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# Evidence of rattlesnake crotalphine effects on tetrodotoxin-sensitive Na channels of mouse dorsal root ganglion neurons

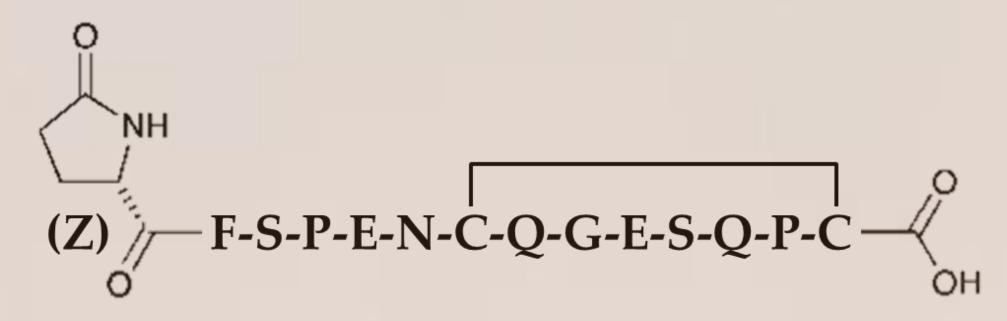

**INTRODUCTION.** Crotalphine is an analgesic peptide identified in the venom of the South American rattlesnake *Crotalus durissus terrificus*. Although its antinociceptive effects are well documented, its direct mechanisms of action are still under investigation. The aim of the present work was to study the action of the crotalid peptide on the sodium channel subtype Na<sub>V</sub>1.7, a genetically validated pain target. To this purpose, the effects of crotalphine were evaluated on the tetrodotoxin (TTX)-sensitive Na current of dorsal root ganglion (DRG) neurons of adult mice, using the whole-cell patch-clamp configuration, and on the cell viability, using the propidium iodide fluorescence and trypan blue assays.



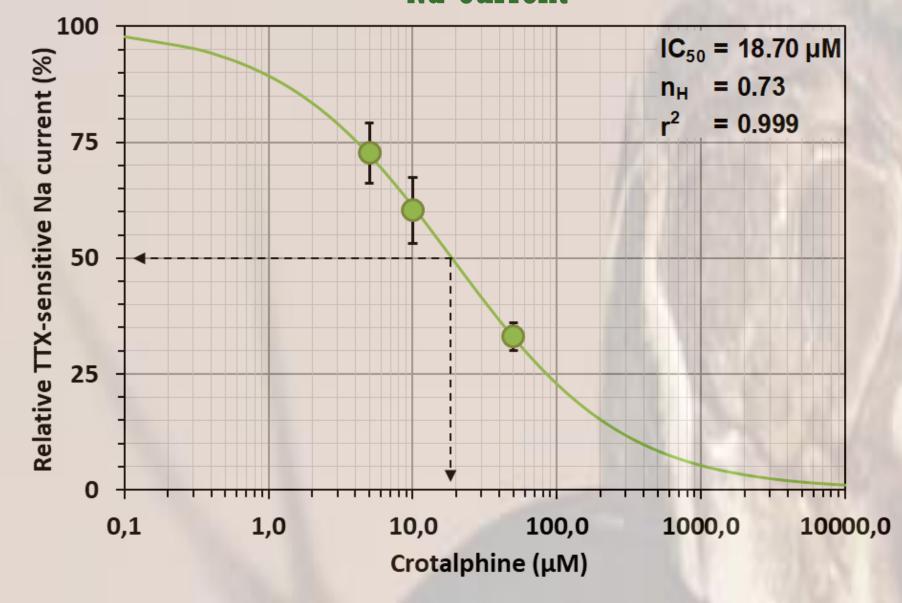
*Z* = pyroglutamic acid (non-standard amino acid)

**RESULTS.** Crotalphine inhibited the TTX-sensitive Na current of mouse DGR neurons with a micromolar range affinity ( $IC_{50} = 18.70 \mu M$ ) (1). In addition, the toxin had no effect on activation or inactivation kinetics (2) and voltage-dependence of the TTX-sensitive Na current (3). Thus, crotalphine appears to block the channel pore without affecting its biophysical properties. The leakage current amplitude was significantly enhanced with increasing blockade of TTX-sensitive Na current (4), likely due to a decreased DRG neuron viability (5).

