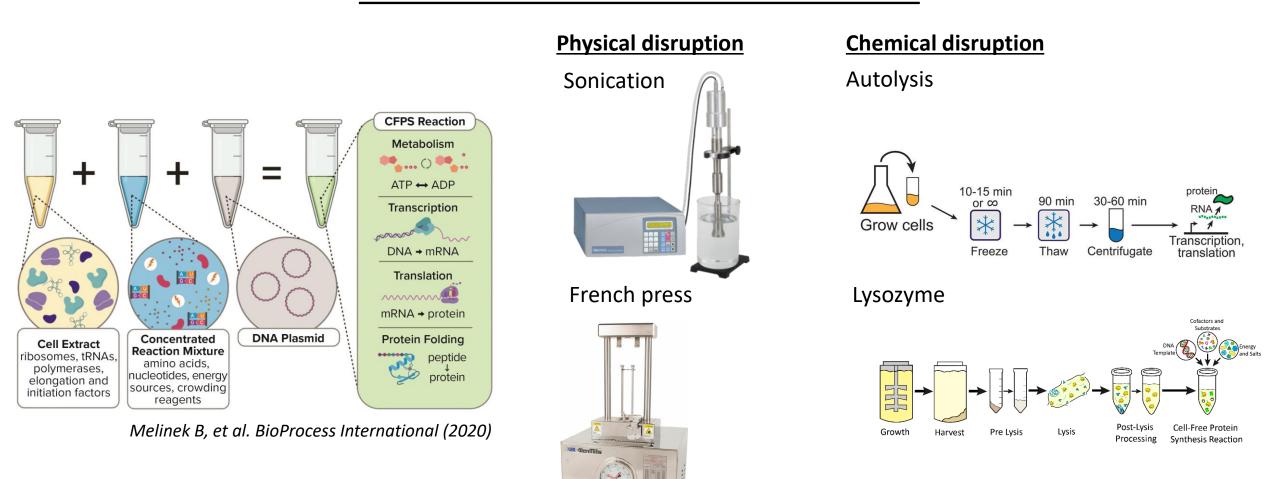

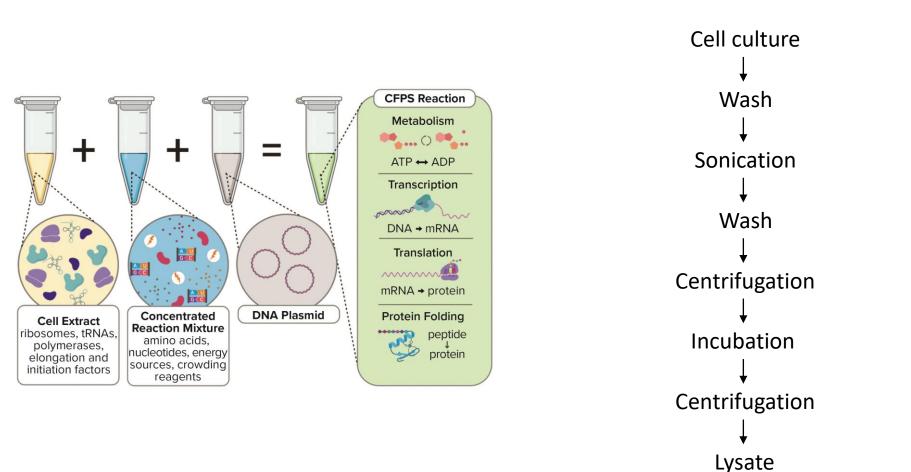

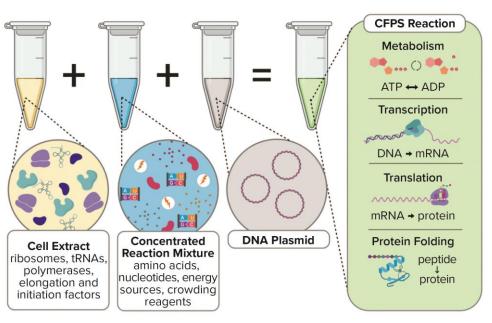
Cell-extract preparation

Buffer composition

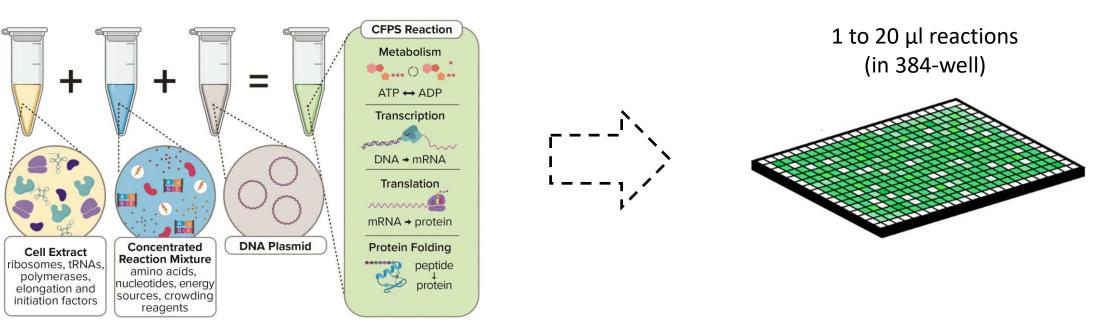

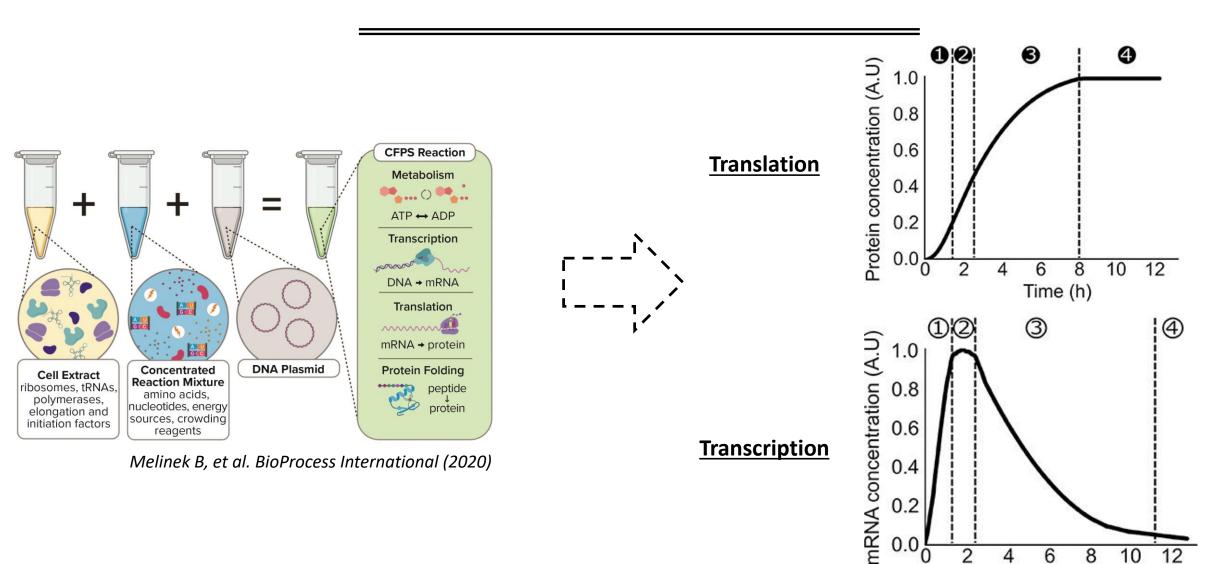

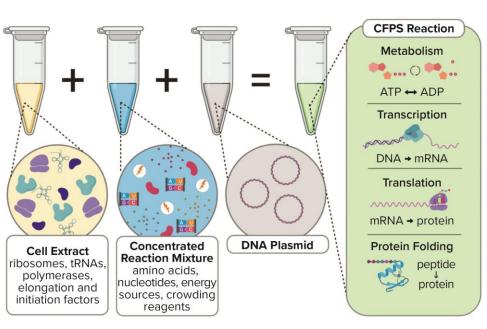

Current existing protocol to produce bacterial cell extract



