Fundamentals of Energy

Energy = To extract ressource from environment and to convert it into work+heat

Example of converter: Human being who being fed, produces W and Heat:



Examples of conversion more powerful than human beings:



Energy: Man compared to Oil

Energy: comparison of human being with 1 gasoline liter

Human work by legs:

$80 \text{ kg (man)} + 10 \text{ kg (rucksack)} \times 2000 \text{ m (elevation)} \approx 0,5 \text{ kWh}$

Every other day, i.e., 100 kWh/year

Accounting for a minimum wage (20 k€/year) : 200 €/kWh



Human works by arms:

$6 \text{ m}^3 \text{ of soil elevated at 1 meter} \approx 0,05 \text{ kWh}$

Every other day, i.e., 10 kWh/year

At minimum wage : 2000 €/kWh



Energy developed by 1 unique liter of gasoline:

10 kWh (2 to 4 kWh mechanical), i.e. 10 to 100 times more than legs or arms

1,5 €/liter thus 0,4 €/kWh i.e. 500 to 5000 times less expensive

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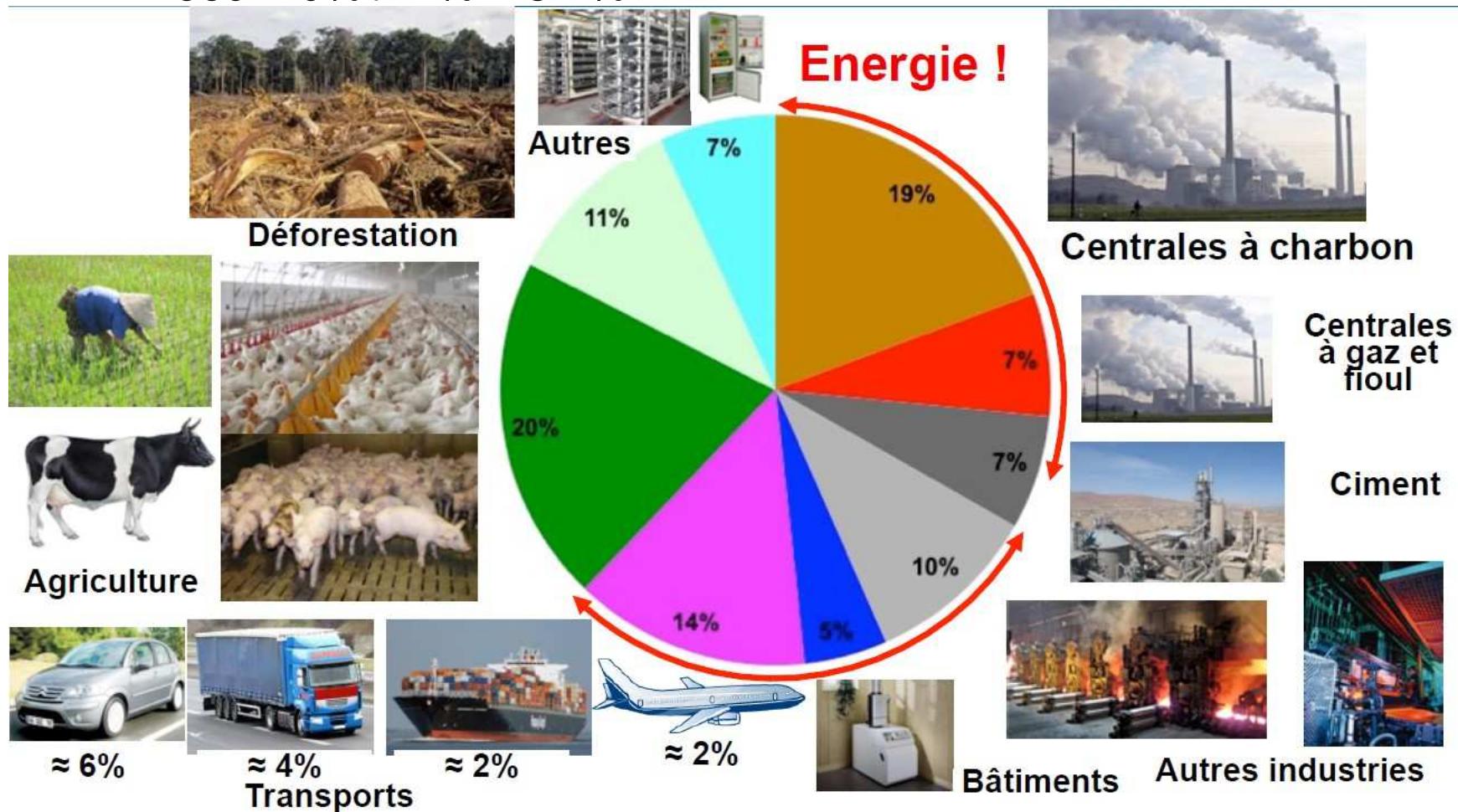
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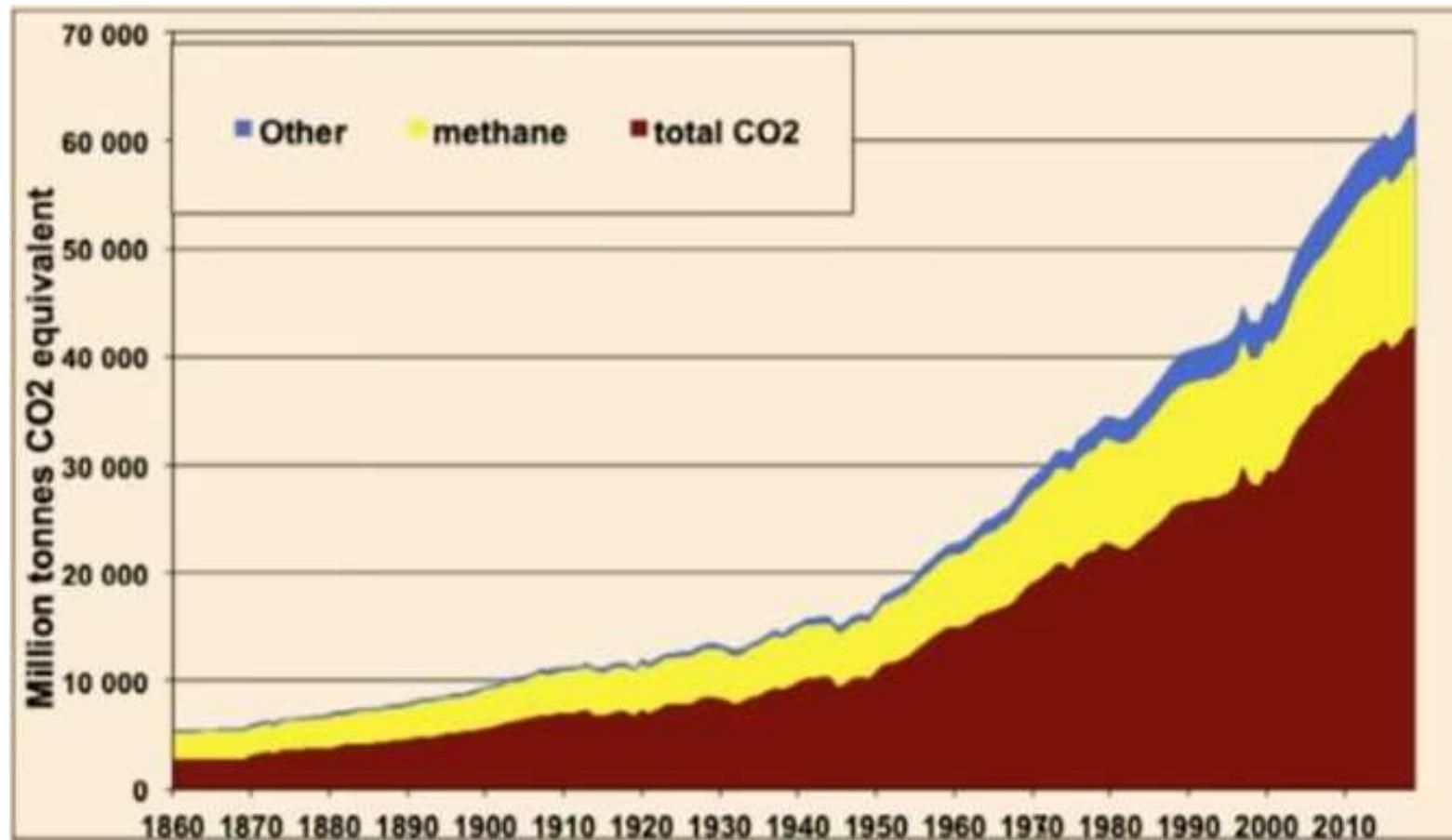
Sources of Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions

