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# Degeneration of families of projective hypersurfaces and Hodge conjecture

#### Abstract

We prove by induction on dimension the Hodge conjecture for smooth complex projective varieties. Let X be a smooth complex projective variety. Then X is birational to a possibly singular projective hypersurface, hence to a smooth projective variety  $E_0$  which is a component of a normal crossing divisor  $E = \bigcup_{i=0}^{r} E_i \subset Y$  which is the singular fiber of a pencil  $f: Y \to \mathbb{A}^1$  of smooth projective hypersurfaces. Using the smooth hypersurface case ([5] theorem 1), the nearby cycle functor on mixed Hodge module with rational de Rham factor, and the induction hypothesis, we prove that an Hodge class of  $E_0$  is absolute Hodge, more precisely the locus of Hodge classes inside the algebraic vector bundle given the De Rham cohomology the rational deformation of  $E_0$  is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ . By [4] theorem 4, we get the Hodge conjecture for  $E_0$ . By the induction hypothesis we also have the Hodge conjecture for X.

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# 1 Introduction

The main result of this article is an inductive proof of the Hodge conjecture using the results of [4] and [5]. More precisely, assuming the Hodge conjecture for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1, the property of satisfying the Hodge conjecture for connected smooth projective varieties of dimension d is a birational invariant (proposition 1). On the other hand, if X is a connected smooth projective variety of dimension d, there exists (see proposition 2) a family of smooth projective hypersurfaces  $f_X : Y \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}}$  with

- Y a smooth complex algebraic variety,  $f_X$  flat projective,
- $Y_s := f_X^{-1}(s) \subset \mathbb{P}^{d+1}_{\mathbb{C}}$  for  $s \in \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus 0$  are smooth projective hypersurfaces,
- $E := f_X^{-1}(0) = \bigcup_{i=0}^r E_i \subset Y$  is a normal crossing divisor and  $E_0$  is birational to X.

Assuming the Hodge conjecture for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1, we then prove the Hodge conjecture for the  $E_i$ , more specifically for  $E_0$  as follows: We consider its canonical rational deformation  $\tilde{f}_X : \mathcal{Y} \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}} \times S$  with

•  $\mathcal{Y}$  a smooth algebraic variety over  $\mathbb{Q}, S \subset \mathbb{A}^s_{\mathbb{Q}}$  an open subset,  $\tilde{f}_X$  flat projective

• 
$$Y = \tilde{f}_X^{-1}(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{O}} \times \{t\}), f_X = \tilde{f}_X \times_S \{t\}, \text{ with } t \in S(\mathbb{C})$$

- $\mathcal{E} = \bigcup_{i=0}^{r} \mathcal{E}_i := \tilde{f}_X^{-1}(\{0\} \times S) \subset \mathcal{Y}$  is a normal crossing divisor,  $\tilde{f}_{X,0} : \mathcal{E}_I := \bigcap_{i \in I} \mathcal{E}_i \to S$  smooth projective for each  $I \subset [0, \ldots, r], \mathcal{E}_{\mathbb{C},t} = E$ ,
- $\tilde{f}_X \times_{\mathbb{A}^1} (\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) \mathcal{Y}^o \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{O}} \setminus 0$  has fibers which are smooth projective hypersurfaces.

We then have the exact sequence of geometric mixed Hodge module over S (in fact of geometric variation of mixed Hodge structures over S)

$$\oplus_{(i,j)\subset[1,\dots,r]}^{r} E^{2p-2}_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_{ij}/S) \xrightarrow{(i_{Ji!})} \oplus_{i=0}^{r} E^{2p}_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_{i}/S) \xrightarrow{(Sp_{\mathcal{E}_{i}/\tilde{f}_{X}})_{0\leq i\leq r}} H^{2p} \Phi_{0} E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{Y}^{o}/((\mathbb{A}^{1}_{\mathbb{Q}}\backslash 0)\times S)).$$

whose de Rham part are morphism of filtered vector bundle over S with Gauss-Manin connexion defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ . Since for  $0 \leq i \leq r$ ,  $E_{Hdg}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_i/S)$  is a geometric variation of pure Hodge structures, this exact sequence split, in particular

$$E_{Hdg}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}}) = l_{0j!}(\oplus_{j=0}^{r} E_{Hdg}^{2p-2}(\mathcal{E}_{0j,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})) \oplus Sp_{\mathcal{E}_{0}/\tilde{f}_{X}}(E_{Hdg}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})).$$

Let  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$ , where we recall  $E_0 = \mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C},t}$ . Then,

$$\lambda = \lambda^{K} + \lambda^{G} \in F^{p} H^{2p}(E_{0}^{an}, \mathbb{Q}), \ \lambda^{K} \in \bigoplus_{J \in R} i_{0j!} F^{p-1} H^{2p-2}(E_{0j,\mathbb{C}}^{an}, \mathbb{Q}), \ \lambda^{G} \in Sp_{E_{0}/f_{X}}(F^{p} H^{2p}(E_{0}^{an}, \mathbb{Q})).$$

