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# Hodge conjecture for projective hypersurfaces

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#### Abstract

We show that a Hodge class of a complex smooth projective hypersurface is an analytic logarithmic De Rham class. On the other hand we show that for a complex smooth projective variety an analytic logarithmic De Rham class of type $(d, d)$ is the class of a codimension $d$ algebraic cycle. We deduce the Hodge conjecture for smooth projective hypersurfaces.


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## 1 Introduction

### 1.1 Complex analytic De Rham logarithmic classes

In [2], we introduced, for $X$ an algebraic variety over a field, the notion of logarithmic De Rham cohomology classes. For $X$ a complex algebraic variety, we also introduce in this work the notion of logarithmic analytic De Rham cohomology classes. In proposition 4 (section 4) we give an analytic analogue of [2] theorem 2 (ii), that is if $X$ is a smooth complex projective variety,

- a logarithmic analytic De Rham cohomology class of type $(d, d)$ is the class of a codimension $d$ algebraic cycle.
- we have $H^{j} O L_{X^{a n}, 0}\left(H_{u s u}^{j-l}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{l}\right)\right)=0$ for $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$ such that $2 l>j$.

Here $O L_{X^{a n}, 0}: \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{l}[-l] \rightarrow \Omega_{X^{a n}}$ is the morphism of the abstract abelian group generated by logarithmic analytic $l$-forms (see definition 2) to the analytic de Rham complex and usu denote the usual complex topology. The proof of proposition 4 is motivic and similar to the proof of [2] theorem 2 : a logarithmic analytic class of bidegree $(p, q), p, q \neq 0, p \geq q, q \neq d_{U}$ is acyclic for the Zariski topology on
each open subset $U \subset X$ such that there exists an etale map $e: U \rightarrow \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}$ such that $e: U \rightarrow e(U)$ is finite etale and $\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}} \backslash e(U) \subset \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}$ is a divisor (proposition 2 ), this allows us to proceed by a finite induction using the crucial fact that the purity isomorphism for De Rham cohomology preserve logarithmic analytic classes since the purity isomorphism is motivic (c.f. [3], see proposition 1).

### 1.2 Hodge conjecture for smooth projective hypersurfaces

Let $X=V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N}$ be a smooth projective hypersurface. Denote $j: U:=\mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N} \backslash X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N}$ the open complementary subset. Let $\left(\Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}} F^{\bullet-p} j_{*} O_{U}\right)^{a n}$ be the filtered De Rham complex of $U$. The cone of $\iota_{\partial}$ :

$$

is locally acyclic for the complex topology, more precisely is acyclic on open balls (see e.g.[6]). As a consequence, we show in proposition 3 , using an open cover $\mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N}=\cup_{i=1}^{n} B_{i}$ by open balls $\phi_{i}: B_{i} \simeq D(0,1)^{N}$ such that $\phi_{i}\left(B_{i} \cap X\right)=0 \times D(0,1)^{N-1}$, that a Hodge class $\alpha \in F^{N-p} H^{N}\left(U^{a n}, \mathbb{Q}\right)$ is logarithmic, that is

We get that, if $N=2 p+1$ and $\lambda \in F^{p} H^{2 p}\left(X^{a n}, \mathbb{Q}\right)$ is a Hodge class,

\lambda=\operatorname{Res}_{X, \mathbb{P}^{N}}(\alpha)+m[H] \in H^{2 p} O L_{X^{a n}}\left(H_{u s u}^{p}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{p}\right)\right)
$$

where $\operatorname{Res}_{X, \mathbb{P}^{N}}: H^{N}\left(U^{a n}, \mathbb{C}\right) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^{2 p}\left(X^{a n}, \mathbb{C}\right)$ is the residu map, using the fact that since the residu map is motivic (see definition 1), it preserves the logaritmic De Rham classes. Proposition 4 (ii) then implies that $\lambda=[Z], Z \in \mathcal{Z}^{p}(X)$, is the class of an algebraic cycle.

To our knowledge, Hodge's conjecture for hypersurfaces was known for only a few cases : hyperplanes, quadrics and Fermat's hypersurfaces of degree $\leq 21$ (Shioda). Our new contribution which allowed us to tackle the general case of hypersurfaces is the introduction of the notion of analytical logarithmic de Rham classes on the one hand and the motivic purity isomorphism on the other hand.

