Energy to pace the heart? Sensing evoked potentials? 10-20 years later

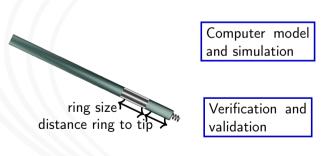

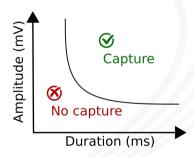
Question of interest

What are the stimulation pulse characteristics (voltage amplitude in V and pulse duration in ms) required for a bradychardia lead in bipolar (tip/ring) mode to capture (stimulate) healthy cardiac tissue?

Context: threshold test in animal experiments. Influence of the design of the lead, like geometry and contact properties ?



Input: design parameters



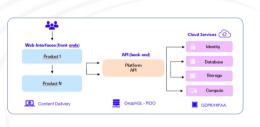
Output: Lapicque curve

Ideal objective: run trials on a web based platform, and obtain credible results





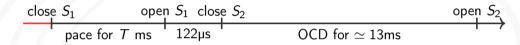

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Contact impedance model



- At pacing, creation of a "double layer" impedance
- Boundary layer related to the Debye length
- Literature is huge²

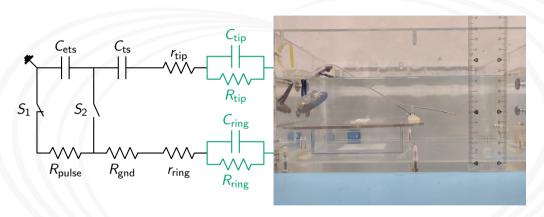


Figure: Passive bath \rightarrow def of contact model and parameter identification

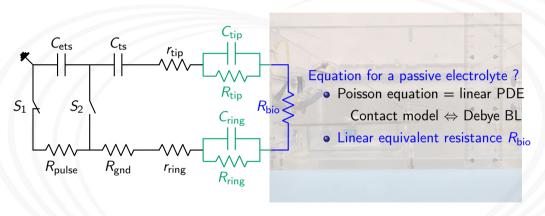
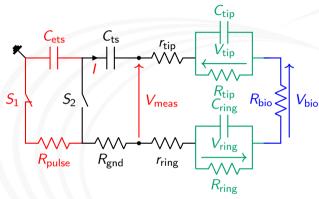


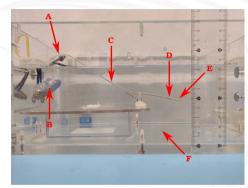
Figure: Passive bath \rightarrow def of contact model and parameter identification

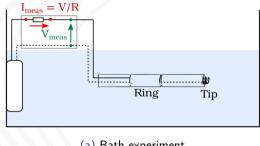

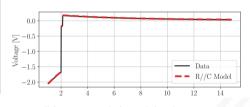

The passive bath experiments

- MICROPORT CRM BOREA pacemaker + VEGA leads
- Saline solution measured at $\sigma = 2.85 \text{mS/cm}$

• 9 datasets: $(0.25, 0.5, 1) \text{ ms} \times (1, 2, 4) \text{ V}$

Method to calibrate the contact parameters

- ullet L-BFGS-B from Python Scipy, restricted to a subset of \mathbb{R}^4
 - ▶ ODE solved semi-analytically (i.e. no approx. error)
 - ▶ First step in Log scale, $R \in (1, 1 \times 10^5)$, $\tau \in (1 \times 10^{-6}, 1)$
- ullet 1 optimisation for each dataset o 9 parameter sets

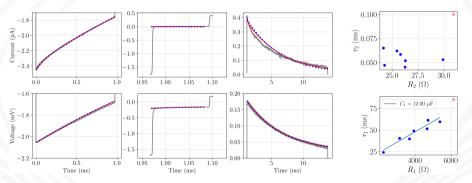


Figure: Current and voltage in each step, measures and model (left), and parameters (right)

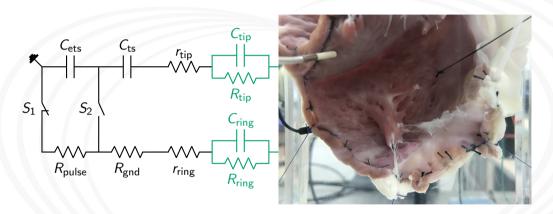


Figure: Animal experiment \rightarrow validation data

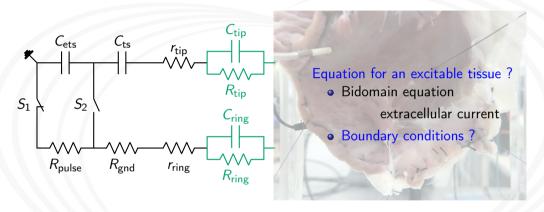
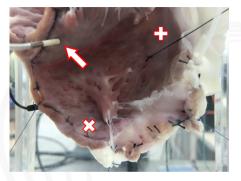


