### **3D PLASTRONICS AT AMPERE AND IMP LABORATORIES**

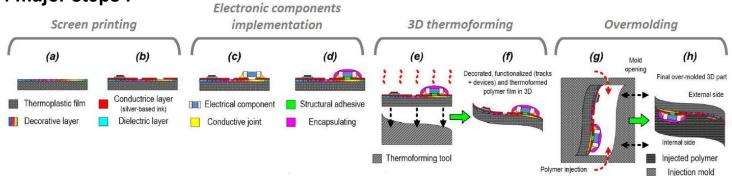
- ➢ Positioning and scientific activities → Research and development in Plastronics:

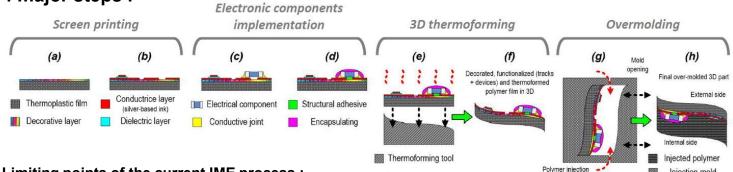

#### Limiting points of the current IME process :

### **IN-MOLD ELECTRONICS (IME)**

#### Limiting points of the current IME process :

- Limited height due to stretching of the tracks during thermoforming
- High cost of the silver ink
- > High resistivity of the inks compared to the bulk copper on conventional PCB
- High resistivity of the glues compared to conventional soldering
- Mechanically weak bonds between the tracks and components
- Long process time due to the drying of the inks and glues

Here we propose a new way to cure the conductive inks and glues in order to minimize the resistivity of inks and glues and the process time using the Photonic Curing technology.

### **AIM AND MOTIVATIONS**

Improve on the current IME process on conventional polymers like PC (HDT 145°C) Process parts on lower temperature polymers, such as PLA (bio-based, Tg ~ 55°C).

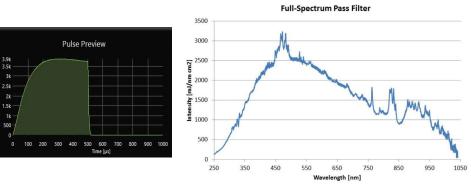
More precisely:

- Improve conductivity of the tracks on conventional materials (PC)
- Connect components to the tracks using conductive glue
- Find whether photonic curing can cure inks on low-temperature substrates (PLA)

Main challenge: the PLA substrate cannot withstand the high temperatures needed for conventional oven ink curing (e.g. **120°C** for Dupont ME603) [1]

## **PHOTONIC CURING**

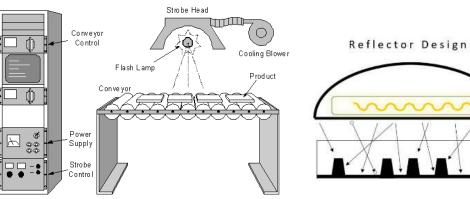
- High-intensity light pulses (Xenon broad spectrum lamp)
- Light is mainly absorbed by the ink/solder paste
- Very short pulses to limit the heating of the polymer substrate (in the millisecond range, 1 µs increments)
- Depending on the parameters, ink annealing or SMD soldering can be done



- Adjustable pulse duration
- Configurable frequency and number of repetitions
- Broad spectrum, can be limited by filters

### **PREVIOUS WORK**

- Photonic curing has been introduced as a process to cure silver nanoparticle inks on low temperature films by Schroder et. Al. in 2006 [2]
- In 2014, van den Ende et. Al studied the soldering of SMD components on PI(Tg >200°C) and PET (Tg ~80°C) substrates showing the feasibility of the photonic curing [3]
- Das et al studied the process using copper oxide based inks on a paper substrate in 2015, showing that substrates are preserved in the process [4]
- Mu et. al. sintered tracks on 3D printed light-absorbing black polymer substrate with success in 2018 [5]

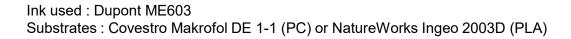
Conductive ink = silver particles(~60%) + polymer binder + solvent

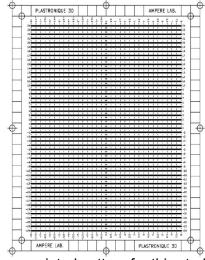
> Curing is meant to evaporate the solvent

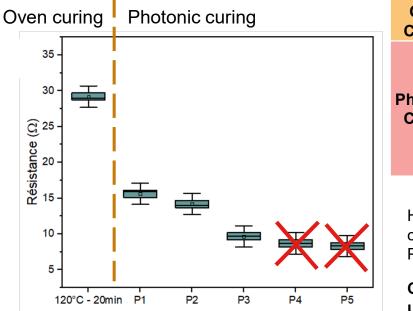
- The pattern was screen printed using a semi-automatic machine with two passes to ensure a good print quality
- The programs shown here are based on preliminary results by our team which served as a basis for this study





Screen printed pattern for this study: 49 lines, L= 160mm, w = 1 mm

Effect of Photonic curing on track resistance, PC substrate



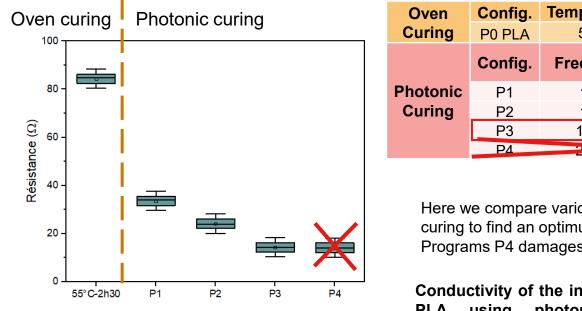

Here we compare various settings of photonic curing to find an optimum. Programs P4 and P5 damage the substrate.

