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# Hodge conjecture for projective hypersurfaces

#### Abstract

We show that an Hodge class of a complex smooth projective hypersurface is an analytic logarithmic De Rham class. On the other hand we show that for a complex smooth projective variety an analytic logarithmic De Rham class of for type (d, d) is the class of codimension d algebraic cycle and that there is no an analytic logarithmic De Rham class of type (p,q),  $p \neq q$ . We deduce the Hodge conjecture for smooth projective hypersurfaces.

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## 1 Introduction

#### 1.1 Complex analytic De Rham logarithmic classes

In [2], we introduced, for X an algebraic variety over a field, the notion of logarithmic De Rham cohomology classes. For X a complex algebraic variety, we also introduce the notion of logarithmic analytic De Rham cohomology classes. In proposition 4 we give an analytic analogue of [2] theorem 2, that is if X is a smooth complex projective variety,

- a logarithmic analytic De Rham cohomology class of type (d, d) is the class of a codimension d algebraic cycle,
- there are no non trivial logarithmic analytic De Rham cohomology classes of type (p,q) for  $p \neq q$ , i.e.  $H^{2d}OL_{X^{an}}(H^{d-k}_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^{d+k}_{X^{an}, \log})) = 0$  for  $k \neq 0$ .

The proof of proposition 4 is motivic and similar to the proof of [2] theorem 2 : a logarithmic analytic class of bidegree (p, q) is acyclic for the etale topology on each open subset  $U \subset X$  such that there exists an etale map  $e: U \to A_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_U}$  (proposition 2), this allows us to proceed by a finite induction using the crucial fact that the purity isomorphism for De Rham cohomology preserve logarithmic analytic classes since the purity isomorphism is motivic (c.f. [3], see proposition 1). The GAGA comparison theorem for de Rham cohomology of X induce, by proposition 4 and [2] theorem 2, a GAGA comparison result for logarithmic De Rham classes.

#### 1.2 Hodge conjecture for smooth projective hypersurfaces

Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}}$  a smooth projective hypersurface. Denote  $j : U := \mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}} \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}}$  the open complementary subset. Using the fact the filtered De Rham complex of U

$$\iota_{\partial}: \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}[-p] \hookrightarrow (\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathbb{P}^{N}} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet-p}j_{*}O_{U})^{an}$$

is locally acyclic for the complex topology, more precisely is acyclic on open balls (see e.g.[6]), we show, considering an open cover  $\mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}} = \bigcup_{i=1}^n B_i$  by open balls  $\phi_i : B_i \simeq D(0,1)^N$  such that  $\phi_i(B_i \cap X) = 0 \times D(0,1)^N$ , that an Hodge class  $\alpha \in F^p H^N(U^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$  is logarithmic, that is

$$\alpha \in H^N OL_{U^{an}}(H^p_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log}))$$

(proposition 3). We get that, if N = 2p + 1 and  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(X^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$  is an Hodge class,

$$\lambda = \operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^N}(\alpha) + m[H] \in H^N OL_{X^{an}}(H^p_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^{N-p}_{X^{an}, \log})),$$

where  $Res_{X,\mathbb{P}^N} : H^N(U^{an},\mathbb{C}) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^{2p}(X^{an},\mathbb{C})$  is the residu map, using the fact that since the residu map is motivic (see definition 1), it preserve the logarithmic De Rham classes. Proposition 4 (ii) then implies that  $\lambda = [Z], Z \in \mathcal{Z}^p(X)$ , is the class of an algebraic cycle.

## 2 Preliminaries and Notations

#### 2.1 Notations

- Denote by Top the category of topological spaces and RTop the category of ringed spaces.
- Denote by Cat the category of small categories and RCat the category of ringed topos.
- For  $S \in \text{Cat}$  and  $X \in S$ , we denote  $S/X \in \text{Cat}$  the category whose objects are Y/X := (Y, f) with  $Y \in S$  and  $f: Y \to X$  is a morphism in S, and whose morphisms Hom((Y', f'), (Y, f)) consists of  $g: Y' \to Y$  in S such that  $f \circ g = f'$ .
- For  $(\mathcal{S}, O_S) \in \mathbb{R}$ Cat a ringed topos, we denote by
  - $PSh(\mathcal{S})$  the category of presheaves of  $O_S$  modules on  $\mathcal{S}$  and  $PSh_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$  the category of presheaves of  $O_S$  modules on  $\mathcal{S}$ , whose objects are  $PSh_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})^0 := \{(M, m), M \in PSh(\mathcal{S}), m : M \otimes O_S \to M\}$ , together with the forgetful functor  $o : PSh(\mathcal{S}) \to PSh_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$ ,
  - $-C(\mathcal{S}) = C(PSh(\mathcal{S}))$  and  $C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S}) = C(PSh_{O_S}(\mathcal{S}))$  the big abelian category of complexes of presheaves of  $O_S$  modules on  $\mathcal{S}$ ,
  - $-C_{O_{S}(2)fil}(\mathcal{S}) := C_{(2)fil}(PSh_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})) \subset C(PSh_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S}), F, W), \text{ the big abelian category of (bi)filtered complexes of presheaves of } O_{S} \text{ modules on } \mathcal{S} \text{ such that the filtration is biregular and } PSh_{O_{S}(2)fil}(\mathcal{S}) := (PSh_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S}), F, W).$
- Let  $(\mathcal{S}, O_S) \in \mathbb{R}$ Cat a ringed topos with topology  $\tau$ . For  $F \in C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$ , we denote by  $k : F \to E_{\tau}(F)$ the canonical flasque resolution in  $C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$  (see [1]). In particular for  $X \in \mathcal{S}$ ,  $H^*(X, E_{\tau}(F)) \xrightarrow{\sim} \mathbb{H}^*_{\tau}(X, F)$ .

• For  $f: \mathcal{S}' \to \mathcal{S}$  a morphism with  $\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{S}' \in \operatorname{RCat}$ , endowed with topology  $\tau$  and  $\tau'$  respectively, we denote for  $F \in C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$  and each  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$\begin{aligned} &-f^* := H^j \Gamma(\mathcal{S}, k \circ \mathrm{ad}(f^*, f_*)(F)) : \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}, F) \to \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}', f^*F), \\ &-f^* := H^j \Gamma(\mathcal{S}, k \circ \mathrm{ad}(f^{*mod}, f_*)(F)) : \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}, F) \to \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}', f^{*mod}F), \end{aligned}$$

the canonical maps.

• For  $X \in$  Top and  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset, denoting  $j : X \setminus Z \hookrightarrow X$  the open complementary, we will consider

$$\Gamma_Z^{\vee} \mathbb{Z}_X := \operatorname{Cone}(\operatorname{ad}(j_!, j^*)(\mathbb{Z}_X) : j_! j^* \mathbb{Z}_X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{Z}_X) \in C(X)$$

and denote for short  $\gamma_Z^{\vee} := \gamma_X^{\vee}(\mathbb{Z}_X) : \mathbb{Z}_X \to \Gamma_Z^{\vee}\mathbb{Z}_X$  the canonical map in C(X).

- Denote by Sch  $\subset$  RTop the subcategory of schemes (the morphisms are the morphisms of locally ringed spaces). We denote by PSch  $\subset$  Sch the full subcategory of proper schemes. For a field k, we consider Sch /k := Sch / Spec k the category of schemes over Spec k, that is whose object are  $X := (X, a_X)$  with  $X \in$  Sch and  $a_X : X \to$  Spec k a morphism and whose objects are morphism of schemes  $f : X' \to X$  such that  $f \circ a_{X'} = a_X$ . We then denote by
  - Var(k) = Sch<sup>ft</sup> /k ⊂ Sch /k the full subcategory consisting of algebraic varieties over k, i.e. schemes of finite type over k,
  - $PVar(k) \subset QPVar(k) \subset Var(k)$  the full subcategories consisting of quasi-projective varieties and projective varieties respectively,
  - $PSmVar(k) \subset SmVar(k) \subset Var(k)$ ,  $PSmVar(k) := PVar(k) \cap SmVar(k)$ , the full subcategories consisting of smooth varieties and smooth projective varieties respectively.
- Denote by AnSp(C) ⊂ RTop the subcategory of analytic spaces over C, and by AnSm(C) ⊂ AnSp(C) the full subcategory of smooth analytic spaces (i.e. complex analytic manifold).
- Let  $(X, O_X) \in \operatorname{RTop}$ . We consider its De Rham complex  $\Omega^{\bullet}_X := DR(X)(O_X)$ .
  - Let  $X \in$  Sch. Considering its De Rham complex  $\Omega^{\bullet}_X := DR(X)(O_X)$ , we have for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$  its De Rham cohomology  $H^j_{DR}(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X)$ .
  - Let  $X \in \operatorname{Var}(k)$ . Considering its De Rham complex  $\Omega_X^{\bullet} := \Omega_{X/k}^{\bullet} := DR(X/k)(O_X)$ , we have for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$  its De Rham cohomology  $H_{DR}^j(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega_X^{\bullet})$ . The differentials of  $\Omega_X^{\bullet} := \Omega_{X/k}^{\bullet}$ are by definition k-linear, thus  $H_{DR}^j(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega_X^{\bullet})$  has a structure of a k vector space.
  - Let  $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ . Considering its De Rham complex  $\Omega^{\bullet}_X := DR(X)(O_X)$ , we have for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$  its De Rham cohomology  $H^j_{DR}(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X)$ .
- For  $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ , we denote  $\alpha(X) : \mathbb{C}_X \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_X$  the embedding in C(X). For  $X \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$ ,  $\alpha(X) : \mathbb{C}_X \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_X$  is an equivalence usu local by Poincare lemma.
- We denote  $\mathbb{I}^n := [0,1]^n \in \text{Diff}(\mathbb{R})$  (with boundary). For  $X \in \text{Top}$  and R a ring, we consider its singular cochain complex

$$C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R) := (\mathbb{Z}\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Top}}(\mathbb{I}^*, X)^{\vee}) \otimes R$$

and for  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$  its singular cohomology  $H^l_{\text{sing}}(X, R) := H^n C^*_{\text{sing}}(X, R)$ . For  $f : X' \to X$  a continous map with  $X, X' \in \text{Top}$ , we have the canonical map of complexes

$$f^*: C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R) \to C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R), \sigma \mapsto f^*\sigma := (\gamma \mapsto \sigma(f \circ \gamma)).$$