The locus of Hodge classes passing through  $\lambda$  (see [6])

$$\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda) := \pi_S(\lambda \times \tilde{S}_{\mathbb{C}}) \cap F^p E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}}) = \mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^K) \cap \mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^G) \subset E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$$

is the intersection of two complex algebraic subvariety of the De Rham vector bundle, where  $\pi_S : H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{C}) \times \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \to E^{2p,an}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$  is the morphism given by the universal covering  $\pi_S : \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \to S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}$ . Now,

• by [5] theorem 1, the Hodge conjecture holds for projective hypersurfaces, hence

$$Sp_{\mathcal{E}_0/\tilde{f}_X}(\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^G)) = \overline{\mathbb{V}^p_{(\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) \times S}(Sp_{E_0/f_X}(\lambda^G))} \cap p^{-1}(0 \times S_{\mathbb{C}}) \subset E^{2p}_{DR,V_0}(\mathcal{Y}_{\mathbb{C}}/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \times S_{\mathbb{C}}))$$

is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ ,

• assuming the Hodge conjecture for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1

$$\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^K) = i_{0J!}(\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^K)) \subset E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$$

is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ .

Hence,  $\mathbb{V}_{S}^{p}(\lambda) \subset E_{DR}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$  is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ . By [4] theorem 4, we get

$$\lambda = [Z] \in H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{Q}), \ Z \in \mathcal{Z}^p(E_0).$$

Since  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$  and  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$  are arbitrary, this proves the Hodge conjecture for  $E_0$ . Since X is birational to  $E_0$ , the Hodge conjecture for  $E_0$  and the induction hypothesis implies the Hodge conjecture for X.

# 2 Preliminaries and notations

#### 2.1 Notations

- Denote by Top the category of topological spaces and RTop the category of ringed spaces.
- Denote by Cat the category of small categories and RCat the category of ringed topos.
- For  $S \in \text{Cat}$  and  $X \in S$ , we denote  $S/X \in \text{Cat}$  the category whose objects are Y/X := (Y, f) with  $Y \in S$  and  $f: Y \to X$  is a morphism in S, and whose morphisms Hom((Y', f'), (Y, f)) consists of  $g: Y' \to Y$  in S such that  $f \circ g = f'$ .
- Let  $(\mathcal{S}, O_S) \in \mathbb{R}$ Cat a ringed topos with topology  $\tau$ . For  $F \in C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$ , we denote by  $k : F \to E_{\tau}(F)$ the canonical flasque resolution in  $C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$  (see [3]). In particular for  $X \in \mathcal{S}$ ,  $H^*(X, E_{\tau}(F)) \xrightarrow{\sim} \mathbb{H}^*_{\tau}(X, F)$ .
- For  $f : \mathcal{S}' \to \mathcal{S}$  a morphism with  $\mathcal{S}, \mathcal{S}' \in \operatorname{RCat}$ , endowed with topology  $\tau$  and  $\tau'$  respectively, we denote for  $F \in C_{O_S}(\mathcal{S})$  and each  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$ ,

$$-f^* := H^j \Gamma(\mathcal{S}, k \circ \mathrm{ad}(f^*, f_*)(F)) : \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}, F) \to \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}', f^*F), -f^* := H^j \Gamma(\mathcal{S}, k \circ \mathrm{ad}(f^{*mod}, f_*)(F)) : \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}, F) \to \mathbb{H}^j(\mathcal{S}', f^{*mod}F),$$

the canonical maps.

