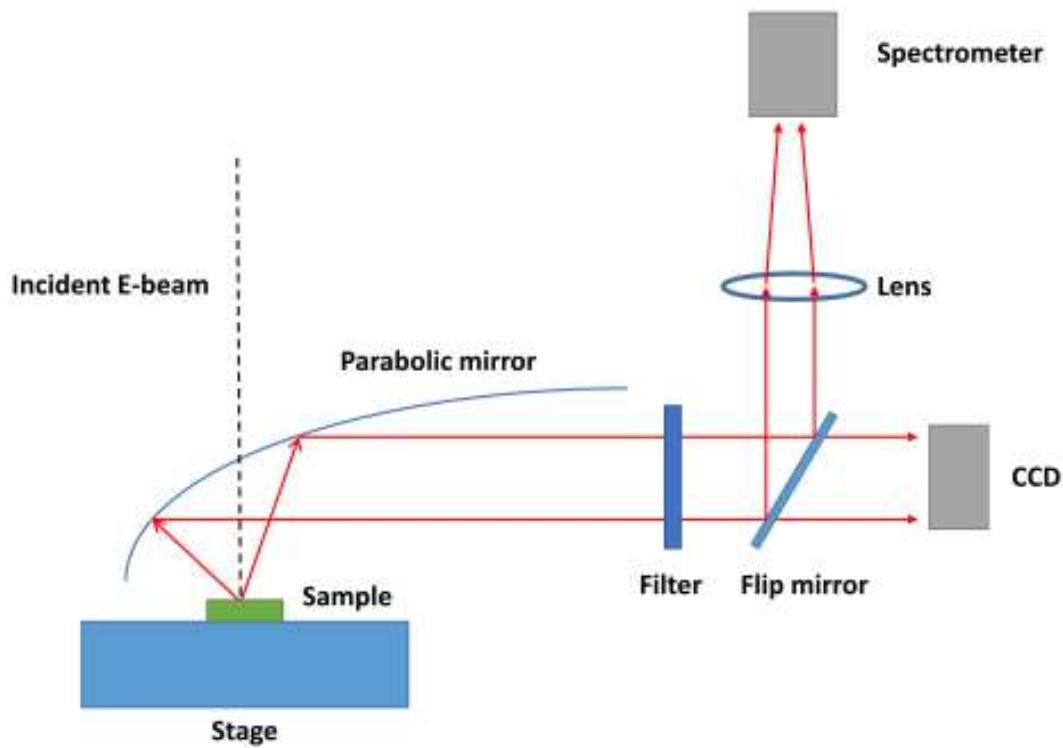

# DETECTION OF THE COLOR CENTERS

## Cathodoluminescence

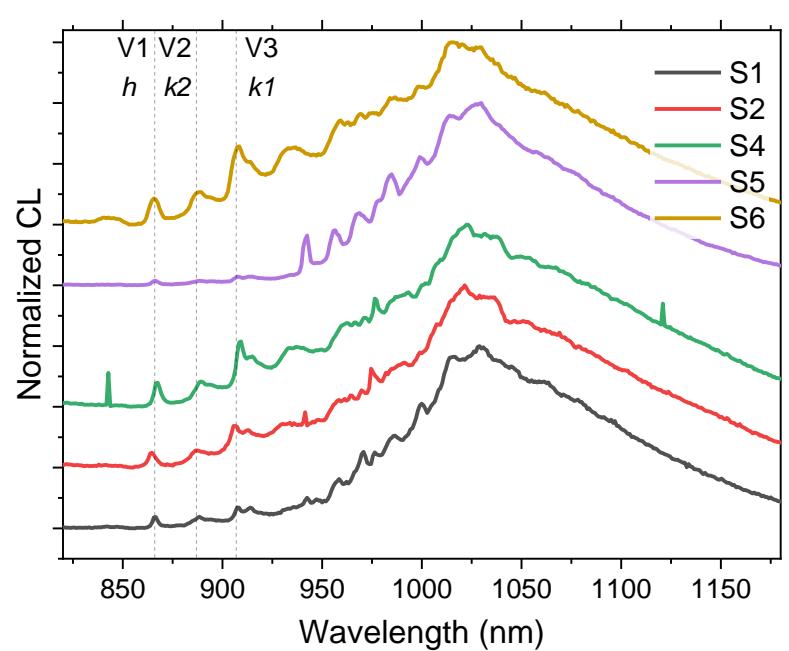
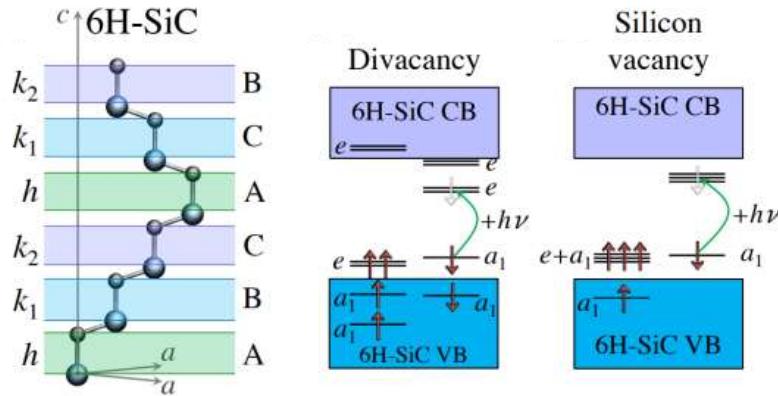
- Realized at **80K** (PL at RT)
- Measurements before and after annealing at **900°C for 15min**
- Good sensibility of the camera until **1000nm**

