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NUMERICAL DETERMINATION OF AN ANATOMICAL STRUCTURE'S UNLOADED STATE FROM IN VIVO MEDICAL IMAGING

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Context

- •Implantable Medical Device (IMD) deployment's computation in patient specific anatomical structures.
- Competitive computation time.

<u>Objectives</u>

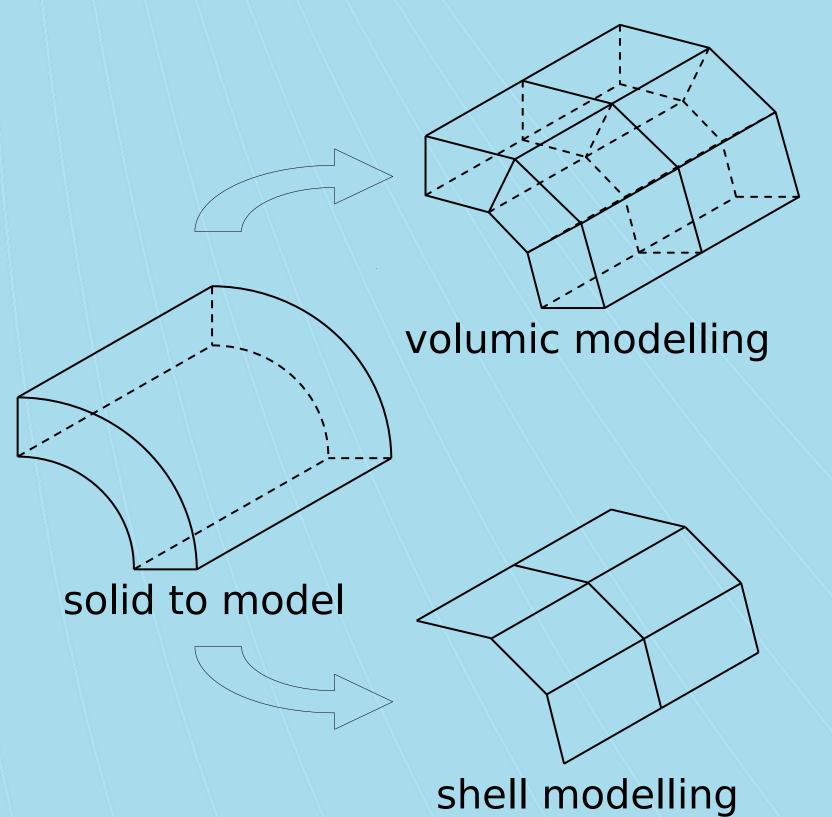
Inspect impact of the choice of stress-free configuration of anatomical structures in the result of IMD-anatomical structure interaction's computation.

Shell modelling

Stress-free configuration determination algorithm already exist in the litterature^{1,2}, but are adapted to volumic mesh modelization of structure.

Medical imaging, with segmentaton, provides geometrical inputs of anatomical structures as their median surfaces. To avoid a step of volumic reconstruction and thickness discretization that would results in more degree of freedom and longer computation time, one could model those structures with shells.

Our contribution is to adapt such algorithm to shell modelling.