In particular, we get by functoriality the complex

 $C^*_{X,R \operatorname{sing}} \in C_R(X), \ (U \subset X) \mapsto C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(U,R)$ 

We recall we have

- For  $X \in$  Top locally contractile, e.g.  $X \in$  CW, and R a ring, the inclusion in  $C_R(X)$  $c_X : R_X \to C^*_{X,R \text{ sing}}$  is by definition an equivalence top local and that we get by the small chain theorem, for all  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$ , an isomorphism  $H^l c_X : H^l(X, R_X) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^l_{\text{sing}}(X, R)$ .
- For  $X \in \text{Diff}(\mathbb{R})$ , the restriction map

$$r_X : \mathbb{Z} \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})}(\mathbb{I}^*, X)^{\vee} \to C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R), \ w \mapsto w : (\phi \mapsto w(\phi))$$

is a quasi-isomorphism by Whitney approximation theorem.

• We will consider the morphism of site given by the analytification functor

An : AnSp(
$$\mathbb{C}$$
)  $\to$  Var( $\mathbb{C}$ ),  $X \mapsto$  An( $X$ ) :=  $X^{an}$ ,  $(f : X' \to X) \mapsto$  An( $f$ ) :=  $f^{an}$ .

For  $X \in Var(\mathbb{C})$ , we denote by

$$\operatorname{an}_X := \operatorname{An}_{|X^{et}} := X^{an,et} \to X^{et}, \ \operatorname{an}_X(U \to X) := U^{an},$$

its restriction to the small etale site  $o_X(X^{et}) \subset \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$ , where  $o_X(U \to X) = U$ , in particular we have the following commutative diagram

$$\begin{array}{c} \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C}) \xrightarrow{\operatorname{An}} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C}) , \\ & \downarrow^{o_{X^{an}}} & \downarrow^{o_X} \\ & \chi^{an,et} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{An}_X} \chi^{et} \end{array}$$

where  $o_{X^{an}}(U \hookrightarrow X^{an}) = U$ . We get the morphism in RTop  $\operatorname{an}_X := \operatorname{an}_{X|O(X)} : X^{an} \to X$ ,  $o: O(X) \subset X^{et}$  being the embedding consisting of the Zariski open subsets of X.

#### 2.2 Complex integral periods

Let k a field of characteristic zero.

Let  $X \in \text{SmVar}(k)$  a smooth variety. Let  $X = \bigcup_{i=1}^{s} X_i$  an open affine cover. We have for  $\sigma : k \to \mathbb{C}$ an embedding, the evaluation period embedding map which is the morphism of bi-complexes

$$ev(X)^{\bullet}_{\bullet}: \Gamma(X_{\bullet}, \Omega^{\bullet}_{X_{\bullet}}) \to \mathbb{Z} \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}}(\mathbb{I}^{\bullet}, X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}, \bullet})^{\vee} \otimes \mathbb{C},$$
$$w^{l}_{I} \in \Gamma(X_{I}, \Omega^{l}_{X_{I}}) \mapsto (ev(X)^{l}_{I}(w^{l}_{I}): \phi^{l}_{I} \in \mathbb{Z} \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}}(\mathbb{I}^{l}, X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}, I})^{\vee} \otimes \mathbb{C} \mapsto ev^{l}_{I}(w^{l}_{I})(\phi^{l}_{I}) := \int_{\mathbb{I}^{l}} \phi^{l*}_{I} w^{l}_{I})$$

given by integration. By taking all the affine open cover  $(j_i : X_i \hookrightarrow X)$  of X, we get for  $\sigma : k \hookrightarrow \mathbb{C}$ , the evaluation period embedding map

$$ev(X) := \varinjlim_{(j_i:X_i \hookrightarrow X)} ev(X)_{\bullet}^{\bullet} : \varinjlim_{(j_i:X_i \hookrightarrow X)} \Gamma(X_{\bullet}, \Omega_{X_{\bullet}}^{\bullet}) \to \varinjlim_{(j_i:X_i \to X)} \mathbb{Z} \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})}(\mathbb{I}^{\bullet}, X_{\mathbb{C}, \bullet}^{an})^{\vee} \otimes \mathbb{C}$$

It induces in cohomology, for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ , the evaluation period map

$$H^{j}ev(X) = H^{j}ev(X)^{\bullet} : H^{j}_{DR}(X) = H^{j}\Gamma(X_{\bullet}, \Omega^{\bullet}_{X_{\bullet}}) \to H^{j}_{\operatorname{sing}}(X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}, \mathbb{C}) = H^{j}(\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})}(\mathbb{I}^{\bullet}, X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}, \bullet})^{\vee} \otimes \mathbb{C}).$$

which does NOT depend on the choice of the affine open cover by acyclicity of quasi-coherent sheaves on affine noetherian schemes for the left hand side and from Mayer-Vietoris quasi-isomorphism for singular cohomology of topological spaces and Whitney approximation theorem for differential manifolds for the right hand side.

Let  $X \in \text{SmVar}(k)$ . Then,

$$H^*ev(X_{\mathbb{C}}) = H^*R\Gamma(X_{\mathbb{C}}^{an}, \alpha(X))^{-1} \circ \Gamma(X_{\mathbb{C}}^{an}, E_{zar}(\Omega(\mathrm{an}_X))) : H^*_{DR}(X_{\mathbb{C}}) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^*_{\mathrm{sing}}(X_{\mathbb{C}}^{an}, \mathbb{C})$$

is the canonical isomorphism induced by the analytical functor and the quasi-isomorphism  $\alpha(X)$ :  $\mathbb{C}_{X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}} \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_{X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}}$ , which gives the periods elements  $H^*ev(X)(H^*_{DR}(X)) \subset H^*_{sing}(X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}},\mathbb{C})$ .

#### 2.3 Algebraic cycles and motives

For  $X \in$  Sch noetherian irreducible and  $d \in \mathbb{N}$ , we denote by  $\mathcal{Z}^d(X)$  the group of algebraic cycles of codimension d, which is the free abelian group generated by irreducible closed subsets of codimension d.

For  $X, X' \in \text{Sch noetherian}$ , with X' irreducible, we denote  $\mathcal{Z}^{fs/X'}(X' \times X) \subset \mathcal{Z}_{d_{X'}}(X' \times X)$  which consist of algebraic cycles  $\alpha = \sum_i n_i \alpha_i \in \mathcal{Z}_{d_{X'}}(X' \times X)$  such that, denoting  $\text{supp}(\alpha) = \bigcup_i \alpha_i \subset X' \times X$ its support and  $p' : X' \times X \to X'$  the projection,  $p'_{|\operatorname{supp}(\alpha)} : \operatorname{supp}(\alpha) \to X'$  is finite surjective.

Let k a field. We denote by  $\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$  the category such that the objects are  $\{X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k)\}$  and such that  $\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{SmVar}(k)}(X', X) := \mathcal{Z}^{fs/X'}(X' \times X)$ . See [3] for the composition law. We denote by  $\operatorname{Tr}$ :  $\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{SmVar}(k) \to \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$  the morphism of site given by the embedding  $\operatorname{Tr} : \operatorname{SmVar}(k) \hookrightarrow \operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$ . Let  $F \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{SmVar}(k))$ . We say that F admits transfers if  $F = \operatorname{Tr}_* F$  with  $F \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{SmVar}(k))$ . We recall that  $\operatorname{DA}(k) := \operatorname{Ho}_{\mathbb{A}^1, et}(C(\operatorname{SmVar}(k)))$  is then the derived category of mixed motives.