- For  $m : A \to B$ ,  $A, B \in C(\mathcal{A})$ ,  $\mathcal{A}$  an additive category, we denote  $c(A) : \text{Cone}(m : A \to B) \to A[1]$ and  $c(B) : B \to \text{Cone}(m : A \to B)$  the canonical maps.
- Denote by Sch  $\subset$  RTop the subcategory of schemes (the morphisms are the morphisms of locally ringed spaces). We denote by PSch  $\subset$  Sch the full subcategory of proper schemes. For a field k, we consider Sch /k := Sch / Spec k the category of schemes over Spec k. The objects are  $X := (X, a_X)$  with  $X \in$  Sch and  $a_X : X \to$  Spec k a morphism and the morphisms are the morphisms of schemes  $f : X' \to X$  such that  $f \circ a_{X'} = a_X$ . We then denote by
  - $\operatorname{Var}(k) = \operatorname{Sch}^{ft} / k \subset \operatorname{Sch} / k$  the full subcategory consisting of algebraic varieties over k, i.e. schemes of finite type over k,
  - $\operatorname{PVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{QPVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{Var}(k)$  the full subcategories consisting of quasi-projective varieties and projective varieties respectively,
  - $\operatorname{PSmVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{SmVar}(k) \subset \operatorname{Var}(k)$ ,  $\operatorname{PSmVar}(k) := \operatorname{PVar}(k) \cap \operatorname{SmVar}(k)$ , the full subcategories consisting of smooth varieties and smooth projective varieties respectively.
- Denote by AnSp(C) ⊂ RTop the subcategory of analytic spaces over C, and by AnSm(C) ⊂ AnSp(C) the full subcategory of smooth analytic spaces (i.e. complex analytic manifold).
- For  $X \in \operatorname{Var}(k)$  and  $X = \bigcup_{i \in I} X_i$  with  $i_i : X_i \hookrightarrow X$  closed embeddings, we denote  $X_{\bullet} \in \operatorname{Fun}(\Delta, \operatorname{Var}(k))$  the associated simplicial space, with for  $J \subset I$ ,  $i_{IJ} : X_I := \bigcap_{i \in I} X_i \hookrightarrow X_J := \bigcap_{i \in J} X_i$  the closed embedding.
- Let  $(X, O_X) \in \text{RTop}$ . We consider its De Rham complex  $\Omega_X^{\bullet} := DR(X)(O_X)$ .
  - Let  $X \in$  Sch. Considering its De Rham complex  $\Omega_X^{\bullet} := DR(X)(O_X)$ , we have for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$  its De Rham cohomology  $H_{DR}^j(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega_X^{\bullet})$ .
  - Let  $X \in \operatorname{Var}(k)$ . Considering its De Rham complex  $\Omega^{\bullet}_X := \Omega^{\bullet}_{X/k} := DR(X/k)(O_X)$ , we have for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$  its De Rham cohomology  $H^j_{DR}(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X)$ . The differentials of  $\Omega^{\bullet}_X := \Omega^{\bullet}_{X/k}$ are by definition k-linear, thus  $H^j_{DR}(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X)$  has a structure of a k vector space.

- Let  $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ . Considering its De Rham complex  $\Omega^{\bullet}_X := DR(X)(O_X)$ , we have for  $j \in \mathbb{Z}$  its De Rham cohomology  $H^j_{DR}(X) := \mathbb{H}^j(X, \Omega^{\bullet}_X)$ .
- For  $X \in \operatorname{AnSp}(\mathbb{C})$ , we denote  $\alpha(X) : \mathbb{C}_X \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_X$  the embedding in C(X). For  $X \in \operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$ ,  $\alpha(X) : \mathbb{C}_X \hookrightarrow \Omega^{\bullet}_X$  is an equivalence usu local by Poincare lemma.
- We denote  $\mathbb{I}^n := [0,1]^n \in \text{Diff}(\mathbb{R})$  (with boundary). For  $X \in \text{Top}$  and R a ring, we consider its singular cochain complex

$$C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X,R) := (\mathbb{Z}\operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Top}}(\mathbb{I}^*,X)^{\vee}) \otimes R$$

and for  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$  its singular cohomology  $H^l_{\text{sing}}(X, R) := H^n C^*_{\text{sing}}(X, R)$ . For  $f: X' \to X$  a continuous map with  $X, X' \in \text{Top}$ , we have the canonical map of complexes

$$f^*: C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R) \to C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R), \sigma \mapsto f^*\sigma := (\gamma \mapsto \sigma(f \circ \gamma)).$$

In particular, we get by functoriality the complex

$$C^*_{X,R \operatorname{sing}} \in C_R(X), \ (U \subset X) \mapsto C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(U,R)$$

We recall that

- For  $X \in$  Top locally contractible, e.g.  $X \in$  CW, and R a ring, the inclusion in  $C_R(X)$  $c_X : R_X \to C^*_{X,R \text{ sing}}$  is by definition an equivalence top local and that we get by the small chain theorem, for all  $l \in \mathbb{Z}$ , an isomorphism  $H^l c_X : H^l(X, R_X) \xrightarrow{\sim} H^l_{\text{sing}}(X, R)$ .
- For  $X \in \text{Diff}(\mathbb{R})$ , the restriction map

 $r_X : \mathbb{Z} \operatorname{Hom}_{\operatorname{Diff}(\mathbb{R})}(\mathbb{I}^*, X)^{\vee} \to C^*_{\operatorname{sing}}(X, R), \ w \mapsto w : (\phi \mapsto w(\phi))$ 

is a quasi-isomorphism by Whitney approximation theorem.

