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RESOLUTION OF CONDUCTIVE-RADIATIVE HEAT TRANSFER IN A SEMI-TRANSPARENT MEDIUM: FUNCTIONAL ESTIMATION OF THE RADIATIVE SOURCE TERM WITH MONTE CARLO METHOD

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Abstract - This study investigates using the Monte Carlo method to solve a conduction-radiation model in a semi-transparent material in a reduced computational time. Transient conduction in an absorbing/emitting and non-scattering grey medium in an academic configuration [1] is investigated where the radiative source term of the heat equation is estimated as a function of the temperature field to the power 4.

THE RADIATIVE SOURCE TERM

Estimation of the radiative source term with the **Monte Carlo method**:

The domain \mathcal{D} is discretized in :

- $N_i \times N_j$ conductive nodes (represented in purple)
- $(N_i 1) \times (N_j 1)$ conductive nodes (represented in green)

Discretization of Eq. (1) with **Finite Differences method**:

Functional estimation of the radiative source term:

$$\vec{\nabla} \cdot \vec{q}_{\mathsf{R}}[\mathsf{i}_{\mathsf{start}},\mathsf{j}_{\mathsf{start}}] \approx 4\sigma_{\mathsf{SB}}\delta_{\mathsf{x}}^2 k_{\mathsf{a}} \left(T[\mathsf{i}_{\mathsf{start}},\mathsf{j}_{\mathsf{start}}]^4 - \sum_{i=0}^{N_i-1}\sum_{j=0}^{N_j-1}\frac{N_{i,j}}{N_{\mathsf{MC}}}T[i,j]^4 \right)$$

CONCLUSIONS

- Proof of concept in an academic case proved the reduction of the computation time required for the resolution of the coupled problem.
- Function obtained without any assumption on the radiative behaviour or the

physics (no linearization) and not limited to grey media.

• Development of the method may be **extended to complex geometries** (2D/3D).

 \hookrightarrow Considering the development and implementation of the method in **inversion pro**cesses becomes practicable (sensitivity study to influencing parameters before inversing parallel hot wire measurements [2]).