- Annual worldwide GHG emissions 2019: 60 Gigatonnes CO₂eq
 - Energy: 19%+7%+(40% of 7%)+10%+5%+14% = 58%
 - Food: 20%+11% = 31 %



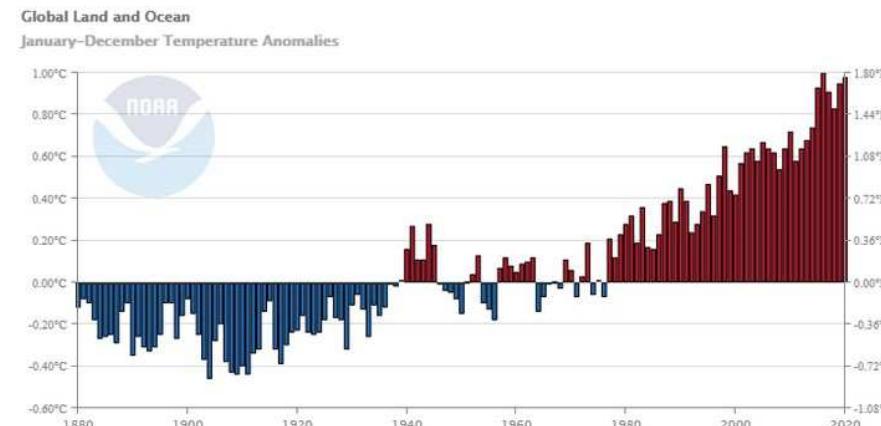
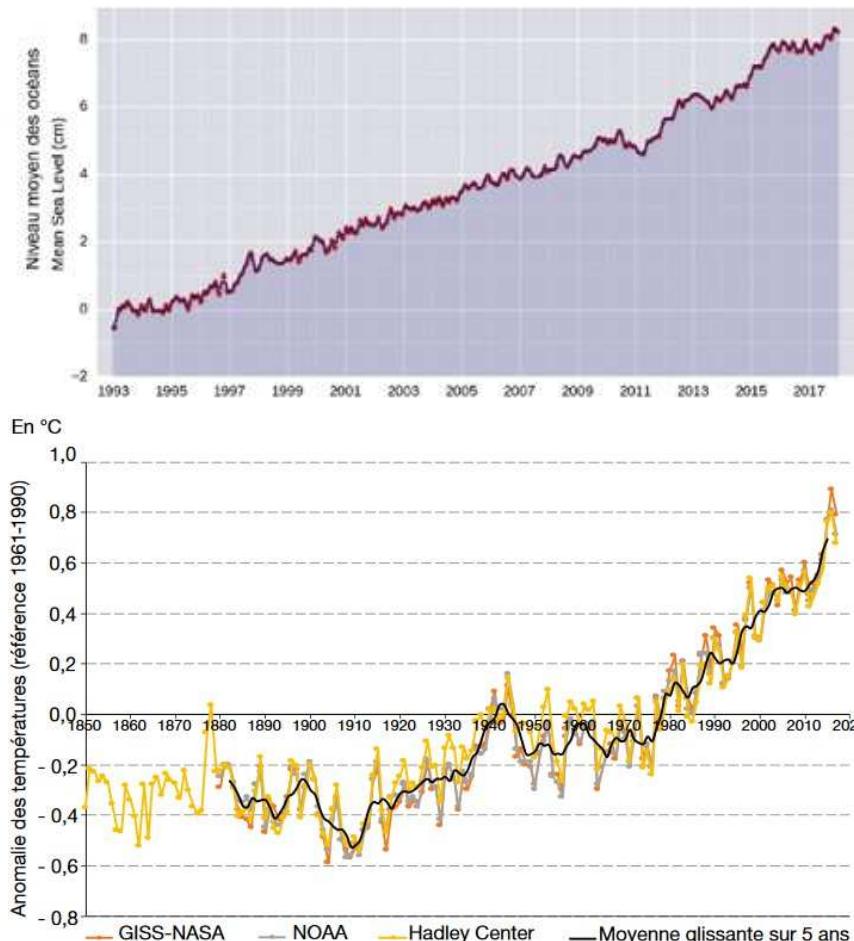
Greenhouse Gas (GHG): Emissions vs time

Temperature and Sea level Increase

- Sea level: >1,7 mm/year ; +26 à +98 cm en 2100 after IPCC
- Temperature increase is evaluated by so-called "anomaly": **+0.08°C/decade since 1880; +0.18°C/decade since 1981; +0.82°C/2011-2020.** Thus 2040 +1,5°C and 2060 +2°C. In these cases anomaly is the difference with 1901–2000 average temperature that is 13.9°C)

Temperature in Mountain and Arctic regions increase faster

- Russia and France have in common a greatest temperature increase compared to the average of earth because of Mountains or Latitude
- French Alpes compared to earth:
 - From 1880 to 2012, mean temperature in French Alpes increased of 2°C
 - From 1880 to 2012, mean temperature earth surface increased of 0.85 °C
 - Ossoue Glacier (Pyrénées) lost 112 m length and 16 m thickness from 2005 to 2015



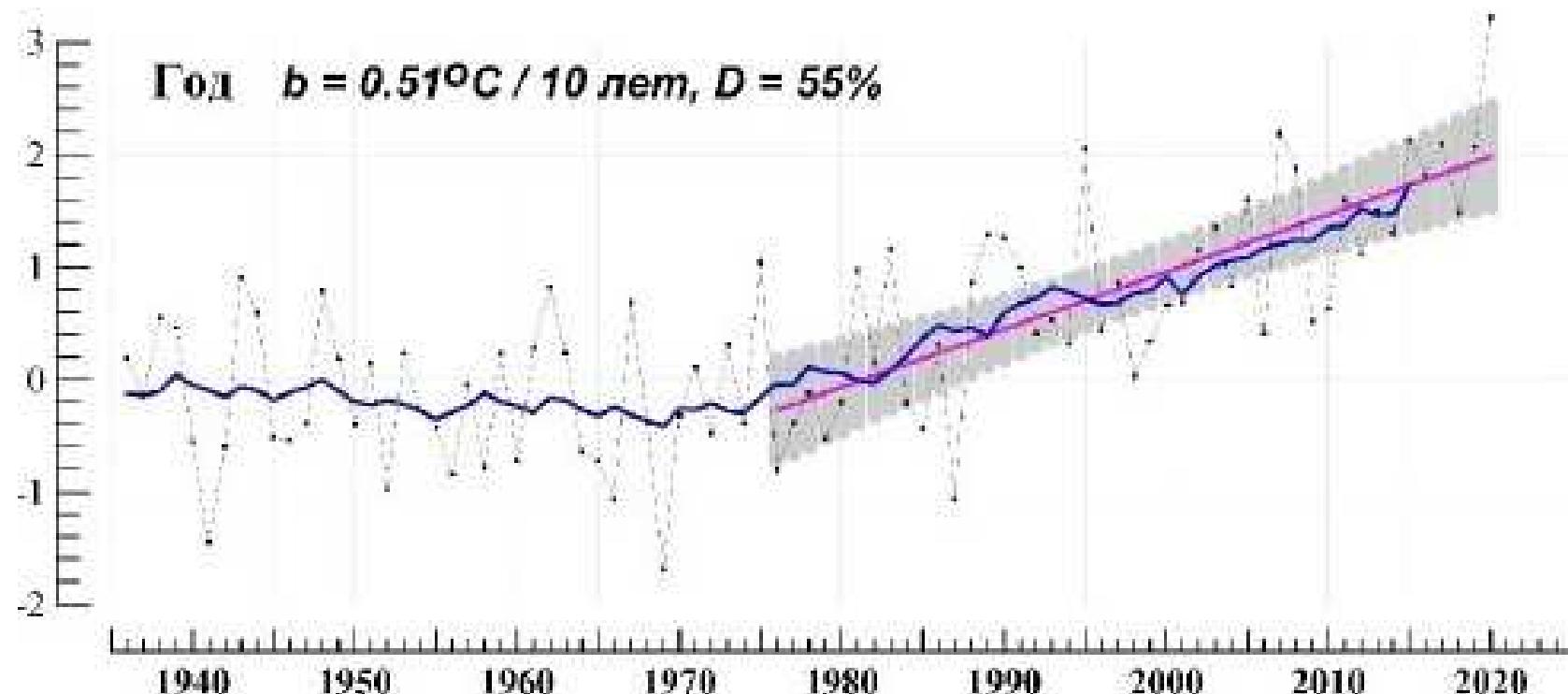

Temperature in Mountain and Arctic regions increase faster (Ctd)

