

INTRODUCTION

French listeners exhibit difficulties with discrimination of non-words [1], French words [2] and Spanish words [3], differing in word accentual patterns.



Research objective

- Examine French listeners' ability to perceive native and non-native accentual word contrasts.
- Examine and compare the time-course of native and non-native accent processing by French listeners.

ELECTROPHYSIOLOGICAL RESULTS

Native accentual contrast


 Main effect of Condition with more negative values in the phonemic deviant condition and accentual deviant condition than in the identical condition.

Non-native accentual contrast

 Main effect of Condition with more negative values in the phonemic deviant condition than in both the accentual deviant and the identical conditions.

DISCUSSION & CONCLUSION

 French listeners react similarly to accentual contrasts and phonemic contrasts when the accentual patterns are native, but react differently when the accentual patterns are non-native.

Phonemic

Stimuli with non-native accentual contrasts are perceived as being identical in the early stages of processing.

> French listeners do not perceive non-native accentual contrasts.

HOWEVER

- Even though French listeners obtained more errors and longer RTs in the accentual than in the phonemic deviance, they still
 achieved a high level of accuracy (93%) in the non-native accentual contrast.
- > French listeners can use the change in accent location (non-native deviance) to perform certain tasks if their attention is directed to the accentual differences.

Conclusion: Despite a high level of performance in the discrimination tasks, French listeners do not perceive the difference in nonnative accentual contrasts (e.g. /'ʒyʁi/ and /ʒy'ʁi/) during unconscious and automatic speech perception processes.