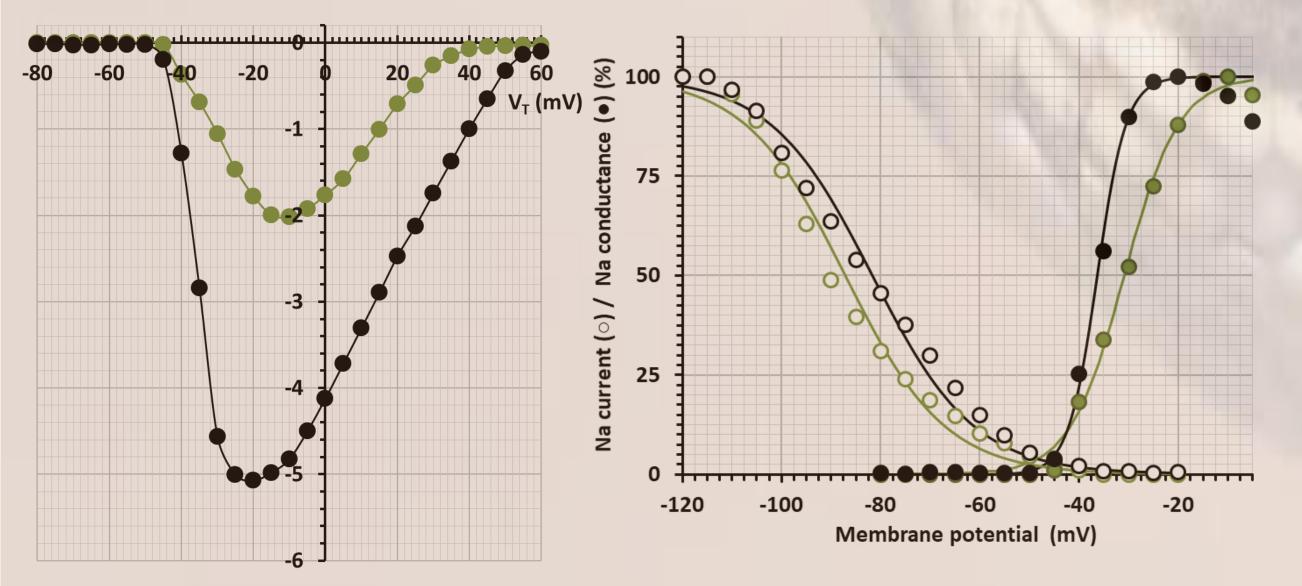

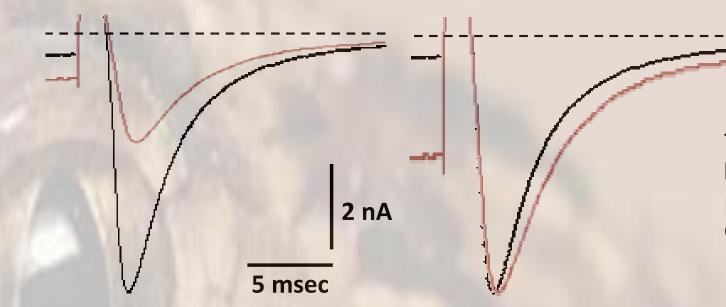




Concentration-response curve of crotalphine steady-state effects on TTX-sensitive Na current. Each value is expressed as percentage of that determined before toxin application.

## 3. The blocking effect occurs without any marked change in the current activation and inactivation voltage-dependencies