Figure: Animal experiment → validation data

Thresehold detection tests in animal experiments



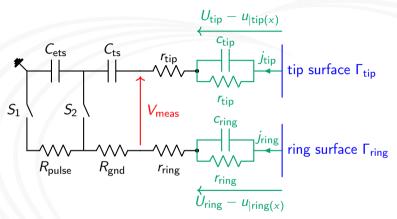
- Ventricular wedge preparation, 2 sheeps (now 3)
- 3 sites: apex (X), septum (\rightarrow) , base (+)
- screw fully deployed, perpendicular
- ullet Recording of $V_{
 m meas}^{\star}$, like in the bath
- Recording of distant EGMs with needle electrodes
- Optical signals + 9.4T MRI

Automatic threshold search by the pacemaker:

- For a fixed duration T (ms) 5 pulses at 1.5 Hz
- ullet Decrease voltage to locate the interval : last capturing o first non capturing
- Capture is decided by the pacemaker, and controlled through EGMs

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Bidomain coupled to the pacemaker – CEM³

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Energy estimate

• There is an inequality if energy, which states the energy associated to each (equivalent) dipole in the overall electrical circuit

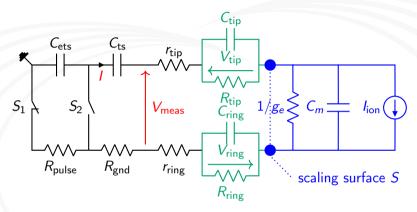

A surrogate 0D model



We need to rescale the current per unit of surface (ionic) to a current:

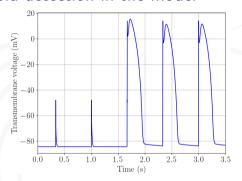

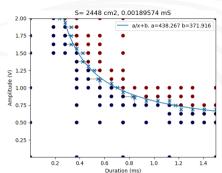

- How to choose S and g_e ?
- Our starting choice: $S=100 {\rm cm}^2$ and $g_e=10^{-2} {\rm mS}$, obtained from a volume of $1 {\rm mm}^3$

Threshold detection in the model





- Capture := more than 50% successful captures, seen on V_m
- ullet a 2D dichotomy algorithm o intervals $(V_{\sf min}({\mathcal T}), V_{\sf max}({\mathcal T}))$
- Rheobase V_{\star} (0.372 V) and chronaxie T_{\star} (1.18 ms) from the Lapicque law (LS fitting):

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First comparisons – experiments and 0D model, see⁵

- Beeler-Reuter ionic model, with parameters from CellML
- Contact parameters fixed from the bath experiments

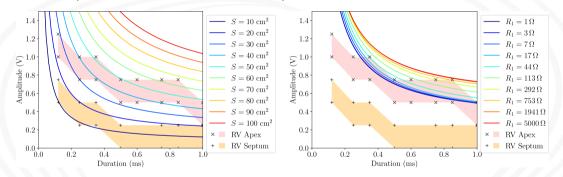


Figure: Comparison of Lapicque curves (solid lines) computed with different values of S (left) and R_{tip} (right). The shaded regions indicate where the experimental capture threshold is located.

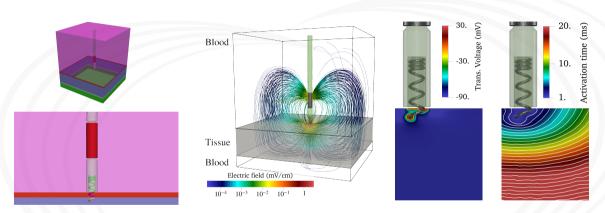
Remarks

• Pacemakers have very sparse covering of the Lapicque plane, but we model the pacemaker

$$\mathcal{T} \in \{0.12, 0.25, 0.35, 0.5, 0.75, 0.85, 1.00\} \text{ms}, \quad V \in \{2.0, 1.75, 1.5, 1.0, 0.75, 0.5, 0.25\} \\ \text{V} \in \{0.12, 0.25, 0.35, 0.5, 0.75, 0.85, 1.00\} \\ \text{ms}, \quad V \in \{0.12, 0.25, 0.35, 0.75, 0.85, 0.75$$