## 2 Preliminaries and Notations

### 2.1 Notations

- Denote by Top the category of topological spaces and RTop the category of ringed spaces.
- Denote by Cat the category of small categories and RCat the category of ringed topos.
- For $\mathcal{S} \in$ Cat and $X \in \mathcal{S}$, we denote $\mathcal{S} / X \in$ Cat the category whose objects are $Y / X:=(Y, f)$ with $Y \in \mathcal{S}$ and $f: Y \rightarrow X$ is a morphism in $\mathcal{S}$, and whose morphisms $\operatorname{Hom}\left(\left(Y^{\prime}, f^{\prime}\right),(Y, f)\right)$ consists of $g: Y^{\prime} \rightarrow Y$ in $\mathcal{S}$ such that $f \circ g=f^{\prime}$.
- For $\left(\mathcal{S}, O_{S}\right) \in$ RCat a ringed topos, we denote by
- $\operatorname{PSh}(\mathcal{S})$ the category of presheaves of $O_{S}$ modules on $\mathcal{S}$ and $\mathrm{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})$ the category of presheaves of $O_{S}$ modules on $\mathcal{S}$, whose objects are $\operatorname{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})^{0}:=\left\{(M, m), M \in \operatorname{PSh}(\mathcal{S}), m: M \otimes O_{S} \rightarrow M\right\}$, together with the forgetful functor $o: \operatorname{PSh}(\mathcal{S}) \rightarrow \operatorname{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})$,
$-C(\mathcal{S})=C(\operatorname{PSh}(\mathcal{S}))$ and $C_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})=C\left(\mathrm{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})\right)$ the big abelian category of complexes of presheaves of $O_{S}$ modules on $\mathcal{S}$,
$-C_{O_{S}(2) f i l}(\mathcal{S}):=C_{(2) f i l}\left(\mathrm{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})\right) \subset C\left(\mathrm{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S}), F, W\right)$, the big abelian category of (bi)filtered complexes of presheaves of $O_{S}$ modules on $\mathcal{S}$ such that the filtration is biregular and $\operatorname{PSh}_{O_{S}(2) f i l}(\mathcal{S}):=$ $\left(\mathrm{PSh}_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S}), F, W\right)$.
- Let $\left(\mathcal{S}, O_{S}\right) \in$ RCat a ringed topos with topology $\tau$. For $F \in C_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})$, we denote by $k: F \rightarrow E_{\tau}(F)$ the canonical flasque resolution in $C_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})$ (see [1]). In particular for $X \in \mathcal{S}, H^{*}\left(X, E_{\tau}(F)\right) \xrightarrow{\sim}$ $\mathbb{H}_{\tau}^{*}(X, F)$.
- For $f: \mathcal{S}^{\prime} \rightarrow \mathcal{S}$ a morphism with $\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{S}^{\prime} \in$ RCat, endowed with topology $\tau$ and $\tau^{\prime}$ respectively, we denote for $F \in C_{O_{S}}(\mathcal{S})$ and each $j \in \mathbb{Z}$,

the canonical maps.

- For $m: A \rightarrow B, A, B \in C(\mathcal{A}), \mathcal{A}$ an additive category, we denote $c(A): \operatorname{Cone}(m: A \rightarrow B) \rightarrow A[1]$ and $c(B): B \rightarrow \operatorname{Cone}(m: A \rightarrow B)$ the canonical maps.
- For $X \in$ Top and $Z \subset X$ a closed subset, denoting $j: X \backslash Z \hookrightarrow X$ the open complementary, we will consider

- Denote by Sch $\subset$ RTop the subcategory of schemes (the morphisms are the morphisms of locally ringed spaces). We denote by PSch $\subset$ Sch the full subcategory of proper schemes. For a field $k$, we consider Sch $/ k:=\operatorname{Sch} / \operatorname{Spec} k$ the category of schemes over Spec $k$. The objects are $X:=\left(X, a_{X}\right)$ with $X \in$ Sch and $a_{X}: X \rightarrow \operatorname{Spec} k$ a morphism and the morphisms are the morphisms of schemes $f: X^{\prime} \rightarrow X$ such that $f \circ a_{X^{\prime}}=a_{X}$. We then denote by
$-\operatorname{Var}(k)=\operatorname{Sch}^{f t} / k \subset \operatorname{Sch} / k$ the full subcategory consisting of algebraic varieties over $k$, i.e. schemes of finite type over $k$,
- PVar $(k) \subset \mathrm{QPVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{Var}(k)$ the full subcategories consisting of quasi-projective varieties and projective varieties respectively,
$-\operatorname{PSmVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(k) \subset \operatorname{Var}(k), \operatorname{PSm} \operatorname{Var}(k):=\operatorname{PVar}(k) \cap \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$, the full subcategories consisting of smooth varieties and smooth projective varieties respectively.
- Denote by $\operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C}) \subset R T$ op the subcategory of analytic spaces over $\mathbb{C}$, and by $\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}) \subset \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ the full subcategory of smooth analytic spaces (i.e. complex analytic manifold).
- For $X \in$ Top and $X=\cup_{i \in I} X_{i}$ an open cover, we denote $X \bullet \in \operatorname{Fun}(\Delta$, Top) the associated simplicial space, with for $J \subset I, j_{I J}: X_{I}:=\cap_{i \in I} X_{i} \hookrightarrow X_{J}:=\cap_{i \in J} X_{i}$ the open embedding.
- For $X \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$ and $X=\cup_{i \in I} X_{i}$ an open cover, we denote $X_{\bullet} \in \operatorname{Fun}(\Delta, \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ the associated simplicial complex manifold, with for $J \subset I, j_{I J}: X_{I}:=\cap_{i \in I} X_{i} \hookrightarrow X_{J}:=\cap_{i \in J} X_{i}$ the open embedding.
- Let $\left(X, O_{X}\right) \in$ RTop. We consider its De Rham complex $\Omega_{X}^{\bullet}:=D R(X)\left(O_{X}\right)$.
- Let $X \in$ Sch. Considering its De Rham complex $\Omega_{X}^{\bullet}:=D R(X)\left(O_{X}\right)$, we have for $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ its De Rham cohomology $H_{D R}^{j}(X):=\mathbb{H}^{j}\left(X, \Omega_{X}^{\bullet}\right)$.
- Let $X \in \operatorname{Var}(k)$. Considering its De Rham complex $\Omega_{X}^{\bullet}:=\Omega_{X / k}^{\bullet}:=D R(X / k)\left(O_{X}\right)$, we have for $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ its De Rham cohomology $H_{D R}^{j}(X):=\mathbb{H}^{j}\left(X, \Omega_{X}^{\bullet}\right)$. The differentials of $\Omega_{X}^{\bullet}:=\Omega_{X / k}^{\bullet}$ are by definition $k$-linear, thus $H_{D R}^{j}(X):=\mathbb{H}^{j}\left(X, \Omega_{X}^{\bullet}\right)$ has a structure of a $k$ vector space.
- Let $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$. Considering its De Rham complex $\Omega_{X}^{\bullet}:=D R(X)\left(O_{X}\right)$, we have for $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ its De Rham cohomology $H_{D R}^{j}(X):=\mathbb{H}^{j}\left(X, \Omega_{X}^{\bullet}\right)$.
- For $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$, we denote $\alpha(X): \mathbb{C}_{X} \hookrightarrow \Omega_{X}^{\bullet}$ the embedding in $C(X)$. For $X \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$, $\alpha(X): \mathbb{C}_{X} \hookrightarrow \Omega_{X}^{\bullet}$ is an equivalence usu local by Poincare lemma.
- We denote $\mathbb{I}^{n}:=[0,1]^{n} \in \operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})$ (with boundary). For $X \in \operatorname{Top}$ and $R$ a ring, we consider its singular cochain complex

