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INTEGRATION OF GAAS-BASED LATERAL FIELD EXCITATION (LFE) SENSOR WITH PDMS MICROFLUIDIC CHANNEL: SIMULATION AND EXPERIMENTAL VALIDATION



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The losses in acoustic signals strength is one of the biggest hurdles in the integration process of acoustic waves-based sensor with PDMS microfluidic channel, due to the viscoelasticity of PDMS. Here we design, simulate and experimentally validate two different structures of GaAs-PDMS integrated microfluidic devices, where we found that the impact of viscous damping from PDMS can be reduced by using a thicker GaAs frame around the suspended active plate area that confines the acoustic energy in the transducer and acts as a microfluidic channel.

Conclusion

We have demonstrated a new design, fabrication, and integration strategy of acoustic sensor with PDMS microfluidic channel without significantly

reducing acoustic signal strength and Q-factor, as shown in the simulation and experimental results of device B. This integration strategy allows applying this GaAs-PDMS microfluidic structures with integrated sensors for in-liquid chemical and biological sensors