#### 2.2 Birational projective varieties and Hodge conjecture

In this subsection, we recall that assuming the Hodge conjecture for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1, the property of satisfying the Hodge conjecture for connected smooth projective varieties of dimension d is a birational invariant :

- **Proposition 1.** (i) Let  $X \in PSmVar(\mathbb{C})$  connected of dimension d. Let  $\epsilon : \tilde{X}_Z \to X$  be the blow up of X along a smooth closed subvariety  $Z \subset X$ . Assume the Hodge conjecture hold for smooth complex projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1. Then the Hodge conjecture hold for X if and only if it hold for  $\tilde{X}_Z$ .
- (ii) Let  $X, X' \in PSmVar(\mathbb{C})$  connected of dimension d. Assume the Hodge conjecture hold for smooth complex projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1. If X is birational to X', then the Hodge conjecture hold for X if and only if it hold for X'

*Proof.* (i): Follows from the fact that

$$(\epsilon^*, \oplus_{l=1}^c i_{E*}((-).h^{l-1})) : H^k(X, \mathbb{Q}) \oplus \oplus_{l=1}^c H^{k-2l}(E, \mathbb{Q}) \to H^k(\tilde{X}_Z, \mathbb{Q})$$

is an isomorphism of Hodge structures for each  $k \in \mathbb{Z}$ , where  $c = \operatorname{codim}(Z, X)$ ,  $i_E : E \hookrightarrow \tilde{X}_Z$  is the closed embedding,  $\epsilon_{|E} : E \to Z$  being a projective vector bundle.

(ii):Follows from (i) since if  $\pi : X^o \to X'$  is a birational map,  $X^o \subset X$  being an open subset, then X is connected to X' by a sequence of blow up of smooth projective varieties with smooth center by [1].

### 2.3 A family of smooth projective hypersurfaces associated to a smooth projective variety

In this subsection, we recall that given a smooth complex projective variety X, there exists a family of smooth complex projective hypersurfaces which degenerates into a normal crossing divisor with one irreducible component birational to X.

**Proposition 2.** Let  $X \in PSmVar(\mathbb{C})$  connected. Then there exists a family of smooth projective hypersurfaces  $f_X : Y \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}}$  with

- $Y \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}), f_X \text{ flat projective,}$
- $Y_s := f_X^{-1}(s) \subset \mathbb{P}^{d+1}_{\mathbb{C}}$  for  $s \in \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus 0$  are smooth projective hypersurfaces,
- $E := f_X^{-1}(0) = \bigcup_{i=0}^r E_i \subset Y$  is a normal crossing divisor and  $E_0$  is birational to X,

*Proof.* See [2] lemma . It use the fact that X is birational to a possibly singular projective hypersurface Y and consider the desingularization of a generic pencil passing through Y.

#### 2.4 The nearby cycle functor and the specialization map

Recall from [3] that for  $k \subset \mathbb{C}$  a subfield and  $S \in Var(k)$  quasi-projective, and  $l : S \hookrightarrow \tilde{S}$  a closed embedding with  $\tilde{S} \in SmVar(k)$ , we have the full subcategory

$$\mu: MHM_{k,gm}(S) \hookrightarrow PSh_{\mathcal{D}fil,S}(S) \times_I P(S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}})$$

consisting of geometric mixed Hodge module whose De Rham part is defined over k, where  $PSh_{\mathcal{D}(1,0)fil,S}(\tilde{S}) \times_I P_{fil}(S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}})$  is the category

- whose objects are  $((M, F, W), (K, W), \alpha)$  where (M, F, W) is a filtered  $D_{\tilde{S}}$  module supported on S, where  $l: S \hookrightarrow \tilde{S}$  is a closed embedding and  $\tilde{S} \in \text{SmVar}(k)$ , (K, W) is a filtered Perverse sheaf on  $S_{\mathbb{C}}^{an}$ , and  $\alpha: l_*(K, W) \otimes \mathbb{C} \to DR(\tilde{S})((M, W)^{an})$  is an isomorphism in  $D_{fil}(\tilde{S}_{\mathbb{C}}^{an})$ .

using the fact that the V-filtration is defined over k. Then, by [3] theorem , we get for  $S \in Var(k)$  quasi-projective and  $l: S \hookrightarrow \tilde{S}$  is a closed embedding with  $\tilde{S} \in SmVar(k)$  an embedding

$$\iota: D(MHM_{k,gm}(S)) \hookrightarrow D_{\mathcal{D}fil,S}(\hat{S}) \times_I D(S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}})$$

consisting of mixed Hodge module whose De Rham part is defined over k, where  $D_{\mathcal{D}(1,0)fil,S}(S) \times_I D_{fil,c}(S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}})$  is the category

