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Methods

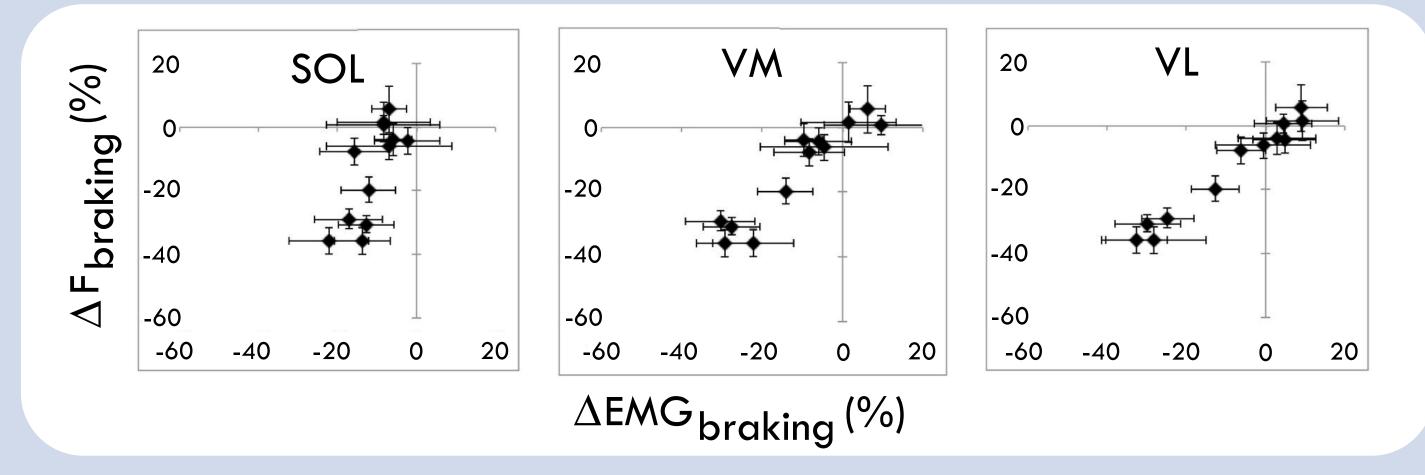


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- Runners are confronted with changing external forces [1]
- Only one study focused on the neuromuscular adjustments to progressive reduction in external forces [2]
- It reported positive correlations during the <u>braking phase</u>



40 male recreational runners (19 ± 1 yr) ran on a Lower
 Body Positive Pressure treadmill (AlterG®, 3.0 ± 0.2 m/s)