We recall that

- For $X \in$ Top locally contractible, e.g. $X \in \mathrm{CW}$, and $R$ a ring, the inclusion in $C_{R}(X)$ $c_{X}: R_{X} \rightarrow C_{X, R \text { sing }}^{*}$ is by definition an equivalence top local and that we get by the small chain theorem, for all $l \in \mathbb{Z}$, an isomorphism $H^{l} c_{X}: H^{l}\left(X, R_{X}\right) \xrightarrow{\sim} H_{\text {sing }}^{l}(X, R)$.
- For $X \in \operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})$, the restriction map

is a quasi-isomorphism by Whitney approximation theorem.

- We will consider the morphism of site given by the analytification functor

its restriction to the small etale site $o_{X}\left(X^{e t}\right) \subset \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$, where $o_{X}(U \rightarrow X)=U$, in particular we have the following commutative diagram

where $o_{X^{a n}}\left(U \hookrightarrow X^{a n}\right)=U$. We get the morphism in RTop $\mathrm{an}_{X}:=\operatorname{an}_{X \mid O(X)}: X^{a n} \rightarrow X$, $o: O(X) \subset X^{\text {et }}$ being the embedding of the Zariski open subsets of $X$.

### 2.2 Complex integral periods

Let $k$ be a field of characteristic zero and $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$ be a smooth variety. Let $X=\cup_{i=1}^{s} X_{i}$ be an open affine cover. For each embedding $\sigma: k \hookrightarrow \mathbb{C}$, we have the evaluation period embedding map which is the morphism of bi-complexes

given by integration. By taking all the affine open cover $\left(j_{i}: X_{i} \hookrightarrow X\right)$ of $X$, we get for $\sigma: k \hookrightarrow \mathbb{C}$, the evaluation period embedding map

It induces in cohomology, for $j \in \mathbb{Z}$, the evaluation period map
$H^{j} e v(X)=H^{j} e v(X)_{\bullet}^{\bullet}: H_{D R}^{j}(X)=H^{j} \Gamma\left(X_{\bullet}, \Omega_{X_{\bullet}}^{\bullet}\right) \rightarrow H_{\text {sing }}^{j}\left(X_{\mathbb{C}}^{a n}, \mathbb{C}\right)=H^{j}\left(\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})}\left(\mathbb{I}^{\bullet}, X_{\mathbb{C}, \bullet}^{a n}\right)^{\vee} \otimes \mathbb{C}\right)$.
which does NOT depend on the choice of the affine open cover by acyclicity of quasi-coherent sheaves on affine noetherian schemes for the left hand side and from Mayer-Vietoris quasi-isomorphism for singular cohomology of topological spaces and Whitney approximation theorem for differential manifolds for the right hand side.

Let $X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(k)$. Then,

is the canonical isomorphism induced by the analytical functor and the quasi-isomorphism $\alpha(X)$ : $\mathbb{C}_{X_{\mathbb{C}}^{a n}} \hookrightarrow \Omega_{X_{\mathbb{C}}^{a n}}^{\bullet}$, which gives the periods elements $H^{*} \operatorname{ev}(X)\left(H_{D R}^{*}(X)\right) \subset H_{\text {sing }}^{*}\left(X_{\mathbb{C}}^{a n}, \mathbb{C}\right)$.