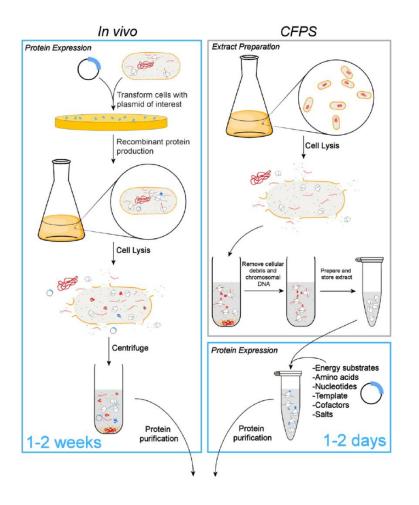

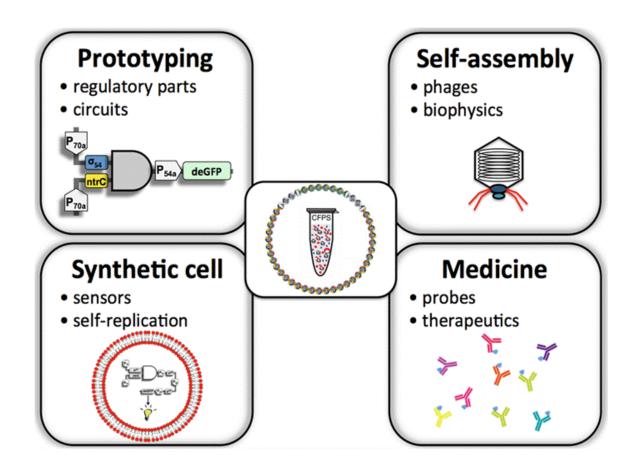

Advantages of producing protein outside of the cell

- Fast reaction to produce protein
- No need for transformation
- No GMO
- No interaction with a living host (No mutation, No burden)
- Decoupling effect (e.g. Metabolic burden vs production burden)