We have (see e.g. [1]) the Hodge realization functor

$$\mathcal{F}^{Hdg}: \mathrm{DA}(\mathbb{C}) \to D(MHS), \ M \mapsto \mathcal{F}^{Hdg}(M) := \iota^{-1}(\mathcal{F}^{FDR}(M), \mathrm{Bti}^* M, \alpha(M))$$

For  $X \in Var(k)$  and  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset, denoting  $j : X \setminus Z \hookrightarrow X$  the open complementary, we will consider

$$\Gamma_Z^{\vee} \mathbb{Z}_X := \operatorname{Cone}(\operatorname{ad}(j_{\sharp}, j^*)(\mathbb{Z}_X) : \mathbb{Z}_X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{Z}_X) \in C(\operatorname{Var}(k)^{sm}/X)$$

and denote for short  $\gamma_Z^{\vee} := \gamma_Z^{\vee}(\mathbb{Z}_X) : \mathbb{Z}_X \to \Gamma_Z^{\vee}\mathbb{Z}_X$  the canonical map in  $C(\operatorname{Var}(k)^{sm}/X)$ . Denote  $a_X : X \to \operatorname{Spec} k$  the structural map. For  $X \in \operatorname{Var}(k)$  and  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset, we have the motive of X with support in Z defined as

$$M_Z(X) := a_{X!} \Gamma_Z^{\vee} a_X^! \mathbb{Z} \in \mathrm{DA}(k).$$

If  $X \in \text{SmVar}(k)$ , we will also consider

$$a_{X\sharp}\Gamma_Z^{\vee}\mathbb{Z}_X := \operatorname{Cone}(a_{X\sharp} \circ \operatorname{ad}(j_{\sharp}, j^*)(\mathbb{Z}_X) : \mathbb{Z}(U) \hookrightarrow \mathbb{Z}(X)) =: \mathbb{Z}(X, X \setminus Z) \in C(\operatorname{SmVar}(k)).$$

Then for  $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$  and  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset

$$M_Z(X) := a_{X!} \Gamma_Z^{\vee} a_X^! \mathbb{Z} = a_{X\sharp} \Gamma_Z^{\vee} \mathbb{Z}_X =: \mathbb{Z}(X, X \setminus Z) \in \mathrm{DA}(k).$$

• Let  $(X, Z) \in \operatorname{Sch}^2$  with  $X \in \operatorname{Sch}$  a noetherian scheme and  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset. We have the deformation  $(D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z) \to \mathbb{A}^1$ ,  $(D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z) \in \operatorname{Sch}^2$  of (X, Z) by the normal cone  $C_{Z/X} \to Z$ , i.e. such that

$$(D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z)_s = (X, Z), \ s \in \mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0, \ (D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z)_0 = (C_{Z/X}, Z).$$

We denote by  $i_1 : (X, Z) \hookrightarrow (D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z)$  and  $i_0 : (C_{Z/X}, Z) \hookrightarrow (D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z)$  the closed embeddings in Sch<sup>2</sup>.

• Let k a field of characteristic zero. Let  $X \in \text{SmVar}(k)$ . For  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset of pure codimension c, consider a desingularisation  $\epsilon : \tilde{Z} \to Z$  of Z and denote  $n : \tilde{Z} \xrightarrow{\epsilon} Z \subset X$ . We have then the morphism in DA(k)

$$G_{Z,X}: M(X) \xrightarrow{D(\mathbb{Z}(n))} M(\tilde{Z})(c)[2c] \xrightarrow{\mathbb{Z}(\epsilon)} M(Z)(c)[2c]$$

where  $D : \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{DA}(k)}(M_c(\tilde{Z}), M_c(X)) \xrightarrow{\sim} \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{DA}(k)}(M(X), M(\tilde{Z})(c)[2c])$  is the duality isomorphism from the six functors formalism (moving lemma of Suzlin and Voevodsky) and  $\mathbb{Z}(n) := \operatorname{ad}(n_!, n^!)(a_X^! \mathbb{Z})$ , noting that  $n_! = n_*$  since n is proper and that  $a_X^! = a_X^*[d_X]$  and  $a_{\tilde{Z}}^! = a_{\tilde{Z}}^*[d_Z]$  since X, resp.  $\tilde{Z}$ , are smooth (considering the connected components, we may assume X and  $\tilde{Z}$  of pure dimension).

We recall the following facts (see [3] and [1]):

**Proposition 1.** Let k be a field a characteristic zero. Let  $X \in \text{SmVar}(k)$  and  $i : Z \subset X$  a smooth subvariety of pure codimension d. Then  $C_{Z/X} = N_{Z/X} \to Z$  is a vector bundle of rank d. The closed embeddings  $i_1 : (X, Z) \hookrightarrow (D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z)$  and  $i_0 : (C_{Z/X}, Z) \hookrightarrow (D_Z X, \mathbb{A}^1_Z)$  in  $\text{SmVar}^2(k)$  induces isomorphisms of motives  $\mathbb{Z}(i_1) : M_Z(X) \xrightarrow{\sim} M_{\mathbb{A}^1_Z}(D_Z X)$  and  $\mathbb{Z}(i_0) : M_Z(N_{Z/X}) \xrightarrow{\sim} M_{\mathbb{A}^1_Z}(D_Z X)$  in DA(k). We get the excision isomorphism in DA(k)

$$P_{Z,X} := \mathbb{Z}(i_0)^{-1} \circ \mathbb{Z}(i_1) : M_Z(X) \xrightarrow{\sim} M_Z(N_{Z/X}).$$

 $We \ have$ 

$$Th(N_{Z/X}) \circ P_{Z,X} \circ \gamma_Z^{\vee}(\mathbb{Z}_X) = G_{Z,X} := D(\mathbb{Z}(i)) : M(X) \to M(Z)(d)[2d].$$

*Proof.* See [3].

**Definition 1.** Let k be a field a characteristic zero. Let  $X \in \text{SmVar}(k)$  and  $i : Z \subset X$  a smooth subvariety of pure codimension d. We consider using proposition 1 the canonical map in DA(k)

$$\operatorname{Res}_{Z,X}: M(Z)(d)[-2d] \xrightarrow{P_{Z,X}^{-1} \circ Th(N_{Z/X})^{-1}} M_Z(X) \xrightarrow{c(\mathbb{Z}(X \setminus Z))} M(X \setminus Z)[1]$$

where, for  $m : A \to B$ ,  $A, B \in C(\mathcal{A})$ ,  $\mathcal{A}$  an additive category,  $c(A) : \operatorname{Cone}(m : A \to B) \to A[1]$  is the canonical map.

- Recall that we say that  $F \in PSh(SmVar(k))$  is  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant if for all  $X \in SmVar(k)$ ,  $p^* := F(p) : F(X) \to F(X \times \mathbb{A}^1)$  is an isomorphism, where  $p : X \times \mathbb{A}^1 \to X$  is the projection.
- Similarly, we say that  $F \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  is  $\mathbb{D}^1$  invariant if for all  $X \in AnSm(\mathbb{C})$ ,  $p^* := F(p) : F(X) \to F(X \times \mathbb{D}^1)$  is an isomorphism, where  $p : X \times \mathbb{D}^1 \to X$  is the projection.

We will use the following theorem of Voevodsky :

**Theorem 1.** (Voevodsky)Let k be a perfect field (e.g. k a field of characteristic zero). Let  $F \in PSh(SmVar(k), \mathbb{Q})$ . If F is  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant and admits transfers, then for all  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,  $H^j E^{\bullet}_{et}(F) \in PSh(SmVar(k))$  are  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant. That is, if F is  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant and admits transfers then F is  $\mathbb{A}^1$  local.

*Proof.* By [5],  $H^j E^{\bullet}_{Nis}(F) \in PSh(SmVar(k))$  are  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant. On the other hand since F takes values in  $\mathbb{Q}$ -vector spaces,  $H^j E^{\bullet}_{Nis}(F) = H^j E^{\bullet}_{et}(F)$ .

#### 2.4 The logarithmic De Rham complexes

We recall from [2] the following notion :

• For k a field and  $X \in Var(k)$ , we consider the embedding in C(X)

$$OL_X : \Omega^{\bullet}_{X, \log} \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_X := \Omega^{\bullet}_{X/k},$$

such that, for  $X^o \subset X$  an open subset and  $w \in \Omega^p_X(X^o)$ ,  $w \in \Omega^p_{X,\log}(X^o)$  if and only if there exists  $(n_i)_{1 \leq i \leq s} \in \mathbb{Z}$  and  $(f_{i,\alpha_k})_{1 \leq i \leq s, 1 \leq k \leq p} \in \Gamma(X^o, O_X)^*$  such that

$$w = \sum_{1 \le i \le s} n_i df_{i,\alpha_1} / f_{i,\alpha_1} \wedge \dots \wedge df_{i,\alpha_p} / f_{i,\alpha_p} \in \Omega^p_X(X^o),$$

and for  $p = 0, \Omega^0_{X, \log} := \mathbb{Z}$ . Let k a field. We get an embedding in  $C(\operatorname{Var}(k))$ 

$$OL: \Omega^{\bullet}_{/k,\log} \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_{/k}, \text{ given by, for } X \in \operatorname{Var}(k),$$
$$OL(X) := OL_X: \Omega^{\bullet}_{/k,\log}(X) := \Gamma(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_{X,\log}) \hookrightarrow \Gamma(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X) =: \Omega^{\bullet}_{/k}(X)$$

and its restriction to  $\operatorname{SmVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{Var}(k)$ .

• For  $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ , we consider the embedding in C(X)

$$OL_X : \Omega^{\bullet}_{X, \log} \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_X,$$

such that, for  $X^o \subset X$  an open subset and  $w \in \Omega^p_X(X^o)$ ,  $w \in \Omega^p_{X,\log}(X^o)$  if and only if there exists  $(n_i)_{1 \leq i \leq s} \in \mathbb{Z}$  and  $(f_{i,\alpha_k})_{1 \leq i \leq s, 1 \leq k \leq p} \in \Gamma(X^o, O_X)^*$  such that

$$w = \sum_{1 \le i \le s} n_i df_{i,\alpha_1} / f_{i,\alpha_1} \wedge \dots \wedge df_{i,\alpha_p} / f_{i,\alpha_p} \in \Omega^p_X(X^o),$$

and for p = 0,  $\Omega^0_{X, \log} := \mathbb{Z}$ . We get an embedding in  $C(\operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C}))$ 

$$OL^{an}: \Omega_{\log}^{\bullet,an} \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet,an}, \text{ given by, for } X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C}),$$
$$OL^{an}(X) := OL_X: \Omega_{\log}^{\bullet}(X) := \Gamma(X, \Omega_{X,\log}^{\bullet,an}) \hookrightarrow \Gamma(X, \Omega_X^{\bullet,an}) =: \Omega^{\bullet,an}(X)$$

and its restriction to  $\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}) \subset \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ .