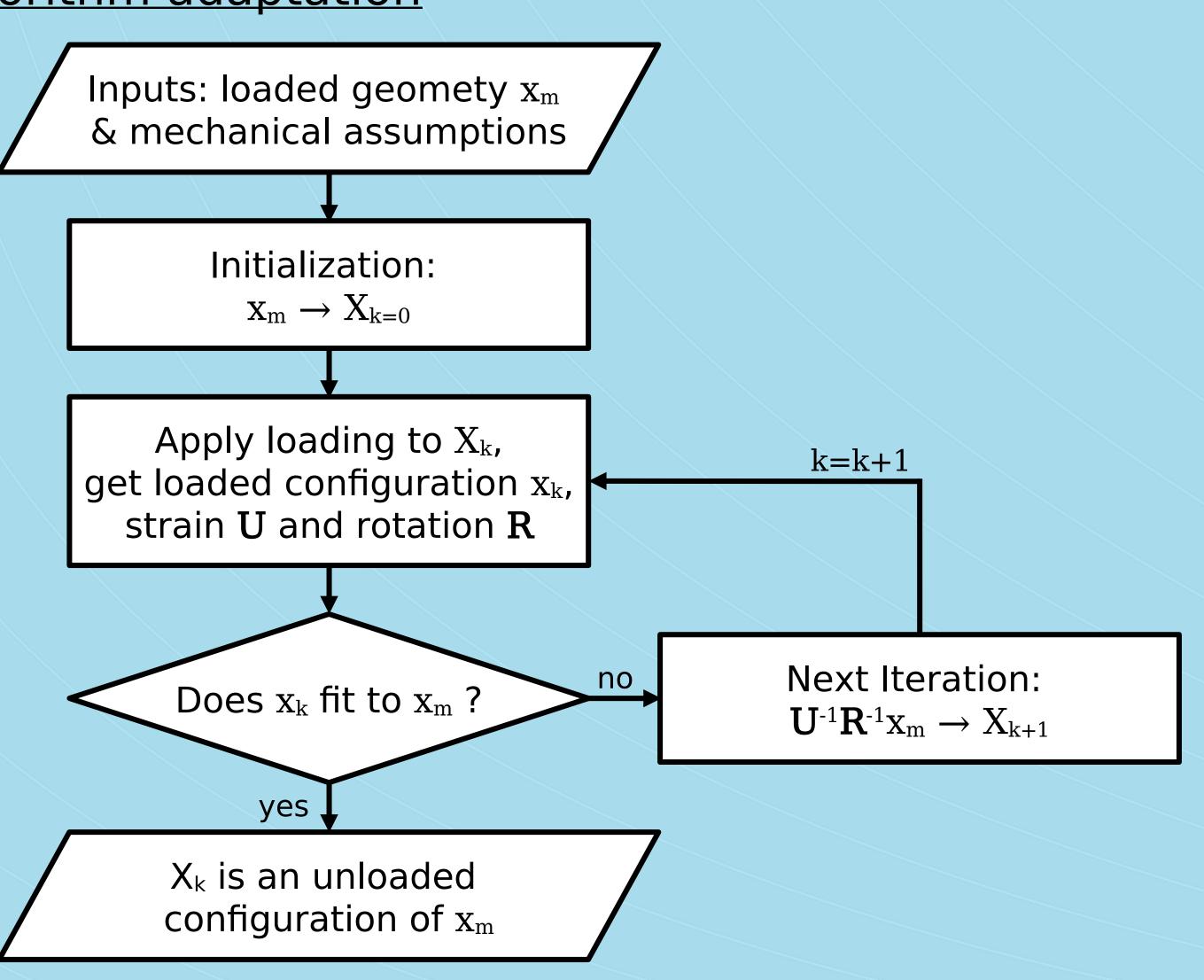
- discretized in thickness

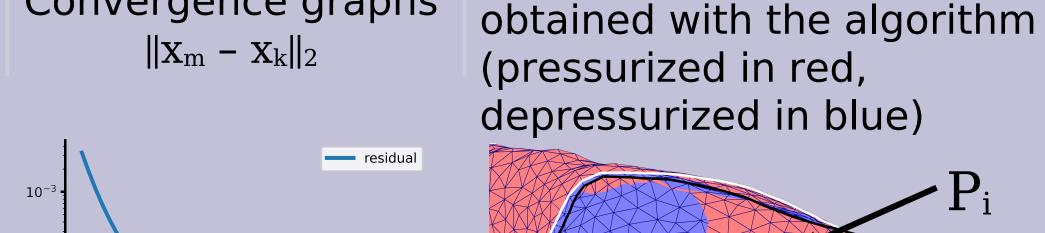


Flowchart of the proposed algorithm

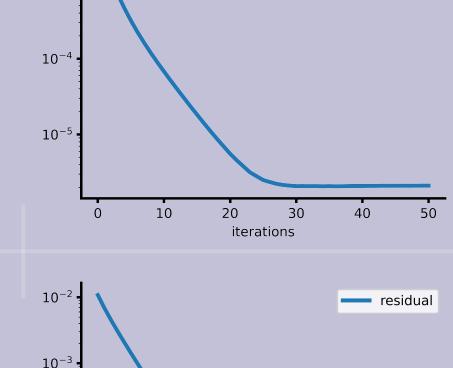
Application to in vivo neural aneurysms

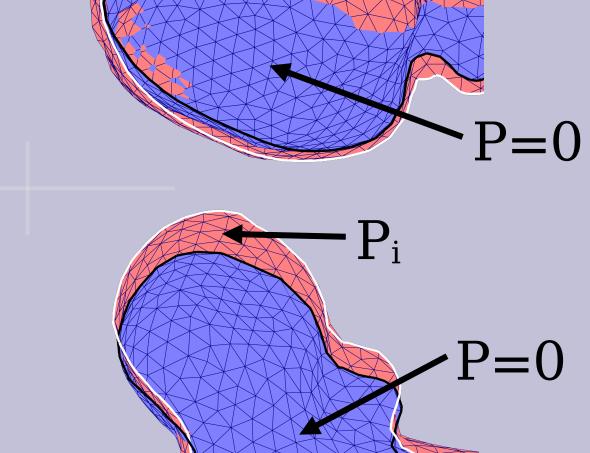
- **Hypothesis:**
- Soft hyperelastic material from in vivo aneurysm wall³
- Homogeneous blood pressure⁴ P_i
- No displacement on contours of the artery

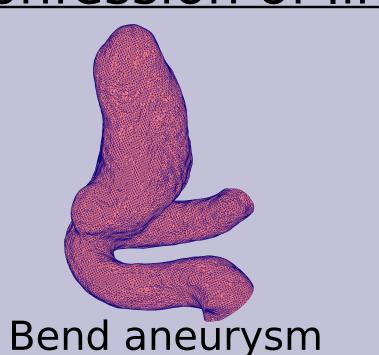




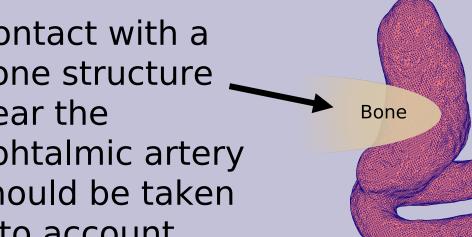

Confession of limitations

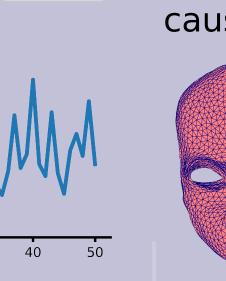


flawed boundary conditions. Contact with a bone structure near the ophtalmic artery should be taken into account



No convergence could due to

No convergence, could due to too soft material mixed with curvature, causing too big rotations.



High curvature happens to be in the same zone than instabilities of the algorithm

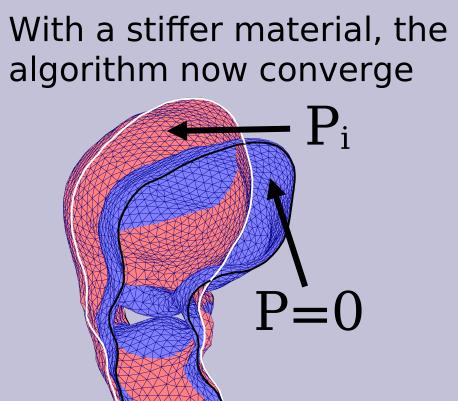

This algorithm allows to find stress-free configuration to implement computations with based of hyperelastic model and patient specific geometry. The convergence of such algorithm depends of the compatibility between the measured geometry, the boundary conditions and the assumed material of the structure.

<u>Perspectives</u>

- Implement more complex boundary conditions, heterogeneous loading or contact with other structures, to adress more cases.
- Assign a different material to the arterial wall than the aneurysm.
- Use Aitken type relaxation to improve convergence.