- whose objects are  $((M, F, W), (K, W), \alpha)$  where (M, F, W) is a complex of filtered  $D_{\tilde{S}}$  module supported on S, (K, W) is a filtered complex of presheaves on  $S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}$  whose cohomology are constructible sheaves, and  $\alpha : l_*(K, W) \otimes \mathbb{C} \to DR(\tilde{S})((M, W)^{an})$  is an isomorphism in  $D_{fil}(\tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}})$ .
- whose morphism are,

and the six functor formalisms :

$$D(MHM_{k,gm}(-)) : \operatorname{Var}(k) \mapsto \operatorname{TriCat}, \ S \mapsto D(MHM_{k,gm}(S)), \ (f:T \to S) \mapsto (f^*, f_*) : D(MHM_{k,gm}(S)) \to D(MHM_{k,gm}(T)), \ (f_!, f^!) : D(MHM_{k,gm}(T)) \to D(MHM_{k,gm}(S))$$

and for  $D \subset S$  a (Cartier) divisor the nearby cycle functor

$$\Phi_D : D(MHM_{k,gm}(S)) \to D(MHM_{k,gm}(D)),$$
  
$$\Phi_D((M, F, W), (K, W), \alpha) := (\Phi_D(M, F, W), \Phi_D(K, W), \Phi_D(\alpha)).$$

For  $f: X \to S$  a projective morphism with  $X, S \in \text{SmVar}(k)$ , we denote

$$E_{Hdg}(X/S) := f_* \mathbb{Z}_X^{Hdg} := (\int f(O_X, F), Rf_* \mathbb{Z}_{X_{\mathbb{C}}^{an}}, f_*\alpha(X)) \in D(MHM_{k,gm}(S)).$$

We then have the specialization map :

**Definition-Proposition 1.** Let k be field of characteristic zero. Let  $f : X \to \mathbb{A}^1_k \times S$  be a projective morphism with  $X, S \in \mathrm{SmVar}(k)$ . Assume that

- $f^o := f \otimes_{\mathbb{A}^1} (\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) : X^o \to (\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) \times S$  is smooth
- $E := f^{-1}(0 \times S) = \bigcup_{i=0}^{r} E_i \subset X$  is a normal crossing divisor and that for  $I \subset [0, \ldots r]$ ,  $f_{0,I} := f_{|E_I} : E_I := \bigcap_{i \in I} E_i \to S$  are smooth. We have by definition  $X^o = X \setminus E$ .

Denote for  $I \subset J \subset [0, \ldots r]$ ,  $i_{JI} : E_J \hookrightarrow E_I$  and  $i_I : E_I \hookrightarrow E$  the closed embeddings. We have then the generalized distinguished triangle in  $D(MHM_{k,gm}(E))$ , where  $R := [1, \ldots, r]$ ,

$$\oplus_{(i,j)\subset R}i_{ij*}i_{ij}^{!}\Phi_{E}\mathbb{Z}_{X^{o}}^{Hdg} = \oplus_{(i,j)\subset R}i_{ij*}\mathbb{Z}_{E_{ij}}^{Hdg}(-1)[-2] \xrightarrow{(\mathrm{ad}(i_{J!},i_{Ji})(i_{i*}i_{I}^{*}\Phi_{E}\mathbb{Z}_{X^{o}}^{Hdg}))}{(\mathrm{ad}(i_{J!},i_{Ji})(i_{I*}i_{I}^{*}\Phi_{E}\mathbb{Z}_{X^{o}}^{Hdg})} \rightarrow \Phi_{E}\mathbb{Z}_{X^{o}}^{Hdg}}$$

where the second equalities follows from the fact that  $E_I$  are smooth. Applying the functor  $(f \circ i_E)_*$ , we obtain the generalized distinguished triangle in  $D(MHM_{k,gm}(S))$

$$\oplus_{i=0}^r E_{Hdg}(E_i/S) \xrightarrow{(sp_{f,E_i}:=(f \circ i_E)_* \operatorname{ad}(i_i!, i_i^!)(\Phi_E \mathbb{Z}_{X^o}^{Hdg}))_{0 \leq 1 \leq r}} (f \circ i_E)_* (\Phi_E \mathbb{Z}_{X^o}^{Hdg}) = \Phi_0 E_{Hdg}(X^o/((\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) \times S))$$

$$\xrightarrow{(f \circ i_E)_* c(i_R * i_R^! \Phi_E \mathbb{Z}_{X^o}^{Hdg})} E_{Hdg}(E_R/S)(-r)[1-2r]$$

*Proof.* Follows from the six functors formalism, and the simplicial descent for the morphism  $i_{\bullet} : E_{\bullet} \to E$ in Fun $(\Delta, \operatorname{Var}(\mathbb{C}))$ , with  $E_{\bullet} \in \operatorname{Fun}(\Delta, \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}))$  (see [8]), noting that

$$\Phi_0 E_{Hdg}(X^o/((\mathbb{A}^1\backslash 0) \times S)) = ((f \circ i_E)_* E_{zar}(i_E^{*mod}\Omega^{\bullet}_{X/\mathbb{A}^1 \times S}(\log E)), \Phi_0 Rf_* \mathbb{Z}_{X^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}}, \Phi_0 f_* \alpha(X^o)).$$

# 3 Hodge conjecture for smooth projective varieties

**Theorem 1.** Let  $X \in \text{PSmVar}(\mathbb{C})$ . Then Hodge conjecture hold for X. That is, if  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$  and  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(X^{an}, \mathbb{Q}), \lambda = [Z]$  with  $Z \in \mathcal{Z}^p(X)$ .