- Low volume of reaction
- Higher level of control: Amount of DNA, Composition of the reaction.
- Work with Linear DNA

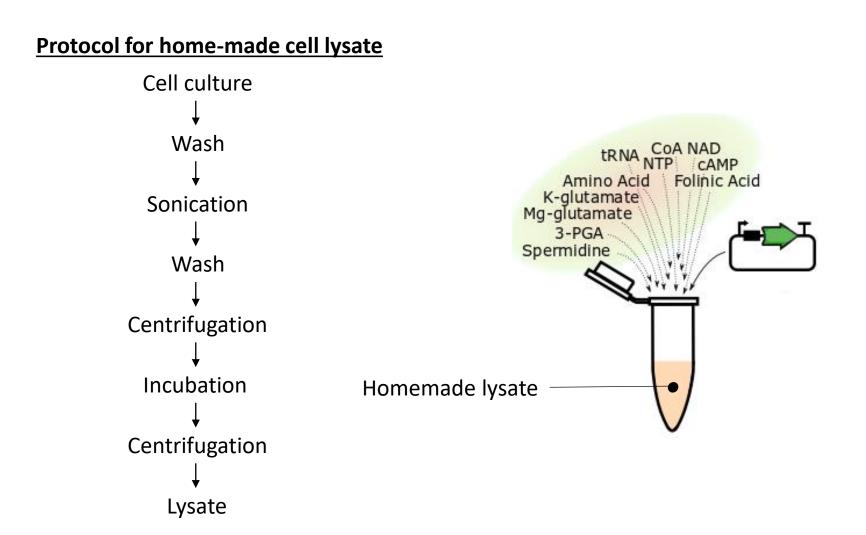

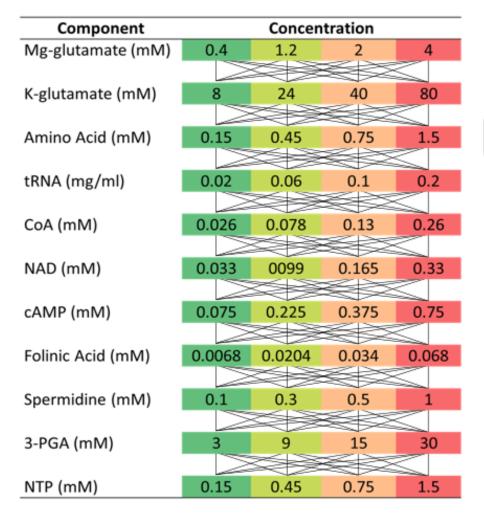

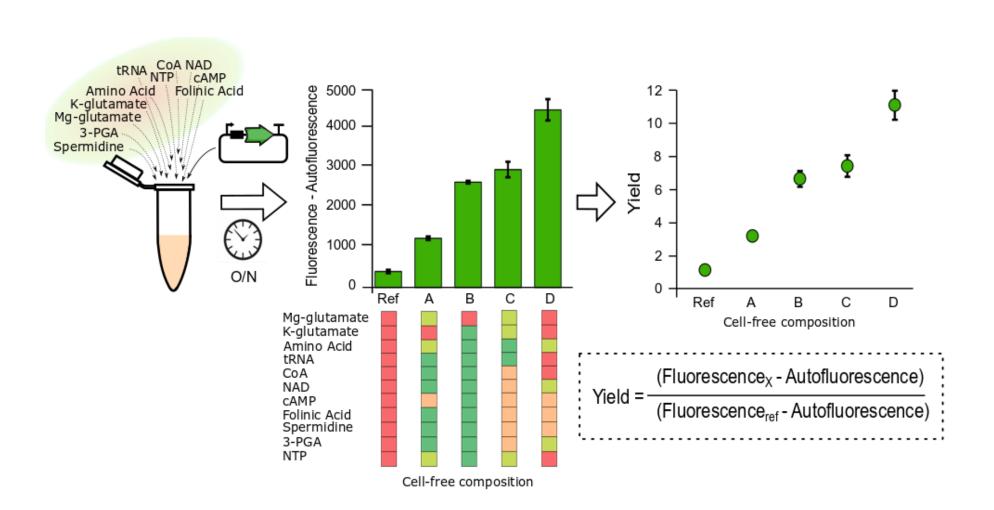
Cell-free composition: A vast combinatorial space to explore



