Large scale urban models are intrinsically flawed and do not reach their goals of long-term application to planning: **Requiem for large scale models in 1973** [Lee Jr, 1973]

Urban analytics and Smart Cities approaches may follow the same path if they ignore the past and the complexity of cities [Batty, 2014]

To foster relevance of large urban models:

- Transparency on data and implementation, reproducibility
- Validation of models and sub-models: from small simple models well validated to larger integrated models

 $\rightarrow$  Open, reproducible urban models can be shared, coupled into modular integrated models, tested and validated [Banos, 2013]

#### Scientific workflow systems

[Yu and Buyya, 2005] [Barker and Van Hemert, 2007]

 $\rightarrow$  Execution of numerical experiments and data processing in a systematic, reproducible and domain-specific way

- $\rightarrow$  Often coupled to High Performance Computing infrastructures
- ightarrow Flexibility with scripting languages and easier collaboration

#### **Proposed approach**

Build modular urban transportation models from the bottom-up using workflow systems, open source sub-models and open data

- ightarrow Sub-models coupled into the workflow, can be easily replaced
- ightarrow Reproducibility and transparency
- $\rightarrow$  Easier transferability of model application
- ightarrow Application of model validation methods

**Case study:** Construct a modular four-step multimodal transportation model using open source projects and data

#### Integrated models:

- MATSim model (MATSim Community) for the transportation system https://www.matsim.org/ [Horni et al., 2016]
- SPENSER model (University of Leeds) for the synthetic population https://github.com/nismod/microsimulation
- QUANT model (CASA, University College London) for spatial interactions to generate home-work plans http://quant.casa.ucl.ac.uk/ [Milton and Roumpani, 2019]
- spatialdata library (OpenMOLE community) for data processing https://github.com/openmole/spatialdata
   [Raimbault et al., 2020]

#### Data:

Generic for any Functional Urban Area (GHSL [Florczyk et al., 2019]) or any arbitrary area in the UK: NOMIS census, OrdnanceSurvey roads, Traveline National Dataset for public transport

#### Workflow systems:

- DAFNI facility funded by UKCRIC https://dafni.ac.uk
- OpenMOLE software https://openmole.org/ [Reuillon et al., 2013]

#### Implementation

Currently integrated into the DAFNI platform:

- synthetic SPENSER population with uniform job locations
- QUANT model to generate home-work commuting flows
- network and plans prepared into MATSim xml files and fed into a one-mode MATSim (multimodal version still tested locally)
- models integrated as Docker containers

## Data preparation

 $\rightarrow$  Road network preprocessing: implemented into the <code>spatialdata</code> scala library [Raimbault et al., 2020]



 $\rightarrow$  Public transport data: from TransXchange (TNDS) to GTFS using UK2GTFS R package [Morgan, 2021]; GTFS to MATSim xml schedule using pt2matsim library

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Platform developed for infrastructure research, providing dataset sharing, model upload, High-performance computing, workflow system. https://dafni.ac.uk

## Towards advanced validation experiments



**OpenMOLE integrates methods for:** sensitivity analysis, spatial sensitivity analysis, design of experiments, calibration, diversity search, inverse problems, model reduction.



#### Integration of OpenMOLE into DAFNI

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#### Developments

 $\rightarrow$  Integration of multi-modal MATSim, calibration of mode choice parameters

 $\rightarrow$  Visualisation of MATSim agents dynamics (MATSim visu features not open)

 $\rightarrow$  Dynamical strong coupling of QUANT and SPENSER to combine population projections with the transport model

#### Applications

 $\rightarrow$  Validation of sub-models and integrated models using advanced model validation methods

 $\rightarrow$  Use MATSim outputs to quantify effective densities in public transport: potential exposure indicators in the COVID-19 context

 $\rightarrow$  Impact of policies and interventions on transport system dynamics and potential contaminations

- No clear link between urban density and COVID-19 transmission [Hamidi et al., 2020], but concern about public transport [Tirachini and Cats, 2020]
- MATSim-based full epidemiological model [Müller et al., 2020]: difficulty to validate and systematically explored
- ightarrow Public transport density as proxy for potential transmission
- $\rightarrow$  To be computed downstream MATSim run using event xml files

 $\rightarrow$  Possible systematic exploration on all urban areas of home-work policies and modifications of agent schedules using genetic algorithms from OpenMOLE

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## Conclusion

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 $\rightarrow$  Open, reproducible and validated urban models as elementary bricks towards larger integrated models

ightarrow Open resource for teaching transport models