### 2.3 Algebraic cycles and motives

For $X \in$ Sch noetherian irreducible and $d \in \mathbb{N}$, we denote by $\mathcal{Z}^{d}(X)$ the group of algebraic cycles of codimension $d$, which is the free abelian group generated by irreducible closed subsets of codimension $d$.

For $X, X^{\prime} \in$ Sch noetherian, with $X^{\prime}$ irreducible, we denote by $\mathcal{Z}^{f s / X^{\prime}}\left(X^{\prime} \times X\right) \subset \mathcal{Z}_{d_{X^{\prime}}}\left(X^{\prime} \times X\right)$ which consist of algebraic cycles $\alpha=\sum_{i} n_{i} \alpha_{i} \in \mathcal{Z}_{d_{X^{\prime}}}\left(X^{\prime} \times X\right)$ such that, denoting $\operatorname{supp}(\alpha)=\cup_{i} \alpha_{i} \subset X^{\prime} \times X$ its support and $p^{\prime}: X^{\prime} \times X \rightarrow X^{\prime}$ the projection, $p_{\mid \operatorname{supp}(\alpha)}^{\prime}: \operatorname{supp}(\alpha) \rightarrow X^{\prime}$ is finite surjective.

Let $k$ be a field. We denote by $\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(k)$ the category whose objects are $\{X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k)\}$ and

Let $F \in \mathrm{PSh}(\operatorname{SmVar}(k))$, we say that $F$ admits transfers if $F=\operatorname{Tr}_{*} F$ with $F \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(k))$.

Let $k$ be a field. We recall that $\mathrm{DA}(k):=\operatorname{Ho}_{\mathbb{A}^{1}, e t}(C(\operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(k)))$ is the derived category of mixed motives.

We have (see e.g. [1]) the Hodge realization functor

For $X \in \operatorname{Var}(k)$ and $Z \subset X$ a closed subset, denoting $j: X \backslash Z \hookrightarrow X$ the open complementary, we will consider

- Let $k$ be a field of characteristic zero. Let $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$. For $Z \subset X$ a closed subset of pure codimension $c$, consider a desingularisation $\epsilon: \tilde{Z} \rightarrow Z$ of $Z$ and denote $n: \tilde{Z} \xrightarrow{\epsilon} Z \subset X$. We have then the morphism in $\mathrm{DA}(k)$

where $D: \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{DA}(k)}\left(M_{c}(\tilde{Z}), M_{c}(X)\right) \xrightarrow{\sim} \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{DA}(k)}(M(X), M(\tilde{Z})(c)[2 c])$ is the duality isomorphism from the six functors formalism (moving lemma of Suzlin and Voevodsky) and $\mathbb{Z}(n):=$ $\operatorname{ad}\left(n_{!}, n^{!}\right)\left(a_{X}^{!} \mathbb{Z}\right)$, noting that $n_{!}=n_{*}$ since $n$ is proper and that $a_{X}^{!}=a_{X}^{*}\left[d_{X}\right]$ and $a_{\tilde{Z}}^{!}=a_{\tilde{Z}}^{*}\left[d_{Z}\right]$ since $X$, resp. $\tilde{Z}$, are smooth (considering the connected components, we may assume $X$ and $\tilde{Z}$ of pure dimension).

We recall the following facts (see [3] and [1]):
Proposition 1. Let $k$ be a field a characteristic zero. Let $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$ and $i: Z \subset X$ a smooth subvariety of pure codimension d. Then $C_{Z / X}=N_{Z / X} \rightarrow Z$ is a vector bundle of rank d. The closed embeddings $i_{1}:(X, Z) \hookrightarrow\left(D_{Z} X, \mathbb{A}_{Z}^{1}\right)$ and $i_{0}:\left(C_{Z / X}, Z\right) \hookrightarrow\left(D_{Z} X, \mathbb{A}_{Z}^{1}\right)$ in $\operatorname{SmVar}^{2}(k)$ induces isomorphisms of motives $\mathbb{Z}\left(i_{1}\right): M_{Z}(X) \xrightarrow{\sim} M_{\mathbb{A}_{Z}^{1}}\left(D_{Z} X\right)$ and $\mathbb{Z}\left(i_{0}\right): M_{Z}\left(N_{Z / X}\right) \xrightarrow{\sim} M_{\mathbb{A}_{Z}^{1}}\left(D_{Z} X\right)$ in $\mathrm{DA}(k)$. We get the excision isomorphism in $\mathrm{DA}(k)$

Definition 1. Let $k$ be a field a characteristic zero. Let $X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(k)$ and $i: Z \subset X$ a smooth subvariety of pure codimension $d$. We consider using proposition 1 the canonical map in $\mathrm{DA}(k)$

- Recall that we say that $F \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{SmVar}(k))$ is $\mathbb{A}^{1}$ invariant if for all $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(k), p^{*}:=F(p)$ : $F(X) \rightarrow F\left(X \times \mathbb{A}^{1}\right)$ is an isomorphism, where $p: X \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \rightarrow X$ is the projection.
- Similarly, we say that $F \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ is $\mathbb{A}^{1}$ invariant if for all $X \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}), p^{*}:=F(p)$ : $F(X) \rightarrow F\left(X \times \mathbb{A}^{1}\right)$ is an isomorphism, where $p: X \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \rightarrow X$ is the projection.