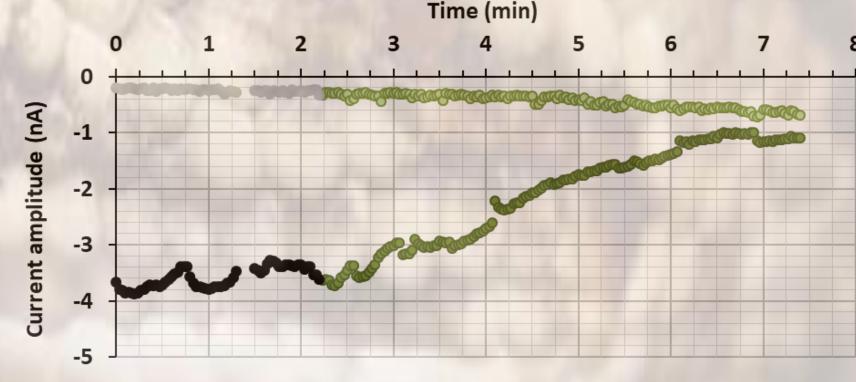

4. Crotalphine induces increased leakage current amplitude

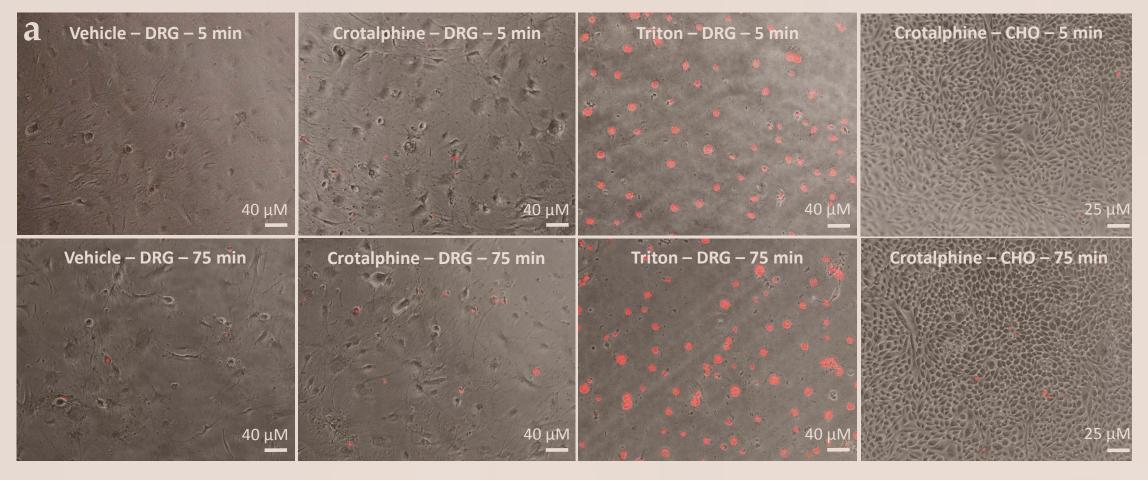


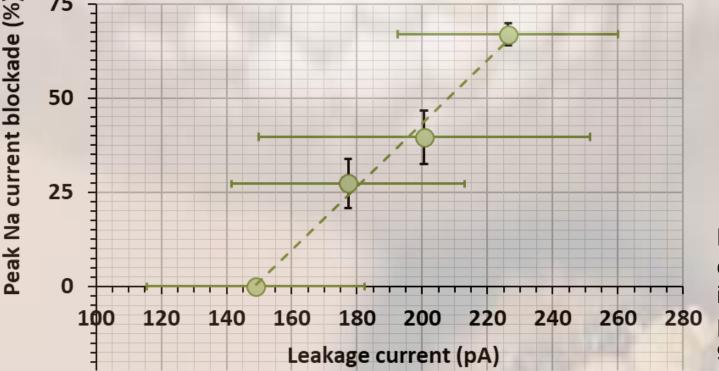

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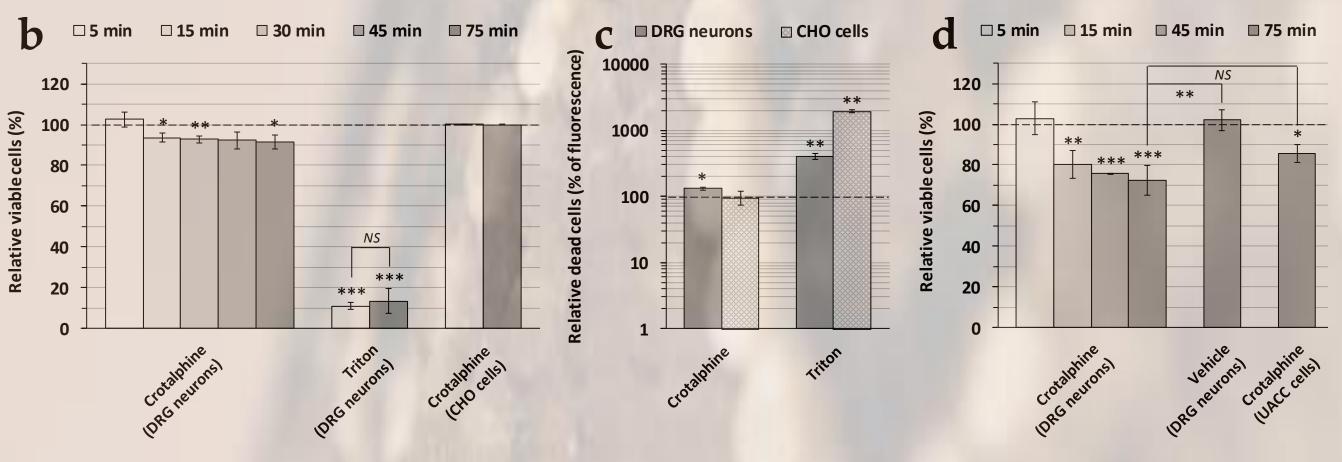

### 5. Crotalphine induces decreased DRG neuron viability





Linear relationship ( $r^2 = 0.988$ ) between the peak Na current blockade and the leakage current amplitude in the absence and in the presence of 5, 10 and 50  $\mu$ M of toxin. Means ± S.E.M. of data obtained from 4-9 neurons. \*:  $P \le 0.049$ .



A decrease of DRG neuron, but not of CHO cell, viability is detected in the presence of crotalphine (50  $\mu$ M), using the propidium iodide fluorescence assay (a,b,c). Similarly, a decrease of DRG neuron and UACC-257 cell viability is detected in the presence of crotalphine (50  $\mu$ M), using the trypan blue assay (d). Note that the toxin induces a maximal decrease of 28% of cell viability. Means ± S.E.M. of data from 3-12 cell cultures. \*:  $P \le 0.005$ , \*\*:  $P \le 0.005$  and \*\*\*:  $P \le 0.0005$  (b,c,d).

**CONCLUSION.** Taken together, these results point out, for the first time, the effectiveness of crotalphine to act on the Na<sub>v</sub>1.7 channel subtype, directly and/or indirectly by affecting cell membrane integrity. This mechanism of action could contribute to the peptide analgesic properties.

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
