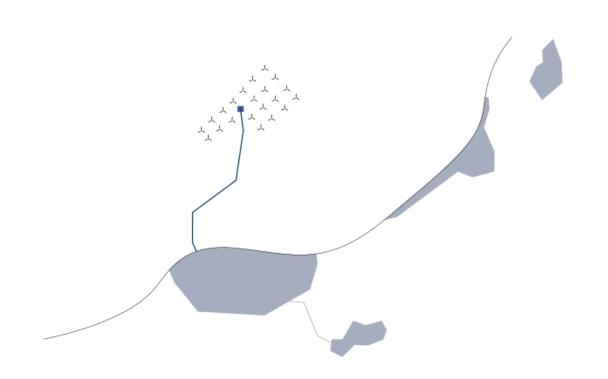

#### **Bottlenecks for integrating ES and MSP**

- ES concept criticism (anthropocentric approach, oversimplification, overgeneralization, overcomplicated to apply and validate)
- Not enough integrated approaches
- Complex data needed

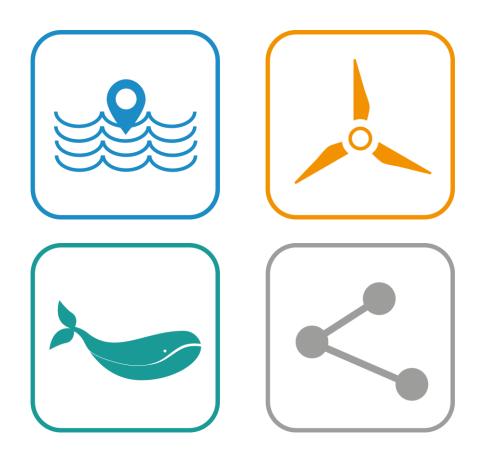
#### Needs and guidelines for future ES mapping approaches

- 1. Define an indicator system for ES mapping in MSP context
- 2. Develop more "scenario" approaches to anticipate future changes
- 3. Engage with local stakeholders
- 4. Ongoing work to integrate knowledge of ecosystems and SE into management policies and maritime planning
- 5. Develop methods for assessing the uncertainty and sensitivity of the ES mapping models

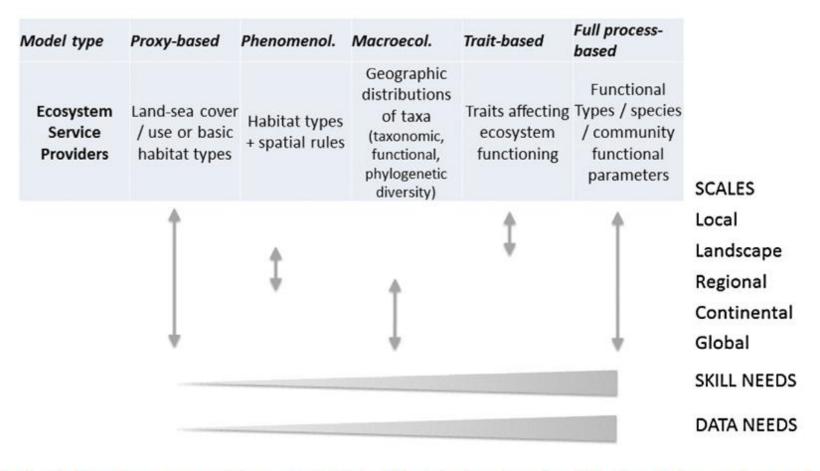


Fig. 1. Biodiversity components incorporated into different categories of models of ecosystem service supply.