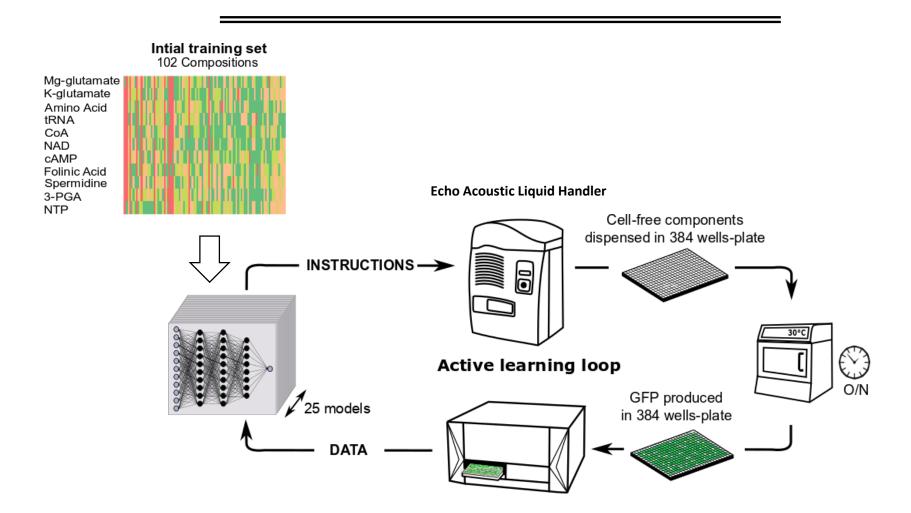
Combinatorial space = 4¹¹ = **4 194 304** compositions

- Can we improve protein production for a specific lysate without increasing the price of cell-free reaction?
- Can we provide efficient predictions of protein production?
- Can we highlight the critical parameters involved in protein production?