### 2.4 The logaritmic De Rham complexes

We recall from [2] the following notion :

We get an embedding in $C(\operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C}))$

$X=\sqcup_{i=1}^{r} X_{i}$ is the decomposition into connected components, for $p=0, \Omega_{X, \log , 0}^{0}:=\mathbb{Z}$, for $p<0$ of course $\Omega_{X, \log , 0}^{p}=0$, and by definition all the differentials of this complex are trivial. Note that $\Omega_{X, \log , 0}^{1}=O_{X}^{*}$. In particular $O L_{X, 0}$ is NOT injective. We get the morphism in $C(\operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C}))$

whose columns are exact with e injective and $q$ surjective, and of course all differentials of $\Omega_{\log , 0}^{\bullet, a n}$ and of $\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}$ are trivial.

Lemma 1. We have a splitting in $C(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$

(i) For each $l \in \mathbb{Z}$, the sheaf $\Omega_{\log }^{l, a n} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ admits transfers compatible with transfers on $\Omega^{l, a n} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$, that is $\Omega^{\bullet, a n} \in C(\operatorname{Cor} \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ and the inclusion $O L: \Omega_{\log }^{l, a n}[-l] \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet, a n}$ in $C(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ is compatible with transfers.

The sheaf $O_{a n}^{*} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ admits transfers : for $W \subset X^{\prime} \times X$ with $X, X^{\prime} \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$ and $W$ finite surjective over $X^{\prime}$ and $f \in O(X)^{*}, W^{*} f:=N_{W / X^{\prime}}\left(p_{X}^{*} f\right)$ where $p_{X}: W \hookrightarrow X^{\prime} \times X \rightarrow X$ is the projection and $N_{W / X^{\prime}}: M(W)^{*} \rightarrow M\left(X^{\prime}\right)^{*}$ is the norm map. This gives transfers on $\Omega_{\log }^{1, a n} \in$ $\operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ compatible with transfers on $\Omega^{1, a n} \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ : for $W \subset X^{\prime} \times X$ with $X, X^{\prime} \in$ $\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$ and $W$ finite surjective over $X^{\prime}$ and $f \in O(X)^{*}$,

(ii) Let $U \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$ such that there exists an etale map $e: U \rightarrow \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}$ such that $e: U \rightarrow e(U)$ is finite etale and $\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}} \backslash e(U) \subset \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}$ is a divisor. where $a_{u s u}$ is the sheafification functor, $p_{X}: X \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \rightarrow X$ is the projection, and the second and the fourth map is the isomorphism given by (i)', and the middle map is an isomorphism by lemma 2(ii)'. Take a desingularization of the pair $\epsilon=\epsilon_{1}:\left(\widetilde{\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}}, E\right) \rightarrow\left(\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}, D\right)$, so that $E=\cup_{i=1}^{s} E_{i} \subset \widetilde{\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}}$ is a normal crossing divisor and $\epsilon: \widetilde{\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}} \backslash E \xrightarrow{\sim} \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}} \backslash D$. We thus get by proposition 1 , for each $p, q \in \mathbb{Z}, p, q \neq 0$,

- $E_{i k}^{o}:=\tilde{E}_{i k} \backslash E_{i k+1} \subset \tilde{E}_{i k}$ is an open subset such that there exists a finite etale map $e_{i k}: E_{i k}^{o} \rightarrow$ $e_{i k}\left(E_{i k}^{o}\right) \subset \mathbb{A}^{d_{U}-k}$ with $\mathbb{A}^{d_{U}-k} \backslash e_{i k}\left(E_{i k}^{o}\right) \subset \mathbb{A}^{d_{U}-k}$ a divisor, $\epsilon_{k}:\left(\tilde{E}_{i k}^{N}, \tilde{E}_{i k+1}\right) \rightarrow\left(\tilde{E}_{i k}, E_{i k+1}\right)$ is a desingularization

## 3 Hypersurface De Rham cohomology and its complex periods

We denote $\mathbb{P}^{N}:=\mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N}:=\operatorname{Proj}\left(\mathbb{C}\left[z_{0}, \cdots, z_{N}\right]\right)$. Let $X=V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^{N}$ be a smooth hypersurface. If $N-1=2 p$ is even, we consider the decompositions

Lemma 3. Let $X=V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^{N}$ be a smooth hypersurface. Denote $j: U:=\mathbb{P}^{N} \backslash X \hookrightarrow \mathbb{P}^{N}$ the open embedding. Let $B \subset \mathbb{P}^{N}, \phi: B \simeq D(0,1)^{N}$ be an open ball such that $\phi(X \cap B)=\{0\} \times D(0,1)^{N-1}$. Then,
(i) For $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0, \mathbb{H}_{u s u}^{q}\left(B,\left(\Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N}}^{\bullet} \otimes_{O_{\mathbb{P}} N} F^{\bullet-p} j_{*} O_{U}\right)^{a n}\right)=0$.
(ii) For $q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0, H_{u s u}^{q}\left(B, \Omega_{\mathbb{P}^{N, a n}}^{N-p}(\log X)^{\partial=0}\right)=0$.

