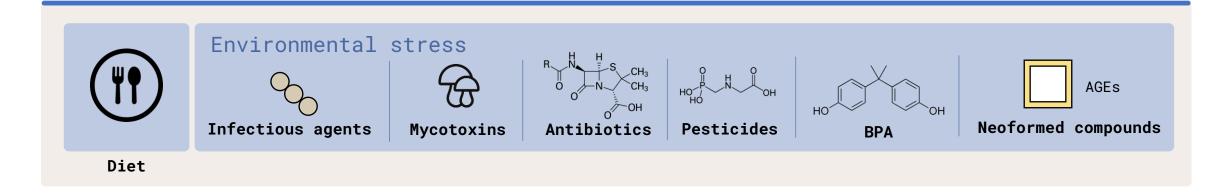

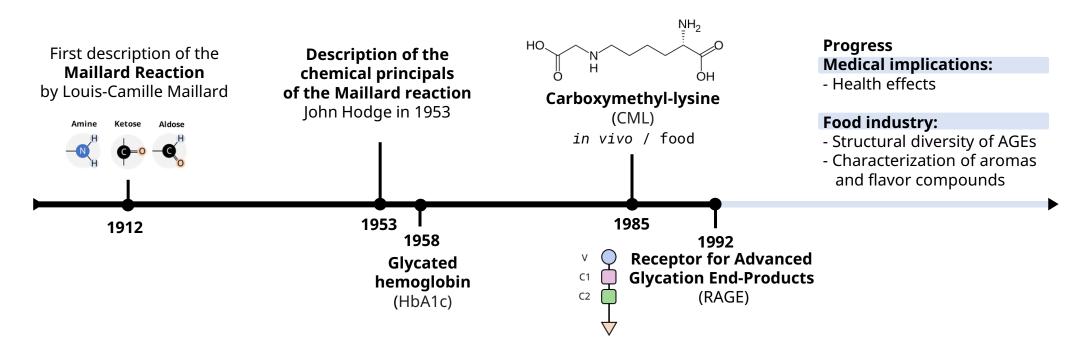

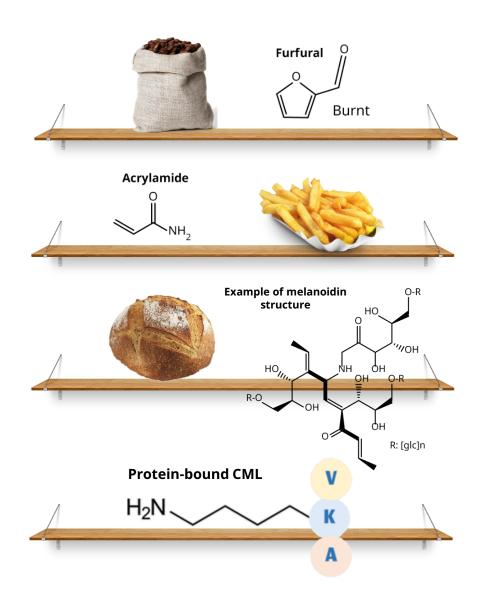

Introduction | Exogenous glycation



High heat **Exogenous AGEs** (Neoformed compounds) Example Infant formula Up tp 40.5 mg CML/100 g prot. Investigating the effects of dAGEs *Dietary protocols*

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Comparative characterization of **classical** and **alternative** methods of converting lysine into CML, investigating other glycation hotspots such as arginine residues as well as more complex forms of glycation products such as crosslinks.

Method to prevent nutritional loss associated with heat treatment.

Extensive use of quantitative and qualitative analytical methods (LC-MS/MS) and proteomics.