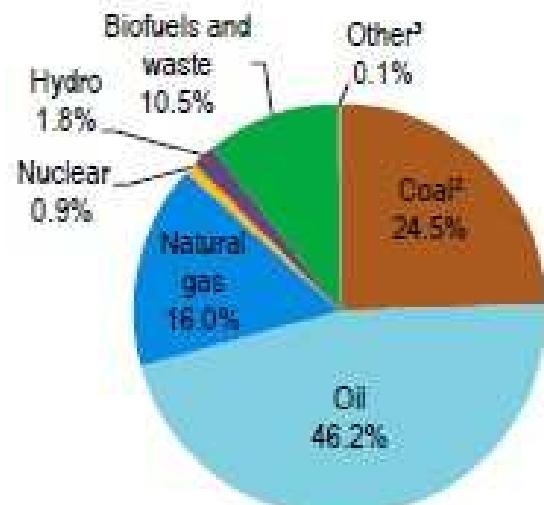
- On 3rd March 2021: Federal Service for Hydrometeorology and Environmental Monitoring of Russia (НИУ Росгидромета) published :
 - +0.51°C/decade in Russia compared to average 1961-1990
 - +3.22°C in Russia in 2020 compared to average 1961-1990
 - Remind for whole earth: +0.18°C/decade compared to 1901–2000 avg. temperature



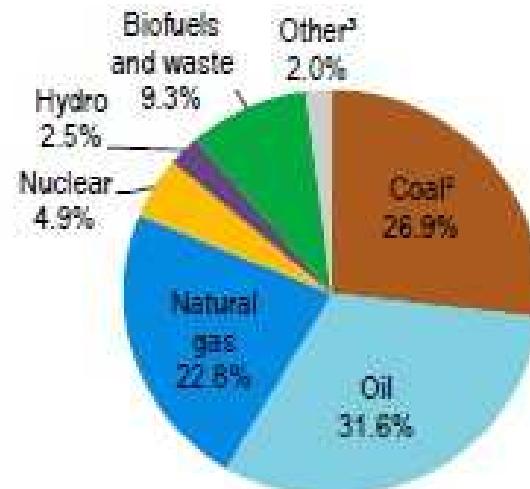
Energy: Total Primary Energy Supply (TES) vs Sources