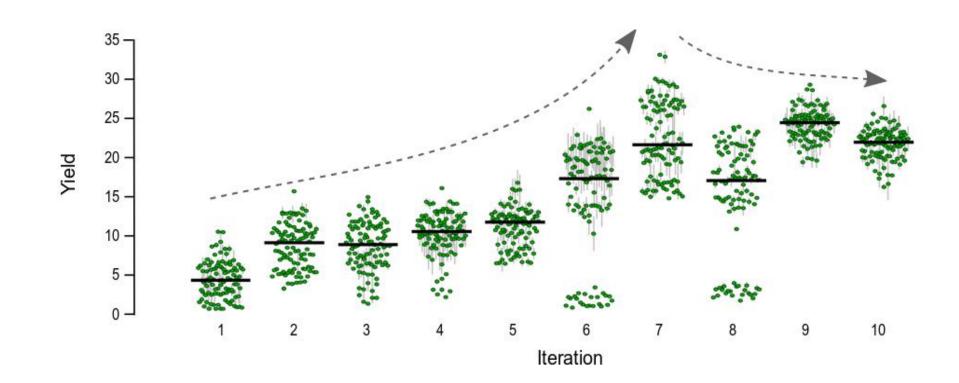
A relative measure of efficiency: Yield



Exploration using active learning

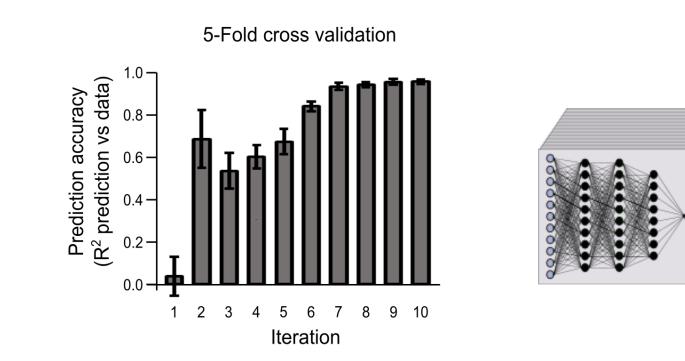


A 34 time Yield improvement using an home-made lysate

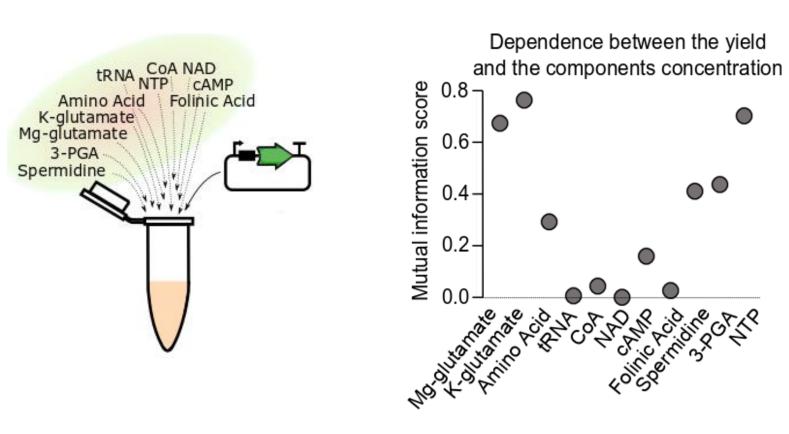

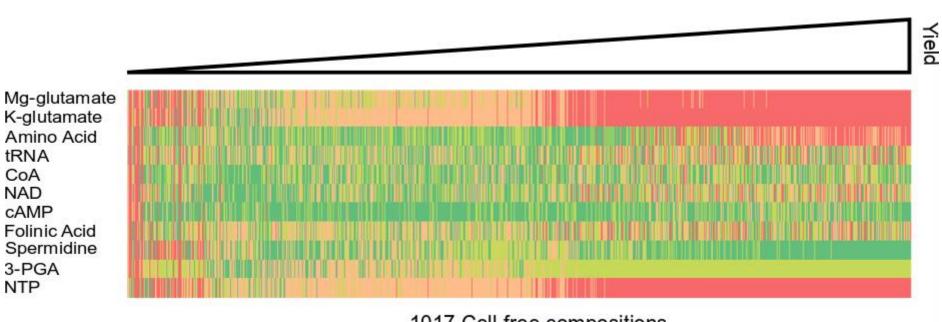

Components that improve yield at high concentration:

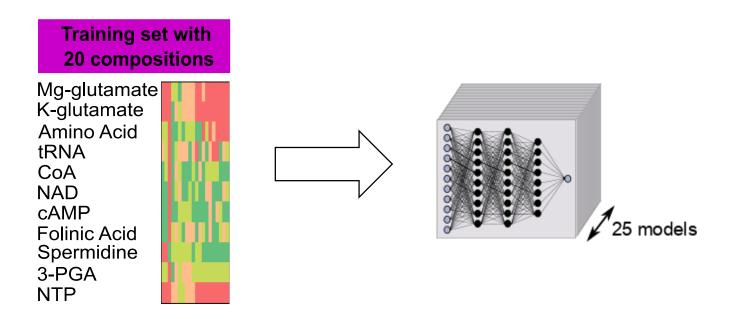
Mg-glutamate, K-glutamate, Amino Acids and NTPs

Components that improve yield at low concentration: Spermidine, 3-PGA

A one-step method to maximize Yield with home-made lysates

Lysate quality is user-dependent, strain-dependent, etc...

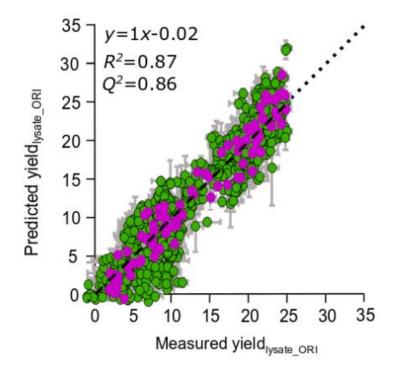
We provide a quick method to maximize protein production with any lysate



