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CABLE MONITORING

Break detection & localisation by acoustic sensors

In view of safety, structure durability and cost efficiency, detection of wire breaks is a strategic component of cable monitoring. Knowing the number of breaks and their location contributes to understand the health of the structure. Acoustic emission emerges as one of the favourite non-destructive evaluation technique. LCPC develops wire and wireless acoustic sensors that provide a reliable cable health monitoring.

Localisation principle

Detection is possible by means of 3 acoustic sensors labelled 1, 2, 3 according to the time of arrival of the wave generated by the break. Sensors 1 and 2 receive the wave first. Break occurred between sensors 1 and 2. The wave speed is computed as :

$$V = L_{31} / \Delta t_{31}$$

and the distance between the break location and sensor 1 Writes :

$$X = \frac{1}{2}* (L_{12} - V * \Delta t_{12})$$

where Δt_{jk} denotes the difference between the time of arrival at sensors j and k.

Applications

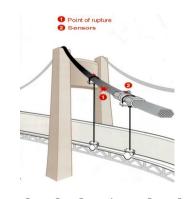
- > Sensors are 10 m equispaced
- Ruptures are detected with an accuracy of +/- 15 cm
- The system provides alarms to bridge operator and successfully predicted critical health of bridges in service

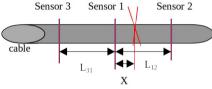




Monitoring of Tancarville and Iseron bridges