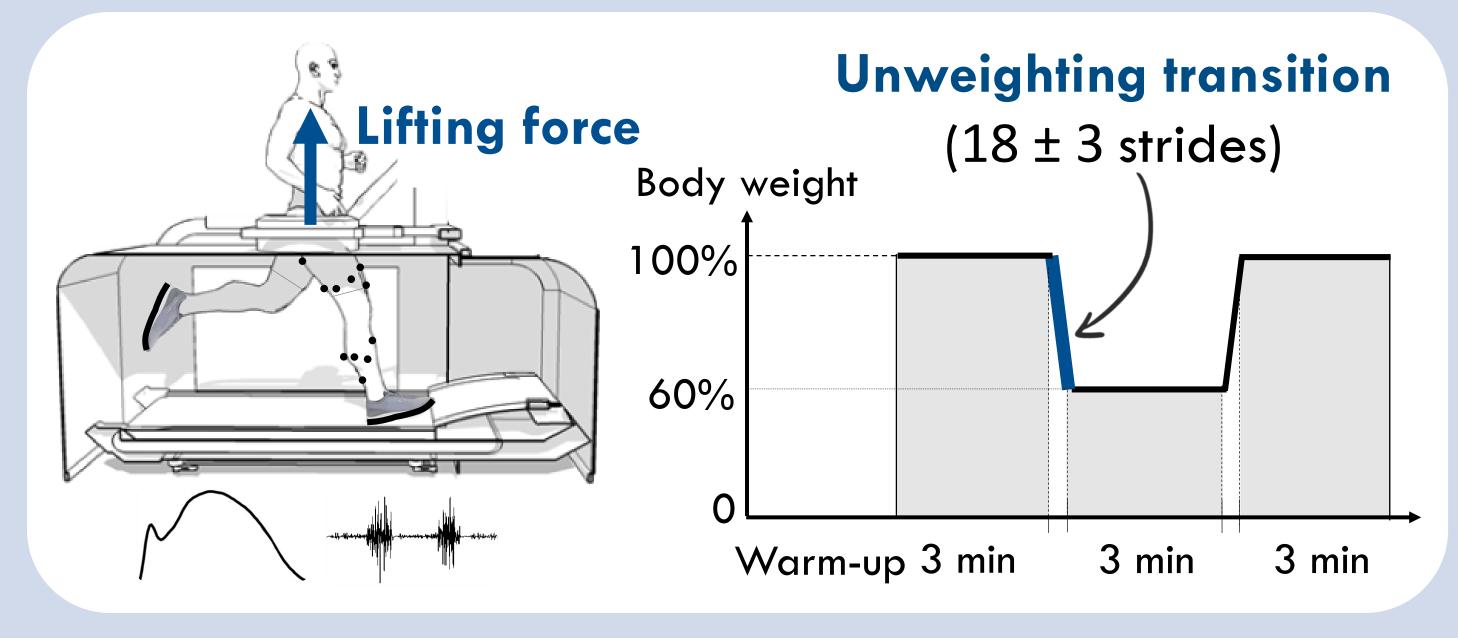
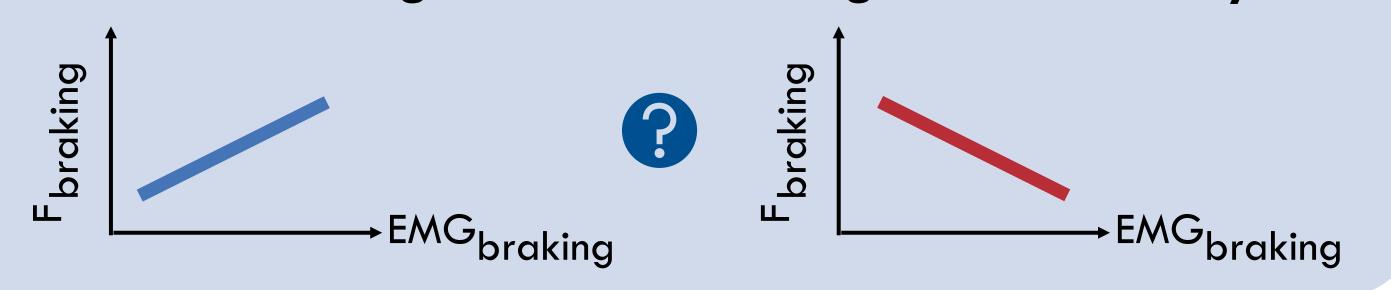