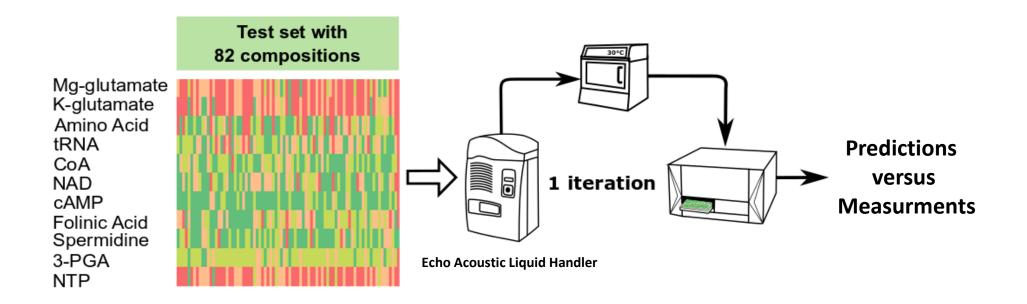

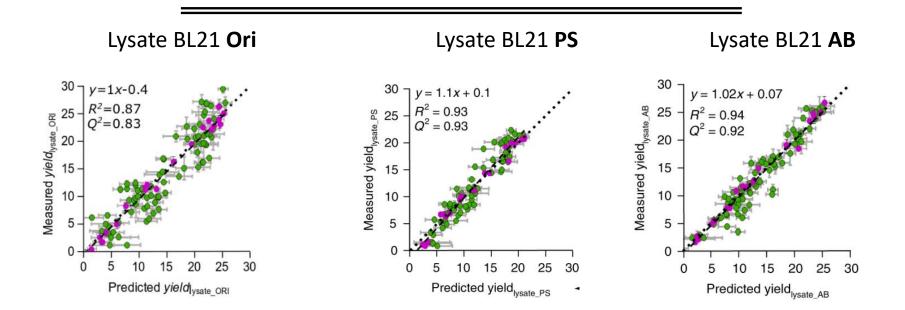
102 cell-free compositions to train (20) and test (82) our models efficiency



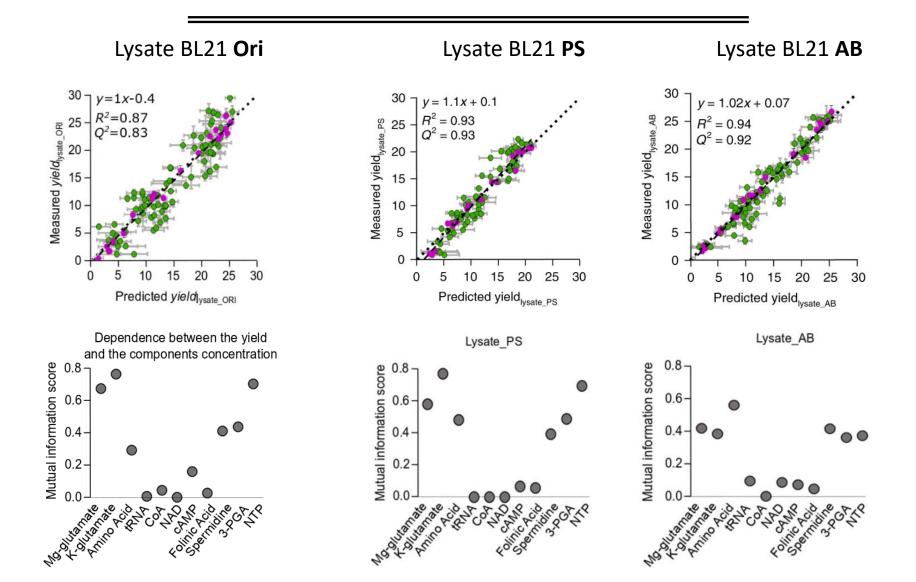
Prediction of the Yields in cell-free using home-made lysates



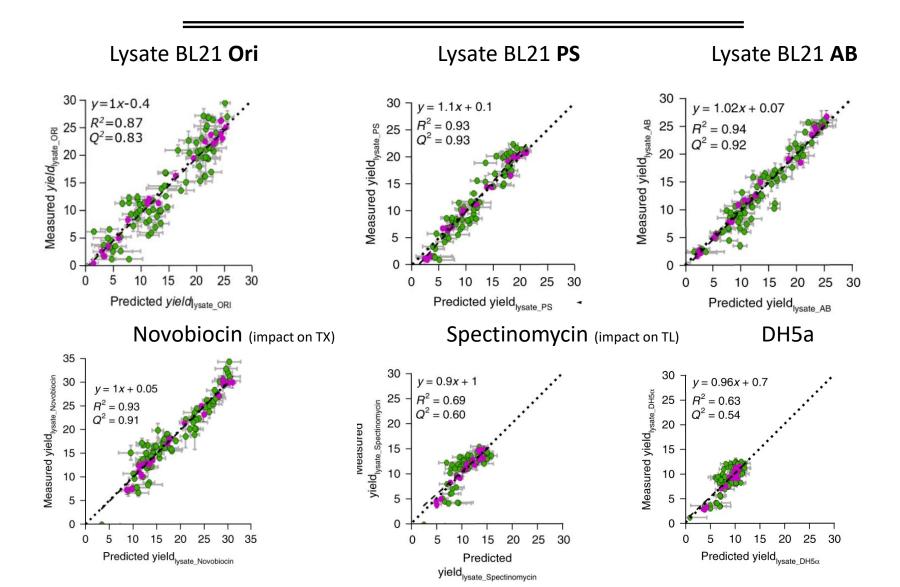
Predictions of cell-free efficiency (lysates from other experimentalists)