*Proof.* Up to split X into its connected components, we may assume that X is connected of dimension d. The Hodge conjecture is true for curves and surfaces. Assume that the Hodge conjecture is true for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1. Consider by proposition 2 a family of smooth projective hypersurfaces  $f_X: Y \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}}$  with

- $Y \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{C}), f_X$  flat projective,
- $Y_s := f_X^{-1}(s) \subset \mathbb{P}^{d+1}_{\mathbb{C}}$  for  $s \in \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus 0$  are smooth projective hypersurfaces

•  $E := f_X^{-1}(0) = \bigcup_{i=0}^r E_i \subset Y$  is a normal crossing divisor and  $E_0$  is birational to X,

and its canonical rational deformation  $\tilde{f}_X : \mathcal{Y} \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}} \times S$  with

- $\mathcal{Y} \in \operatorname{SmVar}(\mathbb{Q}), S \subset \mathbb{A}^s_{\mathbb{Q}}$  an open subset,  $\tilde{f}_X$  flat projective
- $Y = \tilde{f}_X^{-1}(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{O}} \times \{t\}), f_X = \tilde{f}_X \times_S \{t\}, \text{ with } t \in S(\mathbb{C})$
- $\mathcal{E} = \bigcup_{i=0}^{r} \mathcal{E}_i := \tilde{f}_X^{-1}(\{0\} \times S) \subset \mathcal{Y}$  is a normal crossing divisor,  $\tilde{f}_{X,0} : \mathcal{E}_I := \bigcap_{i \in I} \mathcal{E}_i \to S$  smooth projective for each  $I \subset [0, \ldots, r], \mathcal{E}_{\mathbb{C},t} = E$ ,
- $\tilde{f}_X \times_{\mathbb{A}^1} (\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) \mathcal{Y}^o \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}} \setminus 0$  has fibers which are smooth projective hypersurfaces.

We have by definition the commutative diagram in  $\mathrm{SmVar}(\mathbb{Q})$ 

$$\begin{array}{c|c} \mathcal{Y}^{o} & \xrightarrow{j} & \mathcal{Y} & \xrightarrow{i\varepsilon} & \mathcal{E} \\ & & & & & \downarrow \\ \tilde{f}_{X}^{o} & & & & \downarrow \\ \tilde{f}_{X} & & & & \downarrow \\ \mathcal{A}_{\mathbb{Q}}^{1} \setminus \{0\} \times S & \xrightarrow{j \times I_{S}} & \mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{Q}}^{1} \times S & \xleftarrow{i_{0} \times I_{S}} & \{0\} \times S \end{array}$$

whose squares are cartesian, j the open embedding and  $i_{\mathcal{E}}$  the closed embedding. Denote for  $I \subset [0, \ldots, r]$ ,  $i_I : \mathcal{E}_I \hookrightarrow \mathcal{E}$  and for  $I \subset J \subset [0, \ldots, r]$ ,  $i_{JI} : \mathcal{E}_J \to \mathcal{E}_I$  the closed embeddings. Then, definition-proposition 1 applied to  $\tilde{f}_X : \mathcal{Y} \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}} \times S$  gives the generalized distinguish in  $D(MHM_{\mathbb{Q},gm}(S))$ , where  $R := [1, \ldots, r]$ ,

$$E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_R/S)(r)[-2r] \to \cdots \oplus_{(i,j)\in R} E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_{ij}/S)(-1)[-2] \xrightarrow{(i_{Ji1}:=(\tilde{f}_X \circ i_{\mathcal{E}})_* (\operatorname{ad}(i_{Ji1}, i_{Ji}^!)(\mathbb{Z}_{E_i})))_{J=(i,j)\subset R}} \oplus_{i=0}^r E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_i/S) \xrightarrow{(Sp_{\mathcal{E}_i/\tilde{f}_X}:=(\tilde{f}_X \circ i_{\mathcal{E}})_* \operatorname{ad}(i_{i!}, i_i^!)(\Phi_{\mathcal{E}, \tilde{f}_X}))_{0 \le i \le r}} \oplus_0 E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{Y}^o/((\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{Q}}^1 \setminus 0) \times S))) \xrightarrow{(\tilde{f}_X \circ i_{\mathcal{E}})_* c(i_{R1}i_R^! \Phi_{\mathcal{E}}\mathbb{Z}_{\mathcal{Y}^o})} E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_R/S)(r)[-2r+1]$$