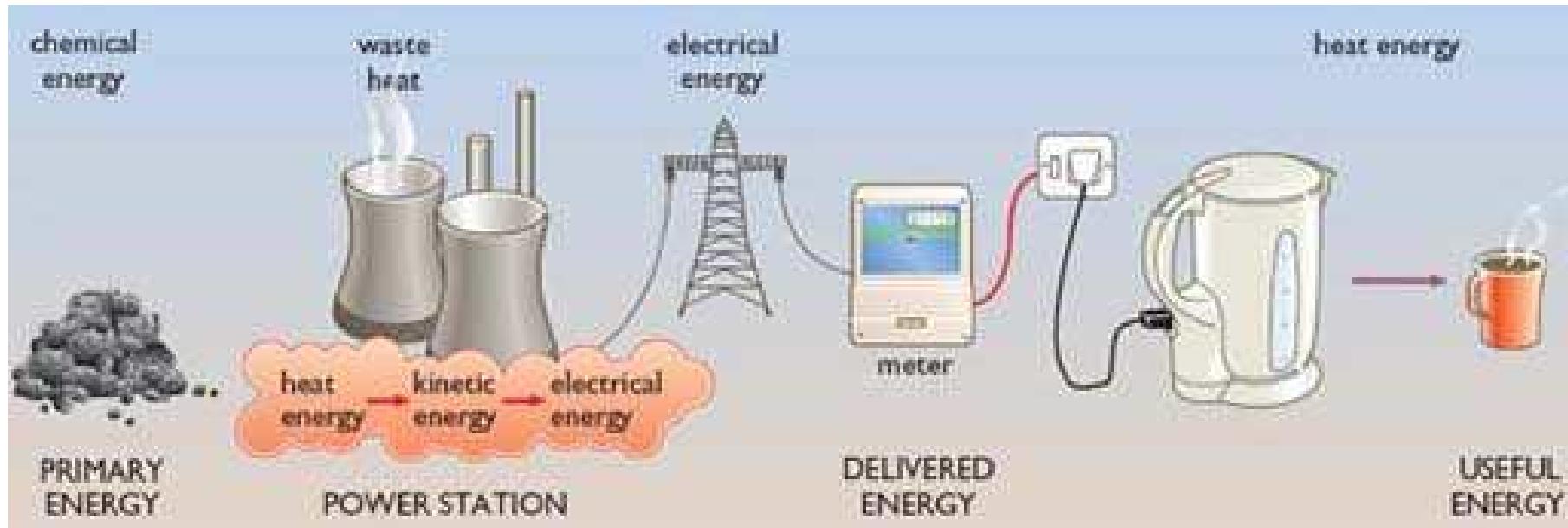

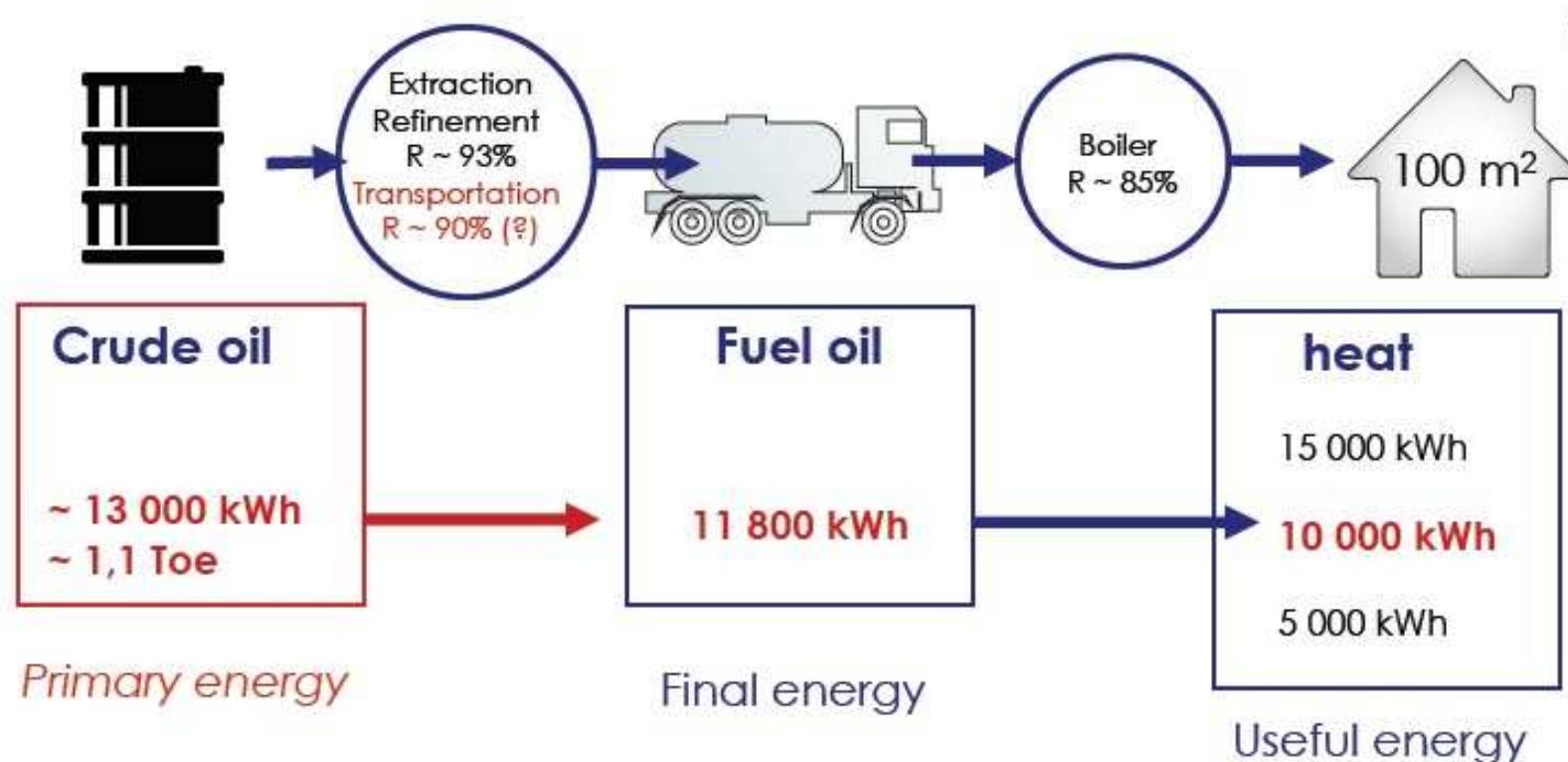

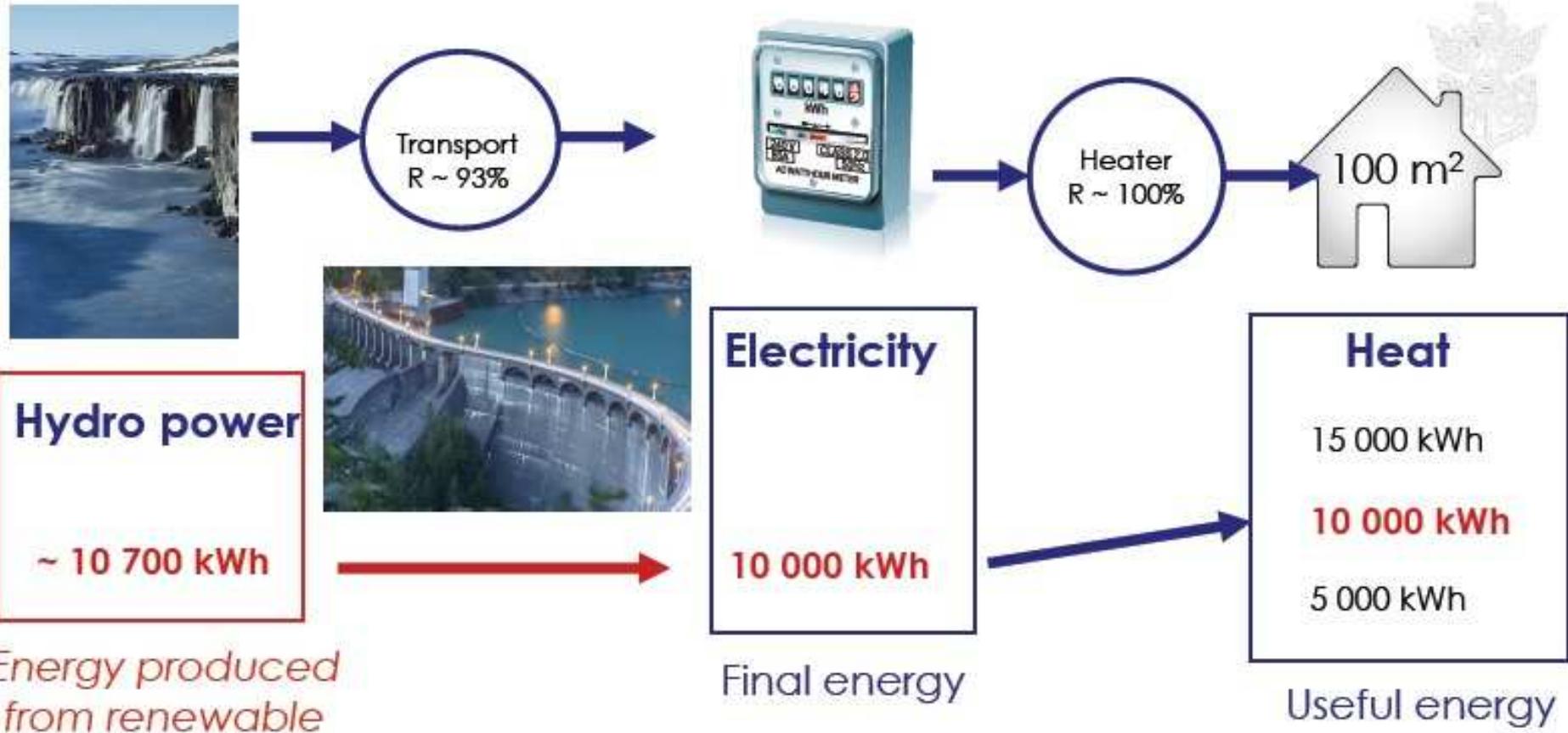
Primary Energy and Useful Energy

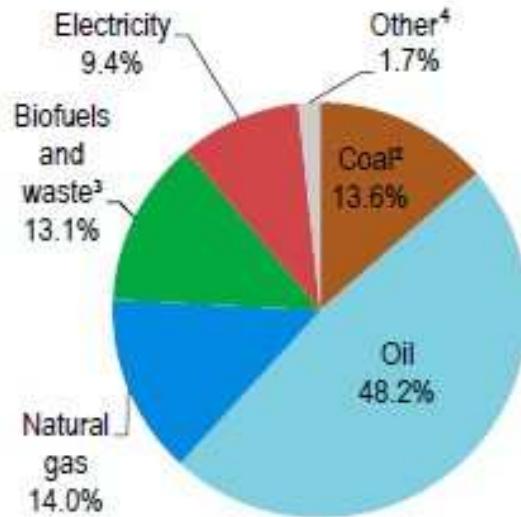

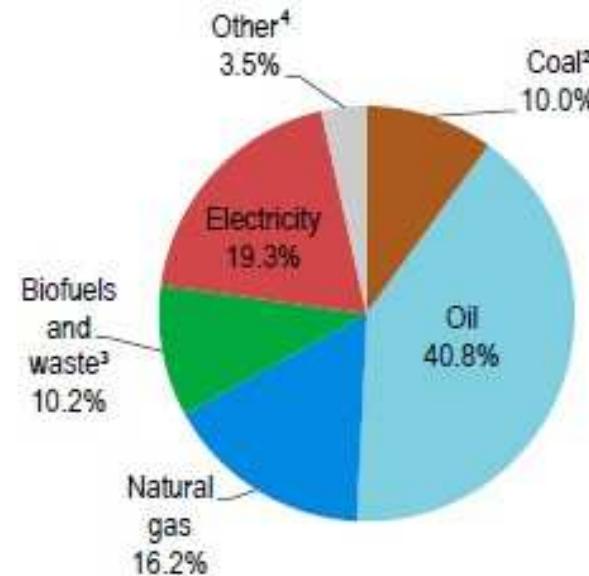
Total (Energy) Final Consumption (TFC) vs Sources

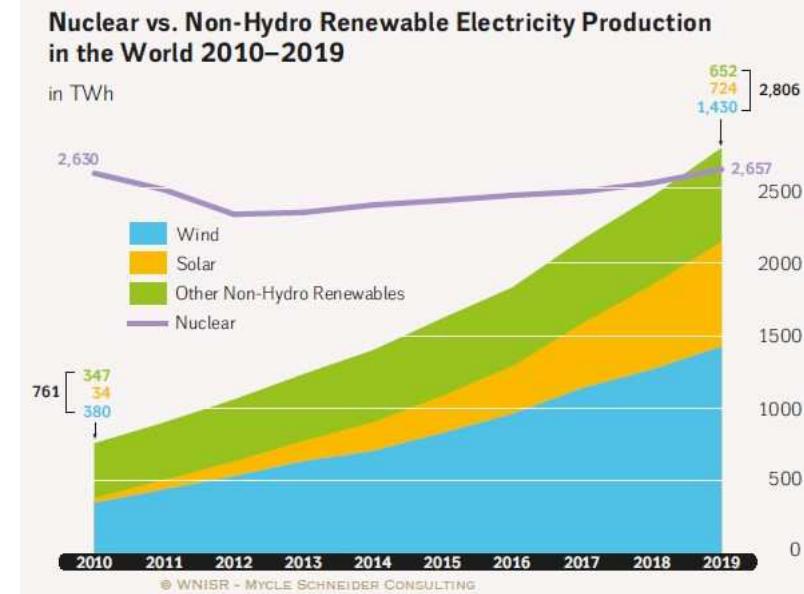
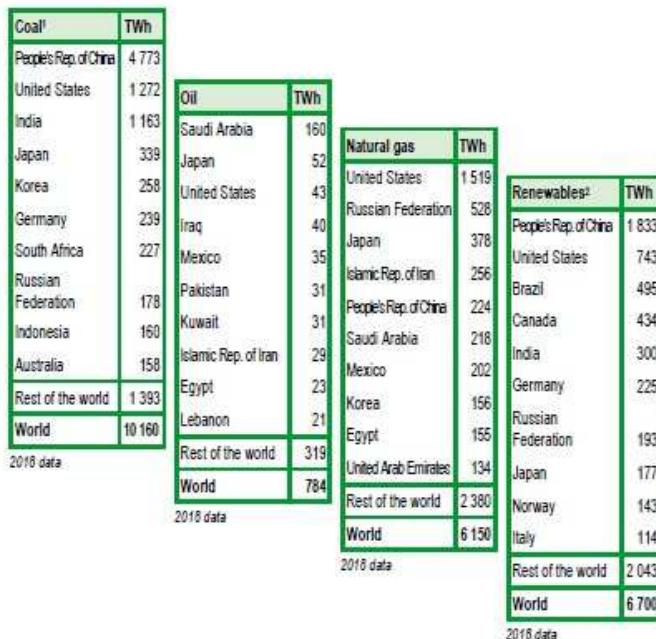