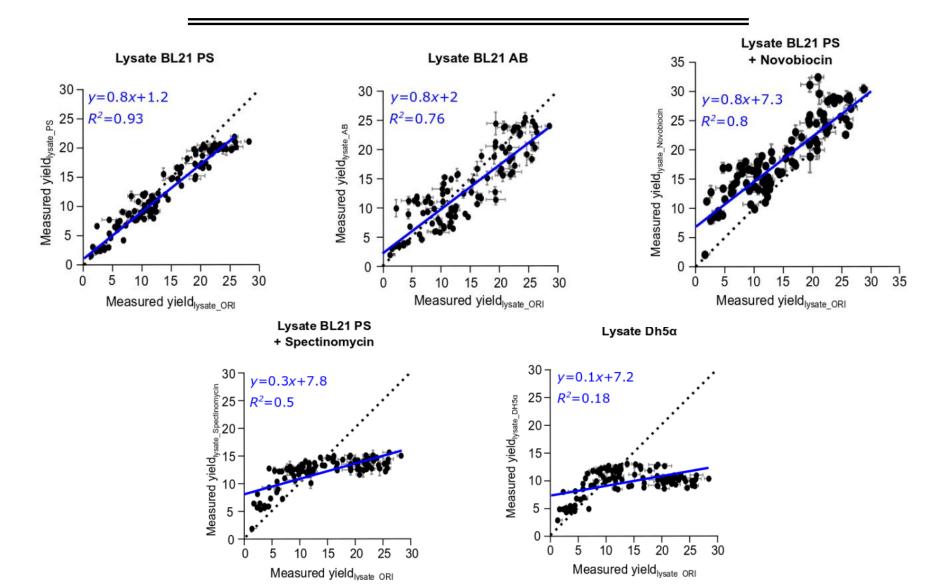
Predictions of cell-free efficiency (lysates from other experimentalists)

Conclusion

<u>Cell-free composition</u>:

- We improved production of an home-made cell-free reactions without increasing the price
- We provided efficient predictions of protein production
- We highlighted the critical parameters involved in protein production

Lysate-independent maximization of protein production:

• A one step method to maximize protein production for home-made cell-free

Transcription vs translation:

• Our data suggests that we mainly improved translation via composition optimization

Our method can be extended to other bacterial-based cell-free (*B. subtilis, V. natrigens*...)