Proof. (i): Since $B$ is Stein, we have for $r, q \in \mathbb{Z}, q \neq 0$,

Since, for each $I \subset[1, \ldots, n]$ and $p \in \mathbb{Z}$,

- taking for each $1 \leq i \leq n, l_{i}^{*} w=\partial w_{1 i}$ since $\partial w=0$ for dimensional reason and by exactness of $l_{i}^{*} \iota_{\partial}$,
- we then have for each $1 \leq i, j \leq n$, considering $w_{1 i j}:=l_{i j}^{*}\left(w_{1 i}-w_{1 j}\right), w_{1 i j}=\partial w_{2 i j}$ since

Proposition 3. Let $X=V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}^{N}$ be a smooth projective hypersurface. Denote $U:=\mathbb{P}^{N} \backslash X$. Let $w \in F^{p+1} H_{D R}^{N}(U) / j^{*} H_{D R}^{N}\left(\mathbb{P}^{N}\right)$. Then the following assertions are equivalent
(i) $e v(U)(w) \in H_{\text {sing }}^{N}\left(U^{a n}, 2 i \pi \mathbb{Q}\right)$,
(ii) $B_{\partial}(w) \in \widehat{O L_{U^{a n}, 0}^{p}}\left(H_{u s u}^{p}\left(U^{a n}, \Omega_{U^{a n}, \log , 0, v}^{N-p}\right)\right)($ see definition 4),
(iii) $w \in O L_{U^{a n}, 0}^{N}\left(H_{u s u}^{p}\left(U^{a n}, \Omega_{U^{a n}, \log , 0, v}^{N-p}\right)\right)$.

is the canonical quasi-isomorphism in $C\left(U^{a n}\right)$. We then have the following commutative diagram


Since $e v(U)$ is injective by the strictness of the Hodge filtration and since $B_{\partial}$ is an isomorphism, ev(U): is injective and

is injective. For $\gamma_{I} \in C_{N-p}^{\text {sing }}\left(B_{I} \backslash X^{a n}, \mathbb{Q}\right)^{\partial=0}$ where $p_{1} \circ \phi_{I}\left(\gamma_{I}\right) \subset D(0,1)^{*}$ is a loop around 0 , we have by the above diagram

Hence if $e v(U)(w) \in H_{\text {sing }}^{N}\left(U^{a n}, 2 i \pi \mathbb{Q}\right)$, then $a_{I} \in \mathbb{Q}$, using the injectivity of $\left(B C_{\partial} \otimes \mathbb{C}\right)^{\prime}$. Hence

## 4 Complex analytic logarithmic de Rham classes

We recall (see section 2) the morphism of site given by the analytification functor

and for $X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$, the following commutative diagram


We have also the morphism of sites (see definition 3)

- $\pi: \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}) \rightarrow \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})^{p r}, \pi\left(X \times \mathbb{A}^{1, a n}\right):=X, \pi(f \otimes I):=f$,
- $\rho: \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})^{p r} \rightarrow \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}), \rho(X):=X \times \mathbb{A}^{1, a n}, \rho(f):=f \otimes I$,
in particular $\rho \circ \pi=I$. Consider the commutative diagram in $C(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$

whose columns are exact with $e$ injective and $q$ surjective (see definition 3 ). We have the factorization in $C(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$

\end{aligned}

and we have denoted again by abuse

- $\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}:=\operatorname{ad}(\pi)\left(\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}\right) \subset \Omega^{\bullet, a n, \partial=0} \subset \Omega^{\bullet, a n}$.
- $\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}:=\operatorname{ad}(\pi)\left(\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}\right) \cap \Omega_{\log }^{\bullet, a n} \subset \Omega^{\bullet, a n, \partial=0} \subset \Omega^{\bullet, a n}$.

Let $X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$. Then, for $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, we have the commutative diagram

whose columns are exact, and of course all differentials of $\Omega_{\log , 0}^{\bullet, a n}$ and of $\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}$ are trivial. Let $Z \subset X$ a closed subset. Then, for $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, we also have the commutative diagram

whose columns are exact.
Lemma 4. Let $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$. For each $k \in \mathbb{Z}, k \neq 0$, we have $H^{k}(e)\left(\mathbb{H}_{\text {usu }}^{k}\left(X^{a n}, \operatorname{ad}(\pi)\left(\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}\right)\right)\right)=0$.
Proof. We have the canonical splitting

where the embedding

in $C\left(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})^{p r}\right)$ is the Dolbeault resolution. Let $X=\cup_{i=1}^{r} X_{i}$ be an open affine cover. Then for each $I \subset[1, \ldots, r]$, there exists by Noether normalization lemma a finite map $X_{I} \rightarrow \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{X}}$. Hence the presheaves $\left(\pi^{*}\left(\mathcal{A}^{l, r, e}\right)\right)_{\mid X_{I}}$ and $\left(\pi^{*} \Omega^{p, e}\right)_{\mid X_{I}}$ are sheaves. We have thus, by Poincare lemma on open balls, for each $I \subset[1, \ldots, r]$,

indeed, since open balls form a basis of the complex topology, there exists $D^{l}$ such that $D^{l} \subset D^{l-1} \times \mathbb{A}^{1}$. We have