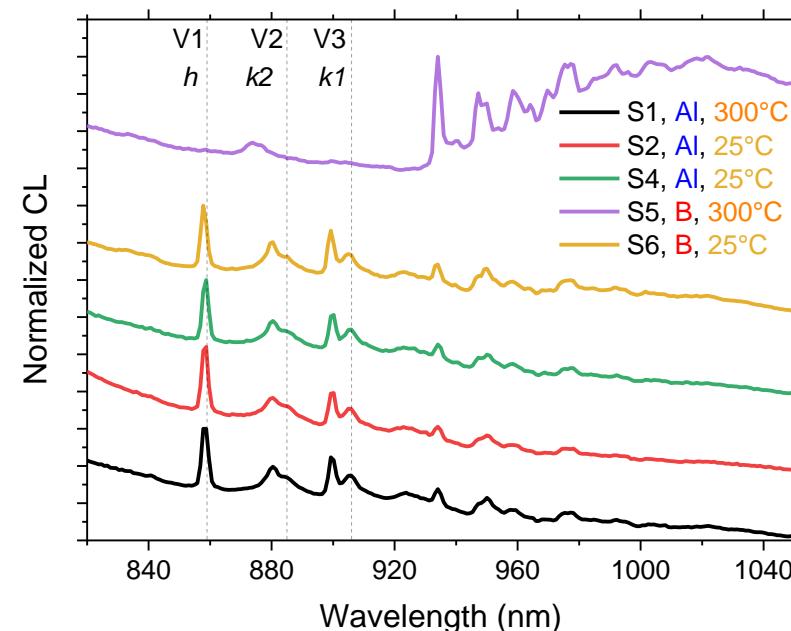


# DETECTION OF THE COLOR CENTERS

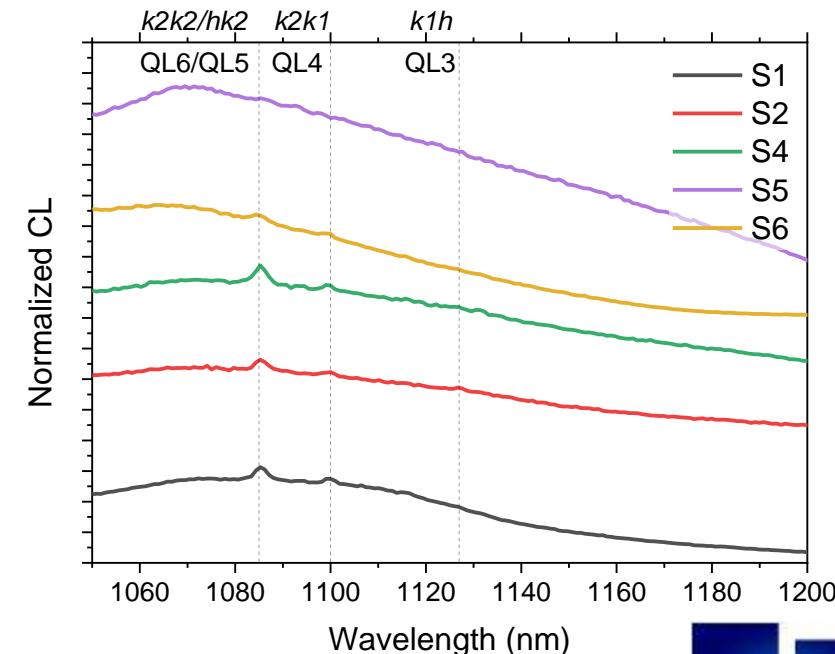


BEFORE ANNEALING

- **Silicon vacancy  $\text{V}_{\text{Si}}$ :** present before and after annealing at 900°C, ↓ of phonon side-bands after annealing
- $\text{V}_{\text{Si}}$  changes of **preferential configuration** after annealing → V3 to V1
- **Divacancy  $\text{V}_{\text{Si}}\text{V}_c$ :** appears after annealing at 900°C for 15min → we approach the **telecom wavelength**
- 9  $\text{V}_{\text{Si}}\text{V}_c$  configurations possible: ZPL not observed yet for three of them