Electricity: Notion of (national) mix

- Electricity generation in Russian Federation in 2019 : **Total = 1118.1 TWh**
Oil = 6.9 TWh; Gas= 519.5 TWh (46%) Coal 182.2 TWh; Nuclear 209.0 TWh (18,7%); Hydro 194.4 TWh; Renewables 1.8 TWh (0,16%); Other 4.3 TWh 1118.1
- Electricity generation in China in 2019 : **Total = 7503.4 TWh**
Oil = 6.0 TWh; Gas= 236.5 TWh; Coal 4853.7 TWh (65%) ; Nuclear 348.7 TWh (4,7%); Hydro 1269.7 TWh; Renewables 732.3 TWh (9,8%); Other 56.5 TWh
- Electricity generation in France in 2019 : **Total = 537.7 TWh**
Nuclear 70.6 %; Hydro 11.2%; Renewables 10.3%
- World: non-hydro Renewable 2806 TWh > Nuclear production 2657 TWh in 2019

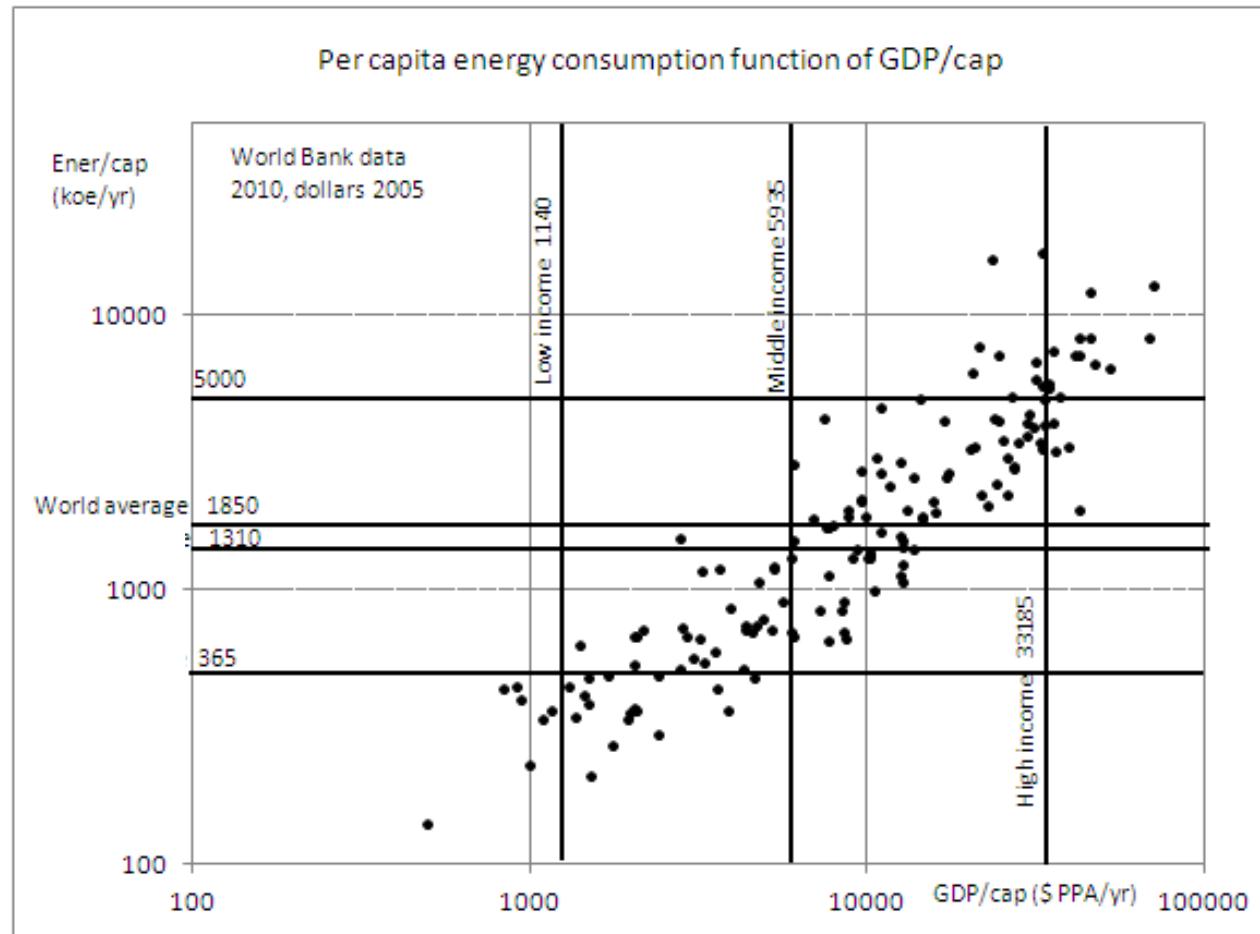

Per capita commercial energy consumption and per capita income (\$PPA = \$Purchasing power parity) 2010



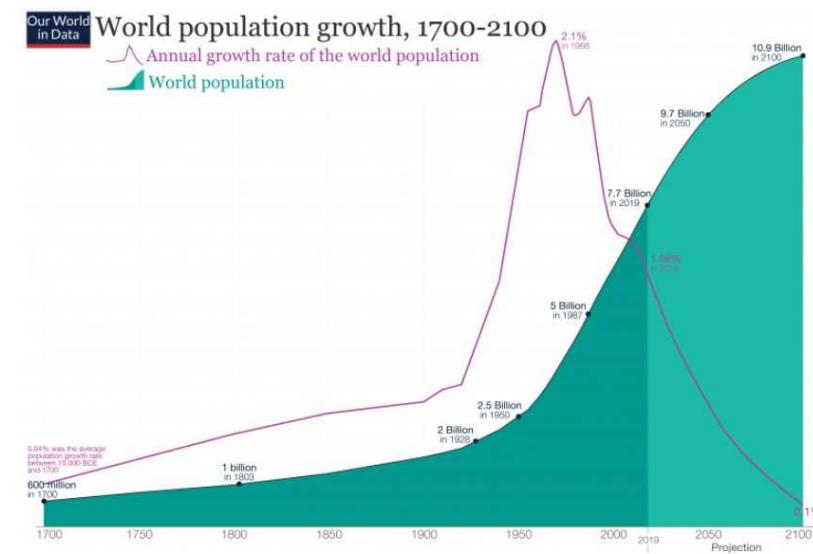
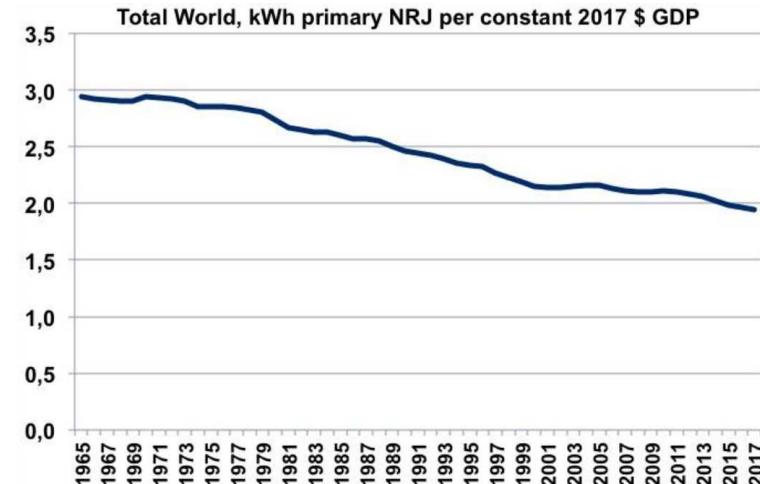
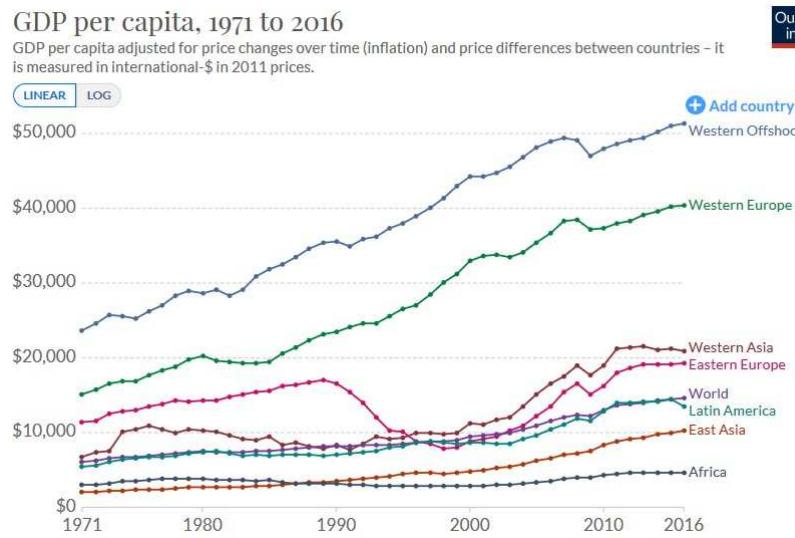
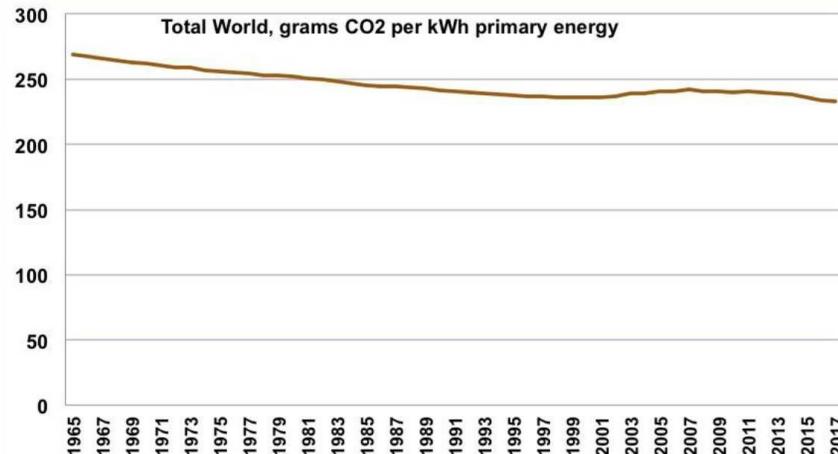
CO₂ emissions, standard of living and demography