Conductivity of the ink is 3 times better on PC using photonic curing than with conventional oven curing.

Effect of Photonic curing on track resistance, PLA substrate

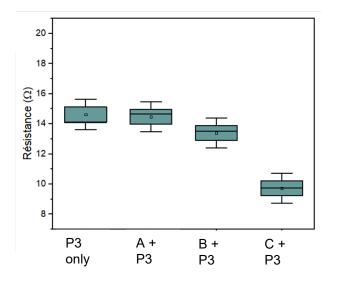

Here we compare various settings of photonic curing to find an optimum. Programs P4 damages the substrate.

Conductivity of the ink is 5 to 6 times better on PLA using photonic curing than with conventional oven curing.

Effect of thermal pre-curing then photonic curing on track resistance

Ink used : Dupont ME603 Substrate : Covestro Makrofol DE 1-1

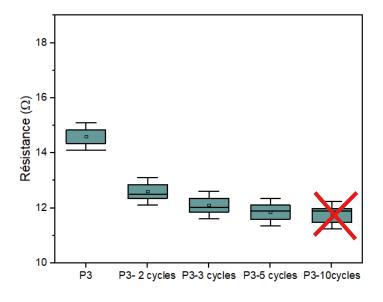

Here the part is placed in an oven **for 20 minutes** at **different temperatures** before the photonic curing, in order to "pre-cure" the conductive ink.

By applying both treatments, conductivity is improved by 50% compared to photonic curing alone, but the process time is not shortened.

#### Effect of repeating the process on track resistance



In this experiment the sample was exposed several times to the same photonic curing configuration.

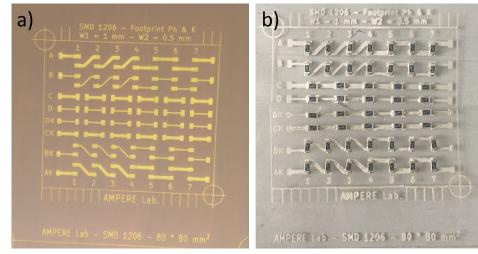
Ink used : Dupont ME603 Substrate : Covestro Makrofol DE 1-1

Conductivity of the ink is improved with multiple cycles by about 20% (5 cycles).

More than that will cause damage to the part.

## **GLUE BOND CONDUCTIVITY IMPROVEMENT**

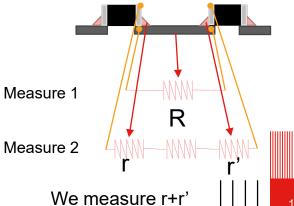
Glue used : Dupont ME902 Substrates : Covestro Makrofol DE 1-1 (PC) or NatureWorks Ingeo 2003D (PLA)



- a) Pattern used for this experiment
- b) Pattern screen printed on a PC film with 1206 SMDs glued on

Conductivity of the glue is 6 times better using photonic curing than with conventional oven curing.

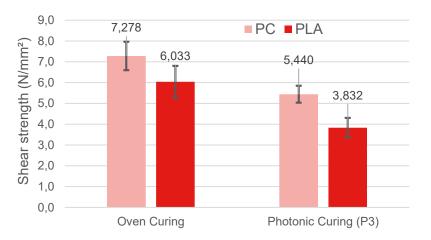
#### Thermal curing parameters:

- 20 min @ 120°C for PC films (supplier recommended settings)
- 2h30 min @ 55°C for PLA films (based on previous work [5])

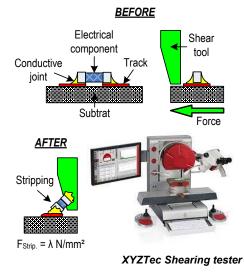
### **GLUE BOND STRENGTH IMPROVEMENT**

Glue used : Dupont ME902 – **No structural glue were used in this study** Substrates : Covestro Makrofol DE 1-1 (PC) or NatureWorks Ingeo 2003D (PLA)

Comparison between conventional oven curing and photonic curing for silver glue bond strength







 Fracture surface is measured with an optical microscope after the shear test

The bond strength is 25% to 30% smaller than conventional curing: structural glue is still needed.

### **IMPACT ON THERMOFORMABILITY**

Ink used : Dupont ME603 Substrates : Covestro Makrofol DE 1-1 (PC) or NatureWorks Ingeo 2003D (PLA)

- We feared that photonic curing would weaken the ink during thermoforming
- Tests realized : thermoforming of cured films on a conic shape to compare the different curing methods
- Results : the conductive tracks are broken when the radius of the cone gets too high, where the ink is stretched too much, regardless of the curing method.



These preliminary results show that photonic curing do not pose a problem in the thermoforming step.

The tracks are not weakened by the improved curing.

## CONCLUSION

Photonic Curing substantially **improves track and bond conductivity** compared to regular oven curing.

It comes at the cost of **slightly weaker bond strength**: a **structural adhesive is still needed** to ensure mechanical strength of the whole part.

No difference have been found during thermoforming between oven-cured and photonic-cured inks.

Photonic Curing also allows to make IME parts on low-temperature substrates like **PLA**, with close electrical performance compared to conventional substrates (**PC**).