We have the following result :

- **Proposition 2.** (i00) Let  $D \in AnSm(\mathbb{C})$  be an open ball. Then, for each  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0, H_{et}^q(D, \Omega_{D,\log}^p) = 0$ .
- (i0) Let  $U \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$  such that there exists an etale map  $e: U \to \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$  such that  $\mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus e(U) \subset \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$  is a divisor. Then, for each  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0, p \neq 0, H^q_{et}(U, \Omega^p_{U^{an}, \log}) = 0.$
- (i) Let  $U \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$  such that there exists an etale map  $e : U \to \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$  such that  $\mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus e(U) \subset \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$  is a divisor. Then, for each  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0, p \neq 0, H^q_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^p_{U^{an}, \log}) = 0.$
- (ii) Let  $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$ . We still denote  $\operatorname{an}_X : X^{an} \xrightarrow{e,\sim} X^{an,et} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{an}_X} X^{et}$  the composite. Consider the map in  $C(X^{et})$

$$T(et, usu) = E_{et}(\operatorname{an}_{X*} k) : E_{et}(\operatorname{an}_{X*} \Omega^p_{X^{an}, \log}) \to E_{et}(\operatorname{an}_{X*} E_{usu}(\Omega^p_{X^{an}, \log})).$$

Then, for each  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$H^{p+q}T(et, usu)(X): H^q_{et}(X, \operatorname{an}_{X*}\Omega^p_{X^{an}, \log}) \to H^q_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^p_{X^{an}, \log})$$

is an isomorphism.

(ii)' Let  $X \in \text{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$ . Let Z a closed subset. Then, for each  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$H^{p+q}_{Z}T(et,usu)(X):H^{q}_{et,Z}(X,\operatorname{an}_{X*}\Omega^{p}_{X^{an},\log})\to H^{q}_{usu,Z}(X^{an},\Omega^{p}_{X^{an},\log})$$

is an isomorphism.

*Proof.* (i00): Let  $B = D(0,1)^N \in AnSm(\mathbb{C})$  be an open ball. Let  $\alpha \in H^q(B, \Omega^p_{B, \log}), q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ . Consider a sequence of sub-balls

$$l_n: B_n := D(0, r_n)^N \hookrightarrow B := D(0, 1)^N, n \in \mathbb{N}, \text{ with } r_n \to 0 \text{ when } n \to \infty.$$

Since  $(B_n := D(0, r_n))_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$  form a basis of neighborhood of  $0 \in B$  and since  $\Omega_{B,\log}^p$  is a single presheaf, there exists  $n := n_\alpha \in \mathbb{N}$  (depending on  $\alpha$ ) such that

$$l_n^* \alpha = 0 \in H^q(B_n, \Omega_{B,\log}^p).$$

But it follows immediately from the definition of the the presheaf  $\Omega_{B,\log}^p$  considering the isomorphism

$$\phi_n: B_n \xrightarrow{\sim} B, \ \phi_n(z) := r_n^{-1} z$$

so that  $(\phi_n)^{-1} \circ l_n = r_n I$ , that

$$l_n^* \alpha = l_n^* \phi_n^{-1*} \phi_n^* \alpha = r_n \phi_n^* \alpha \in H^q(B_n, \Omega^p_{B, \log}).$$

Hence  $\phi_n^* \alpha = 0$ . Since  $\phi_n$  is an isomorphism, we get  $\alpha = 0$ .

(i): We prove (i) by induction on the dimension of U. Let  $U \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$  such that there exists an etale map  $e: U \to \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$ . Denote  $D := \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus e(U)$  the complementary divisor. Since  $H^q_{usu}(\mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}, \Omega^{p,an}_{\log}) = 0$  for all  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$H^{q}E_{usu}\Omega^{p,an}_{\log}(c(\mathbb{Z}(e(U)))) = \partial: H^{q}_{usu}(e(U), \Omega^{p,an}_{\log}) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^{q+1}_{usu,D}(\mathbb{A}^{d_{U}}_{\mathbb{C}}, \Omega^{p,an}_{\log})$$

is an isomorphism for all  $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}$ . Let  $D = \bigcup_i D_i$  be the irreducible components of D. Let  $D_{i0} \subset D_i$  be divisors such that there exist etale maps  $e_i: D_i \setminus D_{0i} \to \mathbb{A}^{d_U-1}_{\mathbb{C}}$  such that  $\mathbb{A}^{d_U-1}_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus e_i(D_i \setminus D_{0i}) \subset \mathbb{A}^{d_U-1}_{\mathbb{C}}$  is a divisor. By (i00),

$$H^q E_{usu}(\Omega^{p,an}_{log}) \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$$

is  $\mathbb{D}^1$  invariant for each  $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ . By the local to global spectral sequence

$$H^{q'}E_{usu}(H^qE_{usu}(\Omega^{p,an}_{\log})) \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$$

are also  $\mathbb{D}^1$  invariant for all  $q' \in \mathbb{Z}$  (one can also use the fact that if  $F \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  is  $\mathbb{D}^1$  invariant and admit transfers then  $H^{q'}E_{usu}(F) \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  is also  $\mathbb{D}^1$  invariant all  $q' \in \mathbb{Z}$ ). We thus get by proposition 1 the isomorphism for each  $q, q' \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ .

$$H^{q'} E_{usu} (H^q E_{usu} (\Omega_{\log}^{p,an} (P_{D_i \setminus D_{i0}, \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_U} \setminus Z_{i0}}))) :$$
  
$$H^{q+q'}_{usu, D_i \setminus D_{i0}} (\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_U}, \Omega_{\log}^{p,an}) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^{q+q'-1}_{usu} (D_i \setminus D_{i0}, \Omega_{\log}^{p-1,an}).$$

On the other hand, by induction hypothesis  $H_{usu}^{q''}(D_i \setminus D_{i0}, \Omega_{\log}^{p-1,an}) = 0$  for all  $q'' \in \mathbb{Z}, q'' \neq 0$ . Hence,

$$H^{q''}_{usu,D_i \setminus D_{i0}}(\mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}, \Omega^{p,an}_{\log}) = 0$$

for all  $q'' \in \mathbb{Z}, q'' \neq 1$ . By a finite decreasing induction  $D_{ir} \subset \cdots \subset D_{i0} \subset Z, r = d_U - 1$ , with  $e_r: D_{ir} \to \mathbb{A}^{d_{D_{ir}}}$  etale such that  $\mathbb{A}^{d_{D_{ir}}} \setminus e_r(D_{ir}) \subset \mathbb{A}^{d_{D_{ir}}}$  is a divisor, we get

$$H^{q^{\prime\prime}}_{usu}(e(U),\Omega^{p,an}_{\log})=H^{q^{\prime\prime}+1}_{usu,D}(\mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}},\Omega^{p,an}_{\log})=0$$

for each  $q'' \in \mathbb{Z}, q'' \neq 0$ . Let  $Z' \subset U$  be a (Zariski) closed subset such that  $e' := e_{|U \setminus Z'} : (U \setminus Z') \to C$  $e(U \setminus Z')$  is finite etale. We thus have, since  $M(U \setminus Z') \simeq M(e(U \setminus Z'))$ , for each  $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ 

$$H^q_{usu}(U\backslash Z', \Omega^{p,an}_{\log}) = H^q_{usu}(e(U\backslash Z'), \Omega^{p,an}_{\log}) = 0.$$

Denote  $j: U \setminus Z' \hookrightarrow U$  the open embedding. By the long exact sequence

$$\cdots \xrightarrow{j^* := \Omega_{\log}^{p,an}(j)} H^q_{usu}(U \setminus Z', \Omega_{\log}^{p,an}) \xrightarrow{\partial := \Omega_{\log}^{p,an}(c(\mathbb{Z}(U \setminus Z')))} H^{q+1}_{usu,Z'}(U, \Omega_{\log}^{p,an}) \xrightarrow{\Omega_{\log}^{p,an}(\gamma_{Z'}^{\vee})} H^{q+1}_{usu}(U, \Omega_{\log}^{p,an}) \xrightarrow{j^*} \cdots$$

we get by a finite induction on the dimension of Z', we get  $H^q_{usu}(U, \Omega^{p,an}_{\log}) = 0$  for all  $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ . (i0): By (i), we have  $a_{et}R^q \operatorname{an}_{U^*} \Omega^p_{U^{an}, \log} = 0, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ . Hence for  $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ ,

$$H^q_{et}(U,\operatorname{an}_{U^*}\Omega^p_{U^{an},\log}) = \mathbb{H}^q_{et}(U,R\operatorname{an}_{U^*}\Omega^p_{U^{an},\log}) = H^q_{usu}(U^{an},\Omega^p_{U^{an},\log}) = 0,$$

where the last equality follows again by (i).

