SINGULARITIES OF HOLOMORPHIC CODIMENSION ONE FOLIATIONS OF THE COMPLEX PROJECTIVE PLANE

DOMINIQUE CERVEAU AND JULIE DÉSERTI

ABSTRACT. We prove that any holomorphic codimension 1 foliation on the complex projective plane has at most one singularity up to the action of an ad-hoc birational map. Consequently, any algebraic foliation on the affine plane has no singularities up to the action of a suitable birational self map of the complex projective plane into itself.

Let \mathscr{F} be a codimension one holomorphic foliation of degree N on $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$. Denote by $\pi \colon \mathbb{C}^3 \setminus \{0\} \to \mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ the canonical projection. The homogeneous foliation $\pi^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ extends to \mathbb{C}^3 and is defined by a 1-form

$$\boldsymbol{\omega} = a(x, y, z) dx + b(x, y, z) dy + c(x, y, z) dz$$

where a, b, c are homogeneous polynomials of degree N+1 without common component satisfying the Euler identity: ax+by+cz=0; it is the Chow theorem for foliations. The singular set $Sing(\mathscr{F})$ of \mathscr{F} is given by

$$\pi(\{a=b=c=0\}\setminus\{0\}).$$

Let us recall what is the Milnor number $\mu(\mathscr{F},m)$ of a foliation \mathscr{F} at a singular point m. Let us fix a local chart (u,v) such that m=(0,0). The germ of \mathscr{F} at m is defined, up to multiplication by a unit at 0, by a 1-form E du + F dv. Denote by $\langle E, F \rangle$ the ideal generated by E and F, then

$$\mu(\mathscr{F},m) = \dim \frac{\mathbb{C}\{u,v\}}{\langle E,F\rangle};$$

it is also the multiplicity of intersection of the germs of curves (E=0) and (F=0). Let us recall that ([Bru15, Chapter 2, Section 3, Example 2])

$$\sum_{m \in \operatorname{Sing}(\mathscr{F})} \mu(\mathscr{F}, m) = N^2 + N + 1;$$

in particular, \mathcal{F} has a least one singular point.

Example. Let us consider the diagonal linear foliation \mathscr{F} given by the 1-form

$$\omega = \lambda yz dx + xz dy - (1 + \lambda)xy dz$$

with $\lambda \in \mathbb{C} \setminus \{0, -1, -2\}$. Note that $\operatorname{Sing}(\mathscr{F}) = \{(0:0:1), (1:0:0), (0:1:0)\}$; moreover, $x^{\lambda}yz^{-(1+\lambda)}$ is a first integral of \mathscr{F} .

The birational involution from $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself given by

$$\mathscr{I}_1: (x:y:z) \dashrightarrow (xy:y^2:x^2-yz),$$

defines an isomorphism of $\{y \neq 0\}$. Remark that the foliation $\mathscr{I}_1^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ is described by the 1-form

$$-y((2+\lambda)x^2+\lambda yz)\,dx+x((2+\lambda)x^2-yz)\,dy+(1+\lambda)xy^2\,dz;$$

in particular, $Sing(\mathscr{I}_1^{-1}\mathscr{F}) = \{(0:0:1), (0:1:0)\}.$

Let us now consider the birational involution \mathscr{I}_2 from $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself given by

$$\mathscr{I}_2: (x:y:z) \dashrightarrow (x^2:-xy+z^2:xz);$$

note that \mathscr{I}_2 defines an isomorphism of $\{x \neq 0\}$. Furthermore, the restriction of $\mathscr{I}_2^{-1}\mathscr{I}_1^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ on (x = 0) is described by the 1-form $(1 - \lambda)z^5 dx$; consequently, $\operatorname{Sing}(\mathscr{I}_2^{-1}\mathscr{I}_1^{-1}\mathscr{F}) = \{(0:1:0)\}.$

Can we generalize this to all holomorphic foliations on $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$? The answer is yes:

Theorem 1. Let \mathscr{F} be a holomorphic foliation on $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$. There exists a birational self map ϕ from $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself such that $\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ has at most one singular point.

Note that many properties are preserved by conjugacy by birational maps, for instance the existence of invariant algebraic curves of genus ≥ 2 , but also the existence of dense leaves.

Corollary 2. Let \mathscr{F} be an algebraic foliation on \mathbb{C}^2 . There exists a birational map ϕ from \mathbb{C}^2 into itself such that $\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ has no singular point.

In a certain sense Corollary 2 indicates that algebraic foliations of \mathbb{C}^2 have no special properties.