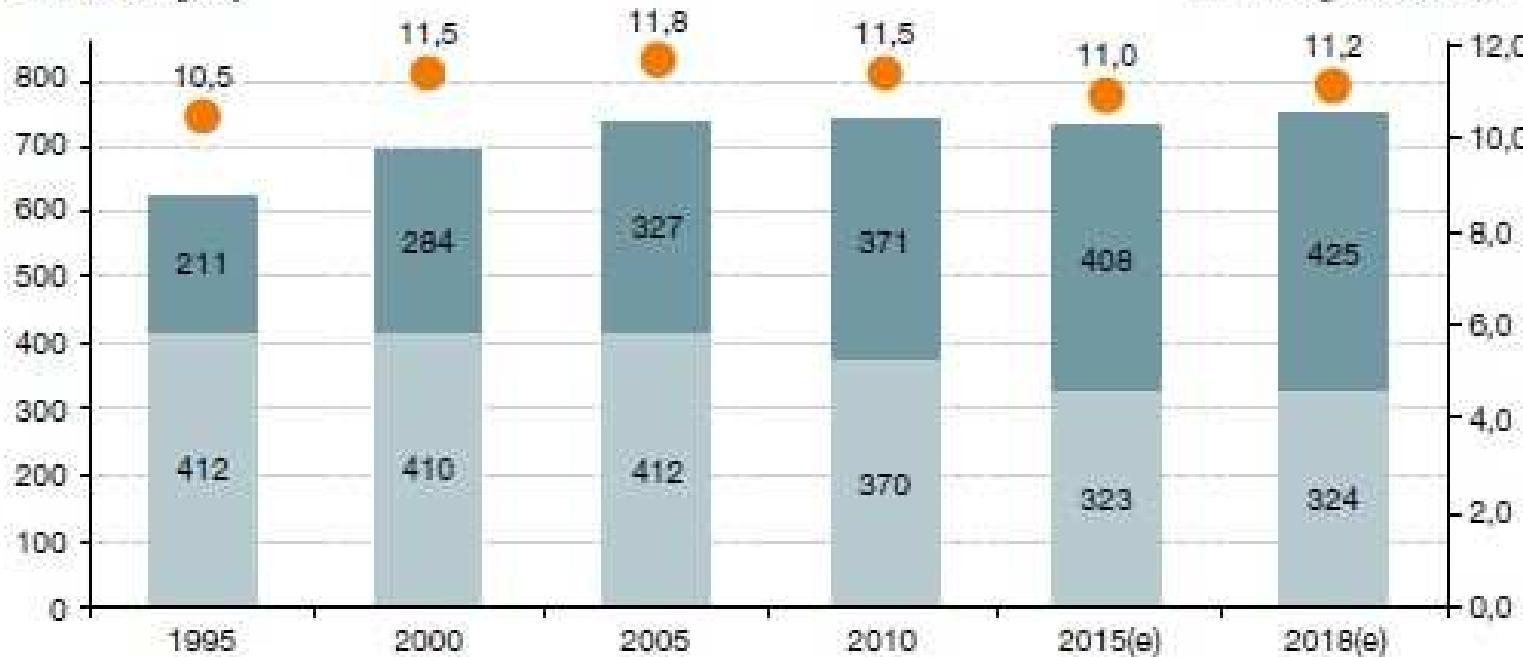


Indicator of GHG emissions: Inventory and Footprint

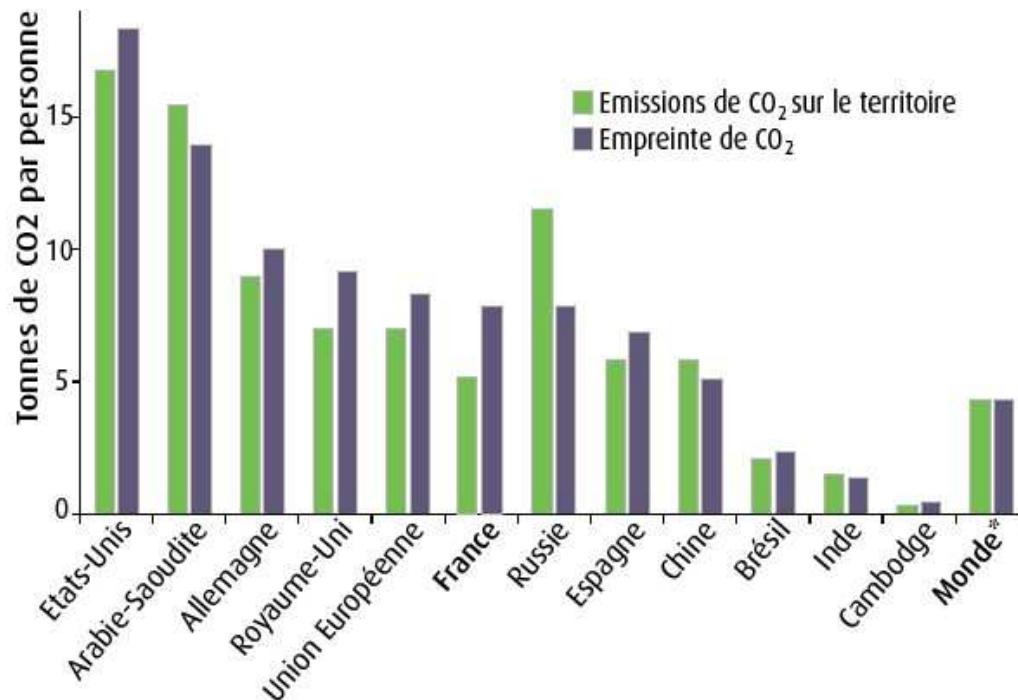

National inventory and footprint accounting for imports in CO₂ emissions per capita in 2011 in Europe

- Russia and France: same carbon footprint (7,5 tCO₂/capita) with different territory emissions (5 tCO₂/capita in France vs 12 tCO₂/capita in Russia)