(ii):By (i),  $a_{et}R^q \operatorname{an}_{X*} \Omega^p_{X^{an}, \log} = 0, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0.$ (ii):Follows from (ii) applied to X and  $X \setminus Z$  by the distinguish triangle in  $Ho(C(\operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})))$ 

$$\mathbb{Z}(X \setminus Z) \xrightarrow{\mathbb{Z}(j)} \mathbb{Z}(X) \to \mathbb{Z}(X, X \setminus Z) \to \mathbb{Z}(X \setminus Z)[1],$$

where  $j: X \setminus Z \hookrightarrow X$  is the open embedding.

# 3 Hypersurface De Rham cohomology and its complex periods

We denote  $\mathbb{P}^N := \mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}} := \operatorname{Proj}(\mathbb{C}[z_0, \cdots, z_N])$ . Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  be a smooth hypersurface. If N-1=2p is even, we consider the decompositions

$$H_{DR}^{N-1}(X) = \mathbb{C}[\Lambda \cap X] \oplus H_{DR,v}^{N-1}(X) , \ H_{\operatorname{sing}}^{N-1}(X^{an}, \mathbb{Q}) = \mathbb{C}[\Lambda \cap X] \oplus H_{\operatorname{sing},v}^{N-1}(X^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$$

of vector spaces, where  $\Lambda \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  is a linear subspace of codimension p. If N-1=2p+1 is even, we set

$$H^{N-1}_{DR,v}(X) := H^{N-1}_{DR}(X) \ , \ H^{N-1}_{\operatorname{sing},v}(X^{an},\mathbb{Q}) := H^{N-1}_{\operatorname{sing}}(X^{an},\mathbb{Q}).$$

Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  be a smooth hypersurface. Denote  $j : U := \mathbb{P}^N \setminus X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^N$  the open embedding. We consider the algebraic Hodge module

$$j_{*Hdg}(O_U, F_b) := ((j_*O_U, F), j_*\mathbb{Q}_{U^{an}}, j_*\alpha(U)) \in HM(\mathbb{P}^N),$$

where  $F^k j_* O_U = \mathbb{C}[x_1, \cdots x_N][\frac{1}{f^k}]$ . Recall for each  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$F^{p}H_{DR}^{N}(U) := H^{N}\iota^{\geq p}(\mathbb{H}^{N}(\mathbb{P}^{N}, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet \geq p}(\log X))) = H^{N}\iota^{\geq p}H^{N}(\mathbb{P}^{N}, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet - p}j_{*}O_{U})$$

and

$$F^{p}H^{N-1}(X) := H^{N-1}\iota^{\geq p}(\mathbb{H}^{N-1}(X, \Omega_{X}^{\bullet \geq p})).$$

where

$$\iota^{\geq p}: \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^{\bullet \geq p}(\log X) \hookrightarrow \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^{\bullet}(\log X) , \ \iota^{\geq p}: \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^N}} F^{\bullet - p} j_* O_U \hookrightarrow \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^N}} j_* O_U = j_* \Omega_U^{\bullet}$$

and  $\iota^{\geq p}: \Omega_X^{\bullet \geq p} \hookrightarrow \Omega_X^{\bullet}$  are the canonical embeddings. Then the map  $Res_{X,\mathbb{P}^N}$  of definition 1 induces for each  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$ , canonical isomorphisms

$$H^{N}\Omega(\operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^{N}}):F^{p+1}H^{N}_{DR}(U)\xrightarrow{\sim} F^{p}H^{N-1}_{DR}(X)_{v},\ H^{N}\operatorname{Bti}(\operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^{N}}):H^{N}_{\operatorname{sing}}(U,\mathbb{Q})\xrightarrow{\sim} H^{N-1}_{\operatorname{sing}}(X,\mathbb{Q})_{v}.$$

**Lemma 1.** Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  be a smooth hypersurface. Denote  $j : U := \mathbb{P}^N \setminus X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^N$  the open embedding. Let  $B \subset \mathbb{P}^N$ ,  $\phi : B \simeq D(0,1)^N$  be an open ball such that  $\phi(X \cap B) = \{0\} \times D(0,1)^{N-1}$ . Then,

(i) For  $q \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,  $q \neq 0$ ,  $\mathbb{H}^q_{usu}(B, (\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathbb{P}^N} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^N}} F^{\bullet - p} j_* O_U)^{an}) = 0$ .

(*ii*) For 
$$q \in \mathbb{Z}$$
,  $q \neq 0$ ,  $H^q_{usu}(B, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}) = 0$ .

*Proof.* (i): Since B is Stein, we have for  $r, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ ,

$$H^q_{usu}(B, (\Omega^r_{\mathbb{P}^N} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^N}} F^{r-p} j_* O_U)^{an}) = 0.$$

On the other hand the De Rham complex of  $(j_*O_{B\setminus X}, F)$  is acyclic (see e.g. [6] corollary 18.7) (ii): Since open balls form a basis of the topology of  $\mathbb{P}^{N,an}$ , we have

$$a_{usu}\iota: a_{usu}(j_*\Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an},\log} \oplus \partial\Omega^{N-p+1}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}) \xrightarrow{\sim} a_{usu}\Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}$$

where

$$\iota: j_*\Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log} \oplus \partial \Omega^{N-p+1}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}} \hookrightarrow \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}} (\log X)^{\partial=0}$$

is the canonical embedding. Now,

• Let  $B = D(0,1)^N \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$  be an open ball. Let  $\alpha \in H^q(B, \partial \Omega^{N-p+1}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}), q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$ . Consider a sequence of sub-balls

$$l_n: B_n := D(0, r_n)^N \hookrightarrow B := D(0, 1)^N, n \in \mathbb{N}, \text{ with } r_n \to 0 \text{ when } n \to \infty.$$

Since  $(B_n := D(0, r_n))_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$  form a basis of neighborhood of  $0 \in B$  and since  $\partial \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{N-p+1}$  is a single presheaf, there exists  $n := n_\alpha \in \mathbb{N}$  (depending on  $\alpha$ ) such that

$$l_n^* \alpha = 0 \in H^q(B_n, \partial \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{N-p+1}).$$

But it follows immediately from the definition of the the presheaf  $\partial \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{N-p+1}$  considering the isomorphism

$$\phi_n: B_n \xrightarrow{\sim} B, \ \phi_n(z) := r_n^{-1} z$$

so that  $(\phi_n)^{-1} \circ l_n = r_n I$ , that

$$l_n^* \alpha = l_n^* \phi_n^{-1*} \phi_n^* \alpha = r_n \phi_n^* \alpha \in H^q(B_n, \Omega_{B,\log}^p).$$

Hence  $\phi_n^* \alpha = 0$ . Since  $\phi_n$  is an isomorphism, we get  $\alpha = 0$ .

• we have for  $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0, H^q_{usu}(B, \Omega^{N-p}_{B^{an}, \log}) = 0$  by proposition 2 (i00). Hence

$$H^{q}E_{usu}\Omega^{an}_{\log}(c(\mathbb{Z}(B))) = \partial: H^{q}_{usu}(B \cap U, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log}) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^{q+1}_{usu, B \cap X}(B, \Omega^{N-p}_{B^{an}, \log})$$

is an isomorphism. By a finite decreasing induction on N, using purity for complex analytic motives, we get  $H^q_{usu}(B \cap U, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log}) = 0.$ 

We have by the local acyclicity of the De Rham complex of  $(j_*O_U, F)$  a canonical map :

**Definition 2.** Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  be a smooth hypersurface. Denote  $j : U := \mathbb{P}^N \setminus X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^N$  the open embedding. Let  $\mathbb{P}^{N,an} = \bigcup_{i=1}^n B_i$  an open cover, with  $\phi_i : \mathbb{B}_i \simeq D(0,1)^N$  open balls such that  $\phi_i(X \cap B_i) = \{0\} \times D(0,1)^{N-1}$ . Denote, for  $I \subset [1,\ldots,n], l_I : B_I \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^N$  the open embeddings, with  $B_I := \bigcap_{i \in I} B_i$ . Since, for each  $I \subset [1,\ldots,n]$  and  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$l_I^*\iota_\partial: l_I^*\Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}[-p] \hookrightarrow l_I^*(\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathbb{P}^N} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^N}} F^{\bullet-p}j_*O_U)^{an}$$

is an quasi-isomorphism (see e.g. [6] corollary 18.7), the spectral sequence of the filtration on the total complex of a bi-complex gives, for each  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$ , a canonical isomorphism, where the first and last map are isomorphism by lemma 1(i) and (ii) respectively,

$$\begin{split} B_{\partial}: F^{p}H_{DR}(U) &:= H^{N}\iota^{\geq p}\mathbb{H}^{N}_{zar}(\mathbb{P}^{N}, \Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathbb{P}^{N}} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet-p}j_{*}O_{U}) \\ & \xrightarrow{H^{N}((l^{*}_{i}=\Omega(l_{i}))_{1\leq i\leq n})} H^{N}\iota^{\geq p}H^{N}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}, (\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathbb{P}^{N}} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet-p}j_{*}O_{U})^{an}) \\ & \to H^{p}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}) \xrightarrow{H^{N}((l^{*}_{i}=\Omega(l_{i}))_{1\leq i\leq n})^{-1}} H^{p}_{usu}(\mathbb{P}^{N}, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}), \end{split}$$

given by, for  $w \in \Gamma(U, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^N)$ , inductively by a p step induction where p is the order of the pole of w at X,

- taking for each  $1 \leq i \leq n$ ,  $l_i^* w = \partial w_{1i}$  since  $\partial w = 0$  for dimensional reason and by exactness of  $l_i^* \iota_{\partial_i}$ ,
- we then have for each  $1 \leq i, j \leq n$ , considering  $w_{1ij} := l_{ij}^*(w_{1i} w_{1j}), w_{1ij} = \partial w_{2ij}$  since

$$\partial w_{1ij} = l_{ij}^* (\partial w_{1i} - \partial w_{1j}) = l_{ij}^* (l_i^* w - l_j^* w) = 0$$

and by exactness of  $l_{ij}^* \iota_{\partial}$ ,

• at the final p step,  $B(w) := w_{pI} \in H^N(B_{\bullet}, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0})$ , cardI = p.

Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  be a smooth hypersurface. Denote  $U := \mathbb{P}^N \setminus X$ . For  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$ , we consider

• the sequence of embeddings in  $C(U^{et})$ 

$$OL_U^l: \Omega_{U,\log}^l[-l] \xrightarrow{\widehat{OL_U^l}[-l]} \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^l(\log X)^{\partial=0}[-l] \xrightarrow{\iota_\partial} \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^N}} F^{\bullet-p} j_* O_U \xrightarrow{\iota^{\geq l}} \Omega_U^{\bullet}$$

• and the sequence of embeddings in  $C(U^{an})$ 

$$OL_{U^{an}}^{l}:\Omega_{U^{an},\log}^{l}[-l] \xrightarrow{OL_{U^{an}}^{l}[-l]} \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{l} (\log X)^{\partial=0}[-l] \xrightarrow{\iota_{\partial}} (\Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet-p} j_{*}O_{U})^{an} \xrightarrow{\iota^{\geq l}} \Omega_{U^{an}}^{\bullet},$$

where

$$\iota_{\partial}: \Omega^{l}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}[-l] \hookrightarrow (\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathbb{P}^{N}} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet-p} j_{*}O_{U})^{an}$$

is an equivalence usu local (see [6]).

The main result of this section is the following :

**Proposition 3.** Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N$  be a smooth projective hypersurface. Denote  $U := \mathbb{P}^N \setminus X$ . Let  $w \in F^{p+1}H_{DR}^N(U)$ . Then the following assertions are equivalent

 $(i) \ ev(U)(w) \in H^{N}_{sing}(U^{an}, 2i\pi\mathbb{Q}),$   $(ii) \ B_{\partial}(w) \in \widehat{OL^{p+1}_{U^{an}}}(H^{p+1}_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log})) \ (see \ definition \ 2),$   $(iii) \ w \in OL^{N-p}_{U^{an}}(H^{p+1}_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log})) = OL_{U^{an}}(H^{p+1}_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log})).$ 

*Proof.* (i) implies (ii): Let  $\mathbb{P}^{N,an} = \bigcup_{i=1}^{n} B_i$  an open cover, with  $\phi_i : \mathbb{B}_i \simeq D(0,1)^N$  open balls such that  $\phi_i(X \cap B_i) = \{0\} \times D(0,1)^{N-1}$ . Denote, for  $I \subset [1,\ldots,n], l_I : B_I \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^N$  the open embeddings, with  $B_I := \bigcap_{i \in I} B_i$ . Then

$$B_{\partial}(w) := (w_{p+1,I}) \in H^{p+1}(B_{\bullet}, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0}).$$

We have, for each  $I \subset [1, \ldots n]$ , a decomposition

$$w_{p+1,I} = \frac{a_I}{z_1} dz_1 \wedge w'_I + w''_I \in \Gamma(B_I, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}(\log X)^{\partial=0})$$

with  $w'_I \in \Gamma(B_I, \Omega^{N-p-1}_{\mathbb{P}^N})^{\partial=0}$  and  $w''_I \in \Gamma(B_I, \Omega^{N-p}_{\mathbb{P}^N})^{\partial=0}$ . Consider the evaluation map

$$ev(U)_{\bullet}^{\bullet}: \Gamma(B_{\bullet} \setminus X, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^N}^{\bullet}) \to C_{\mathrm{diff}}^{\bullet}(B_{\bullet} \setminus X^{an}, \mathbb{C}),$$

which is a morphism of bi-complexes. On the other hand, we have the following canonical map

$$BC_{\partial}: H^{p}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}\backslash X^{an}, C^{N-p,\partial}_{U^{an}, \text{diff}}) \xrightarrow{\Gamma(B_{\bullet}\backslash X^{an}, \iota_{\partial})} = H^{N}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}\backslash X^{an}, C^{\bullet\geq N-p}_{U^{an}, \text{diff}}) \xrightarrow{\Gamma(B_{\bullet}\backslash X^{an}, \iota^{\geq N-p})} = H^{N}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}\backslash X^{an}, C^{\bullet}_{U^{an}, \text{diff}}) \xrightarrow{(H^{N}(l^{*}_{i} = :C^{\bullet}_{U^{an}, \text{diff}}(l_{i}))_{1\leq i\leq n})^{-1}} H^{N}_{\text{sing}}(U^{an}, \mathbb{Q}) = H^{N}\Gamma(U^{an}, C^{\bullet}_{U^{an}, \text{diff}}),$$

where  $H^N(l_i^*)$  is an isomorphism by the acyclicity of  $C_{U^{an},\text{diff}}^{\bullet \geq N-p}(B_I \setminus X^{an})$  for each  $I \subset [1, \dots, n]$ , and

$$C^{ullet}_{U^{an},\mathrm{diff}} \hookrightarrow C^{ullet}_{U^{an},\mathrm{sing}}, \text{ for } V \subset U^{an}, \ C^{ullet}_{\mathrm{diff}}(V) \hookrightarrow C^{ullet}_{\mathrm{sing}}(V)$$

is the canonical quasi-isomorphism in  $C(U^{an})$ . We then have the following commutative diagram

$$\begin{split} H^{N}\iota^{\geq p}H^{N}\Gamma(\mathbb{P}^{N},\Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet}\otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}}F^{\bullet-p}j_{*}O_{U}) & \downarrow \\ H^{N}((l_{i}^{*}=\Omega(l_{i}))_{1\leq i\leq n}) & \longrightarrow \\ H^{N}\iota^{\geq p}H^{N}\Gamma(B_{\bullet},(\Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet}\otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}}F^{\bullet-p}j_{*}O_{U})^{an}) & \xrightarrow{B_{\partial}} & \to H^{p}\Gamma(B_{\bullet},\Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{N-p}(\log X)^{\partial=0}) \\ & \downarrow ev(U) & \downarrow ev(U)^{\bullet} \\ H^{N}_{sing}(U^{an},\mathbb{C}) &= H^{N}\Gamma(U^{an},C_{U^{an},diff}^{\bullet}\otimes\mathbb{C}) \xrightarrow{B_{C_{\partial}\otimes\mathbb{C}}} H^{p}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}\backslash X^{an},C_{diff}^{N-p,\partial=0}\otimes\mathbb{C}) \end{split}$$

Since ev(U) is injective by the strictness of the Hodge filtration and since  $B_{\partial}$  is an isomorphism,  $ev(U)^{\bullet}$  is injective and

$$(BC_{\partial} \otimes \mathbb{C})' := (BC_{\partial} \otimes \mathbb{C})_{|ev(U)_{\bullet}^{\bullet}(H^{p}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{N-p}(\log X)^{\partial=0}))} :$$
$$ev(U)_{\bullet}^{\bullet}(H^{p}\Gamma(B_{\bullet}, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N,an}}^{N-p}(\log X)^{\partial=0})) \to H^{N}_{\operatorname{sing}}(U^{an}, \mathbb{C})$$

is injective. For  $\gamma_I \in C_{N-p}^{\text{sing}}(B_I \setminus X^{an}, \mathbb{Q})^{\partial=0}$  where  $p_1 \circ \phi_I(\gamma_I) \subset D(0, 1)^*$  is a loop around 0, we have by the above diagram

$$ev(U)(w)(\gamma_I) = ev(U)(w_{p+1,I})(\gamma_I) = a_I.$$

Hence if  $ev(U)(w) \in H^N_{sing}(U^{an}, 2i\pi\mathbb{Q})$ , then  $a_I \in \mathbb{Q}$ , using the injectivity of  $(BC_\partial \otimes \mathbb{C})'$ . (ii) is equivalent to (iii): By definition  $B_\partial(w) = (H^p\iota_\partial)^{-1}(w)$ . On the other hand by definition  $(\iota^{\geq p} \circ \iota_\partial \circ OL^{N-p}_{U^{an}} = OL^{N-p}_{U^{an}}$ . (iii) implies (i): See [2].

### 4 Complex GAGA for logarithmic de Rham classes

We recall (see section 2) the morphism of site given by the analytification functor

 $\mathrm{An}:\mathrm{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})\to\mathrm{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}),\ X\mapsto\mathrm{An}(X):=X^{an},\ (f:X'\to X)\mapsto\mathrm{An}(f):=f^{an}.$ 

and for  $X \in \text{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$ , the following commutative diagram

$$\begin{array}{c} \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}) \xrightarrow{\operatorname{An}} \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}) \\ & \downarrow^{o_{X^{an}}} & \downarrow^{o_X} \\ & X^{an,et} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{An}_X} X^{et} \end{array}$$

We have the following :

- **Lemma 2.** (i0) The sheaves  $O_{an}^* \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  and  $\Omega_{log}^{1,an} \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  admit transfers compatible with transfers on  $\Omega^{1,an} \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$ .
  - (i) For each  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$ , the sheaf  $\Omega_{\log}^{l,an} \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  admits transfers compatible with transfers on  $\Omega^{l,an} \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$ , that is  $\Omega^{\bullet,an} \in C(CorAnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  and the inclusion  $OL : \Omega_{\log}^{l,an}[-l] \to \Omega^{\bullet,an}$  in  $C(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  is compatible with transfers.
  - (ii) For each  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$ , the sheaf  $\operatorname{An}_* \Omega_{\log}^{l,an} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}))$  is  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant.