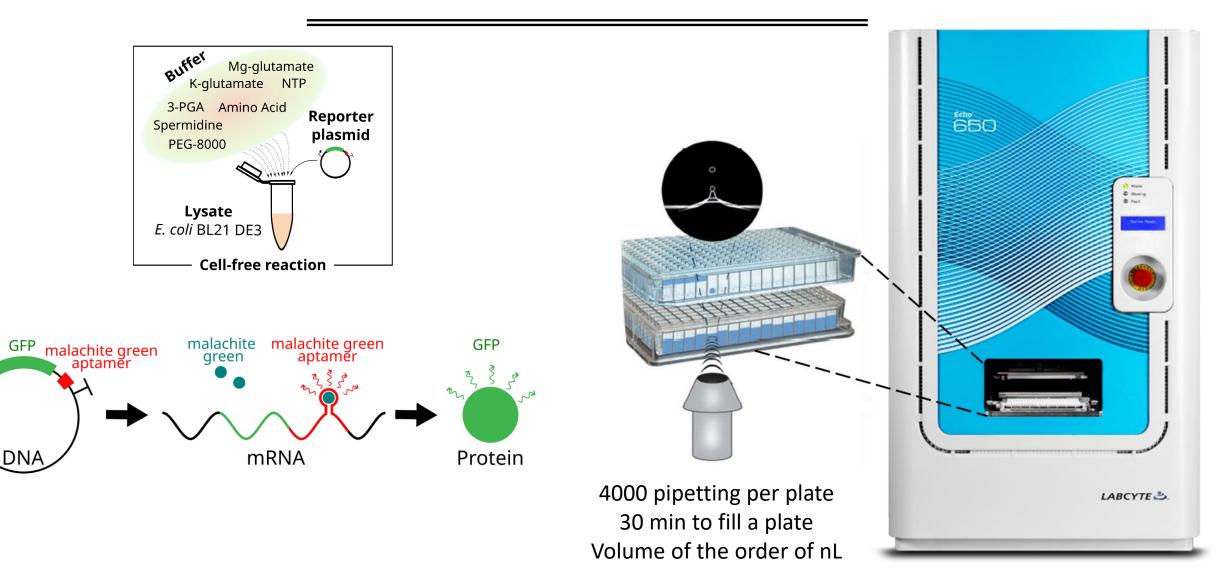

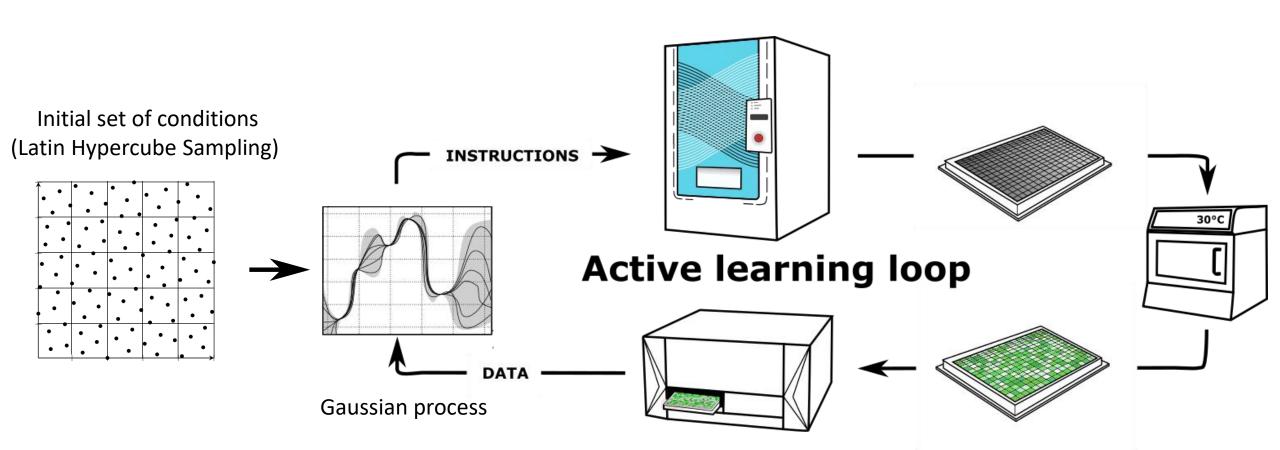

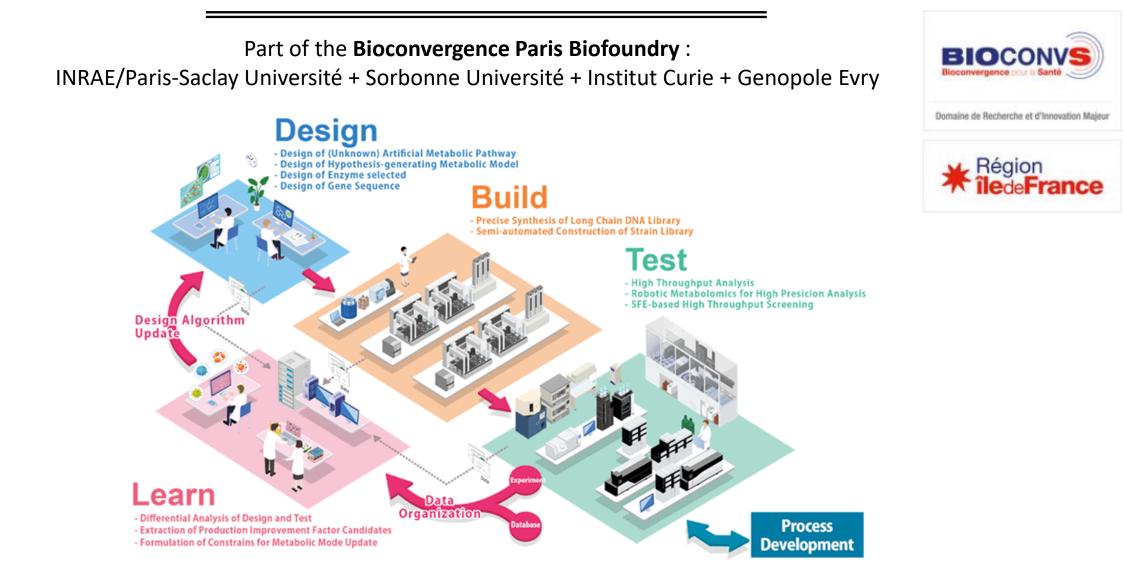
Combinatorial space = 4¹¹ = **4 194 304** compositions