# DETECTION OF THE COLOR CENTERS

## Silicon vacancy evolution

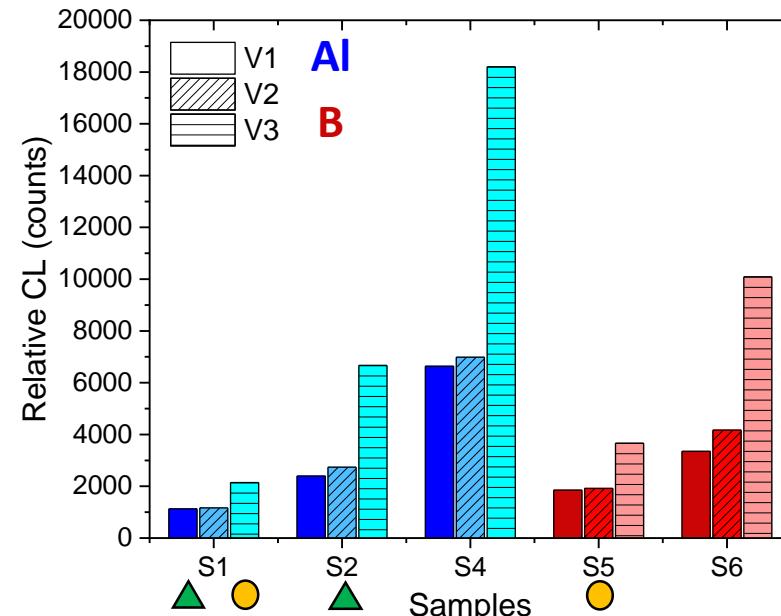
### Before annealing

- More defects for implantation of Al (higher dose) at low temperature with decreasing order of implantations
- V3 configuration favored (k<sub>1</sub> site)

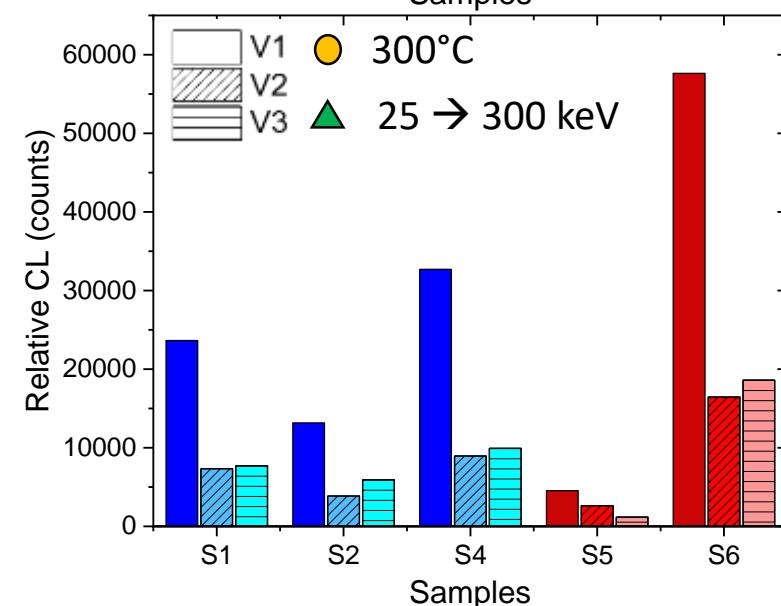
### After annealing

- **Silicon Vacancies**
- V1 configuration favored (h site)
- More defects for implantation of boron at low temperature → high diffusion of B in SiC through VS<sub>i</sub>
- **Divacancies V<sub>Si</sub>V<sub>C</sub>**
- Weak signal of QL3 to QL5/QL6 defects and no signal of QL1 and QL2
- No divacancies for S5 → not enough vacancies

# CONCLUSION AND PERSPECTIVES

## Conclusion

- Color centers are generated by ion implantations of Al and B followed by annealing at 900°C
- Implantations of higher doses at low temperatures result in a loss of crystallinity at the sample surface → the amorphization threshold is not reached
- $V_{Si}$  appears directly after ion implantation: transition from V3 to V1 configuration after annealing.
- Annealing leads to the high diffusion of boron in SiC → more  $V_{Si}$
- $V_{Si}V_C$  appears after annealing at 900°C for 15min → closer to the telecom wavelength than  $V_{Si}$  + longer spin coherence time

## Perspectives

- CCD camera with good NIR sensibility + PL setup in NIR
- Integration of the point defects in a photonic device