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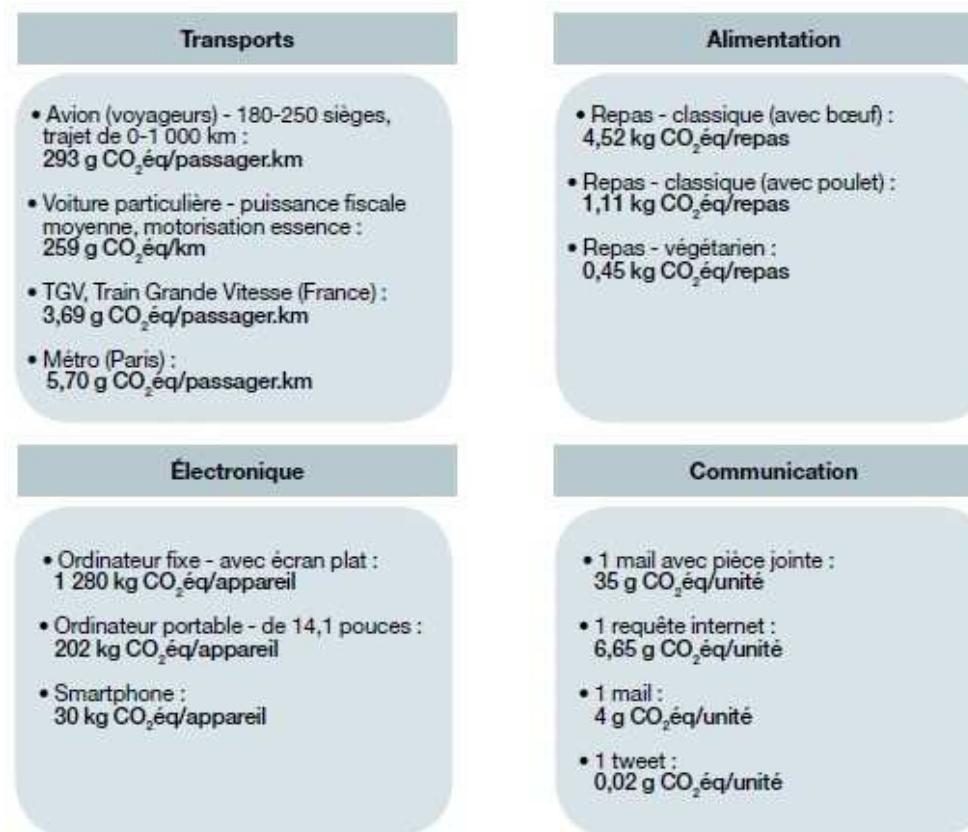
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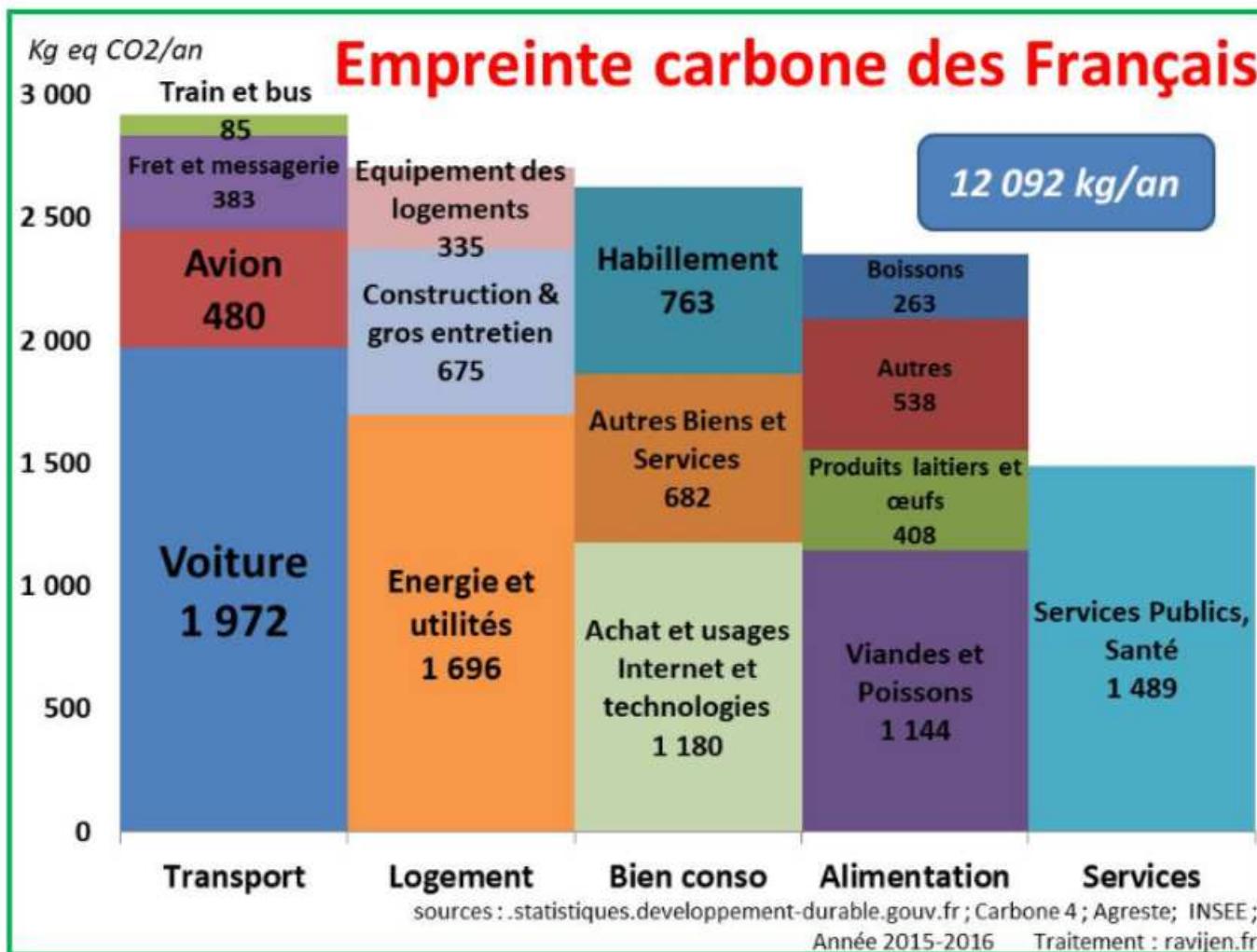
Individual footprint: if individual CO₂ quota were existing

- Imagine if there were an annual allocation of CO₂ emission for each. E.g. 20 billion tonnes of CO₂ eq for 7 billion people, that's 3 per person, for 9 billion, roughly 2:
 - 15 000 km en avion (un A/R Paris Chicago) OR
 - 6000 à 8000 km in a car in a urban zone ; 2 times minus if it is a 4 x 4 wheels OR
 - 7 000 kWh natural gas heating (few months) OR
 - 500 kg manufactured products...



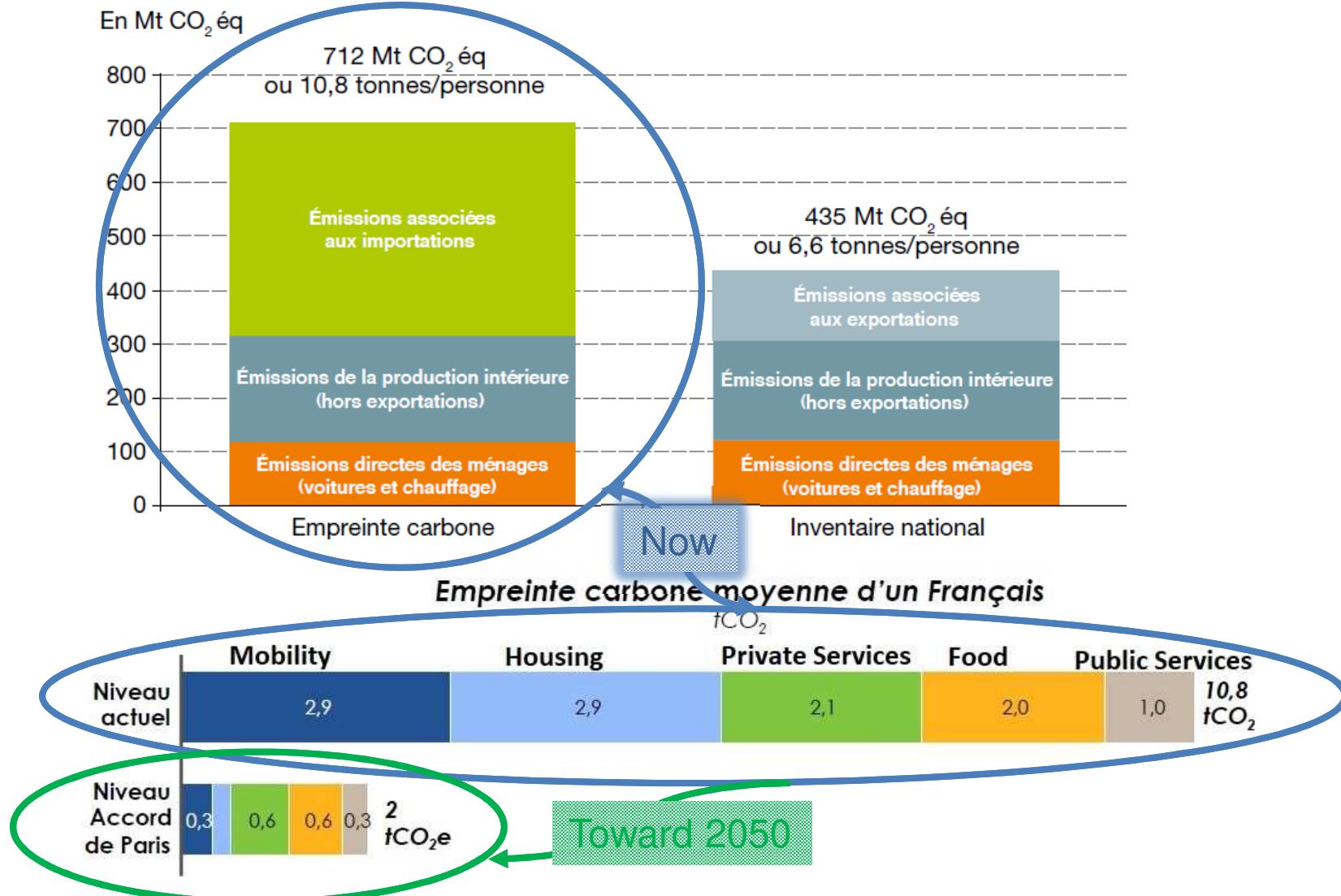
Individual footprint: Example of a French Individual

