OJapan has 208,379 students from overseas in 2015.

- * 114,778 (52.7%) are studying in Tokyo area.
- *2,974 (1.4%) are in Hokkaido prefecture.
- •1,570 (52.7%) are in Hokkaido University.

(cf. 1,587 in Ritsumeikan Univ., 1,418 in Keio Univ.)

- * 149 (0.07%) are in MuroranIT
- * 5-15 (0.007%) are in Kosens (regional colleges)

The authors have tried building a better opportunity for Japanese students in Hokkaido to meet foreigners in regional areas by sharing the international students as human resources in each regional
