- « Borders in/of Adaptations » was the title originally given to the call for proposals launched in 2019, in the perspective of the University of Burgundy's hosting the 15th Annual Association of Adaptation Studies Conference on October 1-2nd, 2020: https://www.adaptation.uk.com/cfp-borders-inof-adaptation/