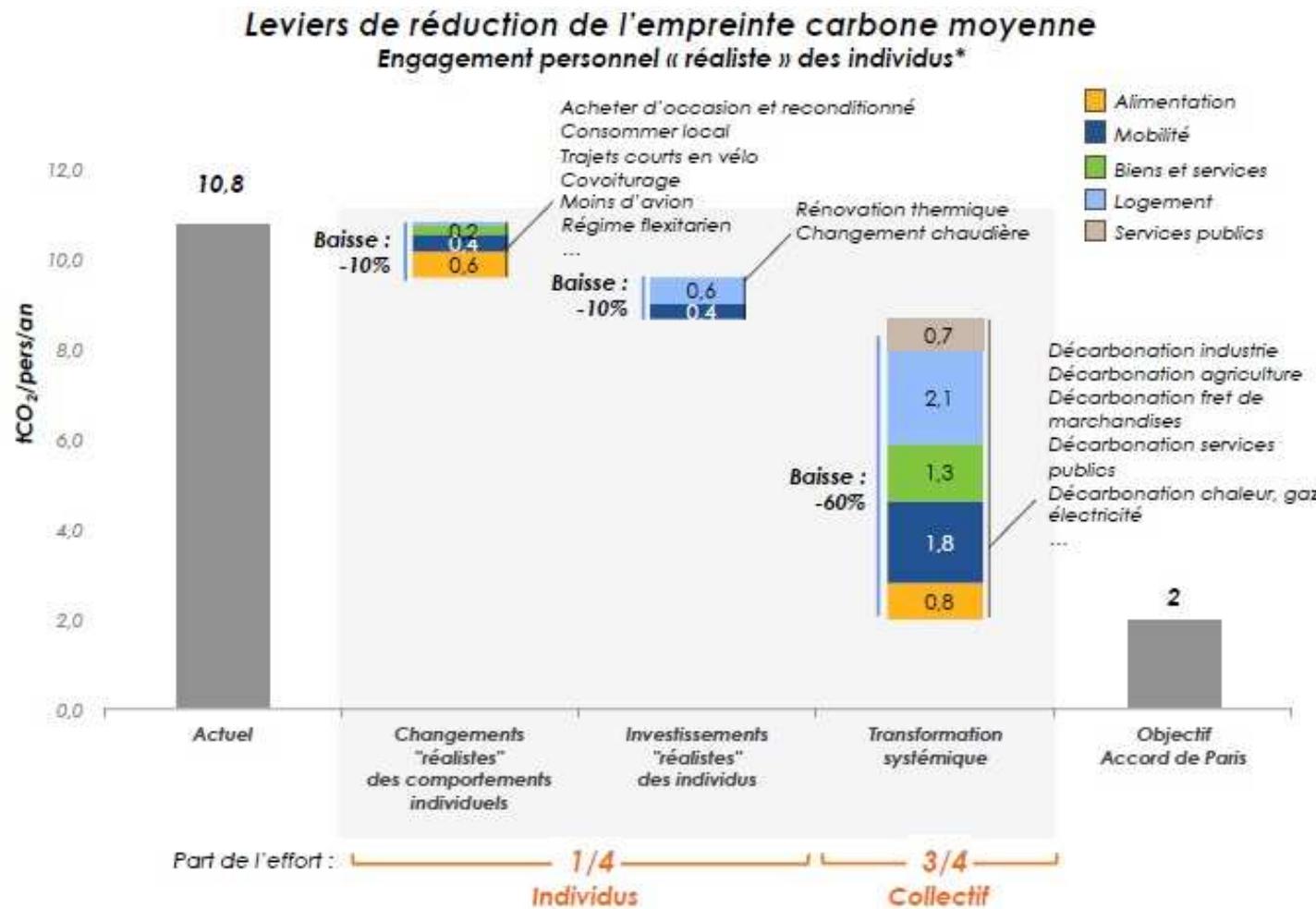
Individual and collective contribution to emission reduction

- Emissions by individual and by activities in France: 10.8 tonnes CO₂eq/capita vs target 2050 of 2 tCO₂eq



Individual and Collective contributions (ctd)

- To each his share of effort: -10% individual way of life ; -10% home renovation ; -60% companies and organizations



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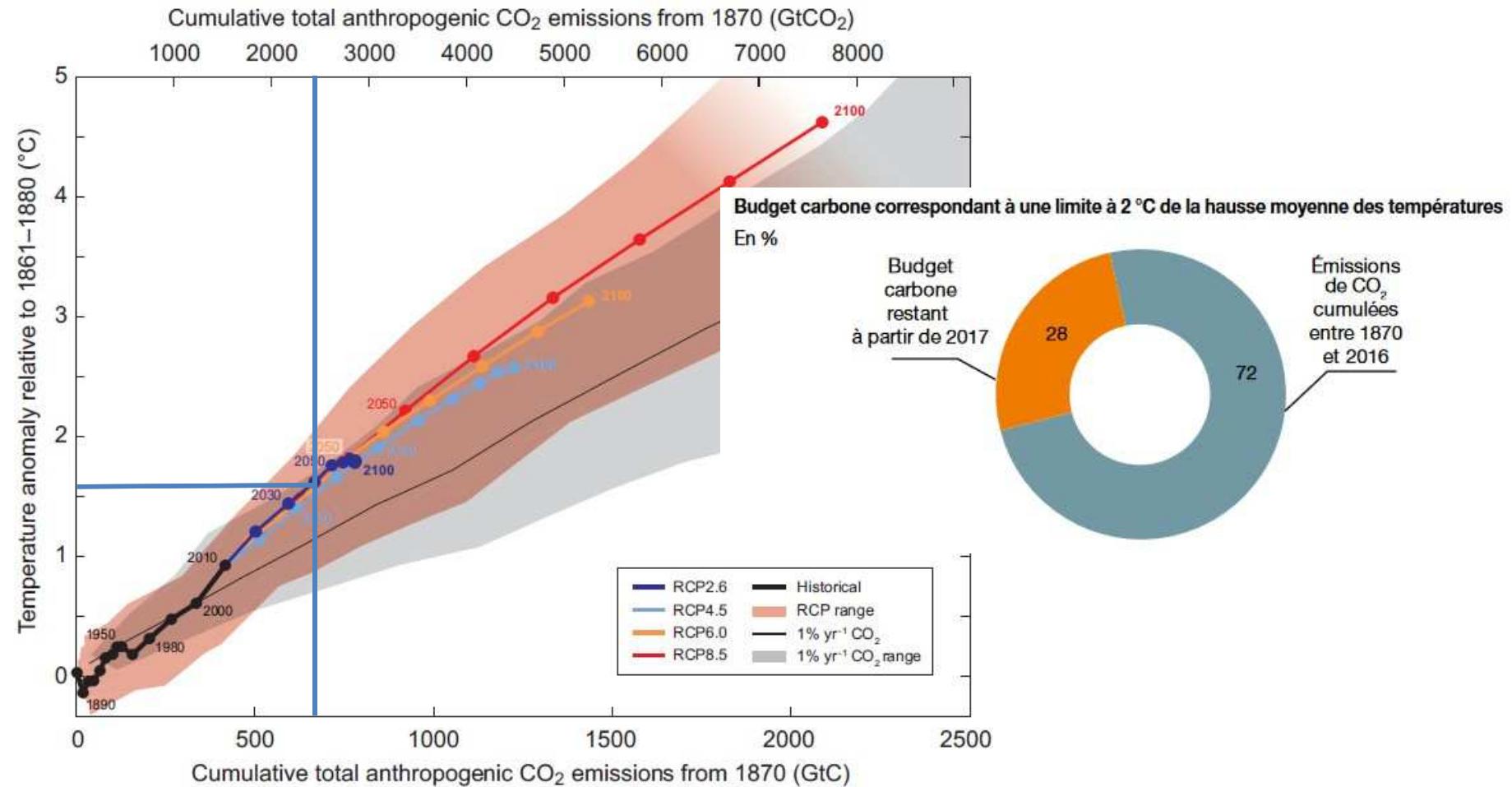
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Conclusion: Carbon budget

- End of 2019, cumulated CO₂ emissions = 2 400 Gt, hence 1.5 °C [emissions during 1850-2019: 1 649 Gt from fossil fuels + 751 Gt CO₂ change of land use (after CITEPA, 2020)]