Fig. 1 Correlations between changes in mean force and mean muscle activity

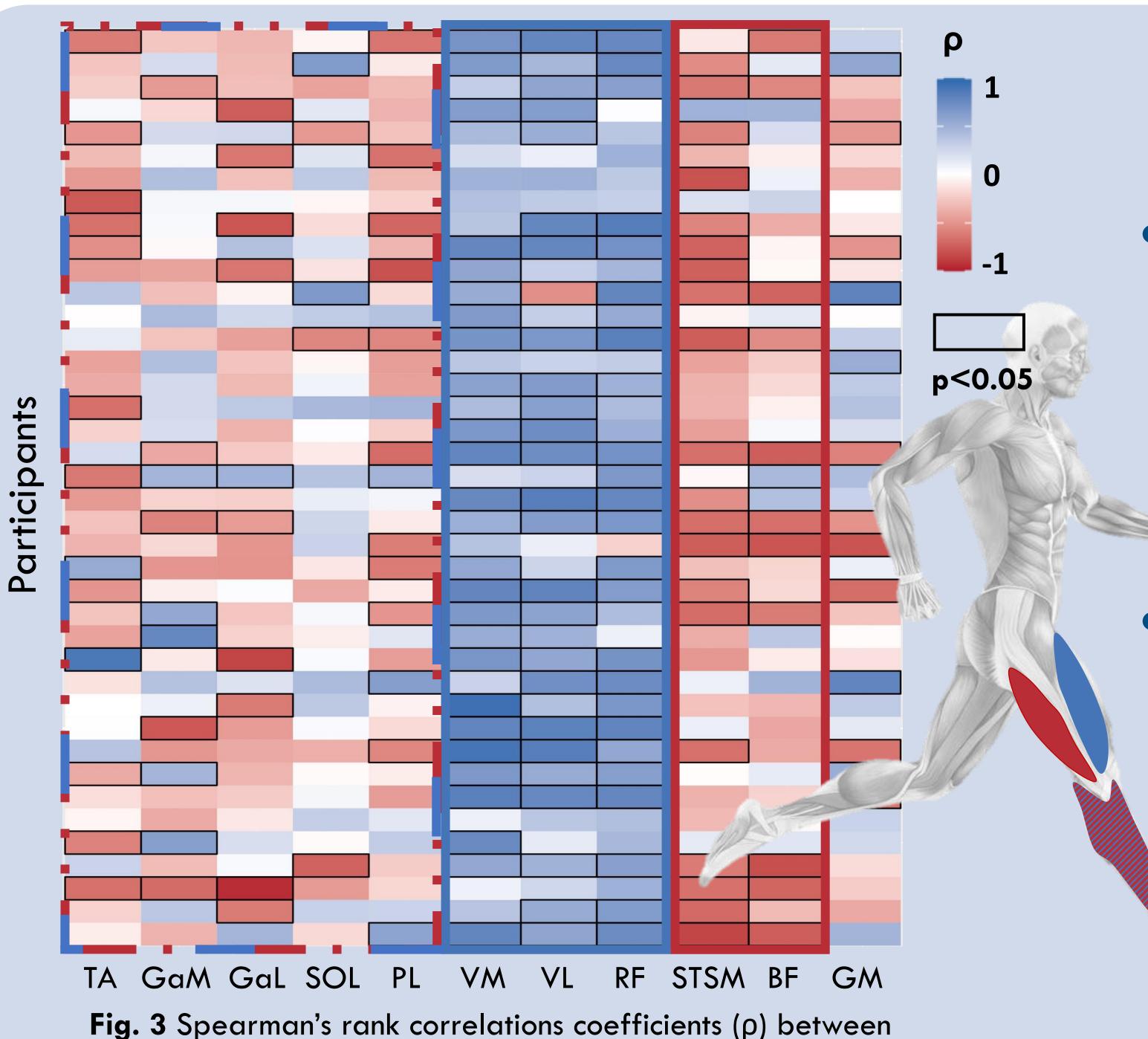
• ...but did not analyse them for each participant separately

This study investigated the dynamics of neuromuscular adjustments to the progressive reduction in external forces, using an <u>individualised analysis</u> Fig. 2 Experimental design

 Spearman's correlation tests to quantify the relationship between braking force and braking muscle activity



3) Results & Discussion



During the <u>braking phase</u>, the progressive reduction in external forces was associated with:

- <u>Similar proximal</u> neuromuscular adjustments
 - Quadriceps activity

Hamstring activity

- Reduces peak knee flexion during stance [3]
- Accelerates the return of the free-leg [4]
- Varied distal neuromuscular adjustments
 Shank muscle activity in some participants
 - **Shank muscle** activity in others
 - Ensures ankle stabilisation when shifting toward a forefoot strike [3]
 - No longer observed after 3 minutes of unweighted running [4]

4 Conclusion

• Neuromuscular adjustments differed between lower limb muscles

- They were similar between participants for the proximal muscles, but varied for the distal muscles
- They were not completed at the end of the unweighting transition

>>> Further analysis should consider the transition and unweighted running phases as a continuum