Now, for each $I \subset[1, \ldots, r]$,

- if $q \circ m: X_{I}^{a n} \xrightarrow{m} Y \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \xrightarrow{q} \mathbb{A}^{1}$ is non constant, we can factor

& =\mathcal{A}^{e}\left(m^{\prime}\right)\left(H ^ { k } \left(\mathcal{A}^{\bullet} \geq p, \bullet, e\right.\right.
\end{array}\right)\left(Y^{\prime} \times \mathbb{A}^{1}\right)\right)=0

by Kunneth formula for $Y^{\prime} \times \mathbb{A}^{1}$,

- if $q \circ m: X \xrightarrow{m} Y \times \mathbb{A}^{1} \xrightarrow{q} \mathbb{A}^{1}$ is constant with value $c$,

Hence, for each $I \subset[1, \ldots, r]$ and $k \in \mathbb{Z}$

Proposition 4. Let $X \in \operatorname{PSm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$. Consider the morphism $\mathrm{an}_{X}: X^{a n} \rightarrow X$ in RTop given by analytical functor.
(i) The analytic De Rham cohomology class of an algebraic cycle is logarithmic and is of type $(d, d)$, that is, for $Z \in \mathcal{Z}^{d}(X)$

[Z]:=H^{2 d} \Omega\left(\gamma_{Z}^{\vee}\right)([Z]) \subset H^{2 d} O L_{X^{a n}, 0}\left(H_{u s u}^{d}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{d}\right)\right) \subset H_{D R}^{2 d}\left(X^{a n}\right)=H_{D R}^{2 d}(X)
$$

(ii) Conversely, any $w \in H^{2 d} O L_{X^{a n}, 0}\left(H_{u s u}^{d}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{d}\right)\right)$ is the class of an algebraic cycle $Z \in$ $\mathcal{Z}^{d}(X) \otimes \mathbb{Q}$, i.e. $w=[Z]$.
(iii) We have $H^{j} O L_{X^{a n}}\left(H_{u s u}^{j-l}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{l}\right)\right)=0$ for $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$ such that $2 l>j$.

Proof. Consider, for $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$ and $X \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C})$,

Consider also for $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}, X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$ and $Z \subset X$ a closed subset,

Consider, for $j, l \in \mathbb{Z}$ and $X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$,

For each $l, j \in \mathbb{Z}$, the presheaf $H^{j-l} E_{u s u}\left(\Omega_{\log }^{l, a n, n e}\right) \in \operatorname{PSh}(\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C}))$ is $\mathbb{A}^{1}$ invariant by proposition $2(\mathrm{i})$. Indeed, for $Y \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$ connected, take an open cover $Y=\cup_{i \in I} D_{i}$ by open balls $D_{i} \simeq D(0,1)^{d_{Y}}$, and let $D_{\bullet} \in \operatorname{Fun}\left(\Delta, \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})\right.$ be the associated simplicial analytic manifold, with for $J \subset I, j_{I J}: D_{I}:=$ $\cap_{i \in I} D_{i} \hookrightarrow D_{J}:=\cap_{i \in J} D_{i}$ the open embedding, we then get the isomorphism

This gives in particular, for $X \in \operatorname{Sm} \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C})$ and $Z \subset X$ a smooth subvariety of (pure) codimension $d$, by proposition 1 an isomorphism

Up to split $X$ by its connected components, we may assume that $X$ is connected. The case $d=d_{X}$ is trivial. So let assume $d \neq d_{X}$. Let $U \subset X$ an open subset such that there exists an etale map $e: U \rightarrow \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}$
such that $e: U \rightarrow e(U)$ is finite etale and $\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}} \backslash e(U) \subset \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{C}}^{d_{U}}$ is a divisor Denote $j: U \hookrightarrow X$ the open embedding. By proposition 2(ii), we have

H^{j}(q)(w)=H^{j-l} E_{u s u}^{\bullet}\left(\Omega_{\log , 0}^{l, a n, n e}\right)\left(\gamma_{Z}^{\vee}\right)\left(w^{\prime}\right), w^{\prime} \in L_{Z}^{l, j-l, n e}(X)
$$

For $Z^{\prime} \subset X$ a closed subset of pure codimension $c$, consider a desingularisation $\epsilon: \tilde{Z}^{\prime} \rightarrow Z^{\prime}$ of $Z^{\prime}$ and denote $n: \tilde{Z}^{\prime} \xrightarrow{\epsilon} Z^{\prime} \subset X$. The morphism in $\mathrm{DA}(k)$

where $D: \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{DA}(k)}\left(M_{c}\left(\tilde{Z}^{\prime}\right), M_{c}(X)\right) \xrightarrow{\sim} \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{DA}(k)}\left(M(X), M\left(\tilde{Z}^{\prime}\right)(c)[2 c]\right)$ is the duality isomorphism from the six functor formalism (moving lemma of Suzlin and Voevodsky) and $\mathbb{Z}(n):=\operatorname{ad}\left(n_{!}, n^{!}\right)\left(a_{X}^{!} \mathbb{Z}\right)$, is given by a morphism in $C(\operatorname{SmVar}(k))$