Note that the situation is completely different on $\mathbb{P}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \times \mathbb{P}^1_{\mathbb{C}}$; in that space there exist foliations without singularities: a foliation on $\mathbb{P}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \times \mathbb{P}^1_{\mathbb{C}}$ birationally conjugate to a foliation without singularities has a rational first integral ([Bru15]).

To prove Theorem 1 we will use the following statement:

Lemma 3. Let \mathscr{F} be a holomorphic codimension one foliation on $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$. Assume that \mathscr{F} has N singular points, and among them $n \geq 2$ singular points on a line L. There exists a birational self map ϕ from $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself such that $\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ has N-n+1 singular points, one on L and N-n on $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus L$.

Proof. \diamond Assume first that L is not invariant by \mathscr{F} . Let us choose coordinates such that

$$\left\{ \begin{array}{l} L = (z = 0) \\ (0:1:0) \not \in \operatorname{Sing}(\mathscr{F}) \\ L \text{ is not tangent to the leaf of } \mathscr{F} \text{ through } (0:1:0) \text{ at } (0:1:0) \end{array} \right. (\star)$$

The foliation \mathcal{F} is defined by

$$\omega = A(x, y, z) dx + B(x, y, z) dy + C(x, y, z) dz.$$

Let us recall the Euler condition: xA + yB + zC = 0; in particular note that B(0,1,0) = 0. The tangency condition (\star) says that $A(0,1,0) \neq 0$.

Let us consider the birational involution ϕ of $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself given by

$$\phi: (x:y:z) \longrightarrow (xz:-yz+x^2:z^2);$$

note that

$$Ind(\phi) = \{(0:1:0)\}, \qquad Exc(\phi) = \{(z=0)\}$$

where $\operatorname{Ind}(\phi)$ (resp. $\operatorname{Exc}(\phi)$) denotes the set of indeterminacy (resp. the exceptional set) of ϕ . In particular, ϕ defines an isomorphism of $\{z \neq 0\}$. One has

$$\phi^* \omega = A(xz, -yz + x^2, z^2)(x dz + z dx) + B(xz, -yz + x^2, z^2)(-y dz - z dy + 2x dx) + 2C(xz, -yz + x^2, z^2)z dz,$$

and

$$\phi^* \omega \big|_{z=0} = xA(0,x^2,0) dx + \underbrace{B(0,x^2,0)}_{=0} (-y dz + 2x dx) = xA(0,x^2,0) dx;$$

in particular $\phi^*\omega\big|_{z=0}$ vanishes only at x=0 since $A(0,1,0)\neq 0$. As a consequence, $\#(\mathrm{Sing}(\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F})\cap (z=0))=1$ and $\#\mathrm{Sing}(\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F})=N-n+1$.

 \diamond Suppose now that L is invariant by \mathscr{F} . Let us choose coordinates such that $\left\{ \begin{array}{l} L=(z=0) \\ (0:1:0) \not\in \mathrm{Sing}(\mathscr{F}) \end{array} \right.$ The foliation \mathscr{F} is defined by

$$\omega = zA(x, y, z) dx + zB(x, y, z) dy + C(x, y, z) dz.$$

Let us still consider the birational involution ϕ of $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself given by

$$\phi: (x:y:z) \dashrightarrow (xz:-yz+x^2:z^2)$$

that defines an isomorphism of $\{z \neq 0\}$. Then

$$\phi^* \omega = z \Big(z A(xz, -yz + x^2, z^2) (x dz + z dx) + z B(xz, -yz + x^2, z^2) (-y dz - z dy + 2x dx) + 2C(xz, -yz + x^2, z^2) dz \Big),$$

and the restriction of $\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ on (z=0) is described by the 1-form $2C(0,x^2,0)\,\mathrm{d}z$. But $C(0,1,0)\neq 0$ (because $(0:1:0)\not\in\mathrm{Sing}(\mathscr{F})$) so $C(0,x^2,0)=0$ if and only if x=0. In particular, $\#(\mathrm{Sing}(\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F})\cap(z=0))=1$ and $\#\mathrm{Sing}(\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F})=N-n+1$.

Proof of Theorem 1. We get the result by iteration using Lemma 3.

Assume that \mathscr{F} is an algebraic foliation of any codimension of \mathbb{C}^n ; is it true that there exists a birational self map of $\mathbb{P}^n_{\mathbb{C}}$ into itself such that $\phi^{-1}\mathscr{F}$ has no singularity? In the real case (for example in $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{R}}$) what is the best result we can expect?

Remark that following [CDGBM10] in which we classify, up to automorphisms of $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$, the quadratic foliations having a unique singularity there is a lot of activity around the foliations of $\mathbb{P}^2_{\mathbb{C}}$ having a unique singularity (for instance [FPR22, Alc22, Cou22, CJ21, CF21, CF20]).