given in definition-proposition 1. Let  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$ . Taking the cohomology to this distinguish triangle, we get in particular the exact sequence in  $MHM_{\mathbb{Q},qm}(S)$ 

$$\oplus_{(i,j)\subset R}^{r} E_{Hdg}^{2p-2}(\mathcal{E}_{ij}/S) \xrightarrow{(i_{Ji!})} \oplus_{i=0}^{r} E_{Hdg}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{i}/S) \xrightarrow{(Sp_{\mathcal{E}_{i}/\tilde{f}_{X}})_{0\leq i\leq r}} H^{2p} \Phi_{0} E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{Y}^{o}/((\mathbb{A}_{\mathbb{Q}}^{1}\backslash 0)\times S)).$$

Since  $H^{2p}E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_0/S) \in MHM_{\mathbb{Q},gm}(S)$  is a geometric variation of pure Hodge structure, and since the category of polarized variation of pure Hodge structure is semi-simple ([7]), this exact sequence split in  $MHM(S_{\mathbb{C}})$ , in particular we get for i = 0, the splitting in  $MHM(S_{\mathbb{C}})$ 

$$H^{2p}E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}}) = i_{J0!}(\oplus_{j\in R}H^{2p-2}E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_{0j,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})) \oplus Sp_{\mathcal{E}_0/\tilde{f}_X}(H^{2p}E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})).$$

For  $\lambda \in H^{2p}(\mathcal{E}^{an}_{0,\mathbb{C},t'},\mathbb{Q}), t' \in S(\mathbb{C})$ , we consider  $\pi_S : \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \to S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}$  the universal covering in AnSm( $\mathbb{C}$ ) and

$$\mathbb{V}_S(\lambda) := \pi_S(\lambda) \subset E_{DR}^{2p,an}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$$

with  $\pi_S: \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \times H^{2p}(\mathcal{E}^{an}_{0,t'}, \mathbb{C}) \to E^{2p,an}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$  the universal covering and

$$\mathbb{V}_{S}^{p}(\lambda) := \mathbb{V}_{S}(\lambda) \cap F^{p} E_{DR}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}}) \subset E_{DR}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}}),$$

which is a algebraic subvariety by [6]. We have

$$H^{2p}E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{Y}^o/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\backslash 0)\times S)) = ((E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\backslash 0)\times S)), F), R^{2p}\tilde{f}_{X*}\mathbb{Z}_{\mathcal{Y}^o}, \tilde{f}_{X*}\alpha(\mathcal{Y}^o)) \in MHM_{\mathbb{Q},gm}(S)$$

By [8], the filtered vector bundle

$$(E_{DR}^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}^o/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\backslash 0)\times S)), F) = H^{2p}\tilde{f}_{X*}E_{zar}(\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathcal{Y}^o/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\backslash 0)\times S}) \in \operatorname{Vect}_{\mathcal{D}fil}(S)$$

extend to a filtered vector bundle

$$(E_{DR,V_0}^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\times S)),F) = H^{2p}\tilde{f}_{X*}E_{zar}(\Omega^{\bullet}_{\mathcal{Y}/\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\times S}(\log \mathcal{E}) \in \operatorname{Vect}_{\mathcal{D}fil}(S)$$

such that

$$H^{2p}\Phi_0 E_{Hdg}(\mathcal{Y}^o/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\backslash 0)\times S)) = (i_0^{*mod}(E_{DR,V_0}^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{Q}}\times S)), F), (\Phi_0 R^{2p}\tilde{f}_{X*}\mathbb{Z}_{\mathcal{Y}^o}, W), \Phi_0\tilde{f}_{X*}\alpha(\mathcal{Y}^o)).$$
  
For

$$\alpha \in H^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}^{an}_{(s,t')}, \mathbb{Q}) = \mathbb{H}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}^{an}_{t'}, \Phi_0 R \tilde{f}_{X*} \mathbb{Q}_{\mathcal{Y}^o}), \, (s,t') \in (\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}}$$

we consider

•  $\pi_{S,G_m} = \pi_S \times \pi_{G_m} : \tilde{G}_m \times \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \to (\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}$  the universal covering in  $\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$  and  $\mathbb{V}_{(\mathbb{A}^1 \backslash 0) \times S}(\alpha) := \pi_{S,G_m}(\alpha) \subset E^{2p,an}_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}})$ with  $\pi_{S,G_m} : \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \times \tilde{G}_m \times H^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}^{an}_{(s,t')}, \mathbb{C}) \to E^{2p,an}_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$  and