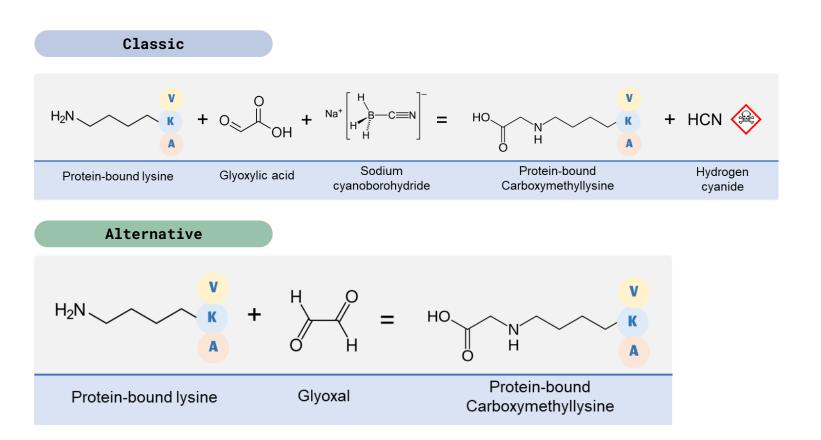
Evaluate the digestibility of modified protein in vivo.

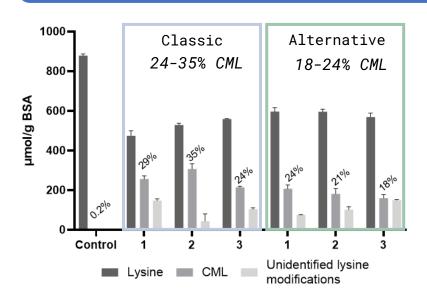

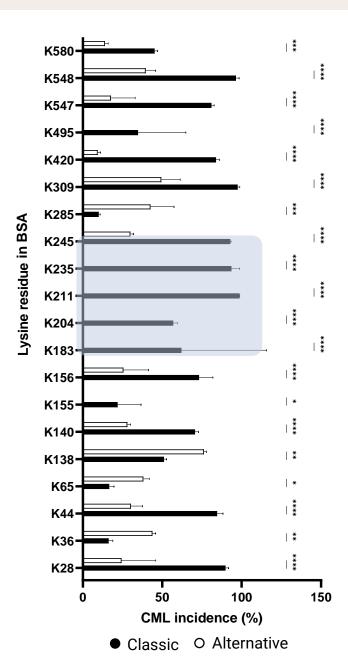
Lysine modifications

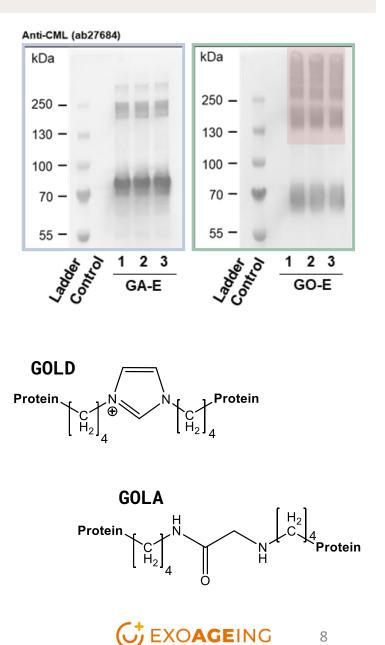


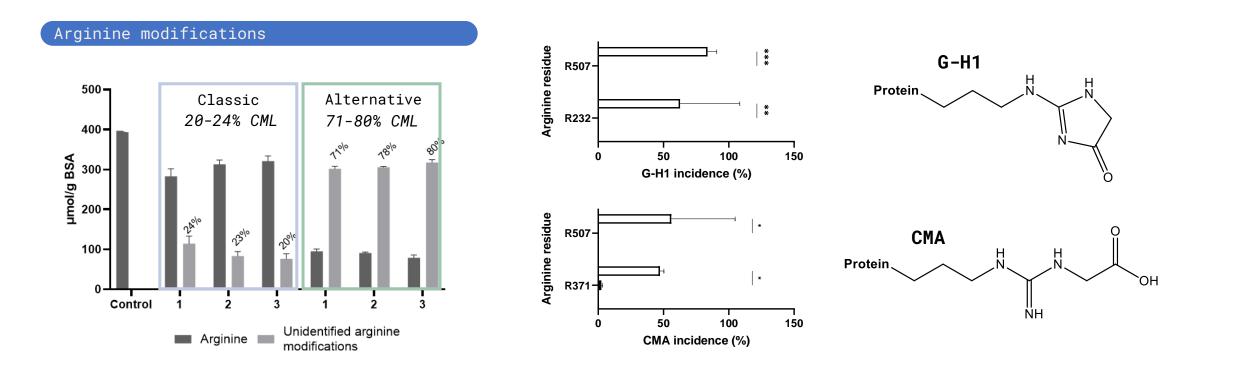
Classic method: Higher CML formation

Able to glycate lysine residues not occuring in alternative methods

Alternative method: Greater formation of high Molecular weight products Including glycation crosslinks GOLD-GOLA







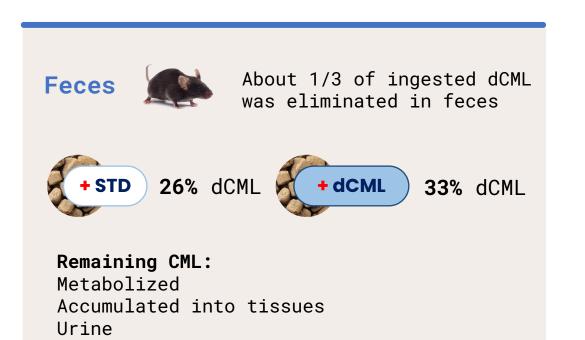
Argines are preferential targets of glycation

G-H1 was the main arginine product formed mainly withing glyoxal alternative method

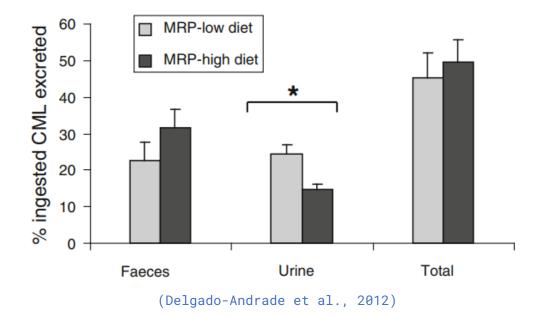