Proof. (i0):Let  $W \subset X' \times X$  with  $X, X' \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}), X'$  connected, and  $p_{X'}: W \subset X' \times X \to X'$  finite surjective over X'. Then  $M(p_X): M(X') \hookrightarrow M(W)$  is a finite, where for  $Y \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$  irreducible, M(Y) := Frac(O(Y)) denote the field of meromorphic function. Since  $O(X') \subset M(X')$  is integrally closed, the trace map  $Tr_{W/X'}: M(W) \to M(X')$  sends O(W) to O(X'), and the norm map  $N_{W/X'}:$  $M(W)^* \to M(X')^*$  sends  $O(W)^*$  to  $O(X')^*$ .

The sheaf  $O_{an}^* \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  admits transfers : for  $W \subset X' \times X$  with  $X, X' \in AnSm(\mathbb{C})$  and W finite surjective over X' and  $f \in O(X)^*$ ,  $W^*f := N_{W/X'}(p_X^*f)$  where  $p_X : W \hookrightarrow X' \times X \to X$  is the projection and  $N_{W/X'} : M(W)^* \to M(X')^*$  is the norm map. This gives transfers on  $\Omega_{\log}^{1,an} \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  compatible with transfers on  $\Omega^{1,an} \in PSh(AnSm(\mathbb{C}))$  : for  $W \subset X' \times X$  with  $X, X' \in AnSm(\mathbb{C})$  and W finite surjective over X' and  $f \in O(X)^*$ ,

$$W^* df / f := dW^* f / W^* f = Tr_{W/X'}(p_X^*(df/f)),$$

where we recall  $p_X : W \hookrightarrow X' \times X \to X$  is the projection and  $Tr_{W/X'} : O(W) \to O(X')$  is the trace map. Note that d(fg)/fg = df/f + dg/g. (i): By (i0), we get transfers on

$$\otimes^{l}_{\mathbb{Q}}\Omega^{1,an}_{\log}, \, \otimes^{l}_{O}\Omega^{1,an} \in \mathrm{PSh}(\mathrm{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$$

since  $\otimes_{\mathbb{Q}}^{l}\Omega_{\log}^{1,an} = H^{0}(\otimes_{\mathbb{Q}}^{L,l}\Omega_{\log}^{1,an})$  and  $\otimes_{O}^{l}\Omega^{1,an} = H^{0}(\otimes_{O}^{L,l}\Omega^{1,an})$ . This induces transfers on

$$\wedge_{\mathbb{Q}}^{l}\Omega_{\log}^{1,an} := \operatorname{coker}(\oplus_{I_{2}\subset[1,\ldots,l]} \otimes_{\mathbb{Q}}^{l-1} \Omega_{\log}^{1,an} \xrightarrow{\oplus_{I_{2}\subset[1,\ldots,l]}\Delta_{I_{2}}:=(w\otimes w'\mapsto w\otimes w\otimes w')} \otimes_{\mathbb{Q}}^{l}\Omega_{\log}^{1,an}) \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})).$$

and

$$\wedge_{O}^{l}\Omega^{1,an} := \operatorname{coker}(\oplus_{I_{2}\subset[1,\dots,l]} \otimes_{O_{k}}^{l-1} \Omega^{1,an} \xrightarrow{\oplus_{I_{2}\subset[1,\dots,l]}\Delta_{I_{2}}:=(w\otimes w'\mapsto w\otimes w\otimes w')}) \otimes_{O}^{l}\Omega^{1,an} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})).$$

(ii): Follows from the fact that for  $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ ,  $O^*(X \times \mathbb{A}^1) = O^*(X)$ . Indeed, let  $h = h(x, z) \in O(X \times \mathbb{A}^1)^*$ . Then for  $x \in X$ ,  $z \in \mathbb{A}^1 \mapsto h(x, z)$  is constant since it is an holomorphic function on  $\mathbb{A}^1$  with no zero. Hence h = h(x).

**Proposition 4.** Let  $X \in PSmVar(\mathbb{C})$ . Consider the morphism  $an_X : X^{an} \to X$  in RTop given by analytical functor.

(i) The analytic De Rham cohomology class of an algebraic cycle is logarithmic and is of type (d, d), that is, for  $Z \in \mathbb{Z}^d(X)$ 

$$[Z] := H^{2d}\Omega(\gamma_Z^{\vee})([Z]) \subset H^{2d}OL_{X^{an}}(H^d_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^d_{X^{an}, \log})) \subset H^{2d}_{DR}(X^{an}) = H^{2d}_{DR}(X).$$

- (ii) Conversely, any  $w \in H^{2d}OL_{X^{an}}(H^d_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^d_{X^{an}, \log}))$  is the class of an algebraic cycle  $Z \in \mathcal{Z}^d(X) \otimes \mathbb{Q}$ , i.e. w = [Z].
- (iii) We have  $H^j OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log})) = 0$  for  $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$  such that  $2l \neq j$ . That is, we only have analytic logarithmic classes in bidegree (d, d) for  $d \in \mathbb{N}$ , in particular there is no non trivial logarithmic classes for odd degree De Rham cohomology  $H^{2d+1}_{DR}(X^{an}) = H^{2d+1}_{DR}(X)$ .
- (iv) For each  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ , the isomorphism

$$\operatorname{an}_X^* : H^j_{DR}(X) = \mathbb{H}^j_{et}(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X) \xrightarrow{\sim} \mathbb{H}^j_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^{\bullet}_{X^{an}}) = H^j_{DR}(X^{an})$$

and its inverse preserve logarithmic classes, that is for each  $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$\operatorname{an}_{X}^{*}(H^{j}(OL_{X})(H^{j-l}_{et}(X,\Omega^{l}_{X,\log}))) = H^{j}OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{usu}(X^{an},\Omega^{l}_{X^{an},\log})).$$

*Proof.* Consider, for  $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$  and  $X \in \text{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$ ,

$$L^{l,j-l}(X) := H^j OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log})).$$

Consider also for  $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}, X \in \text{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$  with good reduction and  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset,

$$L_{Z}^{l,j-l}(X) := H^{j}OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{usu,Z}(X^{an}, \Omega^{l}_{X^{an}, \log})).$$

We still denote  $\operatorname{an}_X : X^{an} \xrightarrow{e,\sim} X^{an,et} \xrightarrow{\operatorname{an}_X} X^{et}$  the composite, with  $e(U \to X^{an}) := e(U)$ . By proposition 2(ii) and (ii)', we have

$$L^{l,j-l}(X) = H^j OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{et}(X, \operatorname{an}_{X^*} \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log})) = H^j OL^{an}(H^{j-l} \operatorname{Hom}(\mathbb{Z}(X), E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l, an}_{\log}))).$$

and

$$L_Z^{l,j-l}(X) = H^j OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{et,Z}(X, \operatorname{an}_{X*}\Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log})) = H^j OL^{an}(H^{j-l}\operatorname{Hom}(\mathbb{Z}(X, X \setminus Z), E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_*\Omega^{l,an}_{\log}))),$$

for the second equalities, note that

$$(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log})_{|X^{et}} := o_{X*} \operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log} = \operatorname{an}_{X*} o_{X^{an,et}} \Omega^{l,an}_{\log} = \operatorname{an}_{X*} \Omega^{l}_{X^{an},\log},$$

where  $o_X : X^{et} \subset \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$  is the small etale site  $o_X : X^{et} \hookrightarrow \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})/X \xrightarrow{o_X} \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}), o_X(U \to X) = U$ . For each  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$ , the presheaves  $\operatorname{An}_* \Omega_{\log}^{l,an} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}))$  admit transfers and are  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant by lemma 2. Hence by theorem 1, they are  $\mathbb{A}^1$  local since they are  $\mathbb{A}^1$  invariant and admit transfers. This gives in particular, for  $Z \subset X$  a smooth subvariety of (pure) codimension d with good reduction, by proposition 1 an isomorphism

$$E_{et}\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log}(P_{Z,X}) : L^{l,j-l}_Z(X) \xrightarrow{\sim} L^{l,j-l}_Z(N_{Z/X}) \xrightarrow{\sim} L^{l-d,j-l-d}(Z).$$

Let

$$\alpha = OL_{X^{an}}(\alpha) \in L^{l,j-l}(X) := H^j OL_{X^{an}}(H^{j-l}_{usu}(X^{an}, \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log})) = H^{j-l} \operatorname{Hom}(\mathbb{Z}(X), E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log})).$$

with  $j - l \neq 0$ . Let  $U \subset X$  an open subset such that there exists an etale map  $e : U \to \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$ . Denote  $j : U \hookrightarrow X$  the open embedding. By proposition 2(i), we have

$$j^*\alpha = 0 \in H^{j-l}_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log}) = 0.$$

Considering a divisor  $X \setminus U \subset D \subset X$ , we get

$$\alpha = H^{j-l} E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log})(\gamma^{\vee}_D)(\alpha), \, \alpha \in L^{l,j-l}_D(X).$$

