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

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
INTRODUCTION


The ranking may differ according the respondents. • There is a great variability in the perceptions of the social subcategories among companies

STAKEHOLDER SUBGROUPS RATING (TOP 10)


Results highlight mainly the suppliers, R&D workers, and local publics actors, according to the respondents' perspective. In contrast, feedbacks show that social issues during extraction phase are not well known



Presence of local public and private actors stakeholders (in yellow) reflects the importance of territorial issues in offshore wind farm sector according to respondents' perspective

 - Civil engineering 55% Local public actors 48%
