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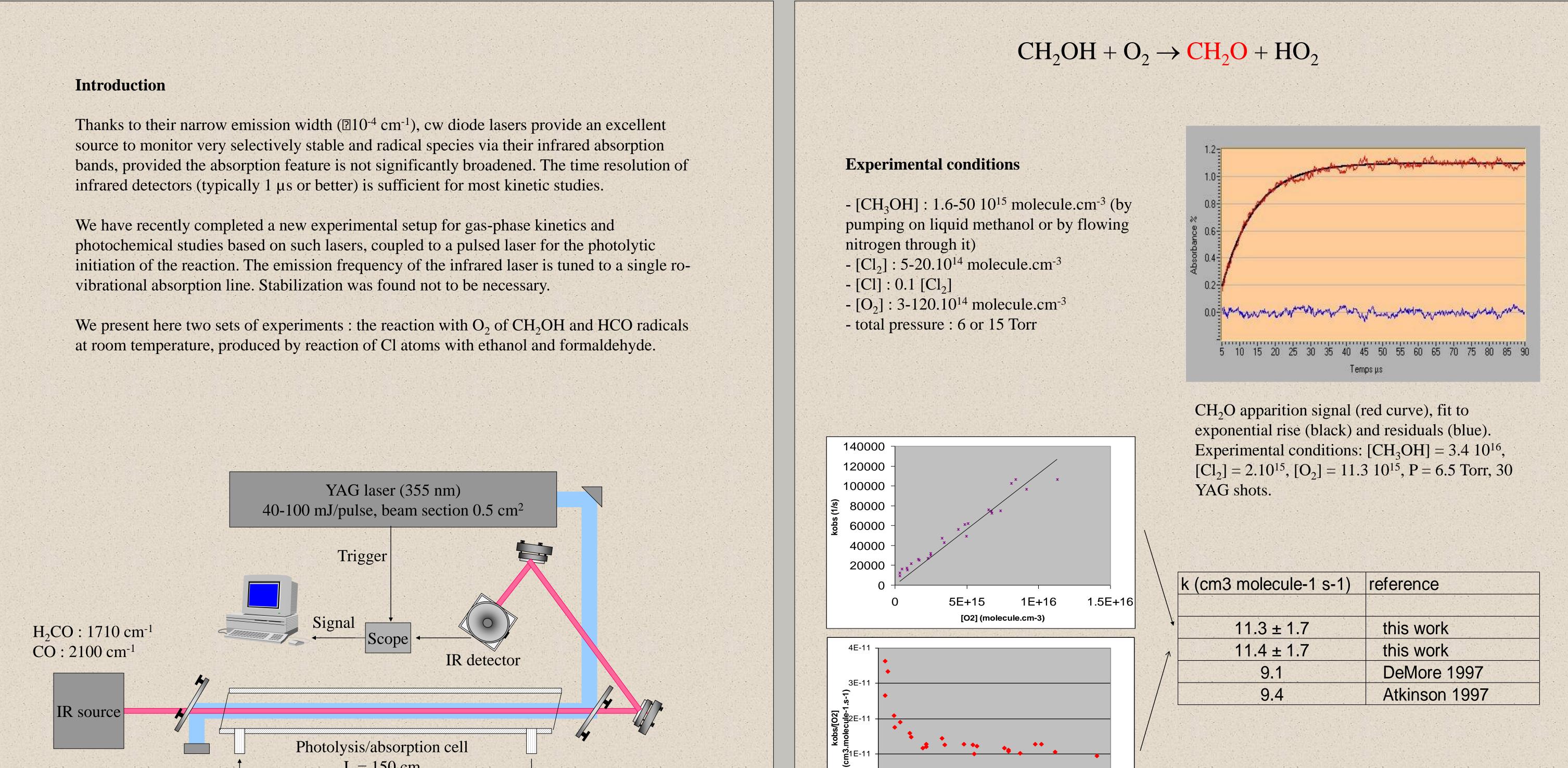
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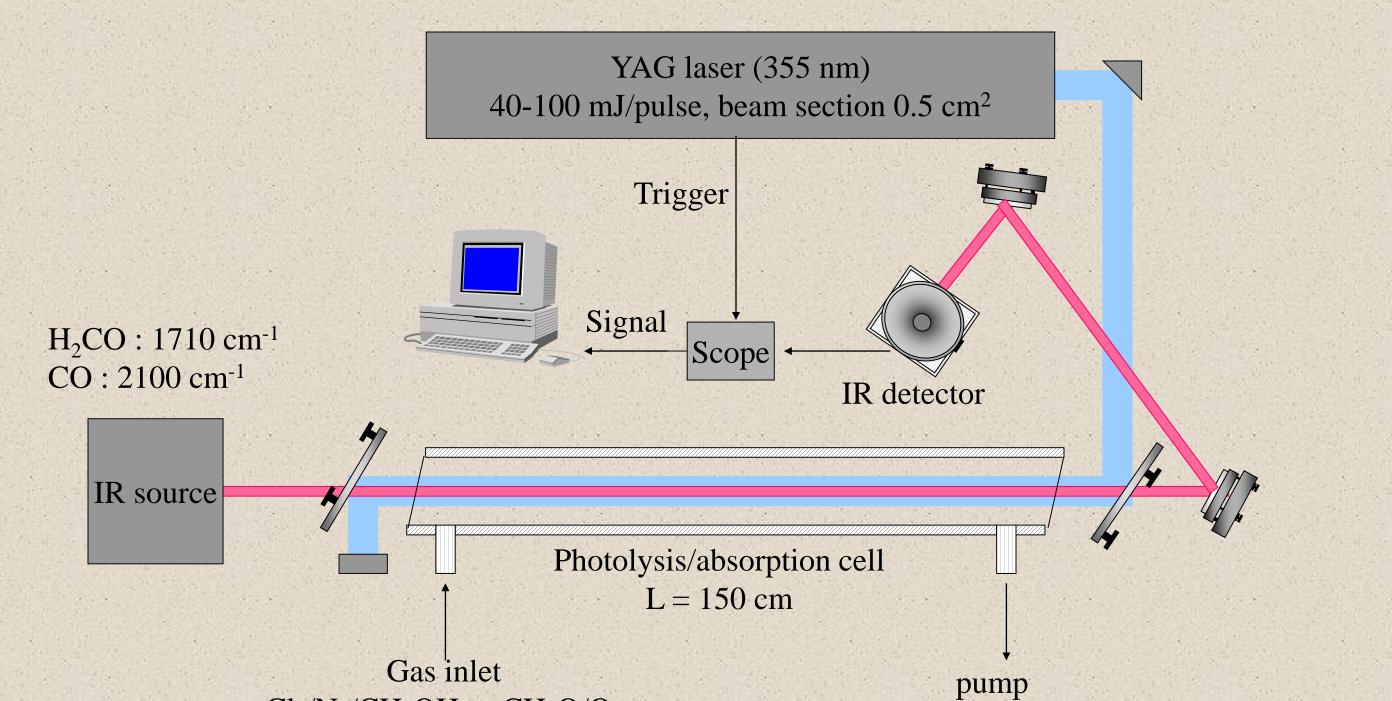