- Proof of (i):Similar to the proof of [2] theorem 2.
- Proof of (ii):By assumption we have  $w \in L^{d,d}(X)$ . Let  $U \subset X$  an open subset such that there exists an etale map  $e: U \to \mathbb{A}^{d_U}_{\mathbb{C}}$ . Considering a divisor  $X \setminus U \subset D \subset X$ , we get

$$w = H^d E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{d,an}_{\log})(\gamma^{\vee}_D)(w), \, \alpha \in L^{d,d}_D(X).$$

Denote  $D^o \subset D$  its smooth locus with good reduction and  $l: X^o \hookrightarrow X$  a Zariski open subset such that  $X^o \cap D = D^o$ . We then have

$$l^*w \in L^{d,d}_{D^o}(X^o) = L^{d-1,d-1}(D^o)$$

We repeat this procedure with each connected components of  $D^o$  instead of X. By a finite induction of d steps, we get

$$w = H^d E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{d,an}_{\log})(\gamma^{\vee}_Z)(w), \ w \in L^{d,d}_Z(X) = L^{0,0}(Z^o)$$

with  $Z := D_d \subset \cdots \subset D \subset X$  a pure codimension d (Zariski) closed subset, thus  $\alpha = \sum_i n_i[Z_i] \in H^{2d}_{DR}(X)$ , where  $n_i \in \mathbb{Q}$  and  $(Z_i)_{1 \leq i \leq t} \subset Z$  are the irreducible components of Z,

• Proof of (iii) part 1: Let j > 2l. Let  $w \in L^{l,j-l}(X)$ . By the proof of (ii) there exists  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset of pure codimension l such that

$$w = H^{j-l} E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log})(\gamma^{\vee}_Z)(w), \ w \in L^{l,j-l}_Z(X).$$

By a finite induction of  $d_X - l$  steps, restricting to the smooth locus with good reduction of closed subsets of Z, w = 0 since  $L^{l,j-l}_{Z'}(X) = 0$  for all  $Z' \in \text{SmVar}(k)$  with good reduction such that  $\operatorname{codim}(Z', X) \geq l$ .

• Proof of (iii) part 2: Let j < 2l. Let  $w \in L^{l,j-l}(X)$ . By the proof of (ii) there exists  $Z \subset X$  a closed subset of pure codimension j-l such that

$$w = H^{j-l} E^{\bullet}_{et}(\operatorname{An}_* \Omega^{l,an}_{\log})(\gamma^{\vee}_Z)(w), \ w \in L^{l,j-l}_Z(X).$$

For  $Z' \subset X$  a closed subset of pure codimension c, consider a desingularisation  $\epsilon : \tilde{Z}' \to Z'$  of Z'and denote  $n : \tilde{Z}' \xrightarrow{\epsilon} Z' \subset X$ . The morphism in DA(k)

$$G_{Z',X}: M(X) \xrightarrow{D(\mathbb{Z}(n))} M(\tilde{Z}')(c)[2c] \xrightarrow{\mathbb{Z}(\epsilon)} M(Z')(c)[2c]$$

where  $D : \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{DA}(k)}(M_c(\tilde{Z}'), M_c(X)) \xrightarrow{\sim} \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{DA}(k)}(M(X), M(\tilde{Z}')(c)[2c])$  is the duality isomorphism from the six functor formalism (moving lemma of Suzlin and Voevodsky) and  $\mathbb{Z}(n) := \operatorname{ad}(n_!, n^!)(a_X^! \mathbb{Z})$ , is given by a morphism in  $C(\operatorname{SmVar}(k))$ 

$$\hat{G}_{Z',X}: \mathbb{Z}_{tr}(X) \to E_{et}(C_*\mathbb{Z}_{tr}(Z'))(c)[2c].$$

Let  $l: X^o \hookrightarrow X$  be an open embedding such that  $Z^o := Z \cap X^o$  is the smooth locus of Z with good reduction. We then have the following commutative diagram of abelian groups

$$0 \longrightarrow H^{j-l}_{et,Z}(X, \operatorname{an}_{X*} \Omega^{l}_{X^{an}, \log}) \xrightarrow{l^{*}} H^{j-l}_{et,Z^{o}}(X^{o}, \operatorname{an}_{X*} \Omega^{l}_{X^{an}, \log}) \xrightarrow{\partial} H^{j-l+1}_{et,Z\setminus Z^{o}}(X, \operatorname{an}_{X*} \Omega^{l}_{X^{an}, \log}) \xrightarrow{} \cdots$$

$$\Omega(\hat{G}_{Z,X}) \xrightarrow{\uparrow} \Omega(P_{Z^{o},X^{o}}) \xrightarrow{\uparrow} \Omega(P_{Z^{o},X^{o}}) \xrightarrow{\uparrow} \Omega(\hat{G}_{Z,X}) \xrightarrow{\downarrow} \Omega(\hat{G}_{Z,X}) \xrightarrow{I} \Omega(\hat{$$

whose rows are exact sequences. Consider

$$l^*w = \Omega(P_{Z^o, X^o})(w^o) \in H^{j-l}_{et, Z^o}(X^o, \operatorname{an}_{X^*} \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log}), \ w^o \in H^0_{et}(Z^o, \operatorname{an}_{Z^*} \Omega^{2l-j}_{Z^{o,an}, \log}).$$

Since  $\partial l^* w = 0 \in H^{j-l+1}_{et,Z \setminus Z^o}(X, \operatorname{an}_{X^*} \Omega^l_{X^{an}, \log})$ , we get, considering the smooth locus with good reduction  $(Z \setminus Z^o)^o \subset Z \setminus Z^o$  and  $X^{oo} \subset X$  is an open subset such that  $X \cap (Z \setminus Z^o)^o = X^{oo} \cap (Z \setminus Z^o)$ ,

$$\partial w^o = 0 \in H^1_{et, Z \setminus Z^o}(Z, \operatorname{an}_{Z^*} \Omega^{2l-j}_{Z^{an}, \log}),$$

since  $H^1_{et,(Z \setminus Z^o) \setminus (Z \setminus Z^o)^o}(Z, \operatorname{an}_{Z^*} \Omega^{2l-j}_{Z^{an}, \log}) = 0$  for dimension reasons, that is

$$w = \Omega(\hat{G}_{Z,X})(w), \text{ with } w \in H^0_{et}(Z, \operatorname{an}_{Z^*} \Omega^{2l-j}_{Z^{an}, \log}).$$

Hence w = 0 since  $H^0(Z', \Omega^k_{Z'^{an}, \log}) = 0$  for all k > 0 and all  $Z' \in PVar(K)$ .

(iv):Follows from (ii),(iii) and [2] theorem 2.

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# 5 Hodge Conjecture for complex smooth projective hypersurfaces

We now state and prove using the result of section 3 and section 4 the main result of this article :

**Theorem 2.** Let  $X = V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}}$  be a smooth projective hypersurface, with N = 2p + 1 odd. Let  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(X^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$ . Then there exists an algebraic cycle  $Z \in \mathbb{Z}^p(X)$  such that  $\lambda = [Z]$ .

*Proof.* Consider  $U := \mathbb{P}^N_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus X$ . Consider  $Res_{X,\mathbb{P}^N} : M(X) \to M(U)[-1]$  the canonical map given in definition 1. We the have the commutative diagram of abelian group

$$\begin{array}{c} H^{N}_{DR}(U) \xrightarrow{H^{N}\Omega(\operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^{N}})} \to H^{N-1}_{DR}(X)_{v} \\ \\ H^{N}_{\alpha}(U^{an}) = ev(U)^{-1} & \uparrow \\ H^{N}_{\operatorname{sing}}(U^{an},\mathbb{C}) \xrightarrow{(H^{N}\operatorname{Bti}(\operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^{N}})) \otimes_{\mathbb{Q}}\mathbb{C}} H^{N-1}_{\operatorname{sing}}(X^{an},\mathbb{C})_{v} \end{array}$$

whose arrows are isomorphisms. Denote  $w(\lambda) := H^{N-1}\alpha(X^{an})(\lambda) \in F^p H^{2p}_{DR}(X)$ . We have

$$\lambda = H^{N-1}\operatorname{Bti}(\operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^N})(\alpha), \text{ with } \alpha \in H^N_{\operatorname{sing}}(U^{an},\mathbb{Q}).$$

Then

$$w(\lambda) = H^{N-1}\Omega(\operatorname{Res}_{X,\mathbb{P}^N})(w(\alpha)), \text{ with } w(\alpha) := H^N\alpha(U^{an})(\alpha) \in F^{p+1}H^N_{DR}(U).$$

Since  $ev(U)(w(\alpha)) = \alpha \in H^N_{sing}(U^{an}, 2i\pi\mathbb{Q})$ , we have by proposition 3,

$$w(\alpha) \in H^N OL_{U^{an}}(H^{p+1}_{usu}(U^{an}, \Omega^{N-p}_{U^{an}, \log}))$$

Hence

$$w(\lambda) = H^{N-1}OL_{X^{an}}(\Omega_{\log}^{N-p,an}(Res_{X,\mathbb{P}^N})(w(\alpha))) \in OL_{X^{an}}(H^p_{usu}(X^{an},\Omega^p_{X^{an},\log}))$$

Hence by proposition 4(ii),  $w(\lambda) = [Z]$  with  $Z \in \mathcal{Z}^p(X)$ .

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