Let $l: X^{o} \hookrightarrow X$ be an open embedding such that $Z^{o}:=Z \cap X^{o}$ is the smooth locus of $Z$. We have the following commutative diagram of abelian groups

whose rows are exact sequences. Consider

l^{*} w^{\prime}=\Omega\left(P_{Z^{o}, X^{o}}\right)\left(w^{o}\right) \in H_{u s u, Z^{o}}^{j-l}\left(X^{o, a n}, \Omega_{\log , 0}^{l, a n, n e}\right), w^{o} \in H_{e t}^{0}\left(Z^{o, a n}, \Omega_{\log , 0}^{2 l-j, a n, n e}\right)
$$

Since $\partial l^{*} w^{\prime}=0 \in H_{u s u, Z \backslash Z^{o}}^{j-l+1}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{\log , 0}^{l, a n, n e}\right)$, we get, considering the smooth locus $\left(Z \backslash Z^{o}\right)^{o} \subset Z \backslash Z^{o}$ and $X^{o o} \subset X$ is an open subset such that $X \cap\left(Z \backslash Z^{o}\right)^{o}=X^{o o} \cap\left(Z \backslash Z^{o}\right)$,

since $H_{u s u,\left(Z \backslash Z^{o}\right) \backslash\left(Z \backslash Z^{o}\right)^{o}}^{1}\left(Z^{a n}, \Omega_{\log , 0}^{2 l-j, a n, n e}\right)=0$ for dimension reasons, that is

Hence $H^{j}(q)(w)=0$ since $H^{0}\left(Z^{\prime a n}, \Omega_{\log , 0}^{k}\right)=0$ for all $k>0$ and all $Z^{\prime} \in \operatorname{PVar}(\mathbb{C})$. But by lemma 4

$$
H(e)\left(\mathbb{H}_{u s u}^{j}\left(X^{a n}, \operatorname{ad}(\pi)\left(\pi^{*} \Omega^{\bullet, e}\right)\right)\right)=0
$$

Hence $w=0$.

## 5 Hodge Conjecture for complex smooth projective hypersurfaces

We now state and prove using the result of section 3 and section 4 the main result of this article :
Theorem 1. Let $X=V(f) \subset \mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N}$ be a smooth projective hypersurface, with $N=2 p+1$ odd. Let $\lambda \in F^{p} H^{2 p}\left(X^{a n}, \mathbb{Q}\right)$. Then there exists an algebraic cycle $Z \in \mathbb{Z}^{p}(X)$ such that $\lambda=[Z]$.

Proof. Let $U:=\mathbb{P}_{\mathbb{C}}^{N} \backslash X$. Consider $\operatorname{Res}_{X, \mathbb{P}^{N}}: M(X) \rightarrow M(U)[-1]$ the canonical map given in definition 1. We have the commuative diagram of complex vector spaces :

whose arrows are isomorphisms. Denote $w(\lambda):=H^{N-1} \alpha\left(X^{a n}\right)(\lambda) \in F^{p} H_{D R}^{2 p}(X)$. We have

$$
\lambda=H^{N-1} \operatorname{Bti}\left(\operatorname{Res}_{X, \mathbb{P}^{N}}\right)(\alpha)+m[H], \text { with } m \in \mathbb{Q}, \alpha \in H_{\operatorname{sing}}^{N}\left(U^{a n}, \mathbb{Q}\right)
$$

where $H:=X \cap \Lambda \subset X$ is an hyperplane section. Then

$$
w(\lambda)=H^{N-1} \Omega\left(\operatorname{Res}_{X, \mathbb{P}^{N}}\right)(w(\alpha))+m[H], \text { with } w(\alpha):=H^{N} \alpha\left(U^{a n}\right)(\alpha) \in F^{p+1} H_{D R}^{N}(U)
$$

Since $e v(U)(w(\alpha))=\alpha \in H_{\text {sing }}^{N}\left(U^{a n}, 2 i \pi \mathbb{Q}\right)$, we have by proposition 3 ,

$$
w(\alpha) \in H^{N} O L_{U^{a n}, 0}\left(H_{u s u}^{p}\left(U^{a n}, \Omega_{U^{a n}, \log , 0}^{N-p}\right)\right)
$$

Hence

$$
w(\lambda)=H^{N-1} O L_{X^{a n}, 0}\left(\Omega_{\log , 0}^{N-p-1, a n}\left(\operatorname{Res}_{X, \mathbb{P}^{N}}\right)(w(\alpha))\right)+m[H] \in O L_{X^{a n}, 0}\left(H_{u s u}^{p}\left(X^{a n}, \Omega_{X^{a n}, \log , 0}^{p}\right)\right)
$$

Hence by proposition $4($ ii $), w(\lambda)=[Z]$ with $Z \in \mathcal{Z}^{p}(X)$.

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