$$\mathbb{V}^{p}_{(\mathbb{A}^{1}\setminus 0)\times S}(\alpha) := \mathbb{V}_{(\mathbb{A}^{1}\setminus 0)\times S}(\alpha) \cap F^{p} E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^{o}_{\mathbb{C}}/(\mathbb{A}^{1}_{\mathbb{C}}\setminus 0)\times S_{\mathbb{C}}) \subset E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^{o}_{\mathbb{C}}/(\mathbb{A}^{1}_{\mathbb{C}}\setminus 0)\times S_{\mathbb{C}})$$

which is a algebraic subvariety by [6],

•  $\pi_S: \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \to S^{an}_{\mathbb{C}}$  the universal covering in  $\operatorname{AnSm}(\mathbb{C})$  and

$$\mathbb{V}_S(\alpha) := \pi_S(\alpha) \subset H^{2p} \Phi_0 E_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}}))^{an}$$

with 
$$\pi_S: \tilde{S}^{an}_{\mathbb{C}} \times H^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}^{an}_{(s,t')}, \mathbb{C}) \to H^{2p}\Phi_0 E_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}}))^{an}$$
 and

$$\mathbb{V}^p_S(\alpha) := \mathbb{V}_S(\alpha) \cap F^p H^{2p} \Phi_0 E_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}}))^{an} \subset H^{2p} \Phi_0 E_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \backslash 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}}))^{an}.$$

Let  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$ , where we recall  $E_0 = \mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C},t}$ . Then,

 $\lambda = \lambda^{K} + \lambda^{G} \in F^{p} H^{2p}(E_{0}^{an}, \mathbb{Q}), \ \lambda^{K} \in \bigoplus_{J \in R} i_{0j!}(F^{p-1} H^{2p-2}(E_{0j}^{an}, \mathbb{Q})), \ \lambda^{G} \in Sp_{E_{0}/f_{X}}(F^{p} H^{2p}(E_{0}^{an}, \mathbb{Q}))$ and

$$\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda) = \mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^K) \cap \mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^G) \subset E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$$

Now,

• we have, by [6],

$$Sp_{\mathcal{E}_0/\tilde{f}_X}(\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^G)) = \mathbb{V}^p_S(Sp_{E_0/f_X}(\lambda^G)) = \overline{\mathbb{V}^p_{(\mathbb{A}^1\setminus 0)\times S}(Sp_{E_0/f_X}(\lambda^G))} \cap p^{-1}(0\times S_{\mathbb{C}})$$
$$\subset E^{2p}_{DR,V_0}(\mathcal{Y}_{\mathbb{C}}/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}}\times S_{\mathbb{C}}))$$

where  $p: E_{DR,V_0}^{2p}(\mathcal{Y}_{\mathbb{C}}/(\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \times S_{\mathbb{C}})) \to \mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \times S_{\mathbb{C}}$  is the projection (the first equality is obvious since  $sp_{\mathcal{E}_0/\tilde{f}_X}$  is a morphism of variation of mixed Hodge structures over S, for the second equality, the inclusion  $\subset$  is obvious, whereas the inclusion  $\supset$  follows from [6] lemma 2.11 and the invariant cycle theorem of a geometric variation of Hodge structures by strictness of the Hodge filtration), but by [5] theorem 1, the Hodge conjecture holds for projective hypersurfaces hence

$$\mathbb{V}^p_{(\mathbb{A}^1 \setminus 0) \times S}(Sp(\lambda^G)) \subset E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{Y}^o_{\mathbb{C}}/((\mathbb{A}^1_{\mathbb{C}} \setminus 0) \times S_{\mathbb{C}}))$$

is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ , hence  $\mathbb{V}_{S}^{p}(\lambda^{G}) \subset E_{DR}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0,\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$  is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ ,

• since the Hodge conjecture is true for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1 by induction hypothesis

$$\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^K) = i_{0,J!}(\mathbb{V}^p_S(\lambda^K)) \subset E^{2p}_{DR}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$$

is defined over  $\mathbb Q.$ 

Hence  $\mathbb{V}_{S}^{p}(\lambda) \subset E_{DR}^{2p}(\mathcal{E}_{0\mathbb{C}}/S_{\mathbb{C}})$  is defined over  $\mathbb{Q}$ . Thus, by [4] theorem 4,

$$\lambda = [Z] \in H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{Q}), \text{ with } Z \in \mathcal{Z}^p(E_0)$$

Since  $p \in \mathbb{Z}$  and  $\lambda \in F^p H^{2p}(E_0^{an}, \mathbb{Q})$  are arbitrary, the Hodge conjecture holds for  $E_0$ . Proposition 1(ii) and the fact that the Hodge conjecture is true for smooth projective varieties of dimension less or equal to d-1 by induction hypothesis then implies that Hodge conjecture holds for X, since X is birational to  $E_0$  and  $X, E_0 \in PSmVar(\mathbb{C})$  are connected of dimension d.

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