#### Results

Experimental conditions and sample signals, converted into either absorption or molecule concentration, are given for the two systems under investigation.

After a few microseconds that allow for the Cl-initiated conversion of the precursor to the reactant radical, and before diffusion can occur, the rise of the stable product can be fitted by a simple exponential law.

 $k_{obs}$  vs.  $[O_2]$  plots are linear and yield values for the rate constant in agreement with the recommended data. However, as shown in the  $k_{obs}/[O_2]$  vs.  $[O_2]$  plots, for low  $O_2$ concentrations ( $<2.10^{15}$  molec.cm<sup>-3</sup> for CH<sub>2</sub>OH,  $<1.10^{16}$  molec.cm<sup>-3</sup> for HCO) reactions of the radical with itself and/or with other species cannot be neglected. We therefore prefer to derive the rate constants from these latter plots, as the average of the values at high  $O_2$ concentrations.

### Conclusion

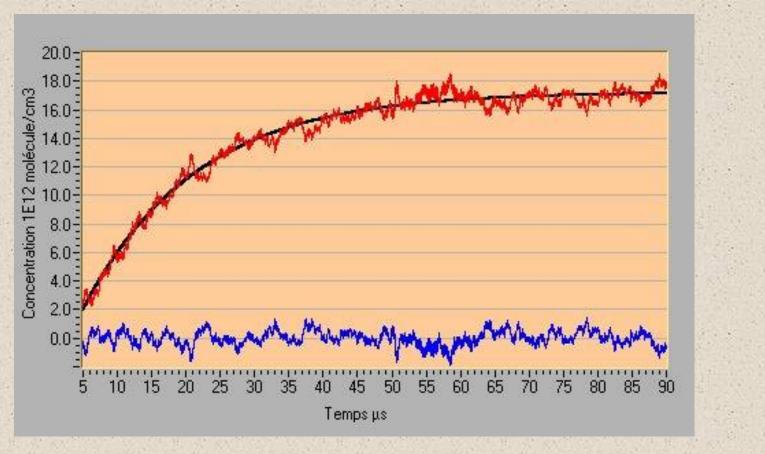
The agreement between the rate constants obtained in this work and the recommended values validates our instrument.

Individual results demonstrate the sensitivity of our setup, and its adequacy for the study of fast reactions ( $k_{obs}$  up to 200,000 s<sup>-1</sup>, limited by the response time of the detection chain).

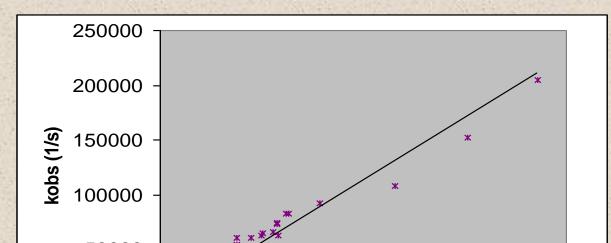
# $HCO + O_2 \rightarrow CO + HO_2$

### **Experimental conditions**

- $[H_2CO]$  : 3-10 10<sup>15</sup> molecule.cm<sup>-3</sup> (from thermal depolymerization of paraformaldehyde) -  $[Cl_2]$  : 2-10.10<sup>14</sup> molecule.cm<sup>-3</sup>
- [Cl] : 0.1 [Cl<sub>2</sub>] -  $[O_2]$  : 6-500.10<sup>14</sup> molecule.cm<sup>-3</sup> - total pressure : 5-20 Torr



CO apparition signal (red curve), fit to exponential rise (black) and residuals (blue). Experimental conditions:  $[H_2CO] = 3.2 \ 10^{15}$ ,  $[Cl_2]$  $= 10^{15}$ ,  $[O_2] = 9.5 \ 10^{15}$ , P = 7 Torr, 30 YAG shots.



Since the technique is applicable to radicals and stable species, it can be used for kinetic and photolytic investigations (rate constants and reaction yields).

Future study will include monitoring of the rise of the HO<sub>2</sub> radical produced in these two reactions, as well as the decay of the reactant radicals, at temperature up to 900 K.