- Lapicque law fits well the model
- Lapicque law do not fit within the experimental regions
- (Too ?) many modeling simplification ?
 - ▶ 0D 1 cell
 - g_e and S: influence of $g_e \ll$ influence of S
 - ightharpoonup Contact properties in bath *versus* tissue ? Influence of $R_{\rm tip}$
 - BR model with CellML std parameters
- What about the V&V40 guidelines
- Fast computations, OK for prototyping ideas / computational procedures

Some preliminary 3D results I



Mesh resolution 6 μ m – 1.5mm, time-step 10 μ s, P1-Lagrange FEM, BDF2+RL2, BiCGStab Supra-threshold pacing, T=1ms and V=2.5V

Standard CellML BR model + electrical conductivity coefficients

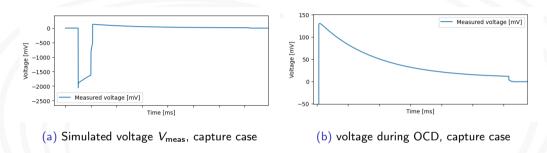


Figure: We obtain the expected behavior for $V_{\rm meas}$

NCV, discretization error, solver error: that is numerical analysis.

We provide many automatic tests (interpolation, quadrature, ODE solvers) and convergence tests on PDEs (Laplace, heat, reaction-diffusion) w/r to manufactured and reference solutions

Use error: on the web-based platform + within SQA

We cover credibility up to 4 or 5, while 2 is needed (risk analysis).

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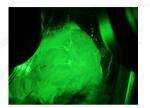

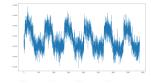
Calibrate model's parameters

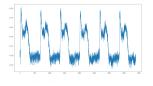
- Contact parameters → done (bath experiments)
- Ionic parameters → optical signal, pixel-wise, done
- Conductivity coefficients \rightarrow 9.4T MRI (300 μ m) + activation maps, partially done

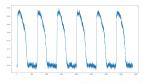
Compare to experiments for validation

Lapicque curves are within the experiment Lapicque regions? Computational challenge

Ionic parameters for the BR model







- BR has 2 parameters for the Na $^+$ current: g_{Na} and $g_{Na,c}$
- Optimisation technique developped in^a: compass search algorithm
- Automatic search in each pixel of each camera (2 camera)
- Using 6 consecutive pacings, beginning of the experiment
- Data has to be normalized (either baseline only or baseline + peak)

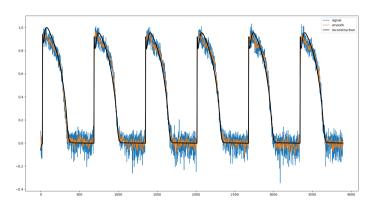


Figure: Exemple identification match. Raw signal (blue), filtered one (orange), and model (black).

Spatial distribution of g_{Na} and $g_{Na,c}$

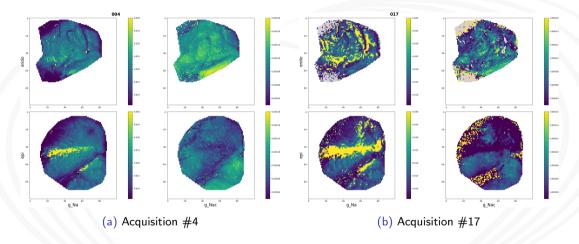


Figure: g_{Na} (left) and $g_{Na,c}$ (right) on endo (top) and epi (bottom) – 2 acquisitions.

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Endo / epi distribution of parameters

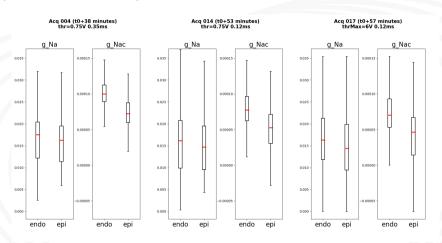
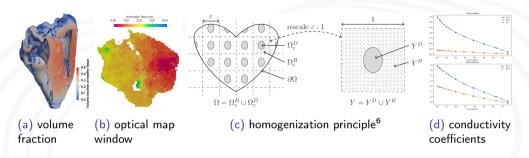


Figure: Statistical distribution of identified g_{Na} and $g_{Na,c}$