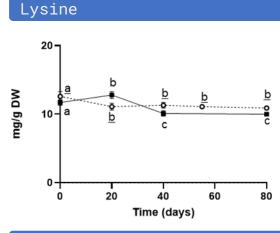




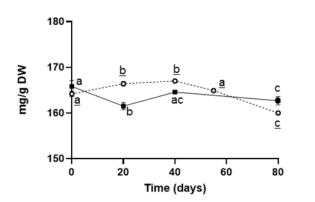

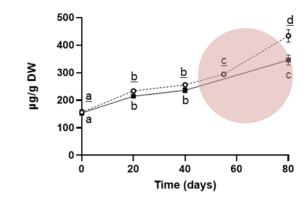


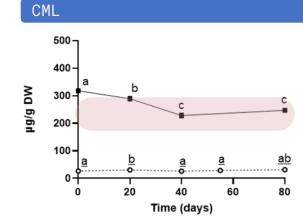


Total protein

Glycated mice diet Building and characterizing mice diet enriched in glycated bovine serum albumin

Key findings GEXOAGEING

The use of GA + cyanoborohydride remained the most effective way in terms of CML yield and the lower incidence of another glycation adducts

The use of glyoxal was demonstrated to be a reproducible method for CML production without the formation of HCN as side product

The extensive modification of BSA by glyoxal did not affect the fecal excretion of CML

No method is still known to the exclusive synthesis of CML.
